Reverend Crow was married to the former Edith Queen and they had two children, Mrs. Macy Brooks and Dr. John B. Crow.

IN MEMORIAM

Brother C. C. Crow was a brother loved by all who knew him. Many of us have been greatly blessed through his personality and influence. Clifford did not have it easy during the early years of his preparation and ministry. However, when he felt the call to preach, his compelling desire to seek the best preparation led him to Wake Forest College where he completed the full-course of study for a Bachelor of Arts degree. At the same time, he was providing for his family and serving churches wherever the opportunity presented itself.

Brother Crow was a dedicated Christian and a devoted minister. He enjoyed humor as much as any person. He believed that merriment and happiness could be brought to people's lives through this medium, if properly used. However, this did not diminish his dedication to the spiritual or the high and holy. Many of us will remember the noble prayers he uttered to his Lord, both publically and privately. He prayed as though he was acquainted with the Person to whom he was speaking.

Brother Crow was a man with a great common touch and appeal. People, upon meeting him, seemed to feel that they had known this man somewhere and expressed the feeling that his acquaintance was already made. I considered Clifford to be as near the perfect Christian gentleman as could be found. He had a balance and a poise that kept him in control of his faculties in the midst of trials and tests. He was a most successful pastor and preacher. He served well wherever he went. His personality and influence will continue to live even though he is gone from us for a while. Let us hear the words of Revelation 14:13 for truly they apply to Brother Crow. "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth. Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labours, and their works do follow them." We ask not for whom the bell tolls, we know it tolls for us and we are the living.

BRIEF HISTORY OF Bethel Baptist Church, Shelby, N. C.



Bethel Baptist Church began with the organization of a Sunday School on March 17, 1939 by Rev. Charles Clifton Mathewry. Rev. Mathewry conducted an open-air revival in the community September 1939. This and other factors contributed to the organization of the church.

On August 19, 1940 a lot was purchased from Mr. Solon Beem. The church was organized September 21, 1940 with 186 charter members. The Baptist Training Union was organized September 15, 1940. The first church budget was \$30.00 a week. The church applied for membership in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association on October 25, 1940.

Rev. J.A. Brock became pastor in October 1942. During his pastorate, the old church auditorium was begun February 1943 and completed October 1943.

Rev. D.W. Digh became pastor in 1949. During his ministry an educational plant was erected in 1951 and the auditorium enlarged.

The church called Dr. Ernest W. Arnold as pastor in December 1957. Church enrollment stood at 1075 when he moved on the field March 1958.

Although Bethel maintained a number of buses throughout her history, the first full-time bus ministry was begun in 1973 by Rev. and Mrs. Ray Pruitt. Rev. Pruitt also began Children's Church Services.

Dr. Earll moved on the church field June 1975. Dr. Earll foresaw the construction of 26 new Sunday School rooms added to the gymnasium area. June 4, 1978 ground was broken for construction of a new church auditorium, more Sunday School classrooms, choir practice room, nursery and offices, prayer rooms and conference room. Actual building began in July 1978 and completed in December 1979. In February 1979 a "Fund Raising Day" was held and \$114,000 was pledged and collected.

Rev. Bill Setzer conducts the Children's Church Services and bus ministry. Mr. Donald Ballingier is minister of youth and music with a choir membership of 76 voices.

Since our beloved church was founded there have been several goals the church has kept before it.

- (1) To preach the Word without fear or favor to the masses as they are to a world that needs it.
- (2) To win the lost to know Christ as Savior.
- (3) To build a great fellowship.

"Therefore, my beloved brethren be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, inasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this body shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

Under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, this association of churches seeks to further the Kingdom through the following:

- (1) the fostering of fellowship and cooperation among the member churches;
- (2) the ministering to the spiritual and physical needs of people;
- (3) the giving and receiving of information, assistance and training for member churches;
- (4) the cooperation with North Carolina Baptist State and Southern Baptist Conventions.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Membership Committee. Application should include:

1. Formal action by the group seeking admission reflecting that 75% of those voting expresses their intent to cooperate.
2. A written statement reflecting their beliefs and practices.
3. A written statement that expresses their intent to cooperate.
4. A willingness to meet with Membership Committee to discuss other items of mutual interest to both parties.

The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist belief and practice and what it means to cooperate with the churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. If recommended by this committee and accepted by the Association, a mission or a church shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a minimum of one year. Membership within the Association shall be determined by vote of the Association at its annual meeting. Churches under the watchcare shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its constitution and by-laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and if requested, the Associational Executive Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like associations.

ARTICLE IV MEETINGS

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Tuesday and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or Executive Board, provided two weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 3: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each fifty members of the church, provided each church shall not have less than three more than ten messengers. These shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those in attendance and registering at the Associational Meeting.

ARTICLE V AUTHORITY

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this Constitution in Article III, Section 2 and 3.

ARTICLE VI OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTIONS

Section 1: The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Music Director, Organist, Sunday School Director, Chairman of the Library Council, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, and Parliamentarian.

Section 2: The Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer shall be elected on the morning of the last day of the annual meeting. All other officers shall be contacted and nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Associational Executive Board at their April meeting.

Section 3: The newly elected Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer shall assume at the close of the annual session all duties incumbent upon them relating to work of the ensuing associational year. All other officers shall assume all duties incumbent upon them relating to the work of the ensuing year on October 1.

Section 4: Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election for two years.

ARTICLE VII TRUSTEES AND THEIR ELECTION

There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

ARTICLE VIII THE ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Associational Executive Board shall be composed of all Associational officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Associational Director of Missions, the Christian Social Ministries Director (ex-officio without voting privileges), each active pastor, two members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The Associational Executive Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the Constitution. Associational Executive Board members are the connecting link between the Association and the churches. Executive Board members should represent the churches to the Association. Executive Board members should act as representatives for the Association to the churches. It is the responsibility of the Executive Board members to promote the programs, represent the needs and report to the churches concerning the work and ministry of the Association. Executive Board members should seek acceptable means of representing the Association to their respective fellowships. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association in its Annual Meeting.

The quarterly meeting will be in January, April and July, on Monday after the third Sunday

ARTICLE IX COMMITTEES

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through the following annual meeting.

