By action of the Executive Committee, the 1985 Missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association are dedicated to the memory of Mr. W.H. Dodd. He had an intense interest in the ministry of the association and served effectively and joyfully on the Special Gifts Committee.

IN MEMORIAM

For 19 years, Walter Henry Dodd, Jr., served the Lord as a faithful member of Waco Baptist Church. When the Lord called him to his heavenly home on Wednesday, August 17, 1985, Mr. Dodd was serving his church as a deacon, member, Adult Men's Sunday School teacher, Director of the Adult Training Union, and as a member of various committees. His pastors remember him as the greatest friend, advisor and supporter a pastor could have.

His love for his Savior, his church, and his pastors came natural for W.H. Dodd, for he was the son of a Baptist preacher, the late Rev. Walter H. Dodd and Jessie Elizabeth Mallonee Dodd. A native of Savannah, Georgia, he attended Wingate College and graduated from Wake Forest University in 1935. On June 28, 1934 he and Ruth Sinclair were united in marriage. They have one daughter, Anne Phoebe of Boone.

W.H. Dodd came to Cleveland County in 1935 to teach at the Piedmont School in Lenoirville. He then became principal at Caesar and in 1945, he became principal at Waco. He remained at Waco until he retired in 1972. His love for children continually showed itself in such activities as his coaching many championship girls baseball teams, his delight in taking unions to Washington, D.C., and his gift of recreational facilities to Waco Baptist Church.

Mr. Dodd was always interested in his community. He was a charter member of the Waco Barman Club and President of the Caperman Cemetery Association. He was also director of the Waco Community Volunteer Fire Department.

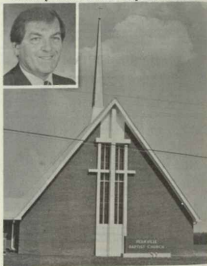

History of Polkville Baptist Church



Polkville Baptist Church was organized July 28, 1943. A Proclivity met at the Polkville High School for the purpose of establishing a Baptist Church in Polkville. As a result of work accomplished by Rev. D.F. Parram, Rev. H.E. Waddrop, N.L. Whisman, and Fred Mena, plans were made to organize what is now Polkville Baptist Church.

Rev. J.W. Sartin, moderator of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association, was elected as moderator, and Wynn Waddburn of Double Springs was elected as secretary.

The Rev. D.F. Parram was recognized and spoke briefly on the status of work at Polkville. Residents of the community and the executive committee had asked him to study the feasibility of a church at Polkville. He stated that with the help of Rev. Lawrence Roberts, and N.L. Whisman a survey made in May had resulted in the establishment of a Sunday

School at Polkville totaling 75 members.

The Presbytery approved the petition asking for the privilege of organizing a new church. The covenant document and 18 articles of faith were accepted unanimously by the church.

The following officers were elected:

Rev. D.F. Pizzum Pastor
Burren Whitman Sunday School Superintendence
Mrs. Pine Withers Music Director

August 13, 1940, was set as the deadline for charter members. A revival was conducted the following week.

The newly organized church continued to hold worship services at Polkville High School for about 15 months. On October 4, 1940, a tract of land was purchased from Mr. & Mrs. Fred Blanton for the purpose of erecting a church building. Construction started immediately, and the congregation moved into the new building late in 1941. Services were first held in the main auditorium of the church on the third Sunday of August, 1942. Minor construction continued for several years. The W.M.U. ladies, desiring to see carpet placed in the sanctuary, planted a ten acre cotton patch and donated the profits to the church for carpet.

The original building was dedicated in 1950, under the leadership of Rev. W.P. Eggerstaff.

As the church continued to grow, led by Rev. W.V. Telford, Rev. Frank Lammert, and Rev. Paul C. Ross, a new educational building was erected in 1960 to house an increasing Sunday School. Property purchased over the years now totals approximately 13 acres. A parsonage erected in 1963 continues to meet the needs of an ever growing ministry.

The original building was demolished in 1976, shortly after dedication of a new sanctuary on February 1, 1976. As in 1950, Rev. W.P. Eggerstaff was the principal speaker, joined by Rev. Kenneth Lambers, Carlos Young, and the pastor, Alton Martin.

Memorial Day, 1982, also marks a Gold Star, because on that day Polkville Baptist Church used its new Family Life Center for the first time. Shortly thereafter, a Tennis Court was given in memory of Mrs. Helen Bradley by Mr. Nl Bradley and was dedicated September 4, 1983.

At present the total membership of Polkville Baptist Church is 456, with an average Sunday School attendance of 215.

History of Union Baptist Church

Union Church, 6254 Polkville Road is conducting a year long celebration of its centennial anniversary. On Tuesday, September 22, 1885, a presbytery of representatives from Zion, Boiling Springs, Double Springs, Sandy Plains and Fair View organized Union Baptist Church with 4 male and 16 female charter members. The site of the meeting was in old Union School House near Union Springs which is 1/4 mile east of present church.

The Sunday, September 22, 1885 centennial celebration service was a re-enactment of the organization of the church. Copies of the original 1885 church records were distributed.

Union joined Kings Mountain Association September 24, 1885. Some other milestones were organization of Sunday School 1896, BYPM and WMU 1927's, Neighborhood 1955, Vacation Bible School 1948, Mission Vacation Bible School on Cherokee Reservation in 1962 and Bible Drill 1965. During the 100 years, 73 men have served as pastors and 30 of them are current members at Union.

There have been three church buildings. In 1885, Marcus Moseley gave two acres of land on which a one-room church was built. While D.O. Washburn was pastor, a second church was built in 1913 with an addition in 1922. The present building was completed in 1943 during pastorate of Amos M. Kiser. The educational plant was enlarged in 1960 while Kenneth Walters was pastor. The renovated sanctuary was dedicated in 1965. The church has a parsonage and fellowship hall.

