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# DEDICATION

By action of the 1982 Annual Session, the 1982 Minutes of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association are dedicated to the memory of the Reverend W. Clyde Bearden, who at the time of his death, was serving as pastor of First Baptist Church, Kings Mountain, North Carolina.



## IN MEMORIAM

"The Nearness of God" was the sermon title for W. Clyde Bearden's last Sunday morning sermon. Early on the following day, Monday, March 15, 1982, after having given himself to a "full days" service at his church, First Baptist Church, Kings Mountain, N.C., W. Clyde Bearden experienced the ultimate in God's nearness as he passed from this life into life eternal.

William Clyde Bearden was born in Mountain Rest, (Oconee County), South Carolina on June 19, 1925. He committed his life to Christ early in life, and at the age of seventeen years acknowledged God's call for his life. He was ordained to the gospel ministry by the Elson Creek Baptist Church, Liberty, South Carolina in 1941. His first years of ministry (1940-42) were spent in evangelism. Clyde believed God's call to preach also included a call to prepare himself for ministry. He received his formal education at the North Greenville Junior College, Taylors, South Carolina; Gardner-Webb College, Boiling Springs, North Carolina; Lenoir Rhyne College, Hickory, North Carolina; and Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina. Throughout his ministry he never lost his hunger for study and knowledge.

Clyde is remembered as a "faithful friend".

Clyde was a faithful friend to the Biblical concept of the home. It was while in

evangelism he met Essie Jackson of Greensboro, North Carolina. On January 21, 1942, they were married. God blessed this union with one son, Harold Basden, who now resides in Charlotte, North Carolina.

He was a faithful friend to the Lord's church. Although a native of South Carolina, his pastoral ministry of forty-one years was spent serving six churches in North Carolina. They were: Immanuel Baptist Church, Greensboro; Third Baptist Church, Charlotte; Mount Home Baptist Church, Morganton; Railow Baptist Church, Asheville; Greenland Avenue Baptist Church, Charlotte; and the First Baptist Church, Kings Mountain. In addition to being an able pastor-teacher, Clyde was also an effective preacher. Many churches were blessed by his ministry as the visiting evangelist during revivals.

Clyde was a faithful friend to his denomination. This was true on both the associational and state levels. With the exception of his last pastorate, Clyde was elected moderator of every association in which he served such as the Catawba, the Mecklenburg, and the Randolph Associations. At the time of his unexpected death, he was serving as vice-moderator of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association, and would have no doubt been chosen as moderator.

Other denominational service included: Trustee, Gardner-Whit College; Ministerial Board Advisor, Gardner-Whit College; president, vice-president, and secretary of North Carolina Baptist Pastors' Conference; and the following positions with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention: member of General Board, conference leader, Sunday School and Church Training Departments; and Evangelism Committee.

When Clyde embarked for Heaven the Father's words "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord" seemed to have special meaning to all who knew him. We rest confidently in the promise that the works of this "fallen prince" will continue to follow him for generations to come. To God be the Glory!

# BRIEF HISTORY OF New Hope Baptist Church, Earl, N.C.



New Hope Baptist Church was formally organized in August 1874.

Abba Earl gave five acres of land for the church ground and J.W. Gibbons gave a rod to include a spring for water.

The first building was a one room frame structure about forty by fifty feet.

Rev. Thomas Dixon with Elders from Buffalo and Antioch Baptist Churches helped to organize and start the new church. The name "New Hope" was chosen because it expressed the feelings of the fifty new converts from a Brush Arbor Revival and others bringing their letters from nearby churches making a total of 161 Charter members.

New Hope joined the Kings Mountain Baptist Association in 1875 and has co-operated in the various ministries of that body since.

A Sabbath School was organized in 1881. In 1923 a B.Y.P.U. was started.

During the pastorate of Rev. John W. Battle, from 1908-1918, a new church building was erected with a sanctuary seating 500. Two years later eight new Sunday School rooms were added, along with an indoor baptistry.

Through the years New Hope has ordained four of its young men for the ministry and one young woman as a missionary.

In 1968, New Hope voted to call a full-time pastor and erected a parsonage.

On August 1, 1964, New Hope moved into its third and present church building with C.A. Kirby, Jr. as pastor.

Twenty-six men have served as pastors during the past 100 years. Rev. M. David Gordon is the present pastor.



# BRIEF HISTORY OF Bethlehem Baptist Church Kings Mountain, N.C.



In the year of our Lord, 1841, several Baptists living in the Bethlehem community, then known as White Plains, felt the need for a local place of worship. They built a meeting house and became an arm of the Antioch Baptist Church. On July 18, 1842, the growing congregation organized Bethlehem Baptist Church and twenty-six letters were presented for membership.

In 1848, a log church was built, not far from the present location, on one and a half acres of land that was given by Mr. James Alton.

In 1859, a frame church was built adjacent to the present location of the church. The land was given to the church by Dr. Thomas Williams of Shelby.

The frame church building was used until 1898, when, during the Great Depression, the present brick building was constructed, housing the sanctuary with side wings.

Bethlehem was originally a part of the Broad River Association. On May 12, 1854, the church left that association and joined the Kings Mountain Association.

In conference, March 2, 1863, the church voted to build the church parsonage.

In conference, April 4, 1864, the church voted to renovate the sanctuary and the basement area so to build an education annex, with three floors, to the then existing structure.

Throughout the life of the church, Bethlehem has been guided by the leadership of thirty-seven (37) pastors. The current pastor, Rev. Samuel H. Murphy, was called as pastor in November, 1978. In 1981, Mr. Neal Efted was called as Minister of Education and his wife, Carolyn, was called as Minister of Music.

Growth is evidenced in the church; the present resident membership is 438. And, just as important, the record of contributions of the church for this year (1982) indicate that about one-fourth (24) of the total church receipts was given to missions - home and foreign.

## **CONSTITUTION**

### **PREAMBLE**

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

### **ARTICLE I NAME**

The name of this body shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

### **ARTICLE II PURPOSE**

Under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, this association of churches seeks to further the Kingdom through the following:

- (1) the fostering of fellowship and cooperation among the member churches;
- (2) the ministering to the spiritual and physical needs of people;
- (3) the giving and receiving of information, assistance and training for member churches;
- (4) the cooperation with North Carolina Baptist State and Southern Baptist Conventions.

### **ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP**

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Membership Committee. Application should include:

1. Formal action by the group seeking admission reflecting that 75% of those voting expresses their intent to cooperate.
2. A written statement reflecting their beliefs and practices.
3. A written statement that expresses their intent to cooperate.
4. A willingness to meet with Membership Committee to discuss other items of mutual interest to both parties.

The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist belief and practice and what it means to cooperate with the churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. If recommended by this committee and accepted by the Association, a mission or a church shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a minimum of one year. Membership within the Association shall be determined by vote of the Association at its annual meeting. Churches under the watchcare shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its constitution and by-laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and if requested, the Associational Executive Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like associations.

### **ARTICLE IV MEETINGS**

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Tuesday and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or Executive Board, provided two weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 3: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each fifty members of the church, provided each church shall not have less than three nor more than ten messengers. These shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those in attendance and registering at the Associational Meeting.