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the Annual Meeting:

1. Order of Business and Program Committee (By-Law IV, Section 1)
2. Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
3. Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
4. Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)
5. Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 5)
6. Nominating Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
7. Constitution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
8. Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
9. Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
10. Resolutions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
11. Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
12. Seminary Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
13. Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
14. Christian Social Ministry Committee (By-Law IV, Section 17)
15. Church Reconciliation Committee (By-Law IV, Section 18)
16. Mission Committee (By-Law IV, Section 19)
17. Recreation and Drama Committee (By-Law IV, Section 20)
18. Long Range Planning Committee.
19. Any other committee authorized by the Association.

B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting: Committee on Committees. (By-Law IV, Section 14)

Section 2: The following committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting to serve during the Annual Meeting: Enrollment Committee (By-Law IV, Section 16).

ARTICLE X AMENDMENTS

Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any Annual Session of the Association upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association on the first day and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association on the last day. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

BY-LAWS

By-Law I PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

By-Law II ASSOCIATION YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

By-Law III DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committee on Committees and Committee on Enrollment. He shall be the Chairman of the Associational Executive

Board and be an ex officio (without voting privileges) member of all other committees. Upon completion of his term of office, the Moderator shall become a member-at-large (for two years) of the Missions Committee, Executive, and the Executive Board.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be the Vice-Chairman of the Executive Board.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's Annual Meeting, distribute at the Annual Meeting copies of the digest of these reports, make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of Minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of Minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the Executive Board. He shall inform all members elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action. He shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its Executive Board, or as designated in the budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Board or the Association in annual session); render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the Annual Meeting and give a report at each quarterly Executive Board meeting and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Associational Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.

Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and make a written report to each Annual Meeting of the Association.

Section 6: The Sunday School Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Sunday School Department. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this committee that would promote this work.

The Associational Sunday School should assist church leaders to be more effective in their responsibility. This should include:

1. Provide opportunities for fellowship and inspiration.
2. Interpret the Sunday School Program.
3. Train Sunday School leaders.
4. Consult with Sunday School leaders concerning their program.
5. Provide organization and leadership for cooperative work among the churches.

Section 7: The Church Training Department shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Church Training Department. This officer shall attend Executive Committee meetings, maintain the co-opting work of this department at all times, and give an annual report to the Association.

Section 8: The Music Director shall provide leadership for the Association in session and when requested at other times during the year. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this Committee that would promote the work. He shall encourage music growth in the churches throughout the year and shall make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

Section 9: The Brotherhood Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of men and boys in the churches. The officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to promote the development of men and boys and an awareness of world mission needs.

Section 10: The Woman's Missionary Union Director serves on the Executive Committee of the Association and works with the Director of Missions; leads the WMU Council; confers with our associational WMU officers and assists them in

their work; leads in providing opportunities for leaders and members of their church WMUs to have fellowship and receive inspiration concerning their mutual mission task; leads in interpreting the WMU program to church leaders; leads in training church WMU workers and members; consults with church leaders concerning location of WMU work and the improvement of existing work; provides a plan for associational meeting; leads in associational WMU annual planning; leads in discovering mission action needs and in coordinating the work being done; and reports progress of WMU work to the Association and serves as contact between the Association and state WMU.

Section 11: The Chairman of the Library Council shall promote the beginning and maintenance of church libraries in the churches; provide training opportunities for church librarians; maintain and develop the associational library; attend the Executive Committee meetings; cooperate with the Director of Missions and make an annual report to the Association at its annual session.

Section 12: The Baptist Youth for Christ Director shall, under the supervision of the Director of Missions, guide and promote the youth activities of the King Mountain Baptist Association. Such activities may include:

1. Youth Council sessions.
2. Bi-monthly sessions of Youth for Christ in local churches.
3. A Kairos Crusade for Christ every 3 to 5 years.
4. Mission Vacation Bible School and/or Backyard VBS.
5. Sponsorship of a booth at Cleveland County Fair each October.
6. Any other activity which the Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Youth Council, Director of Missions, and Executive Committee deems necessary to foster a positive Christian witness for Christ.

Section 13: The Parliamentarian shall, at the Annual Meeting of the Association, rule on all questions of parliamentary procedure which shall arise during the sessions. The Parliamentarian shall serve as a resource person to the churches and shall, upon request, advise and assist the churches on matters of parliamentary procedure.

Section 14: Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Executive Board, except the office of Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1: **The Order of Business and Program Committee** shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Clerk and the Associational Music Director. It shall rotate the place of meeting among the groups of churches with the host church being determined by the group. It shall recommend the preacher and the alternate for the annual sermon. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting for the Association, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the Annual Meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the Annual Meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary. This committee will be responsible for promoting the Annual Meeting through the various news media.

Section 2: The Executive Committee

1. Shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk/Treasurer, Music Director, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMU Director, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Chairperson of the Christian Social Ministries Committee; President of the Pastors' Conference; Chairman of the Nominating Committee; President of the Committee on Committees, Chairman of Christian Life Committee, Chairman of Membership Committee, Chairman of Finance Committee, Chairman of Evangelism, and Chairman of Long Range Planning Committee.

2. When without a Director of Missions, this committee shall seek out and recommend to the Association, or its Executive Board, for election of a new Director of Missions according to By-Law VI, Section II.

3. It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or Executive Board and act on routine or emergency matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven is necessary to transact business.

Section 3: The Evangelism Committee, composed of six members, shall promote the work of evangelism in the churches and the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its Executive Board.

Section 4: The Finance Committee, composed of six members, two rotating annually, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs of an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the Association, upon request, with the stewardship programs offered by the Convention.

The Committee shall express gratitude to the churches for their stewardship development that enables them to participate in local, home, and foreign missions.

Section 5: The Ordination Committee, composed of five members, with the pastor of the home church (the church of which the candidate is a member), the Director of Missions, and deacons of the home and requesting churches, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

The Committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of the Minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conference at which the home voted to request examination of the candidate.

The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.

The Chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place, and procedure.

The Committee suggest that the candidate be questioned at least two weeks prior to his ordination.

The Committee shall question the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, and his personal life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.

The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the ministry.

In every instance, the Committee shall be guided by the Scripture, especially I Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-8.

The Committee shall give solemn notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the ordination.

The Chairman shall report the Committee's activities to the Executive Board quarterly and provide a written report for the Annual Meeting.

Section 6: The Nominating Committee, composed of six members, shall contact before and nominate at the April Executive Board meeting, the officers of the Association according to Article VI and VIII of the Constitution. This Committee shall also, in cooperation with the Nominating Committee of various departments (except the WMU and Brotherhood organizations), recommend workers for these various department. The officers and workers of these respective organizations shall be nominated by the organization themselves and submitted to the Nominating Committee (Article VI, Section 1). It shall also nominate associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our

convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. This Committee shall also assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

Section 7: The Constitution Committee, composed of three members, shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed.

