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REV. FRED CARTER

Rev. Fred Carter was born September 28, 1911. His father and mother Mr. and Mrs. W.C. Carter were devout Christians and faithful church members. Thus Fred had a fine Christian atmosphere to nurture his life from its very beginning. I discovered the footprints of this good family soon after coming to the Dover Church as pastor. Fred accepted Christ as his Savior when he was 11 years of age. He married Mae Short and they had two daughters, Mrs. Joanne Lingarfelt and Mrs. Carley Reid.

He served his country in the armed forces faithfully during World War II and upon his return from military service he began to feel the call to full time Christian service. At first, he felt that he should enter the field of Christian work for he was an excellent musician. However, as time passed he came to feel that his calling was to preach the gospel. He was licensed and ordained by the Dover Baptist Church.

He attended Gardner-Wells College for two years and completed his college work at Baylin University where he received the degree of Master of Religion. His education was accomplished with the wonderful cooperation of his devoted wife who stood faithfully by his side all the way through his ministry.

He served as pastor of the Anthony Grove Baptist Church in the Canton Association for seven and one half years. The church made significant progress during his ministry there. He later organized and led in the building of the Emmanuel Baptist Church near Charryville where he continued to serve as pastor for 20 years.

During the time of his illness his constant assurance to those around him was "That Christ met him at the point of his deepest need." This spirit was manifest in his life as he went among his people. "Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord, you says the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors and their works do follow them." Fred lives on in the memory of those who knew and loved him.

REV. HUGH HARRILL

Hugh Franklin Harrill was one of three children born to Rev. Isaiah D. Harrill and Georgia Lattimore Harrill of Cleveland County, North Carolina. His birth date was November 18, 1905. He was married to the former Alice Padgett and they had two children, Barbara Jean and Richard Durham.

Early in life he had the feeling that sooner or later he would go into the ministry and shared that with his wife to be. This became a reality when his home church, Lattimore Baptist, begged him to preach in January of 1935 and ordained him December 15 of the same year.

Hugh's schooling was at Gardner-Webb College, Wake-Forest College, and he had some study at Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas.

It is easy to remember Hugh as a big man, physically, mentally, and spiritually. He had an infectious grin and hearty laugh, a firm handshake, and one always felt at ease and accepted in his presence.

He loved God's good earth and loved to make it produce vegetables. He loved the creatures of the forest and stream and enjoyed hunting and fishing, raising quail and cattle, and raising bees.

He was a good, gentle person, had strong convictions, standards, and beliefs but he always respected the other person's right to believe differently and maintained friendly good feelings toward everyone.

As a preacher-pastor, Hugh had so many good traits. He had uncommon common sense. His sermons were brief, profound in their simplicity, and to the point, never dwelling on and on boring the listeners. He loved people, loved to be with them and share all the experiences of life, standing with them before God.

He loved the Lord, he loved the Lord's church, he loved his denomination but he respected the belief of those of other faiths, he loved the Bible and sought to share its truths with those whom he served. Most of his churches were made up of rural people. He identified with them and sought to lead them into deep and living relationships with the Carpenter of Nazareth. Only eternity can measure the countless souls whose lives were made happier and more useful and who have and will join him in that eternal city not made with hands, because he led them to know the Savior and to follow His precepts.

Those of us who knew Hugh can say of him what a lady wrote to Dr. Roy Angel when he arrived from Central Baptist Church in Miami, Florida, "Life is more precious to me because your footprints made a path across my soul."

BRIEF HISTORY OF Beaver Dam Baptist Church

The history of Beaver Dam Baptist Church is long and interesting. For some time before the church was constituted, several ministers had been conducting services in a grove nearby. On December 23, 1850, deacons and ministers from Sandy Run, Rolling Springs, Mt. Sinai, and Zion assembled to organize the church. There were 43 charter members. Rev. R.P. Logan was the first pastor, receiving a salary of \$40.20 for the first year.

In 1871, the church joined the Broad Run Baptist Association but withdrew the next day to join the group of churches which was organizing the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. In 1879, Beaver Dam and five other churches formed the Constitutional Kings Mountain Baptist Association. However, in 1896, the group rejoined the regular association. In 1896, the church hosted the association for the first time, using the nearby schoolhouse to accommodate the large crowd.

A year-round Sunday School has been operated since 1879. In 1868, the church authorized purchase of a Bible and Hymn Book, and in 1889, a committee of three women was appointed to purchase an organ. A BYPU was organized in 1921.

The first church building was made of logs and had neither lights nor heat; however, it was situated near a spring. The second building, constructed in 1868, cost \$24 and 52 pounds of nails. The congregation moved into its third building on Thursday of revival week in 1883. And in 1912, the move was made to the present building.

The church has always supported education and missions. Rev. Nattle led the church in giving strong support to Gardner Webb College, and Rev. Funderburke emphasized the Cooperative Program, with the church giving 26% of the plan dollar in 1971 to the Cooperative Program.

Members making a significant contribution to Baptist life include Rev. John Nattle, moderator of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association for 40 years and president of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention; Dr. Nolan Howington, Curriculum Coordinator with the Sunday School Board; Mrs. Jean Tragus, missionary to Hawaii, Jordan, and Japan; Dr. Willard Hamrick, Religion Professor at Wake Forest University; and Bob Morrow, whose husband is Resident Director of Kennedy Home. Supporting these has been a loving, generous church family which has shared praise, prayer, and gifts down through the years.

Currently, Rev. Paul Sorrells serves as pastor, Mrs. Maria Bailey serves as minister of music, and Mr. Rick Hamrick serves as minister of youth.



BRIEF HISTORY OF Mount Sinai Baptist Church

In the spring of 1848 a group of converted Christians gathered in the old Broad River school building for the purpose of organizing a Baptist Church in this community. On May 21, 1848 a Presbytery consisting of Elder Louis H. McSwain, and deacons from the surrounding churches organized Mt. Sinai Baptist Church with thirty charter members. The school building, which was located one-fourth mile from the existing church building housed the meeting for several months. The newly organized church was the result of the efforts of and an arm from the Buffalo Baptist Church in the Broad River Association in York County, S.C.

Elder, L.H. McSwain, having taken an active part in the measures of leading up to the organization of the church was chosen for the first pastor.

The newly organized church was received into the Broad River Baptist Association in 1848 and remained until 1851. In 1851 Mt. Sinai Baptist Church along with several other churches in lower North Carolina met and organized the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

During the years of her history Mt. Sinai Church has ordained and sent out four men for the Gospel Ministry. Mt. Sinai Church has also had close ties with Gardner Webb College and worked with thousands of students from the college.