#### **ARTICLE V AUTHORITY**

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this Constitution in Article III, Section 2 and 3.

#### **ARTICLE VI OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTIONS**

Section 1: The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Music Director, Organist, Sunday School Director, Chairman of the Library Council, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, and Parliamentarian.

Section 2: The Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer shall be elected on the morning of the last day of the annual meeting. All other officers shall be contacted and nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Associational Executive Board at their April meeting.

Section 3: The newly elected Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer shall assume at the close of the annual session all duties incumbent upon them relating to work of the ensuing associational year. All other officers shall assume all duties incumbent upon them relating to the work of the ensuing year on October 1.

Section 4: Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election for two years.

#### **ARTICLE VII TRUSTEES AND THEIR ELECTION**

There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

#### **ARTICLE VIII THE ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD**

The Associational Executive Board shall be composed of all Associational officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Associational Director of Missions, the Christian Social Ministries Director (ex-officio without voting privileges), each active pastor, two members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The Associational Executive Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the Constitution. Associational Executive Board members are the connecting link between the Association and the churches. Executive Board members should represent the churches to the Association. Executive Board members should act as representatives for the Association to the churches. It is the responsibility of the Executive Board members to promote the programs, represent the needs and report to the churches concerning the work and ministry of the Association. Executive Board members should seek acceptable means of representing the Association to their respective fellowships. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association in its Annual Meeting.

The quarterly meeting will be in January, April and July, on Monday after the third Sunday

## **ARTICLE IX COMMITTEES**

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through the following annual meeting.

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the Annual Meeting:

1. Order of Business and Program Committee (By-Law IV, Section 1)
2. Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
3. Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
4. Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)
5. Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 5)
6. Nominating Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
7. Constitution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
8. Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
9. Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
10. Resolutions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
11. Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
12. Seminary Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
13. Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
14. Christian Social Ministry Committee (By-Law IV, Section 17)
15. Church Reconciliation Committee (By-Law IV, Section 18)
16. Mission Committee (By-Law IV, Section 19)
17. Recreation and Drama Committee (By-Law IV, Section 20)
18. Strategy Planning Committee.
19. Any other committee authorized by the Association.

B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting: Committee on Committees. (By-Law IV, Section 14)

Section 2: The following committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting to serve during the Annual Meeting: Enrollments Committee (By-Law IV, Section 16).

## **ARTICLE X AMENDMENTS**

Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any Annual Session of the Association upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association on the first day and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association on the last day. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

## **BY-LAWS**

### **By-Law I PARLIAMENTARY RULES**

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

### **By-Law II ASSOCIATION YEAR**

The Associational Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

### **By-Law III DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committee on Committees and Committee on Enrollments. He shall be the Chairman of the Associational Executive

Board and be an *ex officio* (without voting privileges) member of all other committees. Upon completion of his term of office, the Moderator shall become a member-at-large (for two years) of the Missions Committee, Executive, and the Executive Board.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be the Vice-Chairman of the Executive Board.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's Annual Meeting, distribute at the Annual Meeting copies of the digest of these reports, make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of Minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of Minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the Executive Board. He shall inform all members elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action. He shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its Executive Board, or as designated in the budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Board or the Association in annual session); render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the Annual Meeting and give a report at each quarterly Executive Board meeting and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Associational Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.

Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and make a written report to each Annual Meeting of the Association.

Section 6: The Sunday School Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Sunday School Department. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this committee that would promote this work.

The Associational Sunday School should assist church leaders to be more effective in their responsibility. This should include:

1. Provide opportunities for fellowship and inspiration.
2. Interpret the Sunday School Program.
3. Train Sunday School leaders.
4. Consult with Sunday School leaders concerning their program.
5. Provide organization and leadership for cooperative work among the churches.

Section 7: The Church Training Department shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Church Training Department. This officer shall attend Executive Committee meetings, maintain the on-going work of this department at all times, and give an annual report to the Association.

Section 8: The Music Director shall provide leadership for the Association in session and when requested at other times during the year. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this Committee that would promote the work. He shall encourage music growth in the churches throughout the year and shall make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

Section 9: The Brotherhood Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of men and boys in the churches. The officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to promote the development of men and boys and an awareness of world mission needs.

Section 10: The Woman's Missionary Union Director serves on the Executive Committee of the Association and works with the Director of Missions; leads the WMU Council; confers with our associational WMU officers and assists them in

their work; leads in providing opportunities for leaders and members of their church WMUs to have fellowship and receive inspiration concerning their mutual mission task; leads in interpreting the WMU program to church leaders; leads in training church WMU workers and members; consults with church leaders concerning initiation of WMU work and the improvement of existing work; provides at and plans for associational meeting; leads in associational WMU annual planning; leads in discovering mission action needs and in coordinating the work being done; and reports progress of WMU work to the Association and serves as contact between the Association and state WMU.

Section 11: The Chairman of the Library Council shall promote the beginning and maintenance of church libraries in the churches; provide training opportunities for church librarians; maintain and develop the associational library; attend the Executive Committee meetings; cooperate with the Director of Missions and make an annual report to the Association at its annual session.

Section 12: The Baptist Youth for Christ Director shall, under the supervision of the Director of Missions, guide and promote the youth activities of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. Such activities may include:

1. Youth Council sessions.
2. Bi-monthly sessions of Youth for Christ in local churches.
3. A Kalena Crusade for Christ every 3 to 5 years.
4. Mission Vacation Bible School and/or Backyard VBS.
5. Sponsorship of a booth at Cleveland County Fair each October.
6. Any other activity which the Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Youth Council, Director of Missions, and Executive Committee deems necessary to foster a positive Christian witness for Christ.

Section 13: The Parliamentarian shall, at the Annual Meeting of the Association, rule on all questions of parliamentary procedure which shall arise during the session. The Parliamentarian shall serve as a resource person to the churches and shall, upon request, advise and assist the churches on matters of parliamentary procedure.

Section 14: Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Executive Board, except the office of Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

## **By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES**

Section 1: **The Order of Business and Program Committee** shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Clerk and the Associational Music Director. It shall rotate the place of meeting among the groups of churches with the host church being determined by the group. It shall recommend the preacher and the alternate for the annual session. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting for the Association, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the Annual Meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the Annual Meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary. This committee will be responsible for promoting the Annual Meeting through the various news media.

### **Section 2: The Executive Committee**

1. Shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk/Treasurer, Music Director, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMU Director, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Chairperson of the Christian Social Ministries Committee, President of the Pastors' Conference, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, President of the Committee on Committees, Chairman of Christian Life Committee, Chairman of Membership Committee, Chairman of Finance Committee, Chairman of Evangelism, and Chairman of Long Range Planning Committee.

2. When without a Director of Missions, this committee shall seek out and recommend to the Association, or its Executive Board, for election of a new Director of Missions according to By-Law VI, Section 11.

3. It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or Executive Board and act on routine or emergency matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven is necessary to transact business. Section 3: **The Evangelism Committee**, composed of six members, shall promote the work of evangelism in the churches and the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its Executive Board.

