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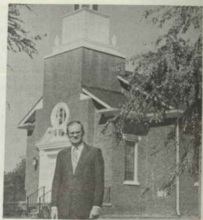
During the days of August 14-17, 1983, Elizabeth celebrated a century of ministry. It all began in the heart of Elizabeth Lowe Wilson for whom the church is named. A reliable source reports that she would bring her cow to graze upon the grassy land where the church now is located. At this same time, Jace Borders Mauney, would join Elizabeth to pray as the cow grazed. The burden of their prayer was for a church in their community to erase the influence of a nearby liquor store and eliminate the necessary travel to reach churches like Pleasant Hill and New Prospect.

The founding date, expressed in the cornerstone of the first brick structure completed in 1900, is June 8, 1883. Available records indicate that either during a break away revival of early 1883 or soon thereafter a Sunday school was organized and that in September 1883 the congregation petitioned for and was accepted into the membership of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. God gloriously answered the prayers of the two early saints and has placed in the Elizabeth community a congregation of near 1,000 whose ministry extends to the ends of the earth.

Over a span of 100 years 59 pastors have served the congregation. The average length of slightly more than 5 years, and more than 7 for the past 50, indicates that from the first pastor of C.F. Peters, whose tenure may be the shortest, to the present pastor Fred A. Mauney, whose length of service is the longest, the pastor people relationship has been strong and enduring.

Five churches in the state have been as supportive to missions and denominational ministries as Elizabeth. Recent statistics, as published in the *Biblical Recorder*, concerning giving through the Cooperative Program revealed the top 100 churches. Elizabeth was number 40 of near 1,500 churches in dollars received and 40 in percentage of total receipts.

The headstone at the grave of Elizabeth Lowe Wilson has inscribed on it, "she hath done what she could." She prayed for a church in her community. She put legs to her prayers when she gave land upon which a building could be constructed. Because hundreds across a hundred years have joined hands and hearts to do what they could, The Elizabeth Baptist Church has become a manifestation of Christ not only in its community but throughout the world as she has endeavored to heed the command of Christ and go out to the world to "make disciples."



## Waco Baptist Church

Waco Baptist Church was originally organized as Capernaum Baptist Church located at the site of Capernaum Cemetery. The following is inscribed inside the cover of the first minute book: "The Church at Capernaum were (sic) constituted the 9th day of July, 1842 by Elders D. Dobbin and R.P. Logan." Elder Drury Dobbin accepted the call of the church and became its first pastor.

On September 2, 1842, Marie Carpenter became the first member to be received by baptism. She was baptized the following day and among her grandchildren are Mrs. John Wagoner of Shelby and W.H. (Chen) Lutz of Waco.

"Sabbath School" was started in April, 1847.

When organized, Capernaum joined the Broad River Association, but joined the King Mountain Association in 1871.

The church decided in 1886 to move its place of worship to Waco and in 1888 used the name "Waco Baptist" in submitting the annual letter to the association.

The original church site was marked in 1918 by the construction of an altar. Since then, Homecoming Day services have been held at the Capernaum altar.

Waco built its present auditorium in 1940 and retired its building debt by the end of 1941.

Rev. Darley Turner of Waynesburg, Kentucky became the church's first full-time pastor on June 21, 1923. In 1934 the church constructed its present educational building, and in 1956, the church built the present parsonage. Then in 1965, the auditorium was remodeled into its present configuration and the front foyer and steeple added.

Rev. Royce Butler, a native of Dallas, Texas, was called from San Juan, Puerto Rico to become pastor of Waco Baptist on July 2, 1977.

Waco Baptist has hosted the Kings Mountain Baptist Association four times: 1895, 1905, 1964 and 1984.

## CONSTITUTION

### PREAMBLE

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

### ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this body shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

### ARTICLE II PURPOSE

Under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, this association of churches seeks to further the Kingdom through the following:

- (1) the fostering of fellowship and cooperation among the member churches;
- (2) the ministering to the spiritual and physical needs of people;
- (3) the giving and receiving of information, assistance and training for member churches;
- (4) the cooperation with North Carolina Baptist State and Southern Baptist Conventions.

### ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Membership Committee. Application should include:

1. Formal action by the group seeking admission reflecting that 75% of those voting expresses their intent to cooperate.
2. A written statement reflecting their beliefs and practices.
3. A written statement that expresses their intent to cooperate.
4. A willingness to meet with Membership Committee to discuss other items of mutual interest to both parties.

The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist belief and practice and what it means to cooperate with the churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. If recommended by this committee and accepted by the Association, a mission or a church shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a minimum of one year. Membership within the Association shall be determined by vote of the Association at its annual meeting. Churches under the watchcare shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its constitution and by-laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and if requested, the Associational Executive Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like associations.

### ARTICLE IV MEETINGS

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Tuesday and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or Executive Board, provided two weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 3: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each fifty members of the church, provided each church shall not have less than three nor more than ten messengers. These shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those in attendance and registering at the Associational Meeting.

## ARTICLE V AUTHORITY

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this Constitution in Article III, Section 2 and 3.

## ARTICLE VI OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTIONS

Section 1: The officers of the association shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Miss Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Chairman of the Library Council, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Parliamentarian, and Auditorial Coordinator.

Section 2: The Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer shall be elected on the morning of the last day of the annual meeting. All other officers shall be contacted and nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Associational Executive Board at their April meeting.

Section 3: The newly elected Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer shall assume at the close of the annual session all duties incumbent upon them relating to work of the ensuing associational year. All other officers shall assume all duties incumbent upon them relating to the work of the ensuing year on October 1.

Section 4: Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election for two years.

## ARTICLE VII TRUSTEES AND THEIR ELECTION

There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

## ARTICLE VIII THE ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Associational Executive Board shall be composed of all Associational officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Associational Director of Missions, the Christian Social Ministries Director (ex-officio without voting privileges), each active pastor, two members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The Associational Executive Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the Constitution. Associational Executive Board members are the connecting link between the Association and the churches. Executive Board members should represent the churches to the Association. Executive Board members should act as representatives for the Association to the churches. It is the responsibility of the Executive Board members to promote the programs, represent the needs and report to the churches concerning the work and ministry of the Association. Executive Board members should seek acceptable means of representing the Association to their respective fellowships. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association in its Annual Meeting.

The quarterly meeting will be in January, April and July, on Monday after the third Sunday.

## ARTICLE IX COMMITTEES

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through the following annual meeting.

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the Annual Meeting:

1. Order of Business and Program Committee (By-Law IV, Section 1)
2. Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
3. Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
4. Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)
5. Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 5)
6. Nominating Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
7. Constitution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
8. Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
9. Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
10. Resolutions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
11. Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
12. Seminary Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
13. Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
14. Christian Social Ministry Committee (By-Law IV, Section 17)
15. Church Reconciliation Committee (By-Law IV, Section 18)
16. Mission Committee (By-Law IV, Section 19)
17. Recreation and Drama Committee (By-Law IV, Section 20)
18. Strategy Planning Committee.
19. Any other committee authorized by the Association.

B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting: Committee on Committees. (By-Law IV, Section 14)

Section 2: The following committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting to serve during the Annual Meeting: Enrollment Committee (By-Law IV, Section 14).