Elder W. Newton Hawkins was Union's first pastor and served 1885-91. Other Pastors and the order in which they served are: T.J. Moss, J.M. Bridges, Tom Dixon, Abram P. Hollifield, C.M. Webb, J.M. Bridges, J.V. DeVosney, T.J. Moss, D. Gordon Washburn, Amos M. Kiser, Clifford C. Cross, Grover C. Teague, Forrest Teague, Bryan Parnam, Max Burges, Bill L. Ford, Ronald Martin, Kenneth Walters and R. Kenneth Cobb. Reverend Cobb came to Union December 16, 1966.

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this body shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

Under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, this association of churches seeks to further the Kingdom through the following:

- (1) the fostering of fellowship and cooperation among the member churches;
- (2) the ministering the spiritual and physical needs of people;
- (3) the giving and receiving of information, assistance and training for member churches;
- (4) the cooperation with North Carolina Baptist State and Southern Baptist Conventions.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Membership Committee. Application should include:

1. Formal action by the group seeking admission reflecting that 75% of those voting express their intent to cooperate.
2. A written statement reflecting their beliefs and practices.
3. A written statement that expresses their intent to cooperate.
4. A willingness to meet with Membership Committee to discuss other items of mutual interest to both parties.

The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist belief and practice and what it means to cooperate with the churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. If recommended by this committee and accepted by the Association, a mission or a church shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a minimum of one year. Membership within the Association shall be determined by vote of the Association at its general meeting. Churches under the watchcare shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its constitution and by-laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and if requested, the Associational Executive Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like association.

ARTICLE IV MEETINGS

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Tuesday and Wednesday after the first Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or Executive Board, provided two weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 3: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each fifty members of the church, provided each church shall not have less than three nor more than ten messengers. Along with all associational officers, these shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those in attendance and registering at the Associational Meeting.

ARTICLE V AUTHORITY

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this Constitution in Article III, Section 2 and 3.

ARTICLE VI OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTIONS

Section 1: The officers of the association shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Chairman of the Library Council, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Parliamentarian, and Audiovisual Coordinator.

Section 2: The Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer shall be elected on the morning of the last day of the annual meeting. All other officers shall be contacted and nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Associational Executive Board at their April meeting.

Section 3: The newly elected Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer shall assume at the close of the annual session all duties incumbent upon them relating to work of the ensuing associational year. All other officers shall assume all duties incumbent upon them relating to the work of the ensuing year on October 1.

Section 4: Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for reelection for two years.

ARTICLE VII TRUSTEES AND THEIR ELECTION

There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving term of three years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

ARTICLE VIII THE ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Associational Executive Board shall be composed of all Associational officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Associational Director of Missions, the Christian Social Minister Director (in-office without voting privileges), each active pastor, two members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The Associational Executive Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the Constitution. Associational Executive Board members are the connecting link between the Association and the churches. Executive Board members should represent the churches to the Association. Executive Board members should act as representatives for the Association to the churches. It is the responsibility of the Executive Board members to promote the programs, represent the needs and report to the churches concerning the work and ministry of the Association. Executive Board members should seek acceptable means of representing the Association in their respective fellowships. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association in its Annual Meeting.

The quarterly meeting will be in January, April and July, on Monday after the third Sunday.

ARTICLE IX COMMITTEES

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their term of office being from the close of the annual meeting through the following annual meeting.

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the Annual Meeting:

1. Order of Business and Program Committee (By-Law IV, Section 1)
2. Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
3. Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
4. Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)

5. Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 5)
6. Nominating Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
7. Constitution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
8. Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
9. Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
10. Resolutions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
11. Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
12. Seminary Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
13. Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
14. Christian Ministry Development Committee (By-Law IV, Section 17)
15. Church Reconciliation Committee (By-Law IV, Section 18)
16. Mission Committee (By-Law IV, Section 19)
17. Recreation and Drama Committee (By-Law IV, Section 20)
18. Strategy Planning Committee
19. Any other committee authorized by the Association.

B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting: Committee on Constitutions. (By-Law IV, Section 14)

Section 2: The following committees shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting to serve during the Annual Meeting: Enrollment Committee (By-Law IV, Section 16).

ARTICLE X. AMENDMENTS

Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any Annual Session of the Association upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association on the first day and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association on the last day. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

BY-LAWS

By-Law I. PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

By-Law II. ASSOCIATION YEAR

The Association Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

By-Law III. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the running of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committees or Commissions and Committee on Enrollments. He shall be the Chairman of the Associational Executive Board and be an *ex-officio* (without voting privileges) member of all other committees. Upon completion of his term of office, the Moderator shall become a member-at-large (for two years) of the Mission Committee, Executive and the Executive Board.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be the Vice-Chairman of the Executive Board.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's Annual Meeting, distribute at the Annual Meeting copies of the digest of these reports, make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of Minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of Minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the Executive Board. He shall inform all members elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action. He shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; deliver the same upon instructions from the Association, its Executive Board, or as designated in the budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance

Committee to the Executive Board or the Association in annual sessions; render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the Annual Meeting and give a report at each quarterly Executive Board meeting and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Associational Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.

Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and make a written report to each Annual Meeting of the Association.

Section 6: The Sunday School Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Sunday School Department. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this committee that would promote this work.

The Associational Sunday School should assist church leaders to be more effective in their responsibility. This should include:

1. Provide opportunities for fellowship and inspiration.
2. Interpret the Sunday School Program.
3. Train Sunday School leaders.
4. Consult with Sunday School leaders concerning their program.
5. Provide organization and leadership for cooperative work among the churches.

Section 7: The Church Training Department shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Church Training Department. This officer shall attend Executive Committee meetings, maintain the on-going work of this department at all times, and give an annual report to the Association.

Section 8: The Music Director shall provide leadership for the Association in session and when requested at other times during the year. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this Committee that would promote the work. He shall encourage music growth in the churches throughout the year and shall make a written report to the Annual meeting.

Section 9: The Brotherhood Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of men and boys in the churches. The officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to promote the development of men and boys and an awareness of world mission needs.