The present membership of the church is 110. Broadus Haskberry is the current pastor of the church, Bobby Palmer is Minister of Music and Velma Ellis church secretary.

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this body shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

Under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, this association of churches seeks to further the Kingdom through the following:

- (1) the fostering of fellowship and cooperation among the member churches;
- (2) the ministering to the spiritual and physical needs of people;
- (3) the giving and receiving of information, assistance and training for member churches;
- (4) the cooperation with North Carolina Baptist State and Southern Baptist Conventions.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Membership Committee. Application should include:

1. Formal action by the group seeking admission reflecting that 75% of those voting expresses their intent to cooperate.
2. A written statement reflecting their beliefs and practices.
3. A written statement that expresses their intent to cooperate.
4. A willingness to meet with Membership Committee to discuss other items of mutual interest to both parties.

The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist belief and practice and what it means to cooperate with the churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. If recommended by this committee and accepted by the Association, a mission or a church shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a minimum of one year. Membership within the Association shall be determined by vote of the Association at its annual meeting. Churches under the watchcare shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its constitution and by-laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and if requested, the Associational Executive Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like associations.

ARTICLE IV MEETINGS

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Tuesday and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or Executive Board, provided two weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 3: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each fifty members of the church, provided each church shall not have less than three nor more than ten messengers. These shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those in attendance and registering at the Associational Meeting.

ARTICLE V AUTHORITY

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this Constitution in Article III, Section 2 and 3.

ARTICLE VI OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTIONS

Section 1: The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Music Director, Organist, Sunday School Director, Chairman of the Library Council, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Parliamentarian, and Audiovisual Coordinator."

Section 2: The Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer shall be elected on the morning of the last day of the annual meeting. All other officers shall be contacted and nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Associational Executive Board at their April meeting.

Section 3: The newly elected Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer shall assume at the close of the annual session all duties incumbent upon them relating to work of the ensuing associational year. All other officers shall assume all duties incumbent upon them relating to the work of the ensuing year on October 1.

Section 4: Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election for two years.

ARTICLE VII TRUSTEES AND THEIR ELECTION

There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

ARTICLE VIII THE ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Associational Executive Board shall be composed of all Associational officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Associational Director of Missions, the Christian Social Ministries Director (ex-officio without voting privileges), each active pastor, two members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The Associational Executive Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the Constitution. Associational Executive Board members are the connecting link between the Association and the churches. Executive Board members should represent the churches to the Association. Executive Board members should act as representatives for the Association to the churches. It is the responsibility of the Executive Board members to promote the programs, represent the needs and report to the churches concerning the work and ministry of the Association. Executive Board members should seek acceptable means of representing the Association to their respective fellowships. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association in its Annual Meeting.

The quarterly meeting will be in January, April and July, on Monday after the third Sunday.

ARTICLE IX COMMITTEES

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through the following annual meeting.

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the Annual Meeting:

1. Order of Business and Program Committee (By-Law IV, Section 1)
2. Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
3. Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
4. Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)
5. Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 5)
6. Nominating Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
7. Constitution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
8. Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
9. Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
10. Resolutions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
11. Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
12. Seminary Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
13. Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
14. Christian Social Ministry Committee (By-Law IV, Section 17)
15. Church Reconciliation Committee (By-Law IV, Section 14)
16. Mission Committee (By-Law IV, Section 16)
17. Recreation and Drama Committee (By-Law IV, Section 20)
18. Strategy Planning Committee.
19. Any other committee authorized by the Association.

B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting: Committee on Committees. (By-Law IV, Section 14)

Section 2: The following committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting to serve during the Annual Meeting: Enrollment Committee (By-Law IV, Section 15).

ARTICLE X AMENDMENTS

Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any Annual Session of the Association upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association on the first day and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association on the last day. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

BY-LAWS

By-Law I PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

By-Law II ASSOCIATION YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

By-Law III DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committee on Committees and Committee on Enrollment. He shall be the Chairman of the Associational Executive Board and be an ex officio (without voting privileges) member of all other committees. Upon completion of his term of office, the Moderator shall become a member-at-large (for two years) of the Mission Committee, Executive, and the Executive Board.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be the Vice-Chairman of the Executive Board.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's Annual Meeting, distribute at the Annual Meeting copies of the digest of these reports, make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of

Minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of Minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the Executive Board. He shall inform all members elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of each action. He shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its Executive Board, or as designated in the budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Board or the Association in annual sessions); render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the Annual Meeting and give a report at each quarterly Executive Board meeting and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Associational Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.

Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and make a written report to each Annual Meeting of the Association.

Section 6: The Sunday School Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Sunday School Department. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this committee that would promote this work.

The Associational Sunday School should assist church leaders to be more effective in their responsibility. This should include:

1. Provide opportunities for fellowship and inspiration.
2. Interpret the Sunday School Program.
3. Train Sunday School leaders.
4. Consult with Sunday School leaders concerning their program.
5. Provide organization and leadership for cooperative work among the churches.

Section 7: The Church Training Department shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Church Training Department. This officer shall attend Executive Committee meetings, maintain the on-going work of this department at all times, and give an annual report to the Association.

Section 8: The Music Director shall provide leadership for the Association in session and when requested at other times during the year. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this Committee that would promote the work. He shall encourage music growth in the churches throughout the year and shall make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

Section 9: The Brotherhood Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of men and boys in the churches. The officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to promote the development of men and boys and an awareness of world mission needs.

Section 10: The Woman's Missionary Union Director serves on the Executive Committee of the Association and works with the Director of Missions; leads the WMU Council; confers with our associational WMU officers and assists them in their work; leads in providing opportunities for leaders and members of their church WMUs to have fellowship and receive inspiration concerning their mutual mission task; leads in interpreting the WMU program to church leaders; leads in training church WMU workers and members; consults with church leaders concerning initiation of WMU work and the improvement of existing work; provides aid and plans for associational meeting; leads in associational WMU annual planning; leads in discovering mission action needs and in coordinating the work being done; and reports progress of WMU work to the Association and serves as contact between the Association and state WMU.

Section 11: The Chairman of the Library Council shall promote the beginning and maintenance of church libraries in the churches; provide training oppor-

tunities for church librarians; maintain and develop the associational library; attend the Executive Committee meetings; cooperate with the Director of Missions and make an annual report to the Association at its annual session.