## **ARTICLE X AMENDMENTS**

Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any Annual Session of the Association upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association on the first day and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association on the last day. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

## **BY-LAWS**

### **By-Law I PARLIAMENTARY RULES**

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

### **By-Law II ASSOCIATION YEAR**

The Associational Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

### **By-Law III DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committee on Committees and Committee on Enrollment. He shall be the Chairman of the Associational Executive Board and be an ex officio (without voting privileges) member of all other committees. Upon completion of his term of office, the Moderator shall become a member-at-large (for two years) of the Mission Committee, Executive, and the Executive Board.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be the Vice-Chairman of the Executive Board.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's Annual Meeting, distribute at the Annual Meeting copies of the digest of these reports, make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of



Minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of Minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the Executive Board. He shall inform all members elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action. He shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its Executive Board, or as designated in the budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Board or the Association in annual sessions); render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the Annual Meeting and give a report at each quarterly Executive Board meeting and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Associational Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.

Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and make a written report to each Annual Meeting of the Association.

Section 6: The Sunday School Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Sunday School Department. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to the committee that would promote this work.

The Associational Sunday School should assist church leaders to be more effective in their responsibility. This should include:

1. Provide opportunities for fellowship and inspiration.
2. Interpret the Sunday School Program.
3. Train Sunday School leaders.
4. Consult with Sunday School leaders concerning their program.
5. Provide organization and leadership for cooperative work among the churches.

Section 7: The Church Training Department shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Church Training Department. This officer shall attend Executive Committee meetings, maintain the on-going work of this department at all times, and give an annual report to the Association.

Section 8: The Music Director shall provide leadership for the Association in session and when requested at other times during the year. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this Committee that would promote the work. He shall encourage music growth in the churches throughout the year and shall make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

Section 9: The Brotherhood Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of men and boys in the churches. The officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to promote the development of men and boys and an awareness of world mission needs.

Section 10: The Woman's Missionary Union Director serves on the Executive Committee of the Association and works with the Director of Missions; leads the WMU Council; confers with our associational WMU officers and assists them in their work; leads in providing opportunities for leaders and members of their church WMUs to have fellowship and receive inspiration concerning their mutual mission task; leads in interpreting the WMU program to church leaders; leads in training church WMU workers and members; consults with church leaders concerning initiation of WMU work and the improvement of existing work; provides at and plans for associational meeting; leads in associational WMU annual planning; leads in discovering mission action needs and in coordinating the work being done; and reports progress of WMU work to the Association and serves as contact between the Association and state WMU.

Section 11: The Chairman of the Library Council shall promote the beginning and maintenance of church libraries in the churches; provide training oppor-

ILITIES for church libraries; maintain and develop the associational library; attend the Executive Committee meetings; cooperate with the Director of Missions and make an annual report to the Association at its annual session.

**Section 12:** The Baptist Youth for Christ Director shall, under the supervision of the Director of Missions, serve as chairman of Youth for Christ Committee of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

**Section 13:** The Parliamentarian shall, at the Annual Meeting of the Association, rule on all questions of parliamentary procedure which shall arise during the sessions. The Parliamentarian shall serve as a resource person to the churches and shall, upon request, advise and assist the churches on matters of parliamentary procedure.

**Section 14:** The Audiovisual Coordinator shall assist all associational leadership in the selection, production and use of audiovisual material. Upon request, he shall provide similar assistance to individual church leaders. He shall provide opportunities for training in the production and use of audiovisuals in education, meditation and worship. The Audiovisual Coordinator shall work with the librarian in storing, cataloging and promoting the use of audiovisual materials equipment. Maintenance of audiovisual equipment is the responsibility of the Audiovisual Coordinator.

**Section 15:** Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Executive Board, except the office of Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

## **By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES**

**Section 1: THE ORDER OF BUSINESS AND PROGRAM COMMITTEE** shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Associational Music Director, and three other members. It shall rotate the place of meeting among the groups of churches with the host church being determined by the group. It shall recommend the preacher and the alternate for the annual session. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting for the Association, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the Annual Meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the Annual Meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary. This committee will be responsible for promoting the Annual Meeting through the various news media.

### **Section 2: The Executive Committee**

1. Shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk/Treasurer, Music Director, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMU Director, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Chairperson of the Christian Social Ministries Committee; President of the Pastors' Conference; Chairman of the Nominating Committee; President of the Committee on Committees, Chairman of Christian Life Committee, Chairman of Membership Committee, Chairman of Finance Committee, Chairman of Evangelism, Chairman of Long Range Planning Committee, and Audiovisual Coordinator.

2. When without a Director of Missions, this committee shall seek out and recommend to the Association, or its Executive Board, for election of a new Director of Missions according to By-Law VI, Section 11.

3. It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or Executive Board and act on routine or emergency matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven is necessary to transact business.

**Section 3: The Evangelism Committee**, composed of six members, shall promote the work of evangelism in the churches and the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its Executive Board.

**Section 4: The Finance Committee**, composed of six members, two rotating annually, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs of an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the Association, upon request, with the stewardship programs offered by the Convention.

The Committee shall express gratitude to the churches for their stewardship development that enables them to participate in local, home, and foreign missions.

**Section 5: The Ordination Committee**, composed of five members, with the pastor of the home church (the church of which the candidate is a member), the Director of Missions, and deacons of the home and requesting churches, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

The Committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of the Minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conference at which the home voted to request examination of the candidate.

The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.

The Chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place, and procedure.

The Committee suggest that the candidate be questioned at least two weeks prior to his ordination.

The Committee shall question the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, and his personal life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.

The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the ministry.

In every instance, the Committee shall be guided by the Scripture, especially 1 Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-6.

The Committee shall give written notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the ordination.

The Chairman shall report the Committee's activities to the Executive Board quarterly and provide a written report for the Annual Meeting.

**Section 6: The Nominating Committee**, composed of six members, shall contact and nominate the officers of the Association according to Article VI of the Constitution. The Committee shall also, in cooperation with the Nominating Committee of various departments (except the WMU and Brotherhood organizations), recommend workers for these various departments. The officers and workers of these respective organizations shall be nominated by the organization themselves and submitted to the Nominating Committee (Article VI, Section 1). They shall also nominate Associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of

our Baptist State Convention. The Committee shall also assist the Executive Board in filing vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

**Section 7: The Constitution Committee**, composed of three members, shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed.

**Section 8: The Membership Committee**, composed of five members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws. The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist faith and practice and what it means to cooperate with other churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. The Membership Committee shall annually review all churches and missions under the watchcare of the Association and may present them for membership within the Association or that they continue under the watchcare.

**Section 9: The Calendar Committee** shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMLU Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director and Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an Associational Calendar for the coming year and present same to the Executive Board for adoption.

**Section 10: The Resolutions Committee** composed of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation, plan and promote the work of the Committee in an annual planning meeting; and present resolutions of appreciation to individuals, organizations, and churches when there are events worthy of commendation.

**Section 11: The Historical Committee** shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and six other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Association Meeting.

**Section 12: The Seminary Extension Committee**, composed of three members, shall publicize study courses and programs that are available; and shall plan, provide and promote Seminary Extension studies as they may be desired.

**Section 13: The Christian Life Committee**, composed of six members, will give continual attention to the moral climate of the community and shall initiate necessary action to maintain and improve the climate. The committee shall commend those persons and institutions that uphold Christian virtue, and shall support the churches in the teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness.

**Section 14: The Committee on Committees**, composed of five members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX, Section 2), and shall assist the Executive Board in filing vacancies on all standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the Chairman of each committee.