Section 10: The Woman's Missionary Union Director serves on the Executive Committee of the Association and works with the Director of Missions; leads the WMU Council; confers with our associational WMU officers and assists them in their work; leads in providing opportunities for leaders and members of their church WMU's to have fellowship and receive inspiration concerning their mutual mission task; leads in interpreting the WMU program to church leaders; leads in training church WMU workers and members; consults with church leaders concerning initiation of WMU work and the improvement of existing work; provides at and plans for associational meeting; leads in associational WMU annual planning; leads in discovering mission action needs and in coordinating the work being done; and reports progress of WMU work to the Association and serves as contact between the Association and state WMU.

Section 11: The Chairman of the Library Council shall promote the beginning and maintenance of church libraries in the churches; provide training opportunities for church librarians; maintain and develop the associational library; attend the Executive Committee meetings; cooperate with the Director of Missions and make an annual report to the Association at its annual session.

Section 12: The Baptist Youth for Christ Director shall, under the supervision of the Director of Missions, serve as chairman of Youth for Christ Committee of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

Section 13: The Parliamentarian shall, at the Annual Meeting of the Association, rule on all questions of parliamentary procedure which shall arise during the sessions. The Parliamentarian shall serve as a resource person to the churches and shall, upon request, advise and assist the churches on matters of parliamentary procedure.

Section 14: The Anthropolical Coordinator shall assist all associational leadership in the

selection, production and use of audiovisual material. Upon request, he shall provide similar assistance to individual church leaders. He shall provide opportunities for training in the production and use of audiovisuals in education, motivation and worship. The Audiovisual Coordinator shall work with the librarian in storing, cataloging and protecting the use of audiovisual materials equipment. Maintenance of audiovisual equipment is the responsibility of the Audiovisual Coordinator.

Section 1.5: Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Executive Board, except the office of Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1: THE ORDER OF BUSINESS AND PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Associational Music Director, and three other members. It shall rotate the place of meeting among the groups of churches with the host church being determined by the group. It shall recommend the preacher and the alternate for the annual session. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting for the Association, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the Annual Meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the Annual Meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary. This committee will be responsible for promoting the Annual Meeting through the various news media.

Section 2: The Executive Committee

1. Shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk/Treasurer, Music Director, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMU Director, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Chairpersons of the Christian Ministry Development Committee, President of the Pastors' Conference, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, President of the Committee on Committees, Chairman of Christian Life Committee, Chairman of Membership Committee, Chairman of Pastor's Committee, Chairman of Evangelism, Chairman of Long Range Planning Committee, and Audiovisual Coordinator.

2. When without a Director of Missions, this committee shall seek out and recommend to the Association, or its Executive Board, for election of a new Director of Missions according to By-Law VI, Section 11.

3. It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or Executive Board and act on routine or emergency matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven is necessary to transact business.

Section 3: The Evangelism Committee, composed of six members, shall promote the work of evangelism in the churches and the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its Executive Board.

Section 4: The Finance Committee, composed of six members, two rotating annually, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs of an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

The Finance Committee may make adjustments during the year (not to exceed \$1,000 in line items of the budget) providing the adjustments:

1. --will not increase the total for a session.
2. --will not alter the basic purpose or intent of the budget.
3. --will have full consent of those affected (individuals, department leaders, etc.)

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the Association, upon request, with the stewardship programs offered by the Convention.

The Committee shall express gratitude to the churches for their stewardship development that enables them to participate in local, home, and foreign missions.

A contingency fund is to be established and maintained in ^{US} approximate amount of one calendar quarter of the Association's operating budget. This contingency fund is to be deposited in an interest bearing account.

The funds to be disbursed should a shortfall of general funds receipts occur, resulting in a lack of funds for regular operating expense.

Any disbursement of funds from the contingency fund must be upon a recommendation of the Finance Committee and approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 5: The Ordination Committee, composed of five members, with the pastor of the home church (the church of which the candidate is a member), the Director of Missions, and members of the home and receiving churches, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

The Committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of the Minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conference at which the home voted to request examination of the candidate.

The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.

The Chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place, and procedure.

The Committee suggest that the candidate be questioned at least two weeks prior to his ordination.

The Committee shall question the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, and his personal life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.

The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the ministry.

In every instance, the Committee shall be guided by the Scriptures, especially 1 Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-9.

The Committee shall give written notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the ordination.

The Chairman shall report the Committee's activities to the Executive Board quarterly and provide a written report for the Annual Meeting.

Section 6: The Nominating Committee, composed of six members, shall contact and nominate the officers of the Association according to Article VI of the Constitution. This Committee shall also, in cooperation with the Nominating Committee of various departments (except the WMU and Brotherhood organizations), recommend workers for these various departments. The officers and workers of these respective organizations shall be nominated by the organization themselves and submitted to the Nominating Committee (Article VI, Section 1). They shall also nominate Associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Conventions. The Committee shall also advise the Executive Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

Section 7: The Constitution Committee, composed of three members, shall be available to study changes or revisions to the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed.

Section 8: The Membership Committee, composed of five members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws. The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist faith and practice and what it means to cooperate with other churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. The Membership Committee shall annually review all churches and churches under the watchcare of the Association and may present them for membership within the Association or that they continue under the watchcare.

Section 9: The Calendar Committee shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMU Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director and Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an Associational Calendar for the coming year and present same to the Executive Board for adoption.

Section 10: The Resolutions Committee composed of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation, plans and promote the work of the Committee in an annual planning meeting; and present resolutions of appreciation to individuals, organizations, and churches when there are events worthy of commendation.

Section 11: The Historical Committee shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and six other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Association Meeting.

Section 12: The Seminary Extension Committee, composed of three members, shall publicize study courses and programs that are available; and shall plan, provide and promote Seminary Extension studies as they may be desired.

Section 13: The Christian Life Committee, composed of six members, will give continual attention to the moral climate of the community and shall initiate necessary action to maintain and improve the climate. The committee shall convert these petitions and inquiries that uphold Christian virtue, and shall support the churches in the teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness.