Section 8: The Membership Committee, composed of five members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws. The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist faith and practice and what it means to cooperate with other churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. The Membership Committee shall annually review all churches and missions under the watchcare of the Association and may present them for membership within the Association or that they continue under the watchcare.

Section 9: The Calendar Committee shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMJ Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director and Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an Associational Calendar for the coming year and present same to the Executive Board for adoption.

Section 10: The Resolutions Committee composed of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation, plan and promote the work of the Committee in an annual planning meeting; and present resolutions of appreciation to individuals, organizations, and churches when there are events worthy of commendation.

Section 11: The Historical Committee shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and six other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Association Meeting.

Section 12: The Seminary Extension Committee, composed of three members, shall publicize study courses and programs that are available; and shall plan, provide and promote Seminary Extension studies as they may be desired.

Section 13: The Christian Life Committee, composed of six members, will give continual attention to the moral climate of the community and shall initiate necessary action to maintain and improve the climate. The committee shall commend these persons and institutions that uphold Christian virtue, and shall support the churches in the teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness.

Section 14: The Committee on Committees, composed of five members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX, Section 1), and shall assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies on all standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the Chairman of each committee.

Section 15: The Telephone Contact Committee shall be composed of one person from each group of churches in the Association (B). This committee members shall relay messages to pastors and key leaders during the year. All messages to be sent should be cleared with the Director of Missions.

Section 16: The Enrollment Committee shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of the messengers at all of the sessions.

Section 17: The Christian Social Ministry Committee, composed of six members, shall assist the CSM Director in the planning, promoting and correlation of the Christian Social Ministry programs. This is to be a sub-committee of the Associational Missions Committee, with the Chairperson of the CSM committee serving as a member of the Missions Committee. Its office members shall be the Moderator and the Director of Missions.

Section 18: The Church Reconciliation Committee shall be composed of the present Moderator as chairman, two immediate past Moderators and two lay persons to be appointed annually by the above stated members. The chairman will report to the Executive Committee or the Executive Board the names of those lay persons appointed. This committee will be open to any person or persons of a member church seeking assistance with problems related to their church.

Section 19: The Missions Committee shall be made up of the following members: the Director of Missions will be the chairman without voting privileges, Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Finance Committee Chairman, Chairpersons of CSM Committee, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMU Director, and President of the Pastor's Conference.

This Committee is to be available as a sounding board, to support the Director of Missions as a person (as well as an officer in the Association), provide feedback concerning Associational programs and activities, conveying suggestions from the Association, and offering support in projecting programs to the Executive Committee and/or Executive Board. The Missions Committee shall seek to determine areas of need within and without the Association and formulate recommendations to the Associational Executive Committee. This responsibility includes recommending the purchase of land for future church development to the Associational Executive Committee. The Missions Committee has no authority other than to make recommendations to the Executive Committee or the Executive Board. The Committee may be called together at the discretion of the Chairman or determine its own meeting time and place.

Section 20: The Recreation and Drama Committee shall promote a program of Christian recreation and drama in the churches. The Committee shall regard recreation and drama as a means, not an end. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall use their programs as a way to teach, a means of witnessing and an avenue of expressing the abundant Christian life. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall be responsible to give assistance to any church that should request help in the area of recreation and drama. The Committee's responsibilities shall include fellowships, Senior Adults, retreats, crafts, drama workshops and other assignments of the Association, if asked. The Chairman of the Recreation and Drama Committee shall plan with the Director of Missions and give a report of the committee's activities at the Executive Board quarterly meetings.

Section 21: "The Long Range Planning Committee" shall engage in continual planning at least five years in advance. It shall seek to be aware of changing needs of the community, the church, and the denomination. It shall also serve as a monitor committee to make certain that the Purpose of the association shall be followed in all programs, activities, and organizations of the association. It shall work with other committees in seeking to carry out the Purpose of the association.

Section 22: Members of all these committees, except those appointed by the Moderator, shall be elected to serve not more than three years on a rotating basis.

By-Law V TRUSTEES

The duty of the Trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other securities of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its Executive Board.

By-Law VI DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

Section 1: His selection shall be upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association at its Annual Meeting, or between sessions of the Association, by its Executive Board. His time of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity.

By-Law VII DIRECTOR OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRY

Section 1: Employment - The Director of CSM shall be jointly employed by the Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Home Mission Board. The employee should be elected to work until the sponsoring groups mutually agree to cease the tenure of service or the employee resigns. The CSM Director shall work under the supervision of the Director of Missions and in compliance with the Job Description provided by the State and Association.

Section 2: Basic Function - The basic functions are to work with the CSM Committee to organize, supervise and promote a program of activities to meet the spiritual, educational, emotional and physical needs of the people within the geographical boundaries of the Association.

Section 3: The CSM Director shall be an ex officio member of the Associational Executive Board, Associational Executive Committee and Missions Committee without voting privileges.

Section 4: When without a Christian Social Ministries Director, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Christian Social Ministries Director according to By-Law VII Section 1 and 2.

By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the Annual Meeting by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

By-Law IX DEFINE PROCEDURE

Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.

Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six Associational Groups as follows: Polkville, Lenoire, Sherry, Kings Mountain, Crover, and Waco.