Section 4: **The Finance Committee**, composed of six members, two rotating annually, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs of an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the Association, upon request, with the stewardship programs offered by the Convention.

The Committee shall express gratitude to the churches for their stewardship development that enables them to participate in local, home, and foreign missions.

Section 5: **The Ordination Committee**, composed of five members, with the pastor of the home church (the church of which the candidate is a member), the Director of Missions, and deacons of the home and requesting churches, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

The Committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of the Minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conference at which the home voted to request examination of the candidate.

The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.

The Chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place, and procedure.

The Committee suggests that the candidate be questioned at least two weeks prior to his ordination.

The Committee shall question the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, and his personal life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.

The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the ministry.

In every instance, the Committee shall be guided by the Scripture, especially I Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-9.

The Committee shall give written notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the ordination.

The Chairman shall report the Committee's activities to the Executive Board quarterly and provide a written report for the Annual Meeting.

Section 6: **The Nominating Committee**, composed of six members, shall contact before and nominate at the April Executive Board meeting, the officers of the Association according to Article VI and VIII of the Constitution. This Committee shall also, in cooperation with the Nominating Committee of various departments except the WMU and Brotherhood organizations, recommend workers for these various departments. The officers and workers of these respective organizations shall be nominated by the organization themselves and submitted to the Nominating Committee (Article VI, Section 1). It shall also nominate associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our



convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. This Committee shall also assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

**Section 7: The Constitution Committee**, composed of three members, shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed.

**Section 8: The Membership Committee**, composed of five members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws. The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist faith and practice and what it means to cooperate with other churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. The Membership Committee shall annually review all churches and missions under the watchcare of the Association and may present them for membership within the Association or that they continue under the watchcare.

**Section 9: The Calendar Committee** shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMJ Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director and Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an Associational Calendar for the coming year and present same to the Executive Board for adoption.

**Section 10: The Resolutions Committee** composed of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation, plan and promote the work of the Committee in an annual planning meeting; and present resolutions of appreciation to individuals, organizations, and churches when there are events worthy of commendation.

**Section 11: The Historical Committee** shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and six other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Association Meeting.

**Section 12: The Seminary Extension Committee**, composed of three members, shall publicize study courses and programs that are available; and shall plan, provide and promote Seminary Extension studies as they may be desired.

**Section 13: The Christian Life Committee**, composed of six members, will give continual attention to the moral climate of the community and shall initiate necessary action to maintain and improve the climate. The committee shall commend those persons and institutions that uphold Christian virtue, and shall support the churches in the teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness.

**Section 14: The Committee on Committees**, composed of five members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX, Section 1), and shall assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies on all standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the Chairman of each committee.

**Section 15: The Telephone Contact Committee** shall be composed of one person from each group of churches in the Association (8). These committee members shall relay messages to pastors and key leaders during the year. All messages to be sent should be cleared with the Director of Missions.

**Section 16: The Enrollment Committee** shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of the messengers at all of the sessions.

**Section 17: The Christian Social Ministry Committee**, composed of six members, shall assist the CSM Director in the planning, promoting and correlation of the Christian Social Ministry programs. This is to be a sub-committee of the Associational Missions Committee, with the Chairperson of the CSM committee serving as a member of the Missions Committee. Ex officio members shall be the Moderator and the Director of Missions.

**Section 18: The Church Reconciliation Committee** shall be composed of the present Moderator as chairman, two immediate past Moderators and two lay persons to be appointed annually by the above stated members. The chairman will report to the Executive Committee or the Executive Board the names of those lay persons appointed. This committee will be open to any person or persons of a member church seeking assistance with problems related to their church.

**Section 19: The Missions Committee** shall be made up of the following members: Chairman, nominated by 'The Committee on Committees' and elected by the Association at the Annual Meeting, the Director of Missions, Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Finance Committee Chairman, Chairperson of CSM Committee, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WML Director, and President of the Pastors' Conference.

This Committee is to be available as a sounding board, to support the Director of Missions as a person (as well as an officer in the Association), provide feedback concerning Associational programs and activities, conveying suggestions from the Association and offering support in projecting programs to the Executive Committee and/or Executive Board. The Missions Committee shall seek to determine areas of need within and without the Association and formulate recommendations to the Associational/ Executive Committee.

The Committee shall enthusiastically explore all mission possibilities throughout the Association, emphasizing the need for new teaching units, preaching points, missions, and churches; and it shall actively seek out potential sponsoring churches for the beginning of specific mission endeavors. Providing energetic outreach leadership for the Association shall be the Committee's highest priority.

**Section 20: The Recreation and Drama Committee** shall promote a program of Christian recreation and drama in the churches. The Committee shall regard recreation and drama as a means, not an end. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall use their programs as a way to teach, a means of witnessing and an avenue of expressing the abundant Christian life. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall be responsible to give assistance to any church that should request help in the area of recreation and drama. The Committee's responsibilities shall include fellowships, Senior Adults, retreats, crafts, drama workshops and other assignments of the Association, if asked. The Chairman of the Recreation and Drama Committee shall plan with the Director of Missions and give a report of the committee's activities at the Executive Board quarterly meetings.

**Section 21: The Strategy Planning Committee**, composed of five members, shall seek to understand the 'Priority Statements' of the Association; provide support and suggestions to the appropriate committees for implementation; and recognize personally and publicly the committees that address themselves to, and make significant accomplishment in achieving the 'Priority Statements.' At a time it judges appropriate, the Committee will also suggest to the Association the need for further strategy planning.

**Section 22:** Members of all these committees, except those appointed by the Moderator, shall be elected to serve not more than three years on a rotating basis.

#### **By-Law V TRUSTEES**

The duty of the Trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other securities of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its Executive Board.

## **By-Law VI DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS**

Section 1: His selection shall be upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association at its Annual Meeting, or between sessions of the Association, by its Executive Board. His time of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity.

## **By-Law VII DIRECTOR OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRY**

Section 1: Employment - The Director of CSM shall be jointly employed by the Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Home Mission Board. The employee should be elected to work until the sponsoring groups mutually agree to cease the tenure of service or the employee resigns. The CSM Director shall work under the supervision of the Director of Missions and in compliance with the Job Description provided by the State and Association.

Section 2: Basic Function - The basic functions are to work with the CSM Committee to organize, supervise and promote a program of activities to meet the spiritual, educational, emotional and physical needs of the people within the geographical boundaries of the Association.

Section 3: The CSM Director shall be an ex officio member of the Associational Executive Board, Associational Executive Committee and Missions Committee without voting privileges.

Section 4: When without a Christian Social Ministries Director, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Christian Social Ministries Director according to By-Law VII Section 1 and 2.

## **By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS**

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the Annual Meeting by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

## **By-Law IX DEFINE PROCEDURE**

Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.

Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six Associational Groups as follows: Polkville, Lattimore, Shelby, Kings Mountain, Grover, and Waco.

PROCEEDINGS  
October 18, 1982  
Tuesday Afternoon

1. Messengers and visitors gathered in the New Hope Baptist Church for the 122nd Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

2. Moderator Marion Adams, pastor of Lily Memorial Baptist Church, called the meeting to order at 2:00 P.M. He also expressed appreciation to the New Hope Baptist Church for being our host and welcomed everyone to the meeting.