Section 14: The Committee on Committees, composed of five members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX, Section 1), and shall assist the Executive Board in filing vacancies on all standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the Chairmen of each committee.

Section 15: The Telephone Contact Committee shall be composed of one person from each group of churches in the Association (8). These committee members shall relay messages to pastors and key leaders during the year. All messages to be sent should be cleared with the Director of Missions.

Section 16: The Evangelism Committee shall prepare for and direct the evangelism of the members. A total effortment shall be made for each day.

Section 17: The Christian Ministry Development Committee.

A. Purpose—The purpose of the Christian Ministry Development Committee shall be to work with the CSM Director to lead the association to address the priority ministry needs in Cleveland County, and to plan and coordinate programs of ministry to share Christ's love in meeting the spiritual, educational, emotional and physical needs.

B. Organization—The Christian Ministry Development Committee shall be composed of the chairpersons of the component sub-committees. Resource personnel will be the W.M.U. Director and/or the Mission Action Director of the W.M.U., Brotherhood Director and/or the Baptist Men's Director. The CSM Director will serve as chairman of the committee. Emergency Ministry needs not addressed in the constitution will be met at the discretion of the CSM Director after consultation with the Director of Missions.

C. Sub-Committees:

1. Prison Ministries—The Prison Ministries shall be composed of (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries in our local prison camp.

2. Jail Ministries—The Jail Ministries shall be composed of (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries in our local jail.

3. Migrant Ministries—The Migrant Ministries shall be composed of (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries among the migrant farm workers.

4. Juvenile Court Ministries—The Juvenile Court Ministries shall be composed of (3) members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries to the Juvenile Court personnel and clientele.

5. Literacy Ministries—The Literacy Ministries shall be composed of (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate activities to the slow readers, non-readers and non-English speaking persons in developing and improving reading skills.

6. Emergency and Relief Ministries—The Emergency and Relief Ministries shall be

composed of six members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the economically disadvantaged persons of Cleveland County.

7. **Developmental Disability Ministries**—The Developmental Disability Ministries shall be composed of (3) members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the Developmental Disabled persons of Cleveland County and to their families.

8. **Visually Handicapped Ministries**—The Visually Handicapped Ministries shall be composed of (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the Visually Handicapped persons of Cleveland County and to their families.

9. **Christmas Toy Store**—The Christmas Toy Store Ministry shall be composed of (6) six members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministry to persons of needy children during the Christmas season.

10. **Substance Abuse Ministry**—The Substance Abuse Ministry shall be composed of (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to address the needs of those afflicted with substance abuse problems and their families.

The personnel of the sub-committees shall provide assistance to churches through their missionary education organizations in the development of ministries to those included in the job description written above, and to encourage participation by the churches in ministries conducted on the associational level.

D. **Meeting**—The personnel of the sub-committees will meet as needed to develop the programs of ministry. The Christian Ministry Development Committee shall meet annually for their planning and training.

Section 18: **The Church Reconciliation Committee** shall be composed of the present Moderator as chairman, two immediate past Moderators and two lay persons to be appointed annually by the above stated members. The chairman will report to the Executive Committee or the Executive Board the names of those lay persons appointed. This committee will be open to any person or persons of a member church seeking assistance with problems related to their church.

Section 19: **The Missions Committee** shall be made up of the following members: Chairman (Vice-Moderator), the Director of Missions, Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Finance Committee Chairman, Chairperson of Christian Ministry Development Committee, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WML Director, President of the Pastors' Conference, and Audiovisual Coordinator.

This Committee is to be available as a sounding board, to support the Director of Missions as a person (as well as an officer in the Association), provide feedback concerning Associational programs and activities, conveying suggestions from the Association and offering support in projecting programs to the Executive Committee and/or Executive Board. The Missions Committee shall seek to determine areas of need within and without the Association and formulate recommendations to the Associational Executive Committee.

The Committee shall enthusiastically explore all mission possibilities throughout the Association, emphasizing the need for new teaching units, preaching points, missions, and churches and it shall actively seek out potential sponsoring churches for the beginning of specific mission endeavors. Providing energetic outreach leadership for the Association shall be the Committee's highest priority.

Section 20: **The Recreation and Drama Committee** shall promote a program of Christian recreation and drama in the churches. The Committee shall regard recreation and drama as a means, not an end. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall use their programs as a way to teach, a means of witnessing and an avenue of expressing the abundant Christian life. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall be responsible to give assistance to any church that should request help in the area of recreation and drama. The Committee's responsibilities shall include fellowships, Senior Adults, retreats, crafts, drama workshops and other assignments of the Association, if asked. The Chairman of the Recreation and Drama Committee shall plan with the Director of Missions and give a report of the commit-

ver's activities at the Executive Board quarterly meetings.

Section 21: The Strategy Planning Committee, composed of five members, shall seek to understand the 'Priority Statements' of the Association; provide support and suggestions to the appropriate committees for implementation; and recognize personally and publicly the committees that address themselves to, and make significant accomplishments in achieving the 'Priority Statements.' At a time it judges appropriate, the Committee will also report to the Association the need for further strategy planning.

Section 22: Youth for Christ Committee, composed of a director and six members, shall be responsible for promoting and coordinating the following activities:

1. Youth Council Sessions.
2. Quarterly sessions of Youth for Christ in local churches.
3. A Rallys Crusade for Christ every 1 to 2 years.
4. Mission Vacation Bible School and/or Backyard VBS.
5. Serve as a support group to the Associational Summer Youth Worker.
6. Any other activity which the Director of Missions and/or Executive Committee deems necessary to foster a positive Christian witness for Christ.

Section 23: Memorials Committee, composed of three members, will be responsible for:

1. Recognizing deceased ministers, staff, deacons, and members in an appropriate way.
2. Submitting reports for inclusion in Associational Minutes.
3. Ministering to the families of associational officers, ministers and staff members when death occurs.