**Section 15: The Telephone Contact Committee** shall be composed of one person from each group of churches in the Association (B). These committee members shall relay messages to pastors and lay leaders during the year. All messages to be sent should be cleared with the Director of Missions.

**Section 16: The Enrollment Committee** shall prepare for and direct the meetings of the messengers. A total enrollment shall be made for each day.

**Section 17: The Christian Social Ministry Committee**, composed of six members, shall assist the CSM Director in the planning, promoting and correlation of the Christian Social Ministry programs. This is to be a sub-committee of the Associational Missions Committee, with the Chairperson of the CSM committee serving as a member of the Missions Committee. Ex officio members shall be the Moderator and the Director of Missions.

**Section 18: The Church Reconciliation Committee** shall be composed of the present Moderator as chairman, two immediate past Moderators and two lay persons to be appointed annually by the above stated members. The chairman will report to the Executive Committee or the Executive Board the names of those lay persons appointed. This committee will be open to any person or persons of a member church seeking assistance with problems related to their church.

**Section 19: The Mission Committee** shall be made up of the following members: Chairman (Vice-Moderator), the Director of Missions, Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Finance Committee Chairman, Chairperson of CSM Committee, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMU Director, President of the Pastors' Conference, and Audiovisual Coordinator.

This Committee is to be available as a sounding board, to support the Director of Missions as a person (as well as an officer in the Association), provide feedback concerning Associational programs and activities, conveying suggestions from the Association and offering support in projecting programs to the Executive Committee and/or Executive Board. The Mission Committee shall seek to determine areas of need within and without the Association and formulate recommendations to the Associational Executive Committee.

The Committee shall enthusiastically explore all mission possibilities throughout the Association, emphasizing the need for new teaching units, preaching points, missions, and churches; and it shall actively seek out potential sponsoring churches for the beginning of specific mission endeavors. Providing energetic outreach leadership for the Association shall be the Committee's highest priority.

**Section 20: The Recreation and Drama Committee** shall promote a program of Christian recreation and drama in the churches. The Committee shall regard recreation and drama as a means, not an end. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall use their programs as a way to teach, a means of witnessing and an avenue of expressing the abundant Christian life. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall be responsible to give assistance to any church that should request help in the area of recreation and drama. The Committee's responsibilities shall include fellowships, Senior Adults, women, crafts, drama workshops and other assignments of the Association, if asked. The Chairman of the Recreation and Drama Committee shall plan with the Director of Missions and give a report of the committee's activities at the Executive Board quarterly meetings.

**Section 21: The Strategy Planning Committee**, composed of five members, shall seek to understand the 'Priority Statements' of the Association; provide support and suggestions to the appropriate committees for implementation; and recognize personally and publicly the committees that address themselves to, and make significant accomplishments in achieving the 'Priority Statements.' At a time it judges appropriate, the Committee will also suggest to the Association the need for further strategy planning.

**Section 22: Youth for Christ Committee**, composed of a director and six members, shall be responsible for promoting and coordinating the following activities:

1. Youth Council Sessions.
2. Quarterly sessions of Youth for Christ in local churches.
3. A Rainbow Crusade for Christ every 3 to 5 years.
4. Mission Vacation Bible School and/or Backyard VBS.
5. Serve as a support group to the Associational Summer Youth Worker.
6. Any other activity which the Director of Missions and/or Executive Committee deems necessary to foster a positive Christian witness for Christ.

**Section 23: Memorials Committee**, composed of three members, will be responsible to:

1. Recognize deceased ministers, staff, deacons, members in an appropriate way.
2. Submit report for inclusion in Associational Minutes.
3. Represent Association to those who are bereaved.

#### **Section 24: PASTORAL MINISTRIES COMMITTEE**

The Pastoral Ministries Committee shall be composed of six ministers and/or staff persons in the Association with two rotating off each year.

It shall be the duty of this committee to work with the Director of Missions in planning and promoting continuing educational opportunities for ministers and staff persons in the Association.

#### **Section 25: CHURCH SURVEY AND EXTENSION COMMITTEE**

The Church Survey and Extension Committee shall be composed of six members and shall encourage the Association to respond to the need for new churches and the development of young congregations. It shall be the responsibility of this committee to keep abreast of the growth and development of the townships within the Association and encourage the appropriate responses.

**Section 26:** Members of all these committees, except those appointed by the Moderator, shall be elected to serve not more than three years on a rotating basis.

### **By-Law V TRUSTEES**

The duty of the Trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other securities of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its Executive Board.

### **By-Law VI DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS**

**Section 1:** His selection shall be upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association at its Annual Meeting, or between sessions of the Association, by its Executive Board. His time of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity.

### **By-Law VII DIRECTOR OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRY**

**Section 1: Employment** - The Director of CSM shall be jointly employed by the Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Home Mission Board. The employee should be elected to work until the sponsoring groups mutually agree to cease the tenure of service or the employee resigns. The CSM Director shall work under the supervision of the Director of Missions and in compliance with the Job Description provided by the State and Association.

**Section 2: Basic Function** - The basic functions are to work with the CSM Committee to organize, supervise and promote a program of activities to meet the spiritual, educational, emotional and physical needs of the people within the geographical boundaries of the Association.

**Section 3:** The CSM Director shall be an ex officio member of the Associational Executive Board, Associational Executive Committee and Missions Committee without voting privileges.

**Section 4:** When without a Christian Social Ministries Director, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search

Committee to seek a person to serve as Christian Social Ministries Director according to By-Law VII Section 1 and 2.

### **By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS**

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the Annual Meeting by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

### **By-Law IX DEFINE PROCEDURE**

Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.

Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six Associational Groups as follows: Polkville, Lanesboro, Shelby, Kings Mountain, Grover, and Waco.