3. Rev. Bob Davis led the congregation in singing "Standing on the Promises," accompanied by Mrs. Beth Hamrick at the organ.

4. Rev. Paul Gray, pastor of Normans Grove Baptist Church, opened by reading Psalm 45. Marion Adams ask if there were any prayer request and then Rev. Sam Saylor, pastor of Christian Freedom Baptist Church, led in the opening prayer.

5. The Order of Business report was given by Rev. Brontus Heatherly, pastor of Mt. Sinai Baptist Church. He moved that the order of program be accepted as printed. Rev. Ned Buckner, pastor of Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, seconded the motion and it was approved.

6. Moderator Marion Adams asked that the enrollment cards be completed and the officers collected them.

7. Rev. Bob Dills, Associational Music Director and Minister of Music at First Baptist Church of Shelby, led the congregation in singing "I Love Thee."

8. The appointment of the Committee on Committees was read by Moderator Marion Adams. This committee will be: Dr. Joel Jenkins, chairman, Mrs. Frances Cline, Mrs. Jane Scovella, Rev. John Hunter, and Rev. Allen Jolley.

9. Rev. Ned Buckner brought before the association the proposed constitutional change in Bylaw IV section 19 and 20. This change is found elsewhere in this volume. This will be voted on Wednesday.

10. The report of the Executive Board was given by Joe Cabaniss, Clerk-treasurer. He also gave the Treasurers report for 1981-82. These reports are found elsewhere in this volume. Mr. Cabaniss moved that we accept these reports. Rev. J.C. Goss seconded the motion and it was approved.

11. Dr. Wyan Washburn gave the Historian report. During his report, Dr. Washburn stated that he and Mrs. Washburn and Mr. and Mrs. Gaines Washburn were donating a computer (TRS 80 Model II) to the associational office. This computer was on display at the front of the church. It will be used for such things as history accounts, payroll, minutes of the meeting and all records that must be kept in the associational office. Spontaneous applause followed as an expression of appreciation.

12. Our enrollment was then announced by Joe Cabaniss as being 368 for this session. This included 256 messengers and 89 others within our association and 23 visitors.

13. Rev. Bob Davis, Christian Social Ministries Director, gave his report to the association. This report is found elsewhere in this volume. He mentioned a series of programs to be shown on cable television on pornography. He stated that we should help fight pornography in Cleveland County. He also presented written guidelines for the Emergency and Relief ministries and a list of mission projects. These were available on a table in the front. Mr. Davis shared a slide presentation of the many ministries in Cleveland County.

14. Rev. Bob Dills led us in singing "The Bond of Love."

15. The Sunday School report was then given by Rev. Rayne Ballow, pastor of Ware Baptist Church. This report is found elsewhere in this volume. Rev. Ballow noted that Sunday School attendance is up but enrollment is down.

16. Rev. Dave Gordon, pastor of our host church New Hope, gave the Church

Training report. He stated that enrollment is up 12.2% this past year. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.

17. Rev. Billy Cooper of First Baptist Church of Shelby then gave the Youth Report in the absence of Rev. Glenn Davenport, associational youth director. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.

18. Rev. Clint Borders, Director of Missions, was recognized by Marion Adams to introduce new ministries and staff in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. Rev. Borders gave a warm welcome to: Gerry Davis—pastor of Tangle, Paul Gray—pastor of Norman Grove, Sam Snyder—pastor of Christian Freedom, Miss Morris—youth director of Putnam Memorial, Rev. and Mrs. Bruce Hancock—pastor of Oak Grove, William Ewing—pastor of Plains View, Caris Owens—pastor of New Buffalo, Glenn Walker—pastor of Patterson Springs, Rev. and Mrs. John Seidgen—pastor of Lawndale, Rev. and Mrs. Dean Proctor—pastor of Allen Memorial, Rev. and Mrs. E. Harvey Rogers—pastor of Fallston, and Presley Statte—pastor of New Prospect. Those new in the association but not present were: Andy Maude—pastor of Elliott Memorial, Lloyd Sanders—pastor of Love Valley, Bill Barber—associate pastor of Pleasant Ridge, Dale Clark—music director of Ldy, Rodia Mann—music director of Fallston, James Greene—pastor of Piedmont, Tim Rauli—music director of Zion, and Michael Thompson—music director of Allen Memorial.

19. The Membership Committee report was then given by Rev. Ken Walters pastor of Union Baptist Church. This report is found elsewhere in this volume. It noted that the Grover Second Baptist Church, later known as Christopher Ross Baptist Church, has disbanded. He also praised the work of the Pathway Mission in Kings Mountain. He made a motion that Pathway be admitted to full membership in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. Glenn Griffin seconded the motion and it was approved. Rev. James Harrick, pastor of Pathway, was asked to come forward and speak. He thanked the association for the vote and ask that we continue to pray for Pathway.

20. Vice-moderator Alton Martin took charge of the meeting at this point.

21. Miss Susan Wilson of Eastside Baptist Church in Shelby presented an enjoyable program of song.

22. The scripture for the moderators message was read by Rev. Alton Martin from Ephesians 4: 10-25 and 11 Second 23: 10.

23. The Moderators message was then given by Rev. Marion Adams. The theme for his message was "Back to the Bible" and the title was "Clng To the Sword", the sword being the Word of God.

24. Rev. Dave Gordon gave directions and thanks for our evening meal. We then adjourned for the meal until 7:00 P.M.

#### Thursday Night October 18, 1962

25. Vice-moderator Alton Martin called the Thursday night session to order at 7:00 P.M. He recognized Bob Dills who introduced Mrs. Yvonne Watterson, wife of Rev. Gene Watterson, pastor of First Baptist Church of Shelby, and Jerry Massey accompanying her on the piano. They presented a mini concert.