Section 12: The Baptist Youth for Christ Director shall, under the supervision of the Director of Missions, guide and promote the youth activities of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. Such activities may include:

1. Youth Council sessions.
2. Bi-monthly sessions of Youth for Christ in local churches.
3. A Kalvin Crusade for Christ every 3 to 5 years.
4. Mission Vacation Bible School and/or Backyard VBS.
5. Sponsorship of a booth at Cleveland County Fair each October.
6. Any other activity which the Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Youth Council, Director of Missions, and Executive Committee deems necessary to foster a positive Christian witness for Christ.

Section 13: The Parliamentarian shall, at the Annual Meeting of the Association, rule on all questions of parliamentary procedure which shall arise during the sessions. The Parliamentarian shall serve as a resource person to the churches and shall, upon request, advise and assist the churches on matters of parliamentary procedure.

Section 14: The Audiovisual Coordinator shall assist all associational leadership in the selection, production and use of audiovisual material. Upon request, he shall provide similar assistance to individual church leaders. He shall provide opportunities for training in the production and use of audiovisuals in education, motivation and worship. The Audiovisual Coordinator shall work with the librarian in storing, cataloging and promoting the use of audiovisual materials equipment. Maintenance of audiovisual equipment is the responsibility of the Audiovisual Coordinator.

Section 15: Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Executive Board, except the office of Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1: The Order of Business and Program Committee shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Clerk and the Associational Music Director. It shall rotate the place of meeting among the groups of churches with the host church being determined by the group. It shall recommend the preacher and the alternate for the annual sessions. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting for the Association, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the Annual Meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the Annual Meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary. This committee will be responsible for promoting the Annual Meeting through the various news media.

Section 2: The Executive Committee

1. Shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk/Treasurer, Music Director, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMU Director, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Chairperson of the Christian Social Ministries Committee, President of the Pastors' Conference, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, President of the Committee on Committees, Chairman of Cleveland Life Committee, Chairman of Membership Committee, Chairman of Finance Committee, Chairman of Evangelism, Chairman of Long Range Planning Committee, and Audiovisual Coordinator.

2. When without a Director of Missions, this committee shall seek out and recommend to the Association, or its Executive Board, for election of a new Director of Missions according to By-Law VI, Section 11.

3. It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or Executive Board and act on routine or emergency matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven is necessary to transact business. **Section 3: The Evangelism Committee**, composed of six members, shall promote the work of evangelism in the churches and the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its Executive Board.

Section 4: The Finance Committee, composed of six members, two rotating annually, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs of an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the Association, upon request, with the stewardship programs offered by the Convention.

The Committee shall express gratitude to the churches for their stewardship development that enables them to participate in local, home, and foreign missions.

Section 5: The Ordination Committee, composed of five members, with the pastor of the home church (the church of which the candidate is a member), the Director of Missions, and deacons of the home and requesting churches, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

The Committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of the Minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conferrer at which the home voted to request ordination of the candidate.

The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.

The Chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place, and procedure.

The Committee suggest that the candidate be questioned at least two weeks prior to his ordination.

The Committee shall question the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, and his personal life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.

The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the ministry.

In every instance, the Committee shall be guided by the Scriptures, especially I Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-8.

The Committee shall give written notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the ordination.

The Chairman shall report the Committee's activities to the Executive Board quarterly and provide a written report for the Annual Meeting.

Section 6: The Nominating Committee, composed of six members, shall contact before and nominate at the April Executive Board meeting, the officers of the Association according to Article VI and VIII of the Constitution. This Committee shall also, in cooperation with the Nominating Committee of various departments (except the WML and Brotherhood organizations), recommend workers for these various departments. The officers and workers of these respective organizations shall be nominated by the organization themselves and submitted to the Nominating Committee (Article VI, Section 1). It shall also nominate associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our

convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. This Committee shall also assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

Section 7: The Constitution Committee, composed of three members, shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed.

Section 8: The Membership Committee, composed of five members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws. The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist faith and practice and what it means to cooperate with other churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. The Membership Committee shall annually review all churches and missions under the watchcare of the Association and may present them for membership within the Association or that they continue under the watchcare.

Section 9: The Calendar Committee shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMU Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director and Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an Associational Calendar for the coming year and present same to the Executive Board for adoption.

Section 10: The Resolutions Committee composed of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation, plan and promote the work of the Committee in an annual planning meeting; and present resolutions of appreciation to individuals, organizations, and churches when there are events worthy of commendation.

Section 11: The Historical Committee shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and six other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Association Meeting.

Section 12: The Secondary Extension Committee, composed of three members, shall publicize study courses and programs that are available, and shall plan, provide and promote Secondary Extension studies as they may be desired.

Section 13: The Christian Life Committee, composed of six members, will give continual attention to the moral climate of the community and shall initiate necessary action to maintain and improve the climate. The committee shall commend those persons and institutions that uphold Christian virtues, and shall support the churches in the teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness.

Section 14: The Committee on Committees, composed of five members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX, Section 1), and shall assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies on all standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the Chairman of each committee.

Section 15: The Telephone Contact Committee shall be composed of one person from each group of churches in the Association (60). These committee members shall relay messages to pastors and key leaders during the year. All messages to be sent should be cleared with the Director of Missions.

Section 16: The Enrollment Committee shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of the members. A total enrollment shall be made for each day.

Section 17: The Christian Social Ministry Committee, composed of six members, shall assist the CSM Director in the planning, promoting and correlation of the Christian Social Ministry programs. This is to be a sub-committee of the Associational Missions Committee, with the Chairperson of the CSM committee serving as a member of the Missions Committee. Ex officio members shall be the Moderator and the Director of Missions.

Section 18: The Church Reconciliation Committee shall be composed of the present Moderator as chairman, two immediate past Moderators and two lay persons to be appointed annually by the above stated members. The chairman will report to the Executive Committee or the Executive Board the names of those lay persons appointed. This committee will be open to any person or persons of a member church seeking assistance with problems related to their church.

Section 19: The Missions Committee shall be made up of the following members: Chairman (Vice-Moderator), the Director of Missions, Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Finance Committee Chairman, Chairperson of CSM Committee, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WML Director, President of the Pastors' Conference, and Apologetical Coordinator.

This Committee is to be available as a sounding board, to support the Director of Missions as a person (as well as an officer in the Association), provide feedback concerning Associational programs and activities, conveying suggestions from the Association and offering support in projecting programs to the Executive Committee and/or Executive Board. The Missions Committee shall seek to determine areas of need within and without the Association and formulate recommendations to the Associational Executive Committee.