**PROCEEDINGS**  
**October 25, 1964**  
**Tuesday Afternoon**

1. Messengers and visitors gathered in the Elizabeth Baptist Church for the 124th Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.
2. Moderator Broadus Heatherly, pastor of Mount Sinai Baptist Church, called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m. Allen Jolley, Associational Music Director and Minister of Music for First Baptist in Kings Mountain, introduced Mrs. Beth Hamrick who gave a mini-concert on the organ. Then Allen Jolley led the congregation in singing "He Lives."
3. Broadus Heatherly asked that enrollment cards be filled out at this time by those who had not already done so.
4. Rev. Scott Forrest, pastor of Churchill Drive, read scripture from Psalms 95: 1-7. Rev. Harvey Rogers, pastor of Falmont Baptist, led in the opening prayer.
5. Dr. Paul Sorrells, pastor of Beaver Dam Baptist Church, then gave the Order of Business report. He moved that the order of programs be accepted as printed with changes as needed. Rev. Ed Sowers, pastor of Bethlehem, seconded the motion and it was approved.
6. Enrollment cards were taken up by the colporters. Broadus Heatherly then expressed thanks to the Elizabeth Baptist Church for being the host for today's meeting.
7. The appointment of the Committee on Constitutions was read by Moderator Broadus Heatherly. This is found elsewhere in this volume.
8. Running ahead of schedule, Broadus Heatherly asked Rev. Larry Morris of Putnam Memorial to share with us some of the achievements that his church has made with the Master Life program.
9. The report of the Executive Board was given by Joe Cabaniss, Clerk-treasurer. He also gave the 1963-64 Treasurer's Report. He made a motion that we accept these reports as written. Dr. Wyatt Washburn seconded and it was approved. These reports are found elsewhere in this volume.
10. Mr. Tom Martin, a local attorney who is on the Constitution Committee, presented the proposed constitutional changes. These changes are found elsewhere in this volume. The vote on these changes will be at the Wednesday session. This involves Article VI of the constitution and the By Laws III Duties of Officers.
11. Dr. Wyatt Washburn then gave the Historical Report aided by Rev. Paul Sorrells and Rev. Allen Jolley holding papers. This report is found elsewhere in this volume. He pointed out the increases in such items as enrollment, baptisms, Sunday School, Church Training, WMU, Brotherhood, mission support, value of church property and ministers since our association was organized in 1851.
12. Our enrollment was announced by Joe Cabaniss as being 359 for this session. This included 302 messengers, 44 non-messengers and 13 visitors.
13. Mrs. Anne Clark, CSM secretary, gave the CSM report in the absence of Bob Davis due to recent surgery. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
14. Allen Jolley then led the congregation in singing "Victory is Near."
15. Moderator Broadus Heatherly recognized all visitors present. These included Mr. Steve Hoffman of the Baptist Children's Home in Charlotte, who gave a brief report on their activities.
16. Rev. Larry Morris, pastor of Putnam Memorial then gave the Evangelism report. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
17. Vice-moderator J.C. Gossie took charge of the meeting at this point.
18. The Sunday School report was given by Revue Balfow, pastor of Ware Baptist Church. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
19. Bruce Hancock, pastor of Oak Grove Baptist, gave the Church Training report. He stated that Church Training no longer has as a "heavy part-reading" session because

of all the new materials available. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.

20. Racing ahead of schedule, Vice-moderator J.C. Goare ask Paul Sorells of Beebe Dam to share with us some details on his church's extraordinary means of borrowing money from the church members interest free.
21. New staff members and ministers in our association were recognized by Clae Borders, Director of Missions. He gave a warm welcome to: Jesus Bailey-Pastor of Maconkota, Terry Bird-Pastor of New Bethel, Bob Cline-pastor of Pleasant Ridge, Scott Forrest-pastor Churchill Drive, Terry Gold-Ministry of Music and Education for Putnam, Rochell Ingal-pastor of Peach Street, Jesus Johnson-pastor of Temple, Mark King-Minister of Youth of Zion, Mike Landrum-Ministry of Youth Kings Mountain First, Tim Spencer-pastor of Piedmont, Gary Thornton-pastor of Rose Grove, Don Whitner-pastor of Sandy Plains, Kevin Morgan-Ministry of Youth for Zion, Ed Sessom-pastor of Bethlehem, Max Turner-pastor of Norman's Grove and Allan Barlow-Ministry of Youth for Double Springs.
22. Dr. Bobby Gantt, pastor of Groves First, gave the Membership Committee report. This report is found elsewhere in this volume. He also shared with us a project that Groves First had on Life Threatening Illnesses. This project involved patients and the families of patients with incurable diseases.
23. Vice-moderator J.C. Goare then made announcements that included the upcoming Bible Drill Workshop on October 29.
24. Steve Austin, Associate pastor at Westview, presented "Great is Thy Faithfulness" accompanied by Mrs. Jean Maxney on the organ.
25. Before beginning his Moderator's message, Brecken Heathcote recognized our past moderators: C.O. Groome, Alvin Martin, E.B. Hicks, Oscar Funderburke, E.M. Smith, C.A. Kirby, Jr., Roland Louch, Russell Pitts, Marion Adams, Bill McDowell, and Carlos Young. For his message, Rev. Heathcote used Isaiah 41:21-22 as his scripture reference. "What avails these stones?" was the title of his sermon. He stated that God would have us to work together for His glory and support each other while doing this.
26. Rev. Fred Maxney, pastor of our host church Elizabeth, then gave directions and thanks for our evening meal. He also thanked the churches in the Waco group of churches for helping prepare the meal. We then adjourned until 6:45 p.m.

#### Tuesday Night October 29, 1984

27. The Tuesday night session began with an inspirational concert of the Caroline Hanksell Choir of Bethel Church under the direction of Rev. Lawton Nally, Minister of Music at Bethel Baptist Church.
28. Rev. Allen Jolley of First Baptist Church, Kings Mountain, led the congregation in a hymn of praise, "Jesus Is Lord of All" accompanied by Mrs. Jean Maxney.
29. Rev. Terry Bird, pastor of New Bethel Baptist Church, read the scripture from Romans 8:35-39.
30. Rev. Bobby Cline, pastor of Pleasant Ridge Baptist Church led the opening prayer.
31. Director of Missions, Rev. Clae Borders, was recognized for his report. Rev. Borders stated that he was very happy to have had the opportunity to serve you another year. He recognized the associational office staff and expressed his appreciation to them. Mr. Borders stated that the work of the association has been overwhelming at times and each one is needed in the association if we reach the people for Jesus Christ. In closing he stated that our joint ministry is exciting and the Lord wants all of us to be a part of what He is doing. His annual report is found elsewhere in this volume.
32. Rev. Billy Cooper, Chairman of the Associational Finance Committee, and Minister of Education of Shelby First Baptist Church was recognized for presentation of the 1984-85 budget. Copies had been distributed as the messengers arrived. Mr. Cooper

stated that there was an overall five percent increase in the budget. He also explained that the Baptist State Convention has requested that we absorb more of the Christian Social Ministries Director salary. He thanked those involved for holding increases to five percent. He also illustrated by chart that it has been proven when the budget is increased, contributions increase, and when the budget is lowered, contributions decrease. Mr. Cooper made a motion that the budget for 1984-85 be adopted, seconded by Joel Jenkins. The motion carried. The 1984-85 budget is found elsewhere in this volume.

13. Rev. Glenn Walker, pastor of Patterson Springs Baptist Church, and Chairman of the Ordination Committee, gave the Ordination Committee report. That report is found elsewhere in this volume.
14. Mrs. Margaret Wilson of Elizabeth Baptist Church presented the Christian Life Committee report for Rev. Dean Proctor. That report is found elsewhere in this volume.
15. Rev. Allen Jolley led the congregation in singing two stanzas of "How Great Thou Art" accompanied by Mrs. Joan Mauney.
16. The Special Gifts Committee report was given by Joe Cabiness, chairman. He stated that according to the printed report (included in the Treasurer's Report) the Special Gifts Committee had been successful. He also stated that a letter to individuals had been mailed regarding Partners in Paving to help on the paving of the parking lot at the associational building. A challenge gift of one half the cost has already been made. Mr. Cabiness asked if they might be allowed to go ahead with the paving before inclement weather begins. Mr. Fred Smith made the motion that they go ahead with the paving, and Mr. Cecil Lutz seconded the motion and the motion carried.
17. Rev. Royce Ballou gave directions to Waco Baptist Church for the morning session and invited everyone for coffee and doughnuts at 8:00 a.m.
18. Mr. A.L. Hamilton gave a report from the Brotherhood Nominating Committee. There were no nominations from the floor. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
19. Rev. Allen Jolley announced that a group from Gardner-Webb College of the Program for the Deaf, entitled Signa, Inc., would bring us special music. They did interpretations of the music as well as the words.
20. Dr. Joel Jenkins, pastor of First Baptist, Kings Mountain, presented the annual session with scripture taken from 1 Kings 19. Dr. Jenkins compared baptisms in our association for the years 1914, 1949, and 1983. In 1949 with 58 churches in the association 1,075 people were baptized, in 1983 we had 75 churches and total baptisms was 581. Dr. Jenkins stated that we need to take a look that in Cleveland County 40,000 people are unchurched. He challenged each one present to win two people to Christ in the coming year. He stated we need to reach and win people to Jesus Christ, and also that we let the scripture in 1 Kings 19 help us have a spiritual renewal.
41. Rev. Greg Thornton, pastor of Ross Grove Baptist Church gave the benediction.