26. Rev. Bob Dills led the congregation in singing a medley of songs that everyone knew.

27. Rev. Dean Proctor, pastor of Allen Memorial, read the scripture from Acts 26: 17.

28. Rev. Larry Morris, pastor of Putnam Memorial, led in the opening prayer.

29. Enrollment cards were taken up from those who did not fill one out earlier today.

30. Rev. Sam Murphy, pastor of Bethlehem Baptist Church, our host church for Wednesday, gave directions to his church for our next session.
31. Elmer W. Borders, director of missions, gave his report. This report is found elsewhere in this volume. He expressed the need to reach the unchurched of Cleveland County.
32. Chairman of the Finance Committee and pastor of Flint Hill Baptist Church, Rev. Ed Sessom, presented the proposed budget for 1962-63. Copies had been distributed as the messengers arrived. Rev. Sessom noted the 4% decrease in the total budget. He motioned that the budget be adopted. Carlos Young seconded. Then Rev. Royce Balfew ask to have the Sunday School budget increased from \$975 to \$1100. W.H. Lutz seconded. An explanation by Rev. Balfew followed as to the plans for more training for Sunday School workers that would need this funding. Warren Reid called the question. The amendment was voted on. It passed 18 to 12 and was adopted. S.L. Lottin called the second question for the total budget to be adopted. This was voted on and passed.
33. Children from Elizabeth and Mt. Sinai who were one through three year winners of the Childrens Bible Drill were recognized by Rev. Dave Gordon.
34. Bobby Lowman, summer worker, gave his report for the summer of 1961. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
35. Rev. Ed Sessom gave the Ordination Committee report. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
36. The Special Gifts Committee report was given by Carlos Young. He recognized some of those who have served on this committee. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
37. The Evangelism Committee report was given by Rev. Larry Morris. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
38. Rev. Broadus Heatherly, pastor of Mt. Sinai, announced that Beaver Dam Baptist Church and Mt. Sinai Baptist Church had invited us to meet at their churches for our 1962 meeting. Mr. J.Y. Eger made the motion and it was seconded by Larry Morris. Voted and approved.
39. Joe Calverline reported that we had a total attendance for the day of 424.
40. Rev. Allen Jolley, music director of Kings Mountain First Baptist Church, presented a program of special songs. He was accompanied by Ellen Flinn on the piano.
41. Rev. Richard Flyler, pastor of Patterson Grove Baptist Church, read the scripture passages from Matthew, John, Ephesians, Colossians and Revelation. He then introduced the guest speaker, Rev. C.O. Greene. He gave an annual sermon entitled "Footsteps." He traced the sound of footsteps all the way from the steps of the donkey that carried Mary to Bethlehem to the steps on the third day from the tomb.
42. Ellen Fitzgerald, music director for Double Shoals Baptist Church, sang "Footprints of Jesus" accompanied at the piano by Jane Cooke.
43. Rev. Pressley Stotts, pastor of New Prospect Baptist Church, gave the benediction.

Wednesday Morning  
October 20, 1962

44. Messengers and visitors gathered in the Bethlehem Baptist Church for the morning session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association Annual Meeting.

45. The session was called to order by Moderator, Marion Adams, at 9:30 A.M.

46. Rev. Bob Dille, Associational Music Director and Minister of Music at First Baptist Church of Shelby, led the congregation in singing "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing," accompanied by Mrs. Ruth Hamrick at the organ.

47. Rev. Harvey Rogers, Jr., pastor of Fallston Baptist Church, read scriptures from Isaiah 55:1-4 and Revelation 5:12-13.

48. The opening prayer was led by Rev. Michael Faulkner, pastor of Peach Street Baptist Church.

49. Moderator Marion Adams expressed thanks for the spirit in the association this year and in years gone by.

50. The following organizational reports were made:

WMU—Ruth Hamrick

Music—Bob Dille

Media Center—Donna Price

These reports are found elsewhere in this volume.

Brotherhood—Clint Borders reported, in the absence of Willard Boyles, that a Prayer Breakfast was held again this year for the fair personnel of the Cleveland County Fair. He reported a greater spirit of cooperation among fair personnel this year and also reported that one hundred thirty-seven were served breakfast. Mr. Borders announced a Missionary Rally to be held at Shelby First Baptist Church on November 21 at 3:00 P.M. for men and boys. Mr. Boney Braxington, Area Secretary of Western South America, will be the guest speaker.

51. Moderator Marion Adams presided for the election of officers. He called upon Rev. Sam Murphy, host pastor, to lead in prayer. Mr. Adams asked for nominees for moderator. Rev. J.C. Gears nominated Rev. Broadus Heatherly and Rev. Walter Hill nominated Rev. Alton Martin. Dr. S.L. Lantz made a motion that nominations cease, seconded by Mr. Warren Reid and motion carried. The vote was taken and Rev. Alton Martin was elected as the new moderator. Mr. Adams asked for nominees for vice-moderator. Rev. Ernest Smith nominated Rev. Broadus Heatherly. Rev. Royce Ballou moved that Rev. Heatherly be elected by acclamation. Rev. Ken Walters seconded the motion and the motion carried. Mr. Adams asked for nominees for clerk-treasurer. Mr. Walter Davis nominated Mr. Joseph E. Calverton as clerk-treasurer and moved that he be elected by acclamation.

52. Rev. Sam Murphy, pastor of Bethlehem Baptist Church, presented the Christian Life Committee report. That report is found elsewhere in this volume.

53. Rev. Bob Dille led the congregation in singing, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus."

54. Rev. Russell Fitts, pastor of Zion Baptist Church, presented the Committee on Committee report. Rev. Fitts moved that the report be accepted. There were no nominations from the floor. The motion was seconded by Rev. Sam Murphy and carried. That report is found elsewhere in this volume.

55. Rev. Ned Buckner, pastor of Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, presented the con-

stitutional changes for approval and requested a motion to vote on the changes as a group, seconded by Rev. Royce Hollow and carried. Rev. Buckner made a motion that the changes be adopted, seconded by Rev. Broadus Heatherly. Following a discussion the motion carried.

56. Rev. J.C. Goode, pastor of Kings Mountain Baptist Church, gave the Resolutions Committee Report. Rev. Dave Gordon suggested that the Resolutions Committee also express appreciation to the volunteers from the Grover group of churches who assisted in serving the meal. That report is found elsewhere in this volume.

57. On behalf of the Resolutions Committee, Rev. J.C. Goode made a motion to dedicate the Minutes of this Annual Meeting to the memory of Rev. Clyde Bearden, seconded by Mr. J.Y. Roper and carried.

58. The report on enrollment was given by Mr. Joe Cabarison. He reported 148 alerted messengers present, 35 non-messengers, and 10 visitors outside the association for a total enrollment of 193. Visitors were recognized.

59. Rev. Ernest Smith reported that 7 pastors, 13 deacons, and 124 lay persons of our Baptist churches have died during the year. This Memorial report is found elsewhere in this volume. The congregation stood for a moment of silent prayer in memory of the deceased followed by a prayer by Rev. Smith.

60. Representatives of conversion agencies were recognized at this time. Those recognized included: Joe Burvette, Home for the Aging; Steve Hoffman, Baptist Children's Homes; Doug Aldrich, Wake Forest; Royce Hollow, Christian Action League; and Bill Crouch, Gardner-Webb.

61. At this time the new officers for 1983-84 were recognized and the moderator asked for prayers for them during the coming year.

62. Rev. Larry Morris, Chairman of Evangelism, was recognized at this time. He presented the following recommendation: The Evangelism Committee of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association recommends that we conduct an Area Wide Crusade the week before public schools begin in 1984. Mr. Morris moved that this recommendation be accepted and was seconded by Rev. Jim Rice. Following a discussion the motion was approved.

63. Moderator Marion Adams recognized Mr. J.Y. Roper who was attending the Annual Meeting for the 41st consecutive year. Rev. Ernest Smith and Dr. S.L. Laman were also recognized for having retired only one year in the past some 39 years.

64. Rev. Paul Wall, pastor of Zion Baptist Church, asked if we needed to appoint a chairman of the Missions Committee since the director of missions will no longer serve in that capacity. Rev. Clyde Bearden stated that the chairman would be elected by the Executive Committee.

65. Rev. Bob Dille introduced Mr. Steve Coldiron, Minister of Music at Elizabeth Baptist, who along with Rev. Dille presented our special music for the morning session. They sang "O How He Loves You and Me" and "Close to Thee".