The Committee shall enthusiastically explore all mission possibilities throughout the Association, emphasizing the need for new teaching units, preaching points, missions, and churches; and it shall actively seek out potential sponsoring churches for the beginning of specific mission endeavors. Providing energetic outreach leadership for the Association shall be the Committee's highest priority.

Section 20: The Recreation and Drama Committee shall promote a program of Christian recreation and drama in the churches. The Committee shall regard recreation and drama as a means, not an end. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall use their programs as a way to teach, a means of witnessing and an avenue of expressing the abundant Christian life. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall be responsible to give assistance to any church that should request help in the area of recreation and drama. The Committee's responsibilities shall include fellowships, Senior Adults, retreats, crafts, drama workshops and other assignments of the Association, if asked. The Chairman of the Recreation and Drama Committee shall plan with the Director of Missions and give a report of the committee's activities at the Executive Board quarterly meetings.

Section 21: The Strategy Planning Committee, composed of five members, shall seek to understand the 'Priority Statements' of the Association; provide support and suggestions to the appropriate committees for implementation; and recognize personally and publicly the committees that address themselves to, and make significant accomplishment in achieving the 'Priority Statements.' At a time it judges appropriate, the Committee will also suggest to the Association the need for further strategy planning.

Section 22: Members of all these committees, except those appointed by the Moderator, shall be elected to serve not more than three years on a rotating basis.

By-Law V TRUSTEES

The duty of the Trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other securities of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its Executive Board.

By-Law VI DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

Section 1: His selection shall be upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association at its Annual Meeting, or between sessions of the Association, by its Executive Board. His time of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity.

By-Law VII DIRECTOR OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRY

Section 1: Employment - The Director of CSM shall be jointly employed by the Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Home Mission Board. The employer should be elected to work until the sponsoring groups mutually agree to cease the tenure of service or the employee resigns. The CSM Director shall work under the supervision of the Director of Missions and in compliance with the Job Description provided by the State and Association.

Section 2: Basic Function - The basic functions are to work with the CSM Committee to organize, supervise and promote a program of activities to meet the spiritual, educational, emotional and physical needs of the people within the geographical boundaries of the Association.

Section 3: The CSM Director shall be an ex officio member of the Associational Executive Board, Associational Executive Committee and Missions Committee without voting privileges.

Section 4: When without a Christian Social Ministries Director, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Christian Social Ministries Director according to By-Law VII Section 1 and 2.

By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the Annual Meeting by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

By-Law IX DEFINE PROCEDURE

Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.

Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six Associational Groups as follows: Polkville, Lattimore, Shelby, Kings Mountain, Grover, and Waco.

October 18, 1983
Tuesday Afternoon

1. Messengers and visitors gathered in the Beaver Dam Baptist Church for the 133rd Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.
2. Moderator Alton Martin, pastor of Polkville Baptist Church, called the meeting to order at 3:00 P.M.
3. Steve Childress, Associational Music Director and Minister of Music for Elizabeth Baptist Church, led the congregation in singing "Brethren, We Have Met To Worship" accompanied by Mrs. Beth Hamrick at the organ. Rev. Larry Hicks, pastor of Double Springs Baptist, opened by reading from Philippians 1 and 2 and led in the opening prayer.
4. Rev. Brodian Heatherly, pastor of Mt. Seaf, gave the Order of Business report. He moved that the order of program be accepted as printed with changes as needed. Rev. Jim Rice, pastor of Insurance Baptist, seconded the motion and it was approved.
5. Steve Childress led us in singing "On Christ The Solid Rock I Stand."
6. Enrollment cards were taken up by the ushers. Moderator Alton Martin recognized Mrs. Bryn Balfew and Mrs. Lennie Padgett from Beaver Dam for helping on the Enrollment Committee by handing out the cards and materials at the door as everyone came in.

9. The report of the Executive Board was given by Joe Cabaniss, Clerk-emergens. He also gave the Treasurer's report for 1982-83. These reports are found elsewhere in this volume.
10. Dr. Wayne Washburn gave the Historian report by giving a short history of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. He moved that this report be adopted as read. Dr. S.L. Lammie seconded the motion and it was approved. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
11. Our enrollment was announced by Joe Cabaniss as being 107 for this session. This included 278 messengers, 32 non-messengers and 7 visitors.

As part of the C.S.M. report, Mrs. Elizabeth Waters from Union Baptist Church gave a report on their Mission Vacation Bible School that was held this summer on the Indian reservation in Cherokee, North Carolina and Mrs. Sarah Williams, Coordinator for the Cleveland County Literacy Council, reported on the Literacy Workshop held this year in May at Dover Baptist Church. 13. Jane Seavey, from Kings Mountain Church, accompanied by Mrs. J.C. Osborn on the piano, shared with us "The Spirit Song."
14. Vice-moderator Brodian Heatherly took charge of the meeting at this point. He added a change to the program by adding the Committee on Evangelism report by Rev. Larry Morris after the Church Training report.
15. The Sunday School report was given by Rev. Royce Balfew, pastor of Waco Baptist Church. This report is found elsewhere in this volume. He presented certificates to the ASSIST Team members in appreciation for their work from the State Sunday School department. He also recognized W.H. Lutz from Waco Baptist Church for 32 years of perfect attendance in Sunday School.

Baptist, Bernice Doughtie-minister of education for Boiling Springs, Steve Blackwell-trainee and youth for Allen Memorial, Rick Hamrick-minister of youth for Beaver Dam and Bobby Palmer-minister of music for Mt. Sinai.

19. The Membership Committee report was given by Buddy Gantt, pastor of Grover Pine Baptist. He reported that the committee met two times during the past year and that the committee had done some work with the Friendship Baptist Church. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.

20. Vice-moderator Broader Heatherly recognized Mr. J.T. Roper, of Waco Baptist Church, for his attendance at 42 consecutive annual meetings. C.A. Kirby, Dr. Wynn Washburn, and S.L. Lamm was also recognized for attending many annual meetings. During this time of announcements, Broader Heatherly announced that for the 1984 annual meeting, Elizabeth Baptist Church would like to be host for the Tuesday session and that Waco Baptist Church would like to be host for the Tuesday session and that Waco Baptist Church would like to be host for the Wednesday session. Also for 1985, Polkville Baptist for the Tuesday session and Union Baptist for the Wednesday session. A motion was made by Marion Adams, pastor of Lily Memorial, to accept these invitations and J.T. 36. The Special Gifts Committee report was presented by Carlos Young.