#### Wednesday Morning October 24, 1984

42. Messengers and visitors gathered in the Waco Baptist Church for the morning session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association Annual Meeting.
43. The session was called to order by Vice-Moderator J.C. Gentry at 8:15 a.m.
44. Rev. Allen Jolley led the congregation in a 15-minute Hymn Sing. We were accompanied by Mrs. W.H. Dodd at the organ.
45. Rev. Allen Jolley led the congregation in singing, "Blessed Assurance."
46. Host pastor, Rev. Royce Ballou, was recognized. He greeted messengers and visitors and thanked them for coming.
47. Tim Spencer, pastor of Piedmont Baptist Church, read scripture from Isaiah 40: 28-31.

48. The opening prayer was led by Rev. Don Whitner pastor of Sandy Plains Baptist Church.
49. Rev. Ed Season was recognized. He asked the association to take a look at increasing the budget for evangelism. He stressed the importance of evangelism throughout our association that we may be able to reach the 40,000 unchurched in Cleveland County.
50. Royce Bales recognized Mr. "Coat" Lutz from the Waco Church who has had perfect attendance in Sunday School for thirty-three years. Also, the moderator recognized Mr. J.V. Roper from the Buffalo Church who has had perfect attendance at the Kings Mountain Baptist Association Annual Meeting for forty-two years.
51. The following organizational reports were made:

52. Rev. Ernest Smith presided over election of officers for the 1984-85 year. He asked for nominations for moderator. Rev. Fred Wells nominated Rev. J.C. Goren. Rev. Goren asked that Rev. Wells withdraw his nomination. Rev. Bruce Hancock nominated Rev. Broader Heatherly. Rev. Woodrow Wall moved that Rev. Heatherly be elected by acclamation. Rev. Smith asked for nominations for vice-moderator. Rev. Russell Pitts nominated Rev. J.C. Goren. Dr. Betty Goren moved that Rev. Goren be elected by acclamation. Rev. Smith asked for nominations for clerk/treasurer. Rev. Marion Adams nominated Mr. Joseph Calhoun. He was elected by acclamation.
53. Rev. Heatherly resumed duties as moderator.
54. Mr. Joe Calhoun was recognized for the attendance report. He reported 199 elected members, 25 non-members, and 12 visitors for a total enrollment of 236. He also reported a total enrollment on Tuesday of 408.
55. Rev. Glenn Walker, pastor of Patterson Springs Baptist Church, presented the Committee on Committees Report. Rev. Walker moved that the report be accepted. There were no nominations from the floor. The motion was seconded by J.V. Roper and carried. The report is found elsewhere in this volume.
56. Rev. Allen Jolley led the congregation in singing, "Why Do I Sing About Jesus."
57. Rev. Heatherly recognized visitors and also recognized Rev. Russell Hixon who is the new pastor at Double Shoals.
58. Mr. Tom Martin from the Constitution Committee presented changes in the Constitution and By-laws for approval. Mr. Martin moved that the changes in Article VI, Section 1 of the Constitution be approved, seconded by Woody Wall. The motion carried. Mr. Martin moved that the changes in Article VI, Section 2, of the Constitution be approved, seconded by Paul Sorrells. Following several statements of opposition, Rev. Glenn Walker called the question which was approved. A vote was taken and the motion was defeated. Mr. Martin moved that changes be implemented as stated in By-laws III and IV. Dr. Wayne Washburn seconded the motion. Mr. Harold Register asked that By-law IV, Section 12, be changed from . . . "under the supervision of the Director of Mission" to . . . "be responsible to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association." The motion died from lack of a second. A vote was taken and the motion carried to make the proposed changes in By-laws III and IV. These changes are found elsewhere in this volume.
59. Rev. Woodrow Wall, retired pastor of Sandy Plains Church, gave the Resolutions Committee Report. He made a move that the report be accepted, seconded by Dr. S.L. Lamm and carried. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
60. Dr. Max Lincum, pastor of Boiling Springs Baptist Church, gave the Memorials Report. He reported that 13 deacons and 218 lay persons of our Baptist churches have

died during the year. He quoted the poem "No Man Is An Island" by John Donne. Dr. Linnens led in a memorial prayer for the deceased.

61. Convention agencies were recognized. Dr. Garland Hendricks was recognized from Gardner-Waltz College.
62. At this time the new officers for 1983-84 were recognized. Clive Borders presented Rev. Broadus Heatherly, moderator; Rev. J.C. Goss, vice-moderator; and Mr. Joe Cabaniss, clerk/treasurer to the messengers and visitors.
63. Rev. Allen Jolley introduced Mrs. Yvel Pempy from the Waco Church who, along with her husband, has assisted faithfully in the Migrant Ministry of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. Mrs. Pempy read scripture from Matthew 4:4 and 5:13 and sang "Sant' Yo First" in Spanish ("Bosca Primero").
64. Rev. Clive Borders introduced our speaker for the evening—Sara Ann Hobbs who serves as Director of Missions for the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. She has served at the convention for twenty-seven years.
65. Miss Hobbs expressed appreciation to the association for their gifts and prayer support. She read scripture from Acts 11 and 13. She discussed the characteristics of the missionary church and asked us to look at the Antioch Church and measure ourselves to them.
66. The 134th session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association was declared adjourned by Moderator Broadus Heatherly.

## DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS ANNUAL REPORT 1983-84

It is difficult for me to believe that another year has passed. But one must recognize the authority of the calendar.

It seems that every year has been a busy year. I have always welcomed a heavy schedule of activity. There are times though when the multitude of the task becomes almost overwhelming.

I need your encouragement, your support, and your participation in this kingdom endeavor. It cannot be done by one person or the staff of our association. It can be done when we become a team complimenting each others efforts. I am being very careful with you when I say I need you, all of you. Your help and your assistance is essential to my personal well being and to the achieving of the goals of our joint ministry.

This past year I have preached thirty-seven sermons, visited in fifty other services. I was in the home or office of thirteen of our ministers. I had seventeen sermons, had four hundred sixty-six personal conferences, four hundred ninety-five telephone conferences, and led training sessions for ten Pastor Search Committees. I participated in twenty-nine associational committee meetings and fifteen state convention meetings. There were twenty-two visits with pastors or members of their families in the hospital. I shared in thirty-five growth groups for ministers and attended eight Pastors' Conferences. I shared in two community meetings, nineteen associational activities and led one retreat.

I want to ask you to join me in looking at the financial circumstances of our pastors and staff members. I am greatly concerned about the financial needs of those who minister among us. In terms of dollars, we have never been paid so well. In terms of purchasing power, we have made very little, if any, progress. Unfortunately, it is still difficult, if not impossible, for the minister to represent his financial needs. Who represents his needs? It is a question worth answering. Who does this in your fellowship? At the table where budgets are proposed and compensation is determined often there is no one to represent the pastor and staff. The association seeks to support this need by providing information, but we do not seek nor are we privileged to sit with and be a part of that process. Let me encourage you to look back into this process and see who accepts the role of representing your ministers financial needs. One of the finest ways to say thank you to a pastor and staff is through adequate and generous compensation.