66. Rev. Broadus Heatherly introduced Dr. Carl Ray, general secretary-treasurer for the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, who presented our message. Dr. Ray's sermon title was "How Can I Bear Witness About Jesus, to My Community, My World, and My State?" He asked how do we keep the denomination on target. He made two appeals: that we come with a fresh commitment to keeping the agenda and to take up our task of telling the world about Jesus. He stated that it is our task to proclaim the Bible, not to defend it.

67. Moderator Marion Adams presented our new moderator Alton Martin.

68. The meeting was declared adjourned by Moderator Marion Adams, who also dismissed with prayer.

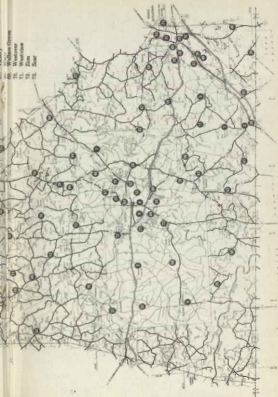

#### REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

At a called session on September 28, 1979, the Kings Mountain Baptist Association extended a call to me to become their director of missions. I visited the annual meeting in October and my duties began on November 1, 1979. This marks the end of my ninth and the beginning of my tenth year as your director of missions.

I come to a recognized association. The Kings Mountain Baptist Association has had a long standing reputation across North Carolina. This has been true because of her many and strong churches. This has been true because of the leadership of pastors. This has been true because of the leadership that has chartered her path—Lewis Laddum, T.W. Bray and C.G. Greene. My challenge was to maintain the legacy of the director of missions.

Change is with us. Persons, churches and agencies that do not make the needed and necessary adjustments will share the same fate as dinosaurs. My anxiety is not what the change will do to us — my anxiety is the consequences we face if we fail to change. Every generation must experience a new and personal awareness of God's grace as expressed through Jesus Christ. We have the great challenge to find a new way to make the old stay alive, vibrant and life-changing to each generation.

My message has two points: the need and the blessing.

The need we must face up to is a great deficit of people in Cleveland County who do not have an ongoing relationship to any church family. I was told upon becoming your director of Missions that we did not need any more new churches in Kings Mountain Baptist Association. My response was that I certainly wanted to take a look at that and any projected growth should be based on the facts. I am con-

pling nine years. I should have some awareness of the religious setting in which we live. I agree that we do not need one new church, we need seventy-two new churches!

Let me share some facts with you: We called all churches in Cleveland County—black and white, every denomination—and asked for resident membership. The report revealed a total of 43,303. The 1950 census reveals that the total population of Cleveland County is 53,495. Therefore, there are 41,132 individuals, adult and children, living in our county that do not have an on-going relationship with a church family. Therefore, if we created seventy-two more churches, with the same resident membership we now have (121,671), that would have 15,495 people. We could have 144 churches with a resident membership of 43,374 and there would still be 15,495 prospects that needed to be reached. We could have churches as small as the smallest, as big as the largest, not taking any from your present resident membership, and have 15,495 prospects left over. I have tried to say this to you in striking figures so that you cannot forget there is a need to grow in Cleveland County.

The blessing—There is evidence that the hand of God has been among us. God has given us a vision of what could be. I say 'us' because I do not believe there is any individual among us who could have envisioned nine years ago where we would be today. I assure you that if someone had sat me down and told me that we would have one county-wide Baptist evangelistic crusade, another with other denominations—that we would have a Christian Social Ministries Director who has established himself as a leader in the field that the Home Mission Board advocated to a state beginning Christian Social Ministries (Kansas, to be specific), that they send their new people by to spend the day with Heb to see how a program could and should be done—that the associational staff would be made up of three full-time and one part-time persons—that volunteer services would increase from zero to 2,150 hours per year, an average of over 40 hours per week—that associational budget money received would move from \$26,032.55 to \$127,369.55—that we would have an adequate and functional facility out of which to do the Lord's work—that Southeastern Seminary would be offering credit courses taught by faculty members from the seminary in our facility—that an affiliate of the Baptist Hospital will begin Clinical Pastoral Education classes in February—that we could and would attract some of the finest youth workers in our association to teach the Bible in trailer parks, apartment complexes and train our own youth in how to be involved in outreach for Jesus Christ—that 99% of the churches would invite the director of missions to assist the Pastor Search Committees in understanding their task and how to work with a prospective pastor—that there would be two pastors' growth groups, a pastors' wives group, and one for married and single ladies meeting weekly to stimulate growth in the context of Christian love—that we would have a library especially for ministers—that we would be providing Seminary Extension classes for thirty-six black pastors who teach more than forty black churches in three counties—that North Carolina Missions would increase 70%, that Foreign Missions would increase 89%, that Home Missions offerings would increase 149%, Associational Missions would increase 151%, Cooperative Program offerings would increase 96—and that total mission giving would increase by 100%—that we would have an associational CIA camp at Gardner-Wald for three years—that the prayer breakfast for the employees who bring the rides and mid-way to Cleveland County would attract 107 persons and not one of them would slip away when the worship service began—if you had sat me down and said this is what will be, I would have asked, "What are you expecting, a miracle?" If someone had sat you down, had pictures and reports to indicate what we would be doing today, I doubt that any one of you could have said, "Yes, I think all of this is pos-

able." I certainly could not have done so.

What I have just related to you is what has been done! You see, it is the hand of God. God gave us a vision of what could be and that vision came through a wide variety of people. Many people contributed parts to the puzzle that has created the picture we see today.

God has given us a vision. Ezekiel said, "Without a vision, the people perish." God created the vision; God kept the vision alive. God has given us the leadership to do the job. Ministers and laypersons have shared or caught the vision and made the commitments necessary to do the work. I do not believe for one moment that our leadership would have paid the price to fulfill any one person's dream. They saw this as the Heavenly Father's dream and they made commitments to the Father to do His work. Chairpersons of our various committees, organizations and coordinators saw the light and carried the torch. One of those, Clyde Bearden, no longer walks among us, but left his mark in many ways. Specifically, Clyde was chairperson of the search committee to secure our Christian Social Ministries Director.

God gave us the resources. If, nine years ago, someone had said to our treasurer, Joe Cabaniss, "Joe, we will need \$1,618,304.18 to do what the Father has in mind over the next nine years", I wonder what Mr. Cabaniss' reaction would have been. I know what would have happened to me! I would have responded, "What are you expecting, a miracle?" But God gave the resources.

It was the work of God. It was the hand of God that led church to give 2% of their resources, and even more. God has worked through individuals also. People who had little or no experience in raising money caught the vision, shared the vision, and gifts of \$5 to \$10,000 came in and I believe that it was the work of God.