37. In a special recognition to the pastors' wives, Carlos Young asked them to stand.

38. For our special music for the evening session, Steve Coldiron introduced Maria Reulley, music director from Beaver Dam, who sang "Safely and Tenderly" accompanied at the piano by Marcelle Hamrick.

44. Bobbie Palmer, Music Director of Mt. Sinai Baptist Church, read scripture from Luke 19.

45. The opening prayer was led by Rev. Bobbie Moore, Pastor of Oak View Baptist Church.

46. Moderator Alton Martin greeted the messengers and visitors and thanked them for coming.

50. Before election of officers, Moderator Alton Martin, expressed a desire to serve only one year and asked that he not be nominated to serve a second year. Roper nominated Rev. J.C. Goetz and Rev. J.C. Goetz nominated Rev. Broadus Heatherly. Rev. C.A. Kirby made a motion that the nominations be closed. Rev. 53. Rev. Paul Gray, pastor of Norman's Grove, who serves as Associational Audio Visual Coordinator, was asked to give a report on the audio visual equipment that is available to all churches.

54. Steve Calkins led the congregation in singing "He Keeps Me Singing."

55. Rev. Broadus Heatherly presented the constitutional changes for approval. Rev. C.A. Kirby moved that they be accepted. Rev. Ned Buckner seconded the motion and carried. These changes are found elsewhere in this volume.

56. Rev. J.C. Goetz, pastor of Kings Mountain Baptist Church, gave the Resolutions Committee Report and they recommended that the 1983 Annual Minutes be dedicated to Rev. Fred Carter and Rev. Hugh Harrell. Rev. J.C. Goetz moved to accept the Resolution Committee Report and Mr. J.Y. Roper seconded and carried.

57. Rev. C.A. Kirby reported that 2 pastors, 4 deacons and 225 lay people of our Baptist churches have died during the year. This Memorial report is found elsewhere in this volume. Steve Calkins led the congregation in singing "God Be With You Till We Meet Again" in memory of those deceased.

58. Moderator Alton Martin recognized those visiting from convention agencies. Those recognized were: Steve Hoffman, Baptist Children's Home; Carlos Young, Baptist Hospital, and Henry Stokes, Wake Forest University.

59. At this time the new officers for 1983-84 were recognized and Moderator Alton Martin symbolically handed the gavel to Rev. Broadus Heatherly, who is the new moderator. Rev. J.C. Goetz is vice-moderator, and Mr. Joe Calhoun, clerk-treasurer.

60. Rev. Cline Borders introduced the editor of the Biblical Recorder, Dr. R.G. Packard, who delivered the morning message.

61. Rev. Bob Dills, Minister of Music of First Baptist Church, Shelby, presented the special music for the morning session accompanied by Mrs. Bob Hamrick. Rev. Dills sang "He Hideth My Soul."

62. Dr. R.G. Packard's message was on the history of the Biblical Recorder, our North Carolina Baptist paper, which was begun in 1833 by Thomas Merritt. Dr. Packard stated we must take seriously the Great Commission, and that more people are still won to Jesus Christ by one or one witness. Dr. Packard stated that Habakkuk 2:2 has been adopted as the text for our paper. "And the Lord answered me, and said, Write the vision, and make it plain upon tables, that he may run that readeth it."

63. The 133rd Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association, October 19, 1983, was declared adjourned by Moderator Alton Martin.

ANNUAL REPORT 1961-62 DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

I am grateful to be the Director of Missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. These ten years have been rewarding, challenging, affirming, and stress-producing that has resulted in growth.

I am very grateful for the pastors of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association who have given of their time and resources in helping to develop a program. The lay people of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association have just been tremendous. They have given of their time and their resources to put together a program of work that has had its effect here in our area and influence the development of other associations as well.

How grateful I am for a good associational staff with whom to work. I do not believe we could find a better Christian Social Ministries director than Bob Davis. How privileged we have been to have Bobby Lawson with us for four summers. Bobby has established the validity of an associational youth worker among the churches. Margaret Lipscomb is our office manager and our two part time secretaries are Judy Franks and Anne Cook. Wayne Whitaker does a good job of keeping our building clean and ready for the many functions that take place there. Our associational staff not only does a good job at their assigned responsibilities but I want you to know that they also get along well together.

I appreciate our Moderator, Alton Martin, and the assistance he has given us this year and Vice-Moderator, Broadus Heatherly. The program leaders of our organizations have been outstanding. Royce Rallow has done an outstanding job as our Sunday School Director. Dave Gordon has brought the Bible Drill to the forefront and we hope to see new gains in this area. Leila Belle Washburn is leading our WMLU and just continues to be a tremendous resource. Whenever we have a need we can call on the WMLU. Richard McSwain, Director of our Brotherhood just completed a good experience at our Cleveland County Prayer Breakfast and has other activities planned throughout the year. How grateful I am for all of these and the many contributors who serve to make our association what it is today.

Now the seventy-three churches of our association are the source of all that is done. It is the churches that elect the associational staff, committees, and officers and members of committees. It is churches that provide the resources. It is churches that provide the volunteers. It is churches that have provided the vital input to shape the future of the association. The churches have created the association. Whatever the association becomes it is the churches that have given her birth. Churches have given the association its form. Churches have chartered her future. What the association is, is what the churches have created. We are your creation, we know this. We are responsible to you, we know this. We are your servants, we know this. We welcome this and we want nothing more than to be able to respond to the task and challenge you assign to us as the churches of the Kings Mountain Baptists Association.

Sometimes the association has the role of service to the churches such as in the field of leadership training. Sometimes the association has the role of ministering to the needs here in our own Jerusalem such as the prayer breakfast at the local Cleveland County Fair. Sometimes the association has the role of prophet to challenge the churches to meet a need such as calling attention to the 40,000 people living in Cleveland County who do not belong to any church. Sometimes the association assumes the role of projecting plans for the joint ministry of the association such as our Christian social Ministries programs. But regardless of the hat we are wearing at the moment it is always as servants of the churches or for the churches. It is our place and as your director of missions I know and welcome this relationship.

This year I am very pleased to be able to recognize twenty-two of our churches that have doubled their gifts through the Cooperative Program during Bold Mission Phase I 1977-82. These churches are: Allen Memorial, Buffalo, David, Double Springs, Eastside Shelby, Emmanuel, Faith, Fallston, Flat Hill, Grover First, Inmanwood, Kings Mountain Second, Midview, New Prospect, Patterson Springs, Pleasant Ridge, Putnam, Shelby First, Union, Victory, Wallace Grove, and Zion.