BETHEL BAPTIST CHURCH
October 20, 1981
Tuesday Afternoon

1. Messengers and visitors gathered in the Bethel Baptist Church of Shelby for the 131st Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.
2. Moderator Marion Adams called the meeting to order at 1:00 P.M. He welcomed everyone and gave thanks to Bethel Baptist Church for being our host.
3. Rev. Bob Dills, Associational Music Director and Minister of Music at First Baptist Church of Shelby, led the congregation in singing "For the Beauty of the Earth," accompanied by Mrs. Marie Horne at the organ.
4. Rev. Jerry Ransfelt, pastor of Denver Baptist Church, opened by reading Psalm 2:1-13. The prayer was led by Rev. Paul Wall, pastor of Zion Baptist Church.
5. Rev. Marion Adams gave a special welcome to a group of Gardner-Webb church administration students who were accompanied by Dr. Robert Lamb.
6. Rev. Broadus Hearberly, pastor of Mt. Sinai Baptist Church, brought a recommendation from the Order of Business Committee that the program be accepted as printed and approved and made the motion to that effect. It was seconded by Rev. Randy Bell and approved.
7. Moderator Marion Adams asked that enrollment cards be completed by those who have not already done so, and they were collected.
8. The appointment of the Committee on Committees was read by Moderator Marion Adams. This committee will be: Rev. Russell Pitts, chairman; Mrs. John Berry Hamrick, Mrs. Inez Connor, Rev. Jim Rice, and Rev. J.C. Goans.
9. Rev. Ned Backner, pastor of Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, brought before the association the proposed constitutional change in Article II, Article IX, and By-Law IV. This change was explained by Rev. Paul Sorrells, chairman of the Long Range Planning Committee. This change is found elsewhere in this volume.
10. Moderator Marion Adams asked everyone to stand and greet those around them.
11. The report of the Executive Board was given by Mr. Joe Cabaniss, Clerk-Treasurer. This report is found elsewhere in this volume. Mr. Cabaniss moved that this report be adopted as read. Rev. Clyde Bearden, vice-moderator, seconded the motion and it was approved.
12. Dr. Wyan Washburn gave our Historian Report. He mentioned anniversaries of several of our older churches that are 100 years old or older. He then recognized Mrs. Delores Hamrick of Poplar Springs Baptist Church. She encouraged all churches in our association to set up "History Rooms" in their church in order to keep records of their church history up-to-date and accessible to others. She gave a vivid description of the history room at Poplar Springs Baptist Church.
13. Our enrollment was then announced by Clerk-Treasurer Joe Cabaniss as being a total of 316 for this session. This includes 260 messengers, 40 others within our association, and 16 from outside our association.

15. Rev. Bob Davis, our Christian Social Ministries Director, was recognized to give his report. Mr. Davis asked if there were others who would like to go to the Day at the Convention in Greensboro on November 3. The reservations need to be made as soon as possible. He then introduced Mrs. Dawn Martin of the Child Abuse Prevention Service, Rev. Billy Cooper of the First Baptist Church of Shelby and Director of the Stages Ministry, and Mrs. Suele Anthony of the Day Care Center for Retarded Adults at First Baptist Church. With the help of these people and their reports from their ministries, we had a look at our Christian Social Ministry Programs for this past year. Mr. Davis' report is found elsewhere in this volume.

16. Vice-Moderator Clyde Bearden recognized Rev. Bob Dills to lead the congregation in singing "Bless Be the Tie That Binds".

17. Rev. C.O. Greene of the Ordination Committee gave a correction to the report he gave earlier to include the ordination of Rev. Bob Dills of the First Baptist Church of Shelby.

18. Rev. Royce Ballow, pastor of Waco Baptist Church, was recognized to give the Sunday School report. The enrollment for the past year was shown to be down by only 2% from the previous year. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.

19. The Church Training report was then given by Rev. Broadus Housharty, pastor of Mt. Sinai Baptist Church. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.

20. Rev. Glenn Davenport of the First Baptist Church in Shelby gave our Youth report. This included details of a Youth Retreat that was held this year at Ridgecrest. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.

21. Rev. Cline Borders, Director of Missions, then recognized and welcomed our new ministers. They were: Jerry Rumlak - pastor of Dover, Jeff Jones - Minister of Music at Kings Mountain Baptist, Teresa Edmondson - Minister of Education at Second Baptist in Shelby, Larry Morris - pastor of Putnam Memorial, Tim Jordan - Assistant pastor of Patterson Grove, and Harold Flippin - pastor of New Buffalo.

22. The Membership Committee report was given by Rev. Kent Walters, pastor of Union Baptist Church. In his report some of our new work was mentioned. This includes the Pathway Mission near Kings Mountain which was recognized for its work during this past year. A new church, Second Baptist Church of Groves, has been formed. Rev. Walters then moved that we accept this church under our watchcare. This was seconded by Mr. Baxter Scruggs and approved. The pastor, Rev. Ken Lynch, along with Robin Wray, Roseatha Panther, Velvia Martin, Wilma Lynch, Don Gibson, Lena Dingus, David Black was recognized as being present today.

23. Rev. Alton Martin, pastor of Polkville Baptist Church, gave the Evangelism report. He emphasized the 1982 Nontrinitarian Crusade and Lay Evangelism Training. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.

24. A congregational hymn was led by Rev. Bob Dills. This was "Oh, How I Love Jesus".

25. The Ministers of Music Quartet gave a program of music that was enjoyed by all. This quartet includes Allen Jolley, Steven Coldiron, Don Ballingier, and Bob Dills. They were accompanied by Mrs. Marie Horne on the piano.

26. The Moderator's message was then given by Rev. Marion Adams. He read from Acts 2:14 and 17-21. The theme of his message was our responsibility of today to minister to all people in Cleveland County and to win them for Jesus Christ. He emphasized the need for all of us to work together.

27. Rev. J.M. Ezell, pastor of our host church, Bethel Baptist, gave directions and thanks for our evening meal. We then adjourned to the gym for the meal until 7:00 P.M.

Tuesday Evening

28. Rev. Paul Sorrells, pastor of Beaver Dam Baptist Church, along with puppeteers from Poplar Springs Baptist Church and Mr. Don Ballingier from Bethel Baptist Church presented a drama on the history of Bethel, our host church. He expressed his appreciation for being permitted program time for this presentation. The purpose of the drama was two-fold: to review the history of Bethel Church and to study some principles of church growth which will be effective in most churches.

29. Rev. Bob Dills led the congregation in singing "To God Be the Glory". He also introduced the organist, Mrs. Marie Horne from Westview.