Section 24: Pastoral Ministries Committee

The Pastoral Ministries Committee shall be composed of six ministers and/or staff persons in the Association with two rotating off each year.

It shall be the duty of this committee to work with the Director of Missions in planning and promoting continuing educational opportunities for ministers and staff persons in the Association.

Section 25: Church Survey and Extension Committee

The Church Survey and Extension Committee shall be composed of six members and shall encourage the Association to respond to the need for new churches and the development of young congregations. It shall be the responsibility of this committee to keep abreast of the growth and development of the townships within the Association and encourage the appropriate responses.

Section 26: Members of all these committees, except those appointed by the Moderator, shall be elected to serve not more than three years on a rotating basis.

By-Law V TRUSTEES

The duty of the Trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other acquisition of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its Executive Board.

By-Law VI DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

Section 1: His selection shall be upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association at its Annual Meeting, or between sessions of the Association, by its Executive Board. His time of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity.

By-Law VII DIRECTOR OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRY

Section 1: Employment:—The Director of CSM shall be jointly employed by the Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Home Mission Board. The employee should be elected to work until the sponsoring groups mutually agree to renew the

tenure of service or the employee resigns. The CSM Director shall work under the supervision of the Director of Missions and in compliance with the Job Description provided by the State and Association.

Section 2: Basic Function—The basic functions are to work with the CSM Committee to organize, supervise and promote a program of activities to meet the spiritual, educational, emotional and physical needs of the people within the geographical boundaries of the Association.

Section 3: The CSM Director shall be an ex officio member of the Associational Executive Board, Associational Executive Committee and Missions Committee without voting privileges.

Section 4: When without a Christian Social Ministries Director, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Christian Social Ministries Director according to By-Law VII Section 1 and 2.

By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the Annual Meeting by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

By-Law IX. DEFINE PROCEDURE

Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.

Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six Associational Groups as follows: Paducah, Lanesboro, Shelby, Kings Mountain, Greer, and Waco.

October 22, 1985

Tuesday Afternoon

1. Messengers and visitors gathered in the Polkville Baptist Church for the 135th Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.
2. Moderator Broadus Heatherly, pastor of Mount Sinai Baptist Church, called the meeting to order at 2:45 p.m. Allen Jolley, Association Music Director and Minister of Music for First Baptist in Kings Mountain, introduced Reba Head, organist of Polkville Baptist Church who presented a vocal concert on the organ. Following the concert, Rev. Jolley led the congregation in singing, "Come We That Love the Lord."
3. Rev. Kenneth Cobb, pastor of Union Baptist Church, read scripture from Psalms 135:1-3. Rev. Bob Collins, pastor of Kings Mountain Baptist Church, led the opening prayer.
4. Dr. Paul Scarella, pastor of Beaver Dam Baptist Church, then gave the Order of Business report. He reported necessary changes in the program and moved that the Order of Program be accepted as printed with changes as needed. Mr. Warren Reid seconded the motion and it was approved.
5. The appointments of the Committee on Consultants was read by Moderator Broadus Heatherly. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.

He reported on improvements that have been made to the existing meeting place and stated their current needs. Statistics on the mission are included in the Director of Missions report found elsewhere in this volume.

49. Rev. Broedus Heatherly, moderator, presided over the election of officers for the 1985-86 year. He asked for nominations for moderator. Dr. Wade Dellinger nominated Rev. J.C. Cozart. Rev. Cozart declined this nomination. Rev. Dave Gordis nominated Dr. Wade Dellinger for moderator. Rev. Russell Hinton nominated Rev. Richard Flyler. Rev. Flyler declined due to health problems. Dr. Joel Jenkins moved that the nominations be closed. Mr. Chuck Lutz seconded and the motion carried. Rev. John Bridges nominated Rev. Bruce Hancock for vice-moderator. Rev. Glenn Walker moved that Rev. Bruce Hancock be elected by acclamation. Rev. J.C. Cozart seconded

- this motion, and the motion carried. Mr. Carlos Young moved that Joe Cabanis be elected by acclamation and Marion Packard seconded the motion and motion carried.
30. Mr. Joe Cabanis was recognized to give the attendance report. He reported 188 elected messengers, 52 non-messengers, and 18 visitors for a total enrollment of 238. He also reported a total enrollment on Tuesday of 425.
 31. Rev. Broadus Heatherly recognized the 18 visitors and asked them to stand.
 32. Rev. Don Whitener was recognized to present the proposed constitutional changes. Rev. Whitener moved that the changes in Article IV, Section 3 of the Constitution be approved. Rev. Alton Martin seconded this motion. Rev. Glenn Walker asked the question, "are we moving into the rights of the churches?" Discussion followed on this and the number of people this would affect. Rev. Jesse Bailey stated he felt it was in order. A standing vote was called for and the motion carried by four votes. It required 2/3 to carry. Rev. Whitener made the motion that By-law IV, Section 4 be adopted. Rev. Billy Cooper seconded the motion and the motion carried. Rev. Whitener moved that the Proposed Addition to Section 4 be approved. He stated that the Contingency Fund has already been approved and the vote is for the wording in the Constitution. This was seconded by Rev. Harold Pitt and the motion carried. Rev. Whitener made the motion that the change for By-law IV, Section 17 be adopted. Mr. Marion Packard seconded the motion and the motion carried. This was a standing vote since the name of the committee would need to be changed in several places in the Constitution. Rev. C.O. Greene asked the question, "if we would be duplicating services since there are other associations in the county." Rev. Bob Davis, Christian Social Ministries Director, stated the other associations have no services of this kind. Rev. Whitener moved that the change in By-law IV, Section 23 be adopted. Rev. Alton Martin seconded the motion and the motion carried. These changes are found elsewhere in this volume.
 33. Rev. Allen Jolley led the congregation in the hymns "Wonderful Words of Life."
 34. Rev. Richard Plyler presented the Consolidation Committee Report. Rev. Plyler moved that this report be accepted. Rev. Walter HSB seconded and the motion carried. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
 35. Rev. Ernest Smith presented the Resolutions Committee Report. Rev. Smith moved that the report be accepted. The motion was seconded and the motion carried. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
 36. Rev. J.C. Coates, interim pastor of Boiling Springs Baptist Church, gave the Memorials Report. He reported that 1 retired pastor, 11 deacons, and 240 lay persons have died during the year. Rev. Coates led in a memorial prayer for the deceased. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
 37. Rev. Broadus Heatherly recognized convention agencies. Dr. Garland Hendricks was recognized from Gardner-Webb College, and Mr. Carlos Young for the Baptist Hospital. Mr. Young reported, also, the chapel at Western Carolina Center is now complete and in use and that many churches in this association have contributed to this. Dr. Garland Hendricks reported for the Annuity Board. There will be open enrollment in October and November in the insurance programs and staff members who work 20 or more hours per week. He also stated the new Annuity Program will begin January 1, 1983.
 38. Rev. Broadus Heatherly, moderator, asked for announcements. Rev. Heatherly announced that the association has a bus going to the Southern Baptist Convention in the spring. Rev. Heatherly also recognized Mr. J.V. Roper, from Buffalo Baptist Church. Mr. Roper has attended 41 sessions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.
 39. Rev. Heatherly at this time recognized new officers for 1982-83: Dr. Wade Dellinger, moderator; Rev. Bruce Hancock, vice moderator; and Mr. Joe Cabanis, clerk/treasurer.