I am also pleased to recognize those churches that doubled their church receipts during Bold Mission Phase I 1977-82. There were twelve of these churches. These churches are: Community, David, Elizabeth, Elliott Memorial, Flat Hill, Larchmont, Love Valley, Pleasant Ridge, Putnam Memorial, Union, Victory, and Waverly.

Larry Morris, director of Evangelism, has already recognized fourteen of our churches that doubled their baptisms during Bold Mission Phase I 1977-82. These churches are: Carpenter's Grove, Cedar, David, Elliott Memorial, Larchmont, Midview, Mt. Sinai, New Bethel, Patterson Grove, Pleasant Ridge, Rose Grove, Union, Victory, and Waco.

Billy Cooper, chairman of our Finance Committee, recognized thirty-six of our churches that doubled their associational gifts during Bold Mission Phase I 1977-82. These churches are: Bethel, Boiling Springs, Buffalo, Calvary, Carpenter's Grove, Church Hill Drive, David, Deven, Eastside Kings Min., Eastside Shelby, Emmanuel, Faith, Fallston, Grover First, Highland, Inmanwood, Kings Mountain, Kings Mountain First, Mt. Sinai, Mt. Zion Memorial, New Bethel, New Hope, New Prospect, Northside, Oak Grove, Oak View, Putnam Grove, Patterson Springs, Peach Street, Pleasant Ridge, Putnam Memorial, Shelby First, Union, Waco, Westview, and Zion.

We rejoice in the growth of the churches of the Kings Mountain Association.

This is the year of evaluation. I have gone back and read each of my annual reports to the association. I want to highlight those messages for you today.

1973

Introduction: My first message was to introduce the principles by which I would seek to operate as your director of missions. Here are the statements that I made.

1. I shall strive to be very careful to love everybody.
2. I must strive not to show partiality between churches or individuals.
3. I must strive to be myself.

4. I must be very careful that my desire to be all things to all people does not allow others to make an around boy out of me.
5. I must strive to sharpen my ability to listen and to learn — willing to be led as well as to lead.
6. Though not a pastor, I must strive to know the pressure and pain of those who serve in this capacity.
7. I must be careful to support churches in their search for a pastor without ever once entering into the decision making process.
8. I must strive to regard every church, every situation in every church, as important and worthy of my best contribution.
9. I must strive to support the shepherd of every flock without ever dreaming to person or his role as a pastor.
10. I must strive to present myself as one who is a helper, equipper and enabler, one who will make every effort to understand.
11. I must strive to continually develop my own spiritual resources.
12. I must strive not to neglect my family for one cannot encourage others to do what he may fail to do himself.
13. I must activate programs, processes and procedures that will serve the future and refuse to only react to what occurs around me.
14. I must be very careful to know Jesus Christ only as Lord of my life — not my family, my task, my convention — but Jesus as Lord.

I ended by saying, "I need you as a person — not as a fund raiser, promoter of programs, or to fulfill associational tasks — but I need you as a person."

Together we shall share in the greatest task ever given to man — "The Kingdom of God".

1974

I am aware of the strong heritage of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. I know and admire those who have served in this capacity. Can we turn a corner? I am not making a motion but using the power of recommendation.

1. Should we consider a full-time director of Christian social ministries?
2. Should we consider a Church Extension person?
3. Should we consider a religious educational consultant at the associational level?
4. Should we consider accepting the responsibility for maintaining a home for girls in Cleveland County?
5. Should we consider the construction of an associational office building for more adequate facilities for more added services.
6. Should we consider a music consultant to assist in developing and strengthening the music ministry in the churches?
7. Should we consider — the list continues — I am not pleading for any one of these causes — only, but trying to raise the question, "Should we consider the ministry of the association to be larger than we have envisioned it to be at this moment?"

The Long Range Committee will begin January 1, 1975. Will they lead us to turn a corner? Kings Mountain Baptist Association is a big business—\$3,441,000. Shall we turn a corner? What corner will we turn? When will we have the resources to turn that corner?

1975

At the end of the 1975 session we began celebrating our 125th Anniversary of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

Activities for the year would be built around the theme, "Let Freedom Ring". Held

county-wide census, lay evangelism schools, churchmen revivals with fifty-two churches participating, had dramatic presentation of first annual session, approved permission to secure service of an associational youth worker for next year, closed the message with a "Dare to Dream?"...

1. Greater fellowship between churches.
2. Greater fellowship within churches.
3. Greater fellowship among pastors.

This is the year the association sent Mrs. Borders and myself to South Africa.

1974

Program Committee requested that I share the needs for a C.S.M. Director. Directed my remarks based on the needs discovered by the Long Range Planning Committee:

1. Strengthen the Family.
2. Minister to those suffering social pain in prison, jails, domestic court and juvenile court.
3. Support system to existing social agencies in Cleveland County.

1977

C.S.M. Search Committee made its first report. Held seminar for pastors led by Dr. Robert Dole and Dr. Jim Davis, association-wide deacons retreat at Ridgecrest with 517 registered, three win schools, people search of entire county, Bi-centennial Celebration with Gaston Baptist Association at Barnes Auditorium in Kings Mountain. Present members of Mission Committee, Pastors' Conference, Executive Committee and General Board is that our greatest need is for a C.S.M. Director.

1978

C.S.M. Search Committee at work. On March 18 at First Baptist, Kings Mountain in a special called meeting, Robert G. Davis was presented by the Search Committee and elected as our first C.S.M. Director. Purchased building site adjacent to Eastside Church in Shelby. Challenging of mind on that we do not need new churches in Kings Mountain Baptist Association. Facts were shared that if we established churches on population ratio of 1980 we would need 103 churches in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. Statement made that we need to establish a church with strength at least every five years. Question was raised as whether the association should rethink the notion about new churches.

1979

Beginning of the Prayer Breakfast at the Cleveland County Fair Grounds, projected plans for a new building, first G.A. Camp at Garden-Webb, launched plans for having pastors visit our churches from South Africa, four-day Pastoral Leadership Seminar, launched Long Range Planning process for the second time, and call to sponsor refugees.

1980

All shocked by the sudden and unexpected death of Mae Petty, our beloved associational office manager. The printed report stated how much we missed Mae Petty who was recovering from surgery. The fact was we also had to announce her death on the first day of

our annual meeting at Patterson Grove.