30. Rev. Bill Parker, pastor of Allen Memorial Baptist Church, read the scripture passage from I Corinthians 13.
31. The opening prayer was led by Rev. Joe Edwards, pastor of Laramore Baptist Church.
32. Clae W. Borders, Director of Missions, gave his report. The report is found elsewhere in this volume. He expressed appreciation for the willing workers who have served in our association during the 1980-81 year.
33. Rev. Jerry King, pastor of Westview Baptist Church, and chairman of the Finance Committee, presented the budget for 1981-82. Copies had been distributed as the messengers arrived. Mr. King noted that we only had an increase of 4.12% over last year's budget and also that our goal is to be able in the future to financially support our Christian Social Ministries' Director 100%. Rev. Clyde Bearden moved the adoption of the budget. Motion was seconded and carried.
34. Moderator Marion Adams asked that we be prayerful for our country and be ready to assist those who are in need in our country. Following was a few moments in silent prayer.
35. Rev. Richard Pyles, pastor of Patterson Grove Baptist Church, and chairman of the General Building Committee, gave the Building Committee report. That report is found elsewhere in this volume.
36. Mr. Joe Cabanis, Treasurer and Chairman of the Special Gifts Committee, presented the Special Gifts report. Copies had been distributed earlier. He made note that total borrowed funds for our new facility was \$129,000.00 at an interest rate of 13.5% with payments being \$2,000 per month. Mr. Cabanis then presented the treasurer's report for the 1980-81 year in addition to the report of contributions from the churches. Mr. Cabanis stated that Mrs. Phyllis Johnson had been contacted and would perform an audit in the near future. Motion was made by Rev. Randy Bell that these reports be approved, seconded by Alfred Waters and carried.
37. Rev. Bob Dills led us in singing "I Will Sing of My Redeemer".
38. Rev. Fred Wells, pastor of Midview Baptist Church, introduced our speaker for the evening message which was brought by Rev. Richard Everett, Director of Personal Evangelism from the Evangelism Department of the Baptist State Convention in Raleigh.
39. Rev. Bob Dills introduced the Ballenger Family, from our host church, who presented our special music for the evening.
40. For his scripture passage, Rev. Everett read Judges 6:1-2, 11; 7:1-3. His message centered on "Reaching the Unreached for Christ". He stated that people are searching for something and vowed that we take God's Word and share it with those who need it. He felt that the greatest need in America is a revival of God's people.
41. The report on enrollment was given by Mr. Joe Cabanis. There were 357 messengers and visitors attending the evening session.
42. Rev. Claude White, pastor of Victory Baptist Church, gave the benediction.

Wednesday Morning

October 21, 1981

43. The session was called to order by Moderator, Marion Adams, at 9:30 A.M.
44. Rev. Bob Dills, Minister of Music at First Baptist Church, Shelby, led the congregation in singing "Come We That Love the Lord".
45. Rev. Paul Silver, pastor of Faith Baptist Church, read scripture from Ephesians 4.
46. The opening prayer was led by Rev. James Parks, pastor of David Baptist Church.
47. Moderator Marion Adams asked if anyone from the Greater group of churches would like to volunteer for our 1982 Annual Meeting. No decision was made at this time.

48. Rev. Paul Sorrells, chairman of the Long Range Planning Committee, presented the six Priority Statements for adoption. Copies had been distributed as messengers arrived. Mr. Sorrells moved that these statements be adopted, seconded by Mr. Marion Thacker and carried. These statements are found elsewhere in this volume.

Mr. Sorrells presented the statement of purpose to be adopted. He made a motion that the statement be adopted, seconded by Rev. Ray Bell and carried.

Rev. Frank Monroe asked that under Item 3 that the word "information" be added to read as follows: "The giving and receiving of information, assistance, and training for member churches." James Parks made a motion that this change be made. Motion was seconded and approved.

Mr. Sorrells made a motion that the Long Range Planning Committee become a standing committee in the association, seconded by Rev. Frank Monroe and approved.

49. Moderator Marion Adams recognized Mr. J.Y. Roper who was attending the Annual Meeting for the 40th consecutive year. Dr. S.L. Luman, Rev. Ernest Smith, and Mr. W.H. "Coot" Lutz were also recognized for having joined only one year in the past some 30 years.

50. The following organizational reports were made:

Music - Bob Dills

Media Center - Bonnie Price

These reports are found elsewhere in this volume.

51. Moderator Marion Adams called on Rev. Clive Borders to preside during the election of officers. Mr. Carlos Young nominated our present moderator, Marion Adams, as moderator. Rev. Clyde Boarden moved the nominations be closed. Motion was seconded and carried. Rev. Marion Adams was re-elected as our moderator.

Rev. Jim Rice nominated our present vice-moderator, Rev. Clyde Boarden, as vice-moderator. There was a motion that nominations cease. That motion was seconded and carried. Rev. Clyde Boarden was re-elected as our vice-moderator.

Rev. Royce Ballou nominated Mr. Joe Cabanis as clerk-treasurer. Mr. Carlos Young moved he be elected by affirmation, seconded by Rev. Ken Walters and carried. Mr. Cabanis was re-elected as clerk-treasurer.

52. Rev. Ken Walters presented the Committee on Committees report. Mr. Walters moved the report be accepted, seconded by Rev. Jim Rice and carried. That report is found elsewhere in this volume.

53. Rev. Sam Murphy presented the Christian Life Committee report. That report is found elsewhere in this volume.

54. Rev. Bob Dills led us in singing "My Jesus I Love Thee".

55. Rev. J.C. Gouge, pastor of Kings Mountain Baptist, gave the Resolutions Committee report. That report is found elsewhere in this volume.

56. Rev. J.C. Gouge made a motion that the Minutes be dedicated to the memory of Rev. C.C. Crow, seconded by Rev. Ray Bell and carried.

57. Mr. Joe Cabanis gave the report on enrollment. There were 184 messengers and visitors attending the morning session.

58. At this time, prayer requests were called for by Moderator Marion Adams. After a period of silent prayer, Vice-Moderator Clyde Boarden led in prayer.

59. Representatives of convention agencies were recognized at this time. Those recognized included: Doree Jenkins, Children's Homes and Carlos Young, Baptist Hospital.

60. Rev. Clyde Boarden, Prayer Chairman, requested our association to pray for our upcoming Convention and for the Simultaneous Crusade.

61. Our re-elected associational officers were recognized and pictures were made for the newspapers.

62. Rev. Fred Carter, pastor of Emmanuel Baptist Church, reported that one minister, 23 deacons, and 341 lay persons of our Baptist churches have deceased during the year. This Memorial report is found elsewhere in this report.
63. Rev. Bob Dills introduced Mr. Steve Coldiron, Minister of Music at Elizabeth Baptist, who presented our special music for the morning. Mr. Coldiron was accompanied at the piano by Sherrie Cox, also from Elizabeth Baptist Church.
64. Moderator Marion Adams introduced Rev. Wilson Padgett, pastor of Tweside Baptist Church, who presented the annual sermon. He used passages from Acts 4 for his scripture. The theme of his message was: "Bold Outreach". He stated that churches need to speak out against the forces of evil, that when revival comes to a church the moral standards will be raised, and that if our nation comes closer to God, it will be through our churches.
65. Moderator Marion Adams gave the benediction.
66. Rev. Paul Sceriffo, pastor of Beaver Dam Baptist Church, issued an invitation for the 1983 Annual Meeting to be held at Beaver Dam.
67. The meeting was declared adjourned by Moderator Marion Adams.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS - ANNUAL REPORT

This is the seventh time I have reported to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. These years have been some of the most challenging and rewarding years in my ministry. I enjoy reporting to you.