Our ministers are looking at a fourteen percent social security cost. This is fourteen percent of total compensation including housing. I am confident that every minister gives a ride as a minimum of his income. Most pastors are also faced with a ten to fifteen percent tax bracket. This means that thirty-four to thirty-nine percent of your ministers income is not under his control or available to him to care for his family. If his salary is \$20,000, thirty-nine percent of that is \$7,800. This leaves your minister \$12,200 to care for his family after riding, taxes, and social security.

Most ministers I know are supplementing their retirement benefits out of their own compensation. Let me share with you some of the facts in North Carolina. This information came from the Annuity Board January 31, 1984. Their figures show those receiving \$100 per month or less and those receiving \$100-\$200 per month. These are the retired pastors and staff members of the churches that have served us in North Carolina. Listed in these figures. Those receiving \$100 or less; 481. Those receiving \$100-\$200; 415. Those receiving \$200 or more per month; 125. This is shocking information. Such inadequate preparation for our ministers consigns them to live in retirement with a loss of personal worth and the inability to meet many of their own human needs. Churches should realize that their minister should be covered with an adequate retirement program in the early years of his life and then and only then will he be adequately cared for in those years when he comes to receive those benefits. Our Baptist State Convention is recommending that churches set aside at least ten percent of the ministers compensation for retirement benefits. Even this sum will be meager enough for those who have served us in the Lord's name to provide for themselves and their

families in the period of retirement.

Our joint ministry continues to grow. You will be made conscious of that growth as you follow the proceedings of this annual session. It is designed to report to you. It will take the whole session to get you in touch with what has been done and to catch a glimpse of those things that are about to happen.

I am delighted to report to you that the American Christian Television Service is coming to Cleveland County. We are indebted to Shelby First Baptist Church for making it easy for us to move into this ministry. First Baptist Church will purchase and house all of the initial equipment needed. We hope your church is in the process of joining this ministry. We must receive written notification saying that your fellowship has voted to participate. The cost is \$1.20 per resident church member per year. This money will go to our Radio/Television Commission to help offset the tremendous cost of production and the purchase of space on the airwaves. The greatest reason that you should belong is that it will minister to our area. ACTS is a way of reaching the unchurched. It is a way to get the gospel into the condominiums, apartment complexes, and other places that we do not have access to through a door-to-door visitation. ACTS is now broadcasting twenty-four hours a day and provides the TV audience an option to watch that is on the tube.

For five years we have been serving as host to the classes offered by Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary. Two teachers drive down from Wake Forest each Monday. Students travel from as far south as Marietta, Georgia and as far north as Elkin, North Carolina to attend these classes. Current enrollment is thirty-one in the New Testament class and forty-two in the Congregational Behavior class. Your pastor has an opportunity to update his training, pursue a new degree or begin his theological training right here in our county? This is a part of your joint ministry.

We are rapidly approaching the fulfillment of a long time dream—a new mission in a needed area by the churches of our joint ministry. Number Three Township has a total population of 7,237. Baptist churches in the area have a combined membership of 1,486. One Methodist church in the area has a resident membership of less than 200 as reported by the pastor of that fellowship. This means that there are 5,237 persons living in that township who are not involved in any of the area churches.

We now have an Advisory Committee organized and waited to begin a new work in this township. Dr. Paul Sorrells is chairman of the committee to begin this new work. The committee needs your active support in terms of personnel and money. Opportunities will be presented to you in the months ahead as this work unfolds. Pray for this new mission, plan to give, and determine to share in this new work. Your church has been asked to consider this opportunity and vote to participate by electing three people to serve on the Advisory Committee. Please now to go back to your fellowship and get on board in this exciting adventure.

North Carolina Baptists are sharing also in a vision in West Africa in the land called Togo. Volunteers are asked to go and share their skills. Already forty-two persons from our state have given from one to three weeks of their time. Who is needed? Listen carefully to the list: tractor operators, diesel operators, lime burners, drilling supervisor, drillers, Mission project supervisor, carpenters, masons, masons, cook, assistant cook, preachers, bridge engineers, concrete specialist, iron worker, missionary kids school teacher. Application forms are available through your associational office. Let me urge you to apply and receive more information. You can stop the process any time. Explore this option, you may find a rich opportunity for yourself and God's Kingdom.

There are opportunities here in Cleveland County and there are opportunities in Togo, West Africa. The Father is calling all of us to find our place.

During this annual session, you will have opportunity to consider several constitutional changes. I personally feel that they are all in the best interest of the association. The principle behind these changes is to more clearly define and spread our responsibility. In my judgement, the stronger the base of operation we can achieve the stronger we will be in our joint ministry.

Bob Davis, our CSM director, is recovering from surgery and doing nicely. Bob has completed six years of work with us beginning in 1978. Aaron's year period of the outstanding piece of work he has done. Read his report carefully and rejoice. This past year the volunteers who operated the top store were recognized by a certificate from Governor Jim Hunt of North Carolina. Bob, himself, was given the Citizen Citizen of the Year award by the Shelby chapter. He was cited for "outstanding achievement and unselfish service in the betterment of our community." When you read the record of twenty-three professions of faith and how he has enlisted 1,877 volunteers, you understand why he has been recognized.

Our joint ministry—it is exciting and I want to tell you something—the Lord has not completed His task with us yet. There is much ahead to be accomplished and He wants all of us to be a part of all He is doing.

## CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRIES — ANNUAL REPORT 1983-84

Again this year we have experienced growth in our programs of ministry. I am delighted to be able to share the following report on the activities of ministry to the people of Cleveland County.

1. **Prison Ministry** We have continued to be involved in ministry to the men in our local prison camp in four major programs of ministry. Our Yuletide program has been one of our major efforts. We have met bi weekly in services of worship and fellowship. Twenty-one volunteers have been involved in this ministry by providing home baked goodies for the fellowship period of our services. Volunteers went 134 times to be a part of this ministry. We had two inmates who made professions of faith. A second ministry has been the weekly Bible study. We meet one hour per week in the afternoon. Seminary Education Bible Study began in October and ran for twelve sessions. In April we began classes using Charles Colson's materials, *Prison Paper*. This has proven to be an excellent resource of valuable guides for discussion. We have had faithful attendance by those who are involved. The third arm of ministry is our Christmas gift packets. Last Christmas we provide gift packets for the men in the local prison camp with forty-two churches/individuals responding to this ministry by providing items for 170 gift packets. The Guides provided New Testaments for each packet. As a fourth emphasis, I have continued to serve as a volunteers chaplain at the camp and spend time in one-to-one counsel with inmates. Total volunteers for the year—48.
2. **Juvenile Court Ministry** In November 13 youth and adult sponsors attended the movie, "The Prodigal." This was preceded by a hot dog supper at Central Methodist Church and followed by a discussion of the film. Also, in November our Juvenile Court program was presented in a special mission program at the Baptist State Convention in Greensboro. In December, the Baptist Young Women of Union Baptist Church hosted youth and adult sponsors of the court at a Christmas dinner. Twenty-six persons enjoyed a delicious turkey dinner with all the trimmings. This was followed by a time of Christmas card making, a magic show and a satirical comic char's talk by Elizabeth Walters. Each youth was given a cross bag and a copy of the New Testament. On March 15 we took a

group to visit the high rise facility for youthful offenders in Morganton. This is called "Final Step" program and gives the juvenile an opportunity to see prison life. Twenty-eight of us went to South Mountain Baptist Camp for this two night retreat. In September we sponsored a camp for emotionally disturbed youth who are involved in therapy at the local mental health center. There were ten youth and three volunteers who went. The total number of volunteers involved in this ministry was 35.