The visit from the pastors of South Africa left a real spiritual deposit in our midst. A tenure study of pastors in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association of forty years was done with an average of five years two months. As your director of missions, I led conferences at both Ridgeway and Glorieta; developed teaching guide for the Seminary Extension Department's newest course, "The Missionary Wife". We conducted a mission vacation tour to Nashville involving eighty-seven persons from twenty-two churches. Groundbreaking was held for our new building on Wyke Road.

1981

1981 was the year of constructing our building. Chairman of the committee, Richard Flyler, guided us during these crucial days. Associational receipts exceeded \$100,000 mark and receipts within the churches exceeded \$6,000,000 mark. Denominational survey revealed approximately 40,000 people in Cleveland County do not belong to any church in the county. Began classes in our facility for Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary.

1982

The theme of the message was that it is time to start talking about what the Lord has done. The series of events that have transpired cannot be explained any other way. What has happened in the seventy-two churches associational program is what the Lord hath done!

1983

An associational-wide evaluation was taken on the leadership of the director of missions. An evaluation form was mailed to all those who receive a copy of the *Breeze*. This is to be processed by the Missions Committee and reported to the association. This process is so new that we will be learning for a long time how to evaluate and how to read the results.

This is an amazing story to me. It does not seem like separate and individual years with each possessing their own joys and trials - it seems like one story orchestrated by a single mind. Now, if you moved to the conclusion that some human being did that, I would have to conclude that you were not in touch with what really happened. If you concluded that this is ten years in which the Heavenly Father has guided and lead us, I would affirm your judgment. No one -- absolutely no one -- is more amazed at what the Father has done than I am.

It has been done because we have all had a share in the shaping and the making of the dream. The Father has called out from our midst people with special strengths, insights, commitment to a task, and most of all commitment to the Lord Jesus Christ who loved us and gave himself for us.

This is a story about the Father and a story about people whom the Father wanted to touch. I illustrate it with our most recent event at the Prayer Breakfast at the Cleveland County Fair. A woman in her late forties or early fifties came up to me at the close of the service and as I shook hands with her I realized she had left something in my hand. I took a second look at her and tears came on her cheeks. She looked at me and said, "You will never know how much I needed this. I knew the Lord was here but I have drifted away." My response was, "Who of us has not, the Lord loves you very much." While repeated thank you's, she faded out of sight. Here is the \$10 bill. I warned you to use it before I turned it in to our treasurer.

This is a story about the Father and a story about people who need the Father's touch. This is a story of seventy-three churches joining together to do together what they could not do alone. This is a story of what you, the churches, have done.

May God continue to bless all seventy-three of His churches.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRY — ANNUAL REPORT

- Prison Ministry:** Our Prison Ministry continues to be one of our vital areas of concern and has experienced a steady growth of involvement both from participation by the inmates and from our volunteers. October through May and September found us in our every two weeks program of our Yorkfellow Worship Service. Average attendance for the total group is approximately 40 people. Our volunteers for this period averaged 15 per night. For the months of June — August we went on a monthly basis. Attendance from the inmates dropped slightly and our volunteers averaged 8 per session. We had a total of 21 inmates who made profession of faith. It was my joy to go and visit with these on a one-to-one basis, and counsel with them on their decisions. Thirty church groups assisted in this program with the provision of home baked "goodies" for the refreshment portion of the program.

September through May we had a volunteer led Bible Study Ministry. This met Monday and Friday afternoons. This group averaged 15 in attendance.

One major ministry this year as in years past, was the Gift Packet for the men in the local Prison Camp. Through your response we provided 176 gift packets. Twenty-eight church groups participated in this ministry. Twenty-three youth from our churches came and volunteered to process the items into the packets. This ministry always seems to have an impact on the prison population and for many of the inmates it represents their total Christmas gift.
- Juvenile Court Ministry:** We planned five trips this year in our Camping Program. We had to cancel our winter retreat in January because of the snow, so we were only able to have four of these. At our October retreat we had total of 20 people, five of these were volunteers. At our April meeting we had 21 attending with six of these volunteers. At our April meeting we had 21 attending with six of these volunteers. At our June camp we had 27 to attend. Eight of these were volunteers. Our July meeting found a total of 15, with three of these being volunteers. These trips seem to hold special excitement and meaning for the youth of the Juvenile Court. Most of these are in the age of 12-15. Our program includes recreation, Bible study and devotional times.

I am excited to report to you that your Camping Program will be presented in a mission emphasis at the meeting of the Baptist State Convention meeting in Greensboro, N.C. in November. Ours is the only association in North Carolina that has this ministry.

In October we took a group of Juvenile Court Youth to the High Rise Prison for youthful offenders in Morganton for the "Final Story" Program. Twenty-three attended this one day trip.
- Migrant Ministry:** Our Migrant Fellowship Meetings began in August and ran for seven weeks this year. We met at the Belwood-Community Center. Representatives from sixteen churches assisted with this ministry. These were Lenoirville, Norman's Grove, Fullerton, Wrenview, Pleasant Ridge, Union, Casar, Double Shoals, Carpenter's Grove, Shelby Fork, Kings Mountain, Elizabeth, Dover, Polkville, Plains View and Waco.

Our program consisted of a worship service, picnic meal, and recreation. It was a beautiful experience of sharing the love of Christ and the salvation of His promise with those who were "strangers" in our midst. Average attendance for the migrants was 17 per meeting. The overall average attendance was 31. Volunteers total 147 people. A tremendous amount of love and involvement was expressed by the people of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association as they shared themselves with those who came to our meetings. Kings Mountain Baptist, Dover Baptist and Elizabeth Baptist provided Health Care Kits for our ministry this year.
- Literacy Ministry:** A mini-workshop was held at the associational office in February with eight persons attending. A ten hour workshop was hosted by the Dover Baptist

Church in May. Seven new volunteers were trained at the workshop and several have been busy working with a student. Non-reading adults continue to come to our sessions. We need to prayerfully consider literacy as a priority item in our concern in Cleveland County.

4. **Visually Handicapped Ministry:** Eight clients participated in the ceramic classes (eight weeks) at First Baptist in Shelby. Twenty-one volunteers assisted. Daily programs began with morning devotional. We had "graduation" luncheon in November. Turkeys donated by local plant were delivered to four visually handicapped in December.

Ceramic class of September-December 1982 re-enacted as it could be on audiovisual presentation on state level for use in Baptist State Convention Production for Missions Department on Volunteerism. Total volunteers were twelve.

5. **Physically Handicapped Ministry:** Day Camp for retarded children and youth held in June, additional camps will be held in July and August. Seven mentally handicapped youth attended the three hour day camp. Twenty-two volunteers were trained and participated in the camp. My. Sinal youth provided refreshments.