The groundbreaking for our new office facility was accomplished by putting the chairman of the Building Committee, Richard Plyler, at a plow with a long rope attached to it. All of those who gathered for the groundbreaking service then put their hands on the rope and pulled as Mr. Plyler broke ground for our new building. I was at the head of that line as we all pulled. I could not feel the pressure of the plow due to the multitude of hands who were pulling the rope. While that may have been true at groundbreaking for the associational building, I want you to know that since that time, indeed, I have felt the pressure of the needs and the challenges of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association during this year 1980-81.

The staff of the association has worked together as a team throughout this year. We are fortunate indeed to have such able and willing workers.

Our association has required much of her leadership this past year. Rev. Richard Plyler, chairman of our General Building Committee, has given us very capable and challenging leadership. Joe Calambas, chairman of our Special Gifts Committee, has done an excellent piece of work in attracting \$58,377.68 for our new facility. Rev. Paul Sorrells has pulled together the research and efforts of our Long Range Planning Committee. Chairman Sorrells has led in establishing the priorities of the association for the next five to ten years. The leaders of our organizations, Beth Hazzick, WMU Director; Willard Boyles, Brotherhood Director; Rev. Royce Hallow, Sunday School Director; and Rev. Broadus Heatherly, Church Training Director have each filled vital roles throughout the year.

The work of this association could not be done without the able assistance of the many volunteers who work with us. We became impressed with the large number of volunteers and the quality of their work. Because of this, we began keeping an accounting of the hours that they have given in the office since January, 1981. Since that time, there have been 525 volunteer hours given in the associational office. This does not account for the number of hours that are given in programs related to the association out in the community at prisons, courts, and other places nor the 100 volunteer hours given the day of our move from downtown Shelby to our new office facility. Over 20 volunteers using 7 trucks came to help make us make the transition. Like an army they moved steadily back and forth and within five hours time had transported all of our belongings from Marion Street to 1175 Wyke Road. Now it took us longer than five hours to sort it out, separate it, and put it where it belonged but it was in-house and we could begin working on it as a staff.

I want to express for myself and for the associational staff our abiding gratitude to the people who have so lovingly helped us and often times on a very short notice to accomplish the program and meet the needs of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

This past year provided me an opportunity to preach in 47 of our churches across the association. It was my privilege to visit with 63 other congregations. I had the opportunity of being in the office or home of 14 of our ministers and to conduct 26 workshops or seminars throughout the year.

The highlight of my day is when I am invited to share in the life and ministry of the churches in the Kings Mountain Association. An expression of this was the 400 personal conferences throughout the year. 529 telephone conferences gave me an added contact with the leadership of the churches. I wrote 643 personal letters in support of the ministry of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. During the year, I conducted 2 revivals and trained 9 Pulpit-Selection Committees. I participated in 32 associational meetings and was involved in 20 Baptist State

Convention meetings throughout the year. I made 27 hospital calls to pastors and/or members of their families throughout the year. I attended 9 pastors' conferences and shared in 27 professional and personal growth groups for ministers. I produced one article for publication and participated in 13 associational activities for the year.

This report clearly indicates that we have a reason to rejoice. This is the first year that our associational receipts have exceeded \$100,000 and the receipts of the churches have gone beyond the \$6,000,000 mark.

During the year, I have served on the Program Planning Committee for the 1981 Joint Baptist Convention between North Carolina Baptists and the General Baptists of North Carolina. A very exciting opportunity came when I was asked to serve on the Commission on Ministry. I served as sub-chairman of one of these committees and the commission's report will be considered at the 1981 Baptist State Convention. There are many of us who believe that this is going to prove to be a monumental step in the life of North Carolina Baptists as we seek to develop better pastor/church relations. Currently, I am serving as a trustee of the Meredith Baptist College. This year will be my last term as President of the Conference of Directors of Missions for the Southern Baptist Convention. I will conclude my office as president at the convention in New Orleans and then serve four years on the Advisory Committee for the conference.

Our Marriage Enrichment Retreat at Ridgecrest was an exciting adventure. Mrs. Borders and I were extremely pleased to provide leadership for 18 couples who participated in this growth opportunity.

We are making every effort to stimulate growth in the churches of the Kings Mountain Association. One of the ways that we tried to accomplish this was to determine the number of people who did not have an on-going relationship with a church in our county. In order to isolate this unknown factor, we contacted every church in the county that we could find listed and discovered that out of the 225 churches our county that total resident membership was 42,000. When we considered the total population of the county it was clearly evident that there was 40,000 people residing in our county who do not have an on-going relationship with any church in the locality.

Following this we did a study of the population development of Cleveland County from the 1980 census compared to the growth rate of our churches. The census revealed a 19.87% increase in Cleveland County over the past ten years while the churches of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association revealed a 14.42% increase.

Our breakfast for the personnel of the midway of the Cleveland County Fair continues to be a very exciting mission opportunity. This year we served 164 persons and with the seconds and thirds, we served 225 plates. Rev. Royce Balfew, from the Waco Baptist Church, presented the plan of salvation in a very attractive manner. How exciting it was and how keenly we felt the presence of God as we took the gospel to the market place.

Currently, we have 26 students, enrolled in classes from Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, meeting in our facility each Monday. These men come from Charlotte, Statesville, Asheville, and Greenville, S.C. How grateful I am that you have made a place here in our association where these ministers can meet and continue to improve their abilities to be more productive servants for the Lord Jesus Christ.

Evaluation continues to be very important to the ministry of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. Each quarter when the Missions Committee meets, the first item on the agenda is to evaluate the leadership role of your Director of Missions. This is healthy and helpful. We have a great association, but it will continue to be great only as we look at it realistically, evaluate the use of our energies, seek to discover our strengths, complement each others weaknesses and be committed to Jesus Christ and to reaching people.



CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRIES
1980-1981 Annual Report
Kings Mountain Baptist Association

I am pleased to report to you the events which have made this another meaningful year of ministry among the churches of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

Our Juvenile Court Ministry continued with the Minister's Day in Court Program. Five ministers served on a rotating basis by attending court on Tuesdays, being support persons for the court personnel and being available to minister to families as occasion permitted.