One afternoon, I was preparing to call on a new pastor. I had called and made an appointment and was just fixing to leave when my light came on and the secretary asked if I could take a call. I did, and discovered it was from a man I knew but hadn't seen in many years. He asked if he might come by to see me. I hesitated and he quickly stated, "If you are busy, I will make it later." I asked if he could come right on and he said, "I will be there in ten minutes." Five minutes later he walked in and said something like this: "I know you are a busy man and I will not take much of your time. I have \$6,000 I would like to invest in the Lord's work. May I contribute through the association?" "Well, yes," I replied. He sat down, wrote a check for \$6,000 and in less than ten minutes was gone. Now, I was sure one of our good Special Gifts Committee members had made a good contact, and at the next meeting I shared the information and asked, "Now, which one of you made that contact?" Nobody responded - nobody - and to this day I have not discovered anyone who approached this individual and asked him to give. I believe this is one contact the Father made.

God gave the resources. I believe that God was just as much at work through the churches' gifts of 2%, through the Special Gifts Committee members who worked hard for that \$5 gift as He was at work in the man who walked into my office and gave \$6,000. God works through His people - God gave us the resources.

The Father who has chartered our path for the last nine years will do it for whatever years we have together. He has blessed us beyond my and I am tempted to say our fondest imagination. Do we dare walk with Him in faith and commitment into the uncharted paths of the future? The record of the future will be our answer to that question.

## CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRY — ANNUAL REPORT

The 1982-83 year has brought many needs to surface in Cleveland County. With them I have seen a growing concern and compassion on the part of God's people. This is as it should be, but we must not be content with what we have done. There is still much to be done, many to be reached, much love to be shared.

This is your report of what you have done this year.

1. **Juvenile Court Ministry:** We have continued our Ministers Day in Court program with five ministers sharing this responsibility. Our ongoing program involved one hundred forty-nine youth and forty-one volunteers in six camping experiences.
2. **Prison Ministry:** Our Volunteer Ministry has met every other week throughout the year. Most of the volunteers have been students at Gardner-Webb, but we have had a few invited from our churches. One great need in this area is for our folks to develop a burning desire to share God's love with the man in prison. Should this be, we will be able to share even more of God's love in our local prison camp. Volunteer averaged fifty-seven in attendance. Volunteers averaged forty-one per quarter. Fifty-six church groups assisted with homebased goodies. There were sixteen professions of faith. We held an eight-week new convert class that averaged eight in attendance. We have had weekly Bible study on Wednesday this year. Our attendance has averaged eleven.

**Christmas Gift Packets:** This past Christmas we again prepared and presented a gift packet to each man in our local prison. Twenty-three church groups, one non-church senior citizens group and the Gideons provided gift items for the one hundred seventy-five men in prison in Shelby. Twenty-three youth from Westview, Shelby First, and Shelby Second met at the associational office and processed the packets. A special thanks to the youth of Shelby Second for collecting two hundred tubes of toothpaste for this project. A job well done, indeed!

3. **Senior Adult Ministry:** Four quarterly Rallies were held. They were at Elizabethtown, fifty-five in attendance with eight churches represented; Eas, one hundred fifty-two in attendance with nineteen churches represented; Putnam Springs, fifty-two in attendance with six churches represented; and Pleasant Ridge, twenty-eight in attendance with eight churches represented. We took three trips this year. Nineteen went on the "Day at the Convention" trip. Fifty went to the Southern Christmas Shore and forty-eight went to the Southern Living Shore.

We also provided display of religious tracts and scriptures at the four school-health fairs throughout our county. "S.A.M.", our senior adult ministry newsletter continues to go to over six hundred persons. This publication changed from monthly to quarterly this year.

4. **Visually Handicapped Ministry:** Two workshops were held this year. One on the associational level. This met at Westview. Twenty-seven people, representing thirteen churches, were present. The other workshop was held at Buffalo Baptist Church. Buffalo is engaged in one-to-one ministry with eight residents at the Shelby Convalescent Center. First Baptist, Shelby, began ceramic classes for visually handicapped in September. This will continue until November. Eight are enrolled in this class, assisted by twelve volunteers.
5. **Migrant Ministry:** Our migrant count this year was considerably lower than in the past due to the late spring freeze. However, we were able to work in co-operation with Upper Cleveland Ministry in a program of recreation, fellowship, and worship. This began June 20 at the Belwood Community Center. Paul

Gray, pastor of Norman's Grove and Archie Chapman, pastor of Carpenter's Grove were instrumental in this ministry. Our ministry was primarily to the Italian, French speaking migrant and secondarily Spanish speaking.

6. **Emergency and Relief Ministry:** This has been an extremely busy ministry during this year. Our economy has worsened and many of our folk are having special kinds of hard in this area.

Applications received from: 1,351 families

Assistance provided for 993 families

Goods received from 555 churches/individuals

Volunteers involved in ministry: 849

A special fund raising effort was held to help provide a room for Ricky LaPage, a youth of the Lattimore community who was left paralyzed from the chest down in an auto accident in June of 1981. Response to this effort was terrific. Total raised was \$7,142.45. Total cost of the room was \$6,897.34. The balance has been used to purchase a bed for Ricky and to help with December utilities. A special thanks to Rev. Joe Edwards, pastor of the Lattimore Baptist Church, for supervising this project and administering the money.

We coordinated the "cheese for the poor" projects (2) for the Cleveland County Department of Social Services. Forty-one volunteers assisted (included in the 849 above).

Several volunteers have assisted in cutting quilt squares from used clothing. Thirty quilt tops have been prepared and are being processed into quilts at the present time.

Many more good things have been done this year. All of this would not have been possible had it not been for the 1,359 volunteers who provided their time, talents, but most important, their love to share themselves, and the Christ who loves us all.

We have, for the past three years, tried to enlist a C.S.M. representative from each church. This was to be a contact person for the sharing of ministry concerns with the churches. This year (1982-83) we will not enlist a C.S.M. representative, but will work through WMU leadership and Baptist Men's leadership. I appreciate the good work that has been done by the C.S.M. representatives.

Yes, much has been done, but there is much to be done, many to be reached, much love to be shared.

Thank you for your continued good support to the ministry of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. You help to make my work a thing of joy and excitement!

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL REINMET 1961 - 1962

Let us begin this report by directing your attention to the excellent Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team (ASSIST) for 1961-62: Darlene Smith, Linda Ellis, Alice Callison, John Hunter, Joe Edwards, Pat St. Charles, Ernest Smith, Bobby Garrit, Larry Green, Stanley and Wanda Webb, Brenda Morrison, and Ray Martin. Four of these, Alice Callison, Linda Ellis, Darlene Smith, and Pat St. Charles are now recognized by our state Sunday School Department as state approved Sunday School conference leaders. Ray Martin, unfortunately, has moved to Virginia after assisting several of our churches to organize Cradle Roll work.

The first major Sunday School event of the 1961-62 church year was High Attendance Day, the last Sunday in October. In our churches, we had 9,872 in attendance on that day.

Joe Edwards, our associational VHS director led the ASSIST team in presenting two Vacation Bible School clinics. One for the Kings Mountain Baptist Association and one for our sister Tennessee Baptist Association.

Several ASSIST team members have led special conferences in other associations.

In September, the new "How to Guide . . ." series of inter-agency study course books were taught in an associational workers training conference in cooperation with the Church Training Department of our association. One hundred twelve (112) attended this conference at Elizabeth Baptist Church.