60. Rev. Clive Borders, Director of Missions, introduced Dr. Michael Blackwell, Director of the Baptist Children's Homes who brought our morning message. Rev. Borders stated that Dr. Blackwell is a prolific writer as well as an outstanding speaker.
61. Rev. Allen Jolley introduced Miss Deborah White, Minister of Music at Macedonia Baptist Church who presented a very inspiring solo, "It is Well with My Soul."
62. Dr. Blackwell presented a book entitled "100 Years of Caring" to Rev. Clive Borders and the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. This book is about the Children's Homes of North Carolina and the 100th birthday of the institution. Dr. Blackwell's message was titled, "Who Says You're Not Beautiful." He read scriptures from Luke 10:1-45. Dr. Blackwell stated we do not have to be beautiful by the world's standards, but are to be channels of God's love in the world.
63. Rev. Broderick Heatherly, moderator, challenged the association to think of the association as "ours." He thanked the association for the privilege and the honor of serving as moderator.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS ANNUAL REPORT 1984-85

On Wednesday, September 25, 1985, Clark-Treasurer Joe Calabrese made the final payment on our building! Praise the Lord!

This has been accomplished because of the churches' contributions and especially those who have faithfully given five percent of their budget dollar to associational missions. The effort of the churches was aided with the work of our Special Gifts Committee. We are very grateful for both. These two forces have enabled us to complete payment for our facility in four years.

The greatest significance of the building is not that it is paid for but the larger scope of ministry that is possible because we have the building as a medium. Not at any moment did we imagine that the building would be utilized so fully so quickly. We can no longer assume space is available. There are times when every meeting room is taken. The fall seminary classes from Southeastern Seminary have forty-five enrolled. These persons travel from Mt. Airy, Rockwell, Hendersonville, North Carolina and Pickens, South Carolina. Seminary Extension classes are also being conducted in our building. We are getting ready for our toy store and ministry to prisoners during the Christmas season. Community organizations such as Head Start, Mental Health Board, Child Abuse Prevention, Abuse Prevention Council, and Diocesan Home Advisory Committee share our building. Our joint effort with seven fire-departments to provide furniture for burned out families has occupied part of our space. Currently, two groups of ladies meet and, under the direction of Marie Wall, turn adult clothing into children's clothing. Three growth groups for pastors use the building each week — and on and on it goes — your joint ministry in our Jerusalem.

As the ministry has grown, so has it increased my activity as your director of missions. During the past year, I preached forty-two sermons and visited in sixty-one other services. I made fourteen calls into the home or office of pastors. I conducted sixteen cruises. I had five hundred sixty-nine personal revivals and met in training sessions with eleven Pastor Search Committees. I met with fifty-six associational committees and attended eleven state meetings. I made eleven visits to the hospital to the leadership of our churches. I attended twenty-eight growth group meetings and ten pastors' conferences. I shared in three community meetings and participated in four associational activities. I assure you that being your director of missions has stretched me as a person and caused me to grow.

Last year's report stated that Dr. Paul Sorrells was chairman of a committee to begin a mission in Number Three Township. That mission is on the way and growing. Attendance has been over forty for the past few weeks and the offering is more of \$300.00 per Sunday. Rev. Gerard Marchese is serving as interim pastor and providing good leadership.

The mission is being sponsored by the following churches: Beaver Dam, Bethany, Bethlehem, Churchill Drive, Double Shoals, Dover, Faith, Kings Mountain Second, New Hope, Oak Grove, Patterson Grove, Patterson Springs, Pleasant Hill, Pleasant Ridge, Putnam, Saffley First, Warn, Wallace Grove, Zion, and Zion. We need more support. We need to buy the lot on Christopher Road and provide a meeting place. The renovated area we are meeting in now is full. One class is being held under a shade tree and that will not be acceptable with the coming of winter. We can purchase the 5.3 acres for \$14,000.00. There are immediate and pressing needs for the mission.

Weeview has passed a motion to give a minimum of \$1,000 toward purchase of the land. That is a challenge. Are there other churches that will do the same or more? Fred and Charlotte Smith have agreed to loan us \$1,000 interest free money. This is another way you may be involved. Let me urge you to contact Dr. Paul Sorrells and let him know of your willingness to share in the mission endeavor. Attorney J.A. Wirt said at our last Advisory Committee meeting, "There is going to be a church at Christopher Road" and you have an opportunity to get in on the ground work and one day look back with a great deal of pride.

that you were used of the Lord to birth a church. It is exciting to be in on the beginning. Get on board with us and find a new excitement in your Christian experience.