In October-November the First Baptist Church of Shelby sponsored creative classes for five youth. This allowed the youth a very creative experience and they made gifts to give to their families for the Christmas season.

During the fall of '80 the Samary Hall Ministries came to Shelby with a religious rock concert. One hundred and forty-two youth made decisions during this time. We received the names of these and distributed the information to appropriate pastors.

Our Juvenile Court fund provided Christmas gifts for the youth who were in Stowersall Jackson Training School.

In April of 1981, eighteen persons attended a picnic at Kings Mountain State Park. Eleven churches assisted with this project. On June 19, 1981, fourteen youth went on a field trip to the North Carolina Zoological Gardens. Two churches assisted in this. The highlight of the year was the retreat at Carolina Beach. Sixteen attended this. We left on Monday and returned on Friday.

We assisted with two trips to the Western Carolina Correctional Center where the juvenile court youth participated in the "final step" program. This program involves a tour of the prison facility and a presentation by a panel of inmates and follow-up discussion.

In addition to this, I continue to serve on the Admissions Committee of the Lutheran Group Home, and attended six convective meetings.

Plans have been completed for a camp in October of '81 and we are finalizing plans for a social in November. We hope to include Juvenile Court in our Associational Youth Camp, June 28-July 2 of 1982, as well as continue the trip to Carolina Beach for those who have done unusually well in their probation period.

Our Prison Ministry continues to focus on weekly Bible Study, Yokefellow, and individual counseling. Rev. Wade Dellinger has worked with our Bible Study Group that meets on Wednesday afternoon. The Yokefellow Ministry has met every other Tuesday, using volunteers from our churches and from Gardner-Webb College. Attendance has been extremely good, with a high of sixty-two. Eight inmates have made professions of faith and are struggling with their own personal growth. We have averaged sixty-five in attendance at these meetings. Response from church groups has been excellent. We have had "home-baked" goodies at each meeting. It is marvelous the witness of a cookie - it says, "someone out there cares about me".

At Christmas time, forty-eight churches/individuals responded to our gift pack project. We were able to provide gift packets for the 160 inmates who are at the local prison camp. We also assisted in the annual Christmas party at the prison and conducted a special communion service on December 23rd.

We continue to serve in a support roll with the Child Abuse Prevention Service of Cleveland County. They have office space in our new facility and use the building for the meetings. We enlisted the Elizabeth Baptist Church to sponsor

a Christmas party for the CAPS personnel and CAPS families in December 1981. Eighty people attended. Each child was given a gift and each family was given a large bag of fresh fruit. The Cleveland County Mental Health Association assisted with a gift of money.

In November, the Oak Grove Baptist Church co-sponsored an appreciation dinner for the foster parents of Cleveland County. Sixty-five people attended. Awards of special recognition were presented to Mrs. Sarah Hogue for serving as a foster parent for twenty-seven years, and to Mr. and Mrs. Fred Burgess for serving as foster parents to 130 children in twenty-one years of service.

We have had two meetings with representatives from our churches to investigate the possibilities of starting Single Adult Ministries on the associational level. We are still investigating this as a possibility.

We have had only limited participation in our literacy ministry. Some of our workers continue to be busy tutoring individuals, but this ministry has not reached the maximum of its potential. Literacy needs continue to be very real in Cleveland County.

We had two meetings of our Migrant Council. A pamphlet, Directory of Service Agencies, was prepared and distributed through the service agencies. Churches prepared 300 copies of the "Use Me Book" and four church groups prepared Health Care Kits.

In response to needs for ministry to senior adults, the Senior Adult Ministry Council was formed. This is made up of the leadership of our twenty senior adult groups within our churches. "S.A.M.," the Senior Adult Ministries newsletter is sent each month to over 600 senior adults. We have begun to have quarterly fellowship rallies. Our first was held in May at the First Baptist Church of Kings Mountain. 113 were in attendance representing nineteen churches. Our second meeting was held at Pleasant Ridge, with sixty-two present, representing ten churches. Our next rally will be on November 14 at 2:30 P.M., with the program being presented by Mr. Jim Saul of the North Carolina Baptist Homes. Elizabeth Baptist Church will host this meeting. We encouraged each church to observe Senior Adult Emphasis Day in May. The county-wide Health Fair for older Americans was held in April. We had a special display booth emphasizing spiritual, mental, and physical health. This year we are working with the Council on Aging to plan four mini-health fairs in four areas of our county.

One of our newest ministries is that which deals with the mentally retarded. We worked with First Baptist in Shelby in co-sponsoring tickets for Northside School to attend a special showing of the movie, *Joni*. We discovered a segment of our community in which no ministry was being done for the severely retarded adult. First Baptist in Shelby responded to this need and has begun a day care program for the severely retarded adult. The enrollment has reached seven, with a potential of eleven. The program meets Monday - Thursday from 9:00 - 12:00 noon. This is under the direction of Sallie Anthony, Day Care Director for the First Baptist Church in Shelby. Volunteers were used to begin this ministry. Recently First Baptist voted to employ a teacher and an aid to work with the program.

We were involved in the planning stages of the Shelby Christian Rehabilitation Center, a much needed ministry in Cleveland County. This has become a reality and the service capacity for housing of those recovering from alcoholism is ten. Mr. Jim Robinsdall serves as president of the Board of Directors. This is an interdenominational effort with the Christian approach to the cure of alcoholism.

We served as a resource for the Westview Baptist Church in their summer mission project to West Virginia. Several couples went to West Virginia in July to visit a small church with construction and community survey. Enthusiasm ran high throughout the whole church as they helped to sponsor those who went. Plans are in the making for another mission trip in the summer of 1982.

Emergency and Relief Ministry continues to be a growing need in our country. This year we received food, clothing, money, and furniture from 453 church groups/individuals. We received application for assistance from 929 families and were able to provide assistance for 782 of these.

Since we entered our new facility on Wyke Road, we have begun our furniture ministry. The sixteen fire departments throughout Cleveland County have begun to collect furniture and store it in our basement. Several families have been helped since this ministry began. We have completed the paper work for becoming a participating agency for the Food Bank of Charlotte. Under this plan, food can be purchased from the food bank for ten cents a pound.

We have recently assisted the Highland Baptist Church of Shelby in opening a food and clothing room so that they can minister to the needy in Shelby. This service is being offered to each church who has an interest in beginning such a ministry.