At our July Day Camp we had 16 mentally handicapped to come and 18 volunteers. At our August Day Camp we had 12 mentally handicapped to come with 18 volunteers. Youth from our churches volunteered and did a beautiful job in working with mentally handicapped youth. We have plans for several day camps next year and a week of Vacation Bible School.

6. **Emergency and Relief Ministry:** This has been an extremely active year in our Emergency and Relief Ministry. The past winter proved to be very difficult for many people of Cleveland County. As always the people of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association responded to the needs of this county in a beautiful and loving way. In addition to our budget expenses, you responded to the needs of this county in a beautiful and loving way. In addition to our budget expenses, you responded to calls for help throughout the year with your special gifts and donations. We received requests for assistance from 1,348 families and were able to provide assistance for 1,281 of these. In the August Session we announced that we were temporarily out of funds in the area of rent and utility assistance. These are only two parts of our Emergency and Relief Ministry. In spite of that, we were able to serve as a referral agency for many families and assist them in finding appropriate resources. Also, many sent us special donations during this time, and we were able to continue this part of the Emergency and Relief Ministry on a limited basis. In the April Executive Board Meeting you voted to employ a part time Christian Social Ministry secretary. She came at a slack time and this has enabled me to have time to train her for work in the Emergency and Relief Ministry.

This has been a tremendous help to me in freeing me to devote more time to the other ministries. The breakdown of our Emergency and Relief work is as follows:

A boost to our winter needs came in the form of the Duke Power March Money. We were chosen as the agency in Cleveland County to work with this program. For every \$4 we raised, we were given \$1 by Duke Power. Your response was overwhelming. We were able to raise \$12,567.86. The Duke March for this was \$2,710. Citizens banded together in the Ten Treasures Artie Sale. We received \$7,000 from this. A part of the \$7,000, approximately \$3,200 was applied to the Duke March Program, thus enabling us to make the money grow and serve more people. We have recently received word that we will receive from the Duke Program again this winter.

We have provided volunteer services to the Department of Social Services in the area of cheese and food distribution to the needy. This was done in October, December, April and August. Approximately 110,000 lbs. of cheese was distributed, plus rice, flour, bean meal and dried milk. We had between 40-50 volunteers who worked hard and faithfully in this caring ministry.

Our most exciting new ministry was the Christmas Toy Store. One hundred twenty-two families assisted with toys, etc. for Christmas. This involved three hundred twenty-three children. Additional twenty-eight families with fifty-seven children were referred to groups who requested a family to help. Four professions of faith in counseling rooms. One hundred eighteen groups/individuals provided items.

We have already begun our emphasis for the Toy Store this year. Please take note of the "Surrounded with Love" sheet in these reports. I'm excited over this unique manner of sharing the birth of a Savior with these families in our Toy Store.

As usual you have been most responsive in your donation of clothing. Often we have excess in adult clothing. This past winter volunteers took notes of our excess and made 36 quilts for the needy. This continues to be a needed ministry and an on-going service.

We continue to look for areas where we can begin to minister to the needs of the people of Cleveland County. One such area of investigation is in the area of Domestic Violence. Your response to the needs of Cleveland County has been the most exciting thing for me this year. The total times you have responded to volunteer in ministry involvement was 2,119. This is doubled from the 81-82 associational year. Thank you for your continued good response to the ministries of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association and for allowing me to be your Director of Christian Social Ministries. May God bless you as you continue to serve Him who loves us all.

**CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS CHANGES PROPOSED
BY THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE**

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE VI OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTIONS

Section 1: After Baptize Youth for Chris Director, delete the word "and" and add the following after Parliamentarian, "and Audiovisual Coordinator."

BY-LAWS

BY-LAW III DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Change Section 14 to read Section 15, and add a new Section 14.

Section 14: The Audiovisual Coordinator shall assist all associational leadership in the selection, production and use of audiovisual material. Upon request, he shall provide similar assistance to individual church leaders. He shall provide opportunities for training in the production and use of audio-visuals in education, motivation and worship. The Audiovisual Coordinator shall work with the librarian in storing, cataloging and promoting the use of audiovisual materials equipment. Maintenance of audiovisual equipment is the responsibility of the Audiovisual Coordinator.

BY-LAW IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 2: The Executive Committee

Paragraph 1. Delete the word "and" after Chairman of Deacons and add the following at the end of the paragraph: "and Audiovisual Coordinator."

Section 3: The Enrollments Committee

Insert a period after messengers and delete "at all of the sessions." Add the following sentence: "A total enrollment shall be made for each day."

Section 18: The Missions Committee

Change the paragraph to read as follows: "The Missions Committee shall be made up of the following members: Chairman (Vice-Moderator), the Director of Missions, Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Finance Committee Chairman, Chairperson of CSM Committee, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMU Director, President of the Pastors' Conference, and Audiovisual Coordinator."

Main local point: ABC STORE REFERENDUM

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Our History lesson today is on DATES!

Some of us do not like dates.

Some of us say we can't remember dates.

But we can. We remember what is important to us.

Each of us remembers his or her birth date, though some of us hesitate to tell it. Our wives remember the date of our wedding anniversary, and we men had better remember it.

The entire world, civilized, pagan and heathen, proceeds on Christian time, the date (A.D.) the year of our Lord, Anno Domini.

We remember Christmas, New Year's Day, the Fourth of July, and that Columbus discovered America in 1492.

Members here at Beaver Dam all know this church was constituted in the fall of 1890, a year before the Kings Mountain Association was formed at Double Springs in 1891; that it got its name from the dates the beavers made in the nearby creek where the first converts were baptized. Most of you have heard that 8-year old John W. Suttle was converted under a big pine near the cemetery, later preached here a third of a century, and that his funeral was here in 1962.

Kings Mountain was the daughter of the Broad River Association which was born in 1800. It was a direct descendant of the Sandy Creek Association and the Sandy Creek church organized by the Rev. Shobal Stearns in Macon County in 1755. Two former members of this association, Sandy Run at Mooreboro and Old Buffalo near Blacksburg, NC were constituted in 1772, before the American Revolution. Zion is now our oldest daughter, born in 1816.

During the past several months I have collected some 50 dates important to members of the churches in the Kings Mountain Association. This list is too long to review today, but I propose to include it as "extended remarks" to be placed in the annual minutes, at some place.

These dates and data will include information about important men and women of the association, both in past and present who have made and are making this body what it is and has been.