It is encouraging to note that the average Sunday School attendance in our churches for the 1961-62 church year was 9,422, the highest since 1925. Unfortunately, our enrollment has continued its decade long decline and is now 17,304. For our Sunday School enrollment to continue to decline in the face of a growing population in our county is a sign that we are not working for our Lord as effectively as we should.

To help us achieve new heights in Christ's service through the Sunday School,

the Sunday School Board of our Southern Baptist Convention and the State Sunday School Department has cooperated with us in planning a Sunday School Enrollment Campaign set for the last of April, next year as part of the national S.S. by '88 campaign.

This is a bold project with potential of helping us to do greater things for our Savior than we have ever done before. Major funding for this project will be provided by the Sunday School Board and the state Sunday School department. This campaign will be introduced in detail at a Sunday School Banquet at First Baptist in Shelby on November 9. Sunday School and church leadership from all our churches are urged to attend. Our own Dr. A.V. Washburn, for many years head of Southern Baptist Sunday School work, will be the special speaker.

### WMU REPORT, 1981-82

The year 1981-82 marked the third and final year of a WMU emphasis on Life-Changing Commitments. The aim of the emphasis has been to lead church members to make life-changing commitments for the support of missions. In February a Baptist Women organization was begun at Community Church. This was the first WMU organization for their church. WMU work has grown in other churches, with new organizations being added.

The associational WMU was recognized as Distinguished for the year 1980-81. This level of achievement was made possible through the efforts of a dedicated WMU Council and because of the support and co-operation of the association.

#### CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMITTEE REPORT, 1992

The orientation/planning meeting for associational committees, held at Rose Grove, marked the beginning of the year for the Christian Life Committee. A suggested objective, adopted by the committee, stated that we try to isolate some of the moral needs existing in the county that need attention and devise some workable plans through which the association might be able to express itself regarding these needs. The primary focus was on the abusiveness of pornography upon the American community; more particularly, upon Cleveland County.

Eight representatives from the association and two from the Cleveland County sheriff's department attended the Conference on Obscenity held in Greensboro on March 30. In follow-up action from this conference, efforts were made to organize action to be taken in Cleveland County. Organizational efforts for Citizens for Decency through Law (CDL) were made on April 5, June 4 and June 25. As a result of these meetings, letters were written to local businesses who sell pornographic material, encouraging them to discontinue sales of the materials. The response was negative. About 600 letters were mailed to churches and county leaders in order to broaden awareness of and interest in the efforts to organize CDL. Citizens for Decency through Law was organized on August 17 with Mr. Harold Causby elected as president, Rev. Ken Walters, vice president, and Rev. Royce Hallow, secretary-treasurer. Key leaders in organizational effort of CDL, with the support of the association were Rev. Larry Morris, Rev. Allen Davis and Rev. Sam Murphy.

On April 22, the chairman of the Christian Life Committee met with Senator Ollie Harris to discuss the Price Adversary Hearing Law. Senator Harris emphasized that this law must be repealed before action will be effective in curbing pornography.

Rev. Royce Hallow and Rev. Sam Murphy, trustees of The Task Force on Obscenity, attended a planning meeting on September 1, at Carmel Baptist Church, Charlotte.

The challenge comes to us as local citizens, if we are not satisfied with the ordinances, let's get them changed!

Therefore, I move that the watchcare of Pathway Baptist Church be terminated and Pathway Baptist Church of Parkdale Circle, Kings Mountain, be admitted to membership in our association.

#### SUMMER MINISTRY REPORT: 1982

This summer was most exciting. God was with us as we worked in Cleveland County! Below are listed events that took place and a few events that are to come in the "Summer of '83".

1. **Backyard Bible Clubs:** We had 46 youth and adults trained to lead BBC work, in addition to those who were already trained. We had 12 Backyard Bible Clubs reported, with several churches who had trainees not reporting BBC work.
2. **Coffinhouses For Youth:** The coffinhouse idea was new to most, but its format of games, fellowship, special music and devotional speaker was interesting enough to draw a total of 228 youth from many of our churches to participate. There were three meetings: first on June 18, when 12 churches and 51 youth participated; second on July 14, with 16 churches and 111 youth participating; third on August 15, when 11 churches and 86 youth participated.
3. **RA Field Day For Missions:** Involving all of the Crusader RA's from our association, we had this day on July 24th at Pleasant Grove Church's field. There were 73 participants, including RA's, leaders, pastors and Pioneers who helped with the field events. Missionaries from churches shared slides and testimony as to God's work through them in their field of missions.
4. **Youth Events:** These events were planned to recompense for the cancellation of the Youth Camp planned for the summer. We went to Wingate college for a choir concert, to Ridgecrest for an evening during Foreign Mission Week, swimming at Gardner-Wells and to Carowinds!
5. **Puppet Making Workshop:** Led by Rex Kayle of Burlington, the workshop was attended by those of our churches who made a total of nine top quality puppets.

#### Ideas For Next Summer Include:

1. **Worker-For-A-Week:** This concept will make the Summer Worker available to our churches who do not have a Summer Worker or Youth Ministry. This week could be a great catalyst for your youth group. Pray with us on this idea, and if you feel led to do so, ask us about it.
2. **Triangle Fellowship:** This concept is presented to begin a youth fellowship made up of youth from all of our churches, meeting to train in prayer and personal evangelism, emphasizing the importance of the triangle of relationships which we have, God being at the top of the triangle, and man being on the two bottom angles, dealing with each other, while dealing with our Lord.
3. **A Continuation of our Older Programs:** Our programs which have been going well continue, such as are reported from this past summer.

The Summer Ministry of our association is here to be a service, to God and to our fellowship of churches. Thank you for your great support in years past. The Special Gifts Committee was formed in 1980 to raise money to pay for our new Associational Building. Some of those who have been active are: Joe Coleman, Rev. J.C. Garrow, Dr. Wyan Washburn, T.S. Our building cost approximately \$315,000. As the end of September, 1983, we owed \$74,000 and have \$4,288 in the Special Gifts account. Our committee is going to continue to solicit small and large gifts and we appeal to you to please help us pay the balance.

## HISTORIAN'S REPORT

(Dr. Washburn called attention to a computer which had been presented to the association and placed at the front of the sanctuary. He presented the following information concerning the computer).

"This little machine can hold and give back nine MILLION bits of information about this association since it was organized in the fall of 1851 at old Double Springs, 131 years ago, and MORE.

"The more we know about the past, the better we can plan for the future."

"It can be programmed to assist in all the business and financial affairs of the association and all its churches. It can write checks, pay bills, pay salaries after deducting for social security, retirement, insurance, income tax or any other government-related item. It can keep a perpetual INVENTORY.

"This versatile unit can store profiles of key leaders in all the churches."

"It can store and summarize all the data gathered by the director of missions, to be used in his bulletins and his monthly and annual reports. It can do charts and graphs to give that data at a glance.

"When any of this information is needed, the computer can then reproduce it on a printer, and make as many copies as you need.

"If used to its full capacity, it will help a large number of dedicated workers in this association to do their jobs better and give us all the information we need to appreciate our spiritual and Baptist heritage; to inspire us to do our best, perhaps to equal or achieve more than the best of witnesses in the Kings Mountain Association's past."