At the present time, we are working on an interdenominational level to better co-ordinate the programs of Emergency and Relief so that duplication can be avoided and we can better minister to those in need.

An appeal was made last year for the churches to enlist a C.S.M. Representative. Response to this was good. We had a total of forty-four representatives representing thirty-nine churches. We continue to ask your support in enlisting a C.S.M. Representative from your church. We will have four training workshops this year for our C.S.M. Representatives. The first one will be November 22 at 2:30 P.M. at the associational office and will deal with the Biblical basis of ministry and Emergency and Relief Ministries.

1982 has been designated as the year to strengthen the family on the Southern Baptist Convention level of the Home Mission Board. Much of our C.S.M. programming on the associational level will be directed toward strengthening the family in Cleveland County.

Let me take this opportunity to thank you for your continued good work in involvement in local ministry and for the joy that is mine in serving with you in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. May we prayerfully continue to find more effective ways to serve Him who loves us all in very special ways.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

The year 1980 was the second of a three-year WMU emphasis on Life-Changing Commitments. The aim of this emphasis is to lead church members to make life-changing commitments for the support of missions. The emphasis undergirds Bold Mission Thrust.

REPORT OF THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

The members of the Membership Committee would like to express their appreciation for the opportunity they have had this year to serve you, the people and churches of the association, by providing support and encouragement to churches seeking membership in our great association. We have sought to be encouraging, supportive, and have stood ready with advice for churches and missions in their formative stage, seeking to gain their feet and minister in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ.

We of the committee have met twice this year, once with members of the leadership of Pathway Mission and once with Second Baptist Church of Grover. Our Director of Missions has been available to meet with us on one of these occasions.

Pathway Mission, located south of Kings Mountain, has continued this year under the watchcare of our association. We have continued to see this mission grow in service to the Lord under the able leadership of Rev. James Hamrick. They are presently renting two vans to reach out to their community and bring people to the services. Their membership has grown to thirty-five with forty-seven enrolled in Sunday School. Last Sunday, October 18, they enjoyed their High Attendance Sunday and had fifty in Sunday School and fifty-seven in worship service. A new G.A. chapter is being organized to give the girls the mission information and challenge which the fifteen boys are receiving in their already-functioning R.A. chapter. Pathway Mission this year has bought property for their future. They purchased one and one-half acres bordering their present meeting site with the possibility of buying more as it is needed.

We look forward to a continued close relationship with Pathway Mission as they remain in watchcare to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

Our second privilege of the year has been working with the pastor and membership of the newly-formed Second Baptist Church of Grover. On June 26, 1981 our committee received a letter from Rev. Ken Lynch, pastor of Second Baptist of Grover, applying for membership in our association. The letter stated that the church had a "harden to reach the lost for Christ and to regain the backsliders". To accomplish this, the church promised:

- "to be a cooperating member of the association,
- to be a lighthouse for all those who we may come in contact with,

ASSOCIATIONAL HISTORY COMMITTEE
W. Wynn Washburn, M.D., chairman

The following **Priority Statements** were presented by the Long Range Planning Committee and adopted at the Kings Mountain Baptist Association annual meeting.

EVANGELISM. The first Long Range Planning Committee of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association listed evangelism as a priority. Records revealed to them a decline in baptisms and attendance. Two efforts were put forth to correct the decline: a Simultaneous Crusade and the James Robinson Crusade. Both were a help; however, baptisms continue to decline - from 807 in 1972, to 485 in 1979.

Therefore, the Long Range Planning Committee wishes to recommend that the association diligently search for ways to encourage the churches to place new emphasis on winning the lost.

LEADERSHIP TRAINING. One of the most frequently mentioned items from a questionnaire sent to pastors was praise for training opportunities provided by the association. Such events should be continued. These events include Vacation Bible School clinics, committee training, lay leadership training, lay evangelism training, and seminars and workshops designed primarily for pastors. The association should continue to provide leadership training and ever be alert to ways of improving its services.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRIES. Since the last Long Range Planning Committee report, a full-time Christian Social Ministries Director has been employed. Mr. Davis has instituted social programs which have benefited the churches and reached many neglected persons. Area social agencies indicate this effort has been a wise investment of association money. Work has also begun with Singles and Senior Adults from the churches. Work with the prison system, the court system, juvenile offenders, the clothes closet, the food bank, and other programs need to be continued.

UNITY AMONG THE CHURCHES. This priority deals with the attitude of churches toward each other. A careful study of the history of the association will reveal that there has always been a spirit of competition among the churches. Sometimes this competition has reached destructive levels. In many associations, there are small churches, middle-sized churches, and large churches. Each church knows its niche and thus does not feel competitive with other churches. However, our association is made up of many churches of nearly equal size, and this fosters a spirit of competition. This phenomenon needs to be recognized and a spirit of competition developed that is complementary, rather than destructive.

Areas where competition needs to be maintained include church "territories," program duplications, proselytizing of active church members, and duplication of ministries simply out of a spirit of competition. Our enemy is the Devil with his scourge of sin, not other churches. The association should constantly seek to build unity among the churches built upon the foundation that there is one Lord and one Body.

STARTING NEW CHURCHES. In the last five years, at least nine churches have been started in our associational area. Yet only two of these are a part of our association. The fact that new churches are being started says that people are interested. There are more people per church in Cleveland County now than there were in 1950. New congregations reach more people.

The association should aid in locating geographical areas where a church is needed, help conduct a census, locate a meeting place, and give counsel. It is hoped that a member church or churches would serve as sponsors, thereby allowing associational leadership to turn its attention to other needs.

COOPERATION AMONG THE CHURCHES... The association should serve as a channel for the churches to mutually benefit themselves, each other, and the Kingdom of God. Pastors praised the association for providing opportunities "to work together doing greater things than one church can do." They mentioned specifically paper cost savings and the tape cassette ministry. The idea of forming a co-op should be explored. Such a co-op might allow churches to save on purchases of fuel, custodial supplies, lawn and cemetery equipment, fertilizer, athletic equipment, and kitchen supplies.

The association is already serving as a resource center for clothing and food from the churches, for information about staff position needs and prospects, and for information about genuine needs of persons in church communities. Also, the association coordinates Garden-Webb Ministerial Education Day.

The association should also maintain an information bank on the work of local social agencies. Such information is too technical, too temporal, and too expansive for each church to know in order to meet community needs.

We urge the association to continue its many efforts to foster cooperation among the churches.