While trying to be involved in missions here, our churches are also involved in missions to West Virginia and Togo, Africa. Elizabeth Baptist has sent two teams and Patterson Springs Baptist has sent one team to West Virginia. Ms. Beryl Barber from Beaver Dam Church, Mrs. Marjorie Hamrick from Bolling Springs Church, Mrs. Mary Gragg from Pleasant Ridge Church, Mr. Bob Chadwick, Mr. Roger Martin, and Mr. John McSwain all from Westview Church have been to Togo during the past year. Mr. Carroll Brackley from Oak Grove Church will leave for Togo on October 24th. We praise the Lord for these churches and individuals who have chosen to serve Him in this way.

We do not need to pick and choose between these opportunities as we have the resources to be involved in all of these mission opportunities.

The joint ministry of our churches is possible because of the ongoing participation of our many volunteers. During the church year literally hundreds of volunteers staff the needed ministries. I want to say a big word of thanks to each of you. God bless you for your willingness to serve and for your capable ministry.

Contributions from our churches continued to increase. This year receipts show a 10.4% increase over last year.

I have a deep appreciation for our staff. Bob Davis continues to lead us in one of the best C.S.M. programs in our convention. Margaret Lipscomb continues to grow in her skills as office manager. Jody Francis keeps our financial affairs straight under the able assistance of Joe Calabrese. Anne Cook gives not only assistance to those who request it but adds love and understanding. Anne has a beautiful way of witnessing to those who enter her office. I am so grateful for an efficient and congenial staff with whom to work and witness.

Three seminars are scheduled for next year for ministers and staff personnel: March 4 — "Understanding Population Growth in North Carolina", May 20-21 — "Issues Around Forced Termination", November 18-19 — "Coping With Anger and Authority in the Ministry."

We have a new retirement program for pastors, church staff and employees that will take effect in 1982. I have asked that we create a task force to help us make churches aware of the need to upgrade the retirement of those who serve us. We have little awareness of how totally inadequate projected incomes will be for those who serve us.

Our world is changing. We must be willing to look for new and better ways to be a witness of the marvelous grace and love of our Lord to this present generation.

New dreams with me!

Is there one among us who could have predicted ten years ago where we would be today as a cooperating group of churches? Maybe you foresee it all — I did not. I had dreams but they were not as ambitious as the reality we have accomplished. We have had pastors and lay people who have accepted major chunks of responsibility. They have led us with fairness and firmness. They caught sight of the dreams of what we could become and they mustered the support to accomplish the task and did it in the context of Christian grace. I trusted the support to accomplish the task and did it in the context of Christian grace. I trusted you. We could not be where we are today — we would not be where we are today — where you. I must admit that I became discouraged and would have settled for far less but you led us on — and I speak for myself and a multitude of others when I say thank you for your faithfulness to the task.

What is our next major step? What are some of the pressing needs that we are struggling with in our ranks? We are faced with a static or declining Sunday School enrollment. The Sunday School is the source or pond from which we will officers in the Southern Baptist Convention. We have the challenge of bringing to Christ one-half of this county. That is a conservative figure! Resident membership of all churches in Cleveland County is less than one-half the population. Do we dare think or believe that all resident members have a vital

population. Do we dare think or believe that all resident members have a vital relationship with Christ? I am like the Baptist who was being taken to task by a Methodist. The Methodist said the trouble with you Baptists is that you don't think anybody is going to Heaven except Baptist. The Baptist replied, "It is worse than that. I don't think all the Baptists are going to Heaven." It is not church membership but a vital relationship with Christ. Vital relationship with Christ will result in identification with the body of Christ. I do not believe anybody can be saved and remain in isolation from other Christians.

This is our challenge, reaching one-half of the people here, where I live, where you live, with a vital experience with Christ.

What can we do at the associational level? This is the only option open to us to assist with this challenge. The association is not a church, must not try to become a church but must put itself together to be of maximum benefit to the churches.

What is it??? Hear me carefully. A church development person whose primary goal will be church growth. This individual would work with the four basic organizations, Sunday School, Church Training, WMU and Brotherhood. This person would work through our existing volunteer leaders, supplementing their leadership. Religious Directors would have a resource person to encourage them in their task.

Currently there are fifteen churches in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association that are at that awkward stage of growth whereby they need another staff person but not quite able to afford it. This person could and would be available to these churches and any other to lead them in short term projects. For that period of time, the church development person would attend the church that he is working with and work under the leadership of the pastor until the project is done. Churches would need to define clearly what task they wanted accomplished and how long it would take, secure an agreement with the church development person and/or committee and go at it. Then the church development person would be ready to do maintenance work as the project commenced to unfold. If all those churches at the point of needing another staff person joined in this process and each secured the services of such a person for three months, it would take three years and six months to respond to their request. Then there are the other 50 churches that would also request his services plus the 9 who have Religious Education persons. This person should be available to all the churches, supported by all the churches and his primary aim would be CHURCH GROWTH.

We now have five associations that have such a person and three other associations seeking such a person. Two associations having such a person has a smaller resident membership than KMSA. One of them has less churches. One of the three seeking such a person has less resident members and less churches. If you are interested in what other associations are doing in this regard, we would be right on target. All signs seem to point this out as our next move.

What are some of the task such a person could accomplish? Leadership training for new classes, working with outreach leaders to become active in reaching others, grading a Sunday School up so as to create new classes, training of the leaders of new converts to be effective witnesses, directing a people search, leading Sunday School teachers to win others through their classes and there are many more.

We do not want nor need someone to fix our existing religious structure but someone whose primary emphasis would be on growth — reaching people with a vital relationship in Christ.