3. **Senior Adult Ministry** We teamed and co-sponsored with the Department of Aging, NC Baptist State Convention, a Senior Adult Conference on March 21. There were five associations and eighteen churches represented. Total attendance was 34.
4. **Literacy Ministry** We have had ten volunteers working with 19 adult students this year. These have volunteered 1,000 hours this year. Our next workshop is to be held at the associational office October 26 from 4:00 to 9:00 p.m. and October 27 from 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Pre-registration will be necessary in order to determine the amount of materials we will need.
5. **Domestic Violence** We had a conference in May designed to help the minister and his spouse to know of the problem and how to deal with it. Twenty-six volunteers were in attendance. Our next conference will be October 30 at the associational office and will be for lay people.
6. **Migrant Ministry** Our Belwood Community Center worship and fellowship program began August 19 and continued through September 23. Average migrant attendance was 21. A total of 187 volunteers was involved. Fifteen churches participated in this project.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT TO KMB, 10/25/84

## CHURCH TRAINING REPORT

Church Training continues to provide opportunities for growth in Christian discipleship. Among these opportunities are (1) continuing age-graded groups, (2) Equipping Centers, (3) new church member training, (4) Baptist doctrine study, (5) Master Life, and (6) Disciple Life: Training Youth in Discipleship. Churches throughout our association are using one or more of these approaches to training in an effective manner. Enrollment in Church Training increased by 1.2% during the past year. Equipping Center Modules continue to be a popular resource for short-term training or as an alternative to dated periodicals. The variety of materials which are available enable a church to design a Church Training program which will meet the needs of its people. I encourage our churches to utilize these resources and to continue their good work in Church Training.

Associational events during the past year were as follows:

- (1) Two of our Associational Church Training leaders attended the Enabler's Conference at Fruitland.
- (2) Master Life training was offered at the associational office for the second time under the leadership of Rev. Billy Cooper.
- (3) A Bible Drill Worker's Workshop was held with a total of 19 people in attendance.
- (4) Six churches participated in the Associational Bible Drill. There were 27 children and 1 youth. Twenty-five children and one youth were State Bible Drill winners.
- (5) We had one participant in the Youth Speaker's Tournament who represented our association at the regional tournament.

Exciting things are happening in Church Training. Resources are available to help you have an equipping, growing, and "building up" ministry in your church. May God enable you to make this a reality.

**CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS CHANGES PROPOSED  
BY THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE  
(Effective 1985)**

**CONSTITUTION**

**ARTICLE VI OFFICES AND THEIR ELECTION**

**Present Reading** Section 1: The officers of the Association shall be the Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Music Director, Organist, Sunday School Director, Chairman of the Library Council, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Parliamentarian, and Audiovisual Coordinator.

**Proposed Change** Section 1: The officers of the association shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Chairman of the Library Council, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Parliamentarian, and Audiovisual Coordinator.

**Present Reading** Section 2: The Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer shall be elected out by majority of the last day of the annual meeting. All other officers shall be contacted and nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Associational Executive Board at their April meeting.

**Proposed Change** Section 2: The Nominating Committee shall present recommendations for the offices of Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk-Treasurer to the Association for election at the evening session of the first day of the annual meeting. Other nominees may be recommended from the floor. All other officers shall be contacted and nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Associational Executive Board at their April meeting.

**BY-LAWS**

**BY-LAWS III DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

**Present Reading** Section 12: The Baptist Youth for Christ Director shall, under the supervision of the Director of Missions, guide and promote the youth activities of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. Such activities may include:

1. Youth Council sessions
2. Bi-monthly sessions of Youth for Christ in local churches.
3. A Kairoi Crusade for Christ every 3 to 5 years.
4. Mission Vacation Bible School and/or Backyard VBS.
5. Sponsorship of a booth at Cleveland County Fair each October.
6. Any other activity which the Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Youth Council, Director of Missions, and Executive Committee deems necessary to foster a positive Christian witness for Christ.

**Proposed Change** Section 12: The Baptist Youth for Christ Director shall, under the supervision of the Director of Missions, serve as chairman of Youth for Christ Committee of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

**BY-LAW IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES**

**Present Reading** Section 1: THE ORDER OF BUSINESS AND PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Clerk, and the Associational Music Director. It shall rotate the place of meeting among the groups of churches with the host church being determined by the group. It shall recommend the preacher and the alternate for the annual sessions. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting for the association, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least

thirty days before the Annual Meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the Annual Meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary. This committee will be responsible for promoting the Annual Meeting through the various news media.

**Proposed Change Section 1: THE ORDER OF BUSINESS AND PROGRAM COMMITTEE.** This shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Associational Music Director, and three other members. It shall rotate the place of meeting among the groups of churches with the home church being determined by the group. It shall recommend the preacher and the alternate for the annual sermon. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting for the Association, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the Annual Meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the Annual Meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary. This committee will be responsible for promoting the Annual Meeting through the various news media.

**Present Reading Section 8: The Nominating Committee,** composed of six members, shall contact before and nominate at the April Executive Board meeting, the officers of the Association according to Article VI and VIII of the Constitution. This Committee shall also, in cooperation with the Nominating Committee of various departments (except the WMU and Brotherhood organizations), recommend workers for these various departments. The officers and workers of these respective organizations shall be nominated by the organization themselves and submitted to the Nominating Committee (Article VI, Section 1). It shall also nominate associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. This Committee shall also assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

**Proposed Change Section 8: The Nominating Committee,** composed of six members, shall contact and nominate the officers of the Association according to Article VI of the Constitution. This Committee shall submit the proposed nominees for Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk-Treasurer for inclusion in the September issue of the Associational Newsletter. This Committee shall also, in cooperation with the Nominating Committee of various departments (except the WMU and a Brotherhood organization), recommend workers for these various departments. The officers and workers of these respective organizations shall be nominated by the organization themselves and submitted to the Nominating Committee (Article VI, Section 1). They shall also nominate Associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. The Committee shall also assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

#### CHANGE SECTION 22 TO SECTION 26, AND ADD NEW SECTION 22-25

**Section 22: Youth for Christ Committee,** composed of a director and six members, shall be responsible for promoting and coordinating the following activities:

1. Youth Council Sessions.
2. Quarterly sessions of Youth for Christ in local churches.
3. A Kalene Crusade for Christ every 3 to 5 years.
4. Mission Vacation Bible School and/or Backyard VBS.
5. Serve as a support group to the Associational Summer Youth Worker.
6. Any other activity which the Director of Ministries and/or Executive Committee deems necessary to foster a positive Christian witness for Christ.

Section 13: Memorial Committee, composed of three members, will be responsible for:

1. Recognize deceased ministers, staff, deacons, members in an appropriate way.
2. Submit report for inclusion in Associational Minutes.
3. Represent Association to those who are bereaved.

#### Section 14: PASTORAL MINISTRIES COMMITTEE

The Pastoral Ministries Committee shall be composed of six ministers and/or staff persons in the Association with two rotating off each year.

It shall be the duty of this committee to work with the Director of Missions in planning and promoting continuing educational opportunities for ministers and staff persons in the Association.

#### Section 15: CHURCH SURVEY AND EXTENSION COMMITTEE

The Church Survey and Extension Committee shall be composed of six members and shall encourage the Association to respond to the need for new churches and the development of young congregations. It shall be the responsibility of this committee to keep abreast of the growth and development of the townships within the Association and encourage the appropriate responses.

#### REASONS FOR MAKING CHANGE TO ARTICLE VI (Officers and their election)

1. Give the Association a better distribution of leadership.
2. Give laymen a better opportunity to be considered.
3. Will provide an opportunity to confer with those who might be nominated.
4. Will enable the committee on nominations to evaluate potential nominees.
5. The present Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk/Treasurer support this idea.
6. Our Director of Missions has continually been working toward this proposal.
7. Most N.C. Baptist Associations elect their officers by use of a committee. A survey was taken at the Key Leadership Conference held at Ridgecrest in May 1984 to substantiate this theory.

RESULTS: 63 Associations were represented.

31 stated that they used committees to select their officers.

## ORDINATION COMMITTEE REPORT

The committee this past year was composed of the following members: Rev. L.A. Howard, Rev. Marion Adams, Rev. Dave Gordon, and Rev. Glena Walker, Chairman. Rev. Sam Murphy served with us a short time but moved from our association.

This past year we met one time for the purpose of organization and four times at the request of churches for the purpose of examining candidates for ordination.

The committee met on October 29, 1983 at the request of Faith Baptist Church, Kings Mountain, to examine Mr. Stephen Parker. After a period of questioning, Mr. Parker was recommended for ordination. Mr. Parker was called as pastor of Walker's Chapel Baptist Church.

On August 4, 1984 the committee met at the request of Dover Baptist Church to examine Mr. Robert Dockery. Mr. Dockery was examined and did well with the questioning but was not recommended for ordination at this time because he had not been called to a church. The reason for this procedure was because Mr. Dockery was going to Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas and was looking toward being called to a church there. At such time Dover Church could proceed with the ordination. However, if there is too much time elapsed the committee felt that another examination should be held.

The committee met on October 26, 1984 at 1 P.M. at the request of First Baptist Kings Mountain to examine Mr. Mike Landrum. After a period of questioning Mr. Landrum was recommended for ordination. Mr. Landrum was called as associate pastor of First Baptist Kings Mountain. The committee met on October 20, 1984 at 2:30 P.M. at the request of Nashville Baptist Church to examine Mr. Mark Turner, Jr. After a period of questioning Mr. Turner was recommended for ordination. Mr. Turner was called as pastor of Norman's Grove Baptist Church.

In June of this year, it was called to our attention that Food Lion, Lowe's Food and its convenience stores had petitioned the city of Shelby to be annexed to the city by sanitary annexation. The reason the stores wanted to be included in the city was this would enable them to sell beer and wine. The Christian Life Committee met in the office of Mr. J.A. West to discuss what we could and should do about this. A decision on the petition was to be made by City Council at their next meeting. So it was decided that we should go to the Council meeting and Mr. West would be our spokesman to voice our opposition to the city making it possible for these stores to sell beer and wine. We, along with several other concerned citizens, went to the council meeting. Some who could not attend had called the council members before the meeting and others had sent a petition—all in opposition to the annexation. Maybe we had a small part in helping the council members decide to vote against annexation.

Also at our meeting in Mr. West's office, we discussed pornography and the fact that so many nude magazines are displayed in the mall, newsstands, and convenience stores where small children and young people are exposed to them. Mr. West advised us that until the Supreme Court changes its stand on the issue of pornography, that we would not have a chance at winning a case against the people that choose to sell this material. Right now we are just keeping a watchful eye and hoping that soon there will be some changes in the Supreme Court. When there is — maybe the petitioners will swing back toward common decency and we can do something.

In order for the Christian Life Committee to accomplish much, we need the help of all of you. If you hear of or read of anything that you think needs to be checked into, please give one of the committee members a call. If you can't remember who we are, just call the associational office. They will refer it to the proper person. We will never know if we can help a situation or not until we try.

So, if we will all work together, maybe we can make this a better Christian community in which to live.

## HISTORIAN REPORT

Kings Mountain Association in 1851 had 13 original churches in Cleveland County and Rutherford County and upper South Carolina. We are now 131 years old and have approximately 50,000 members in 73 churches.

The first year after the association was organized there were 128 baptisms. Now there are approximately 600 baptisms per year.

If there were any Sunday Schools (then called Sabbath Schools) the minutes do not tell of them. The Sunday School era began about 20 years later. There are now about 17,000 members.

The Women's Missionary Union was begun in 1866 with possibly 25 members. Two churches, New Bethel and Shelby First, appear to have organized about the same time, though Shelby made the first report to the NC Baptist Convention. WMU now has some 1,000 members.

Training Union, or the old Baptist Young People Union (BYPU) appears in the minutes of 1894 with Professor G. P. Hamrick of Boiling Springs as Associational leader. It now has 4,000 members.

Brotherhood appeared first at Zion in 1946, and now has about 1,000 members.

Property values were not listed in early years, but a fair estimate is \$6,500 for 13 churches. Some of the members were still meeting under branch arbors. Total property value now is a whopping \$26,000,000.

There were only nine full-time ministers in the association in 1851 and they supplemented their income by farming or merchandising. There are now approximately 120 ministers in the association as active pastors, teachers or retirees.

Salaries in those early days ranged from no pay at all to \$1,000 per year and pay was sometimes supplemented by "presentings" of fruits, vegetables, meats, and home supplies and other gifts of love. Larger churches now have multiple presented salaries to pay for music, education, maintenance, etc. . . . not just for the pastor. The spread is now from \$1,000 to \$135,000 per year.

Gifts for all causes per year per member increased from about \$4.80 to \$240 per year.

Total gifts for 1851 were less than \$7,000 and now all gifts exceed \$7,000,000 per year. This information represents the extremes of THEN and NOW. We have grown most, at least in numbers. Anniversaries are important events for our churches. This year Patterson Grove reached the century mark and Union will be 100 next year. First Hill celebrated her diamond or 75th anniversary this year and Newman Grove will be 75 in '85.

Calvary will enter the Golden Age of 50 years in 1985, and to celebrate is planning a new church in a new location.

Double Springs is 140 years old, and its neighbor Beaver Dam will be 135 next year. Sandy Plains and New Prospect are 130. New Hope is a mature 116. Casar and Patterson Synops are 90 years old. Kings Mountain Second and Pleasant Ridge will reach their "three score and ten" majority at 70 years in 1985. Polkville will soon be 65. Love Valley is 40 now and will share its two score candle with Community and Temple who will be 40 next year. Waverly is coming up on 35 in 1985 and Peach Street will be 30. Emmanuel and Northside are young as churches go at a 20 and 18 years old, respectively. The other thousands (speaking with us!) is looking at ten years. Pleasant Hill always knows its age as it was constituted in 1851, the same year as the association.

Christian Freedom is the 14th church to be in the association family and is walking, talking and nodding well at the age of 7. Zion is the oldest at a venerable 169 years old. It began 20 years before there was a county of Cleveland and 15 years before there was a Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

Our committee salutes both young and old. Of such does History continue to be made.