Now friends there are two ways we are going to reach one-half of Cleveland County. We might as well quit fooling around and think we will do it any other way. We will have an opportunity to reach half of Cleveland County when we start number 1, new units in existing churches and number two, new churches. This is how and where growth occurs. If we are not willing to do these things then we are saying to the lost we are not serious about reaching them. We will be saying to our Lord, the Great Shepherd that we are not serious about reaching His lost sheep. I believe this is the next step for us in our joint ministry.

You have heard a demand! I do not think anybody is ready to make a motion. I do not know of anyone who plans to make a motion. This need has surfaced in every Long Range Planning process we have been involved in. Now is the time for us to pray together, share together, plan together, and during this next year, decide whether or not we will do something decisive and creative to have an opportunity to reach one-half of Cleveland County for Christ.

Remember the story of the stewards in the bible. The man who flunked the test, failed miserably and said "I was afraid". We will be confronted with this temptation. I do not know how much time we have. No one knows but I want to spend my time and my energies reaching myself and our association to reach the unreached of Cleveland County for Christ.

We need to feel your strength, your encouragement, your suggestions and together may the Lord shape us into a team that will win a victory — a victory for Jesus in Cleveland County and a victory for Christ.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRY ANNUAL REPORT 1984-85

1. **Prison Ministry** Statistics show that we have over 17,000 people in our state who are housed in our prison system. Some of these are not Christians, and need to hear God's word proclaimed. Many are Christians and need someone to testify that God's love is real, expressed by His Spirit and shared by His people. Our ministry to the one hundred sixty-five men and personnel in our Shelby prison camp continues to be a priority concern for the CSM Department of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

A. Our Tuesday evening worship services continue to meet with regularity every other Tuesday evening. We are allowed to take seven volunteers in for this project, and have had a total of fourteen volunteers involved in this part of our prison ministry this year. We have had thirty groups of Baptist women and Associates to provide baked goods for our worship/fellowship experiences this year. If these groupings only averaged three per group, this would make ninety volunteers who have had a part in this ministry.

B. Our Thursday afternoon Bible Study continues to be a real source of joy for us. It is exciting to see people hunger after God's word, and grow in their faith as a result of their gained knowledge and faith. We have had five volunteers involved in this ministry.

C. Twenty-nine church groups/individuals participated in the donation of items for the gift packets at Christmas. Representatives from five churches helped with the packaging of the items. There were twenty-two volunteers. We prepared and delivered one hundred seventy packets. Because of extra money this year, we were able to provide each of the prison personnel with a one pound fruit cake.

2. **Juvenile Court Ministry** We were only able to have two camping experiences with our Juvenile Court youth this year. Our camping experience in March was a delight. The weather was terrific — in the 80's both days. We had fourteen youth to go and eleven volunteers. Pleasant Ridge Baptist Young Women provided the meal for Friday night and cookies for all weekend, and the Shelby Rescue Squad Auxiliary sponsored three youth's expenses. On June 7-8 we took ten youth to South Mountain Christian Camp for an overnight camping trip. Four adults went as chaperones.

3. **Literacy Ministry** There are many tragic points to those caught in the web of il-

literacy. We now have approximately 3,500 adult people in Cleveland County who have difficulty with reading. In addition to these, there are numbers of young adults between the ages of 16-24 who have the same problems. It is estimated that one out of every five adults in North Carolina is either illiterate or functionally illiterate. Sarah Williams has done an excellent job this year in directing our Literacy Ministry. We have had eleven volunteers who have been active this year. On April 26-27 we had a one-hour workshop to train literacy volunteers. Sixteen workers were trained. Nineteen persons were in attendance.

4. **Ministry To Visually Handicapped** In March we had a dinner for the Visually Handicapped students of Gardner-Webb. Twenty persons were in attendance. There were twelve WMCU groups from our churches who had given funds for the New Testament on tape. Each of the six Gardner-Webb students was presented his/her personal copy of the New Testament on tape.

We were asked to provide an evening meal and program for the special orientation for blind and deaf students from Gardner-Webb College. Two of our churches responded. The Baptist Young Women of Pleasant Ridge hosted the group on August 12th with a cookout and Baptist Women of Shelby First hosted with a spaghetti supper on August 13th. There were thirty present on the first evening and thirty-one on the second evening.

5. **Duke Match Ministry** We were fortunate this year to again be the receiving agency for the Duke Match Ministry. This year Duke Power matched our giving on a three to one basis. Your response, as always, was exciting and encouraging.

7. **Migrant Ministry** Our Migrant Ministry began at the Belwood Community Center and Norman's Grove Baptist Church on June 9 and continued through September 8. I am deeply grateful to Anne Cook, CSM Secretary, for her splendid work on this project, to Rev. Max Turner and the congregation at Norman's Grove for the use of their sanctuary for our worship, to Vici and Gonzalo Ponce and Evelyn Kiser of Waco Baptist Church for the excellent and faithful leadership they gave to this ministry, and to the fourteen churches who participated in the Norman's Grove-Belwood project. We had two hundred sixty volunteers who were a part of this area of ministry. Churches participating were Pleasant Grove, Carpenter's Grove, Shelby First, Union, Zion, Polkville, Norman's Grove, Fallston, Dover, New Bethel, Northside, Cassin, Double Shoals and Waco.

In addition to this we had four churches who provided health care items and school items for migrant farm workers. These were Rolling Springs, Elizabeth, Shelby First and New Hope.

8. **Developmental Disability Ministry** We had two days camps for Mentally Retarded youth. Both of these had three MR's in attendance, with a total of fifteen volunteers. In July, the Oak Grove Baptist Church sponsored a week of Vacation Bible School. There were twelve MR's who attended. The Adults of Oak Grove provided the leadership for the school and did an outstanding job. Total volunteers from Oak Grove were twenty-three.

9. **Cleaners Ministry** The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina asked us to be one of two associations in North Carolina to pilot a Cleaners Ministry. We have begun with information sharing in the Groves/Kings Mountain Group, the Polkville Group and the Lattimore Group.

Our major emphasis is home garden. To date six families have been assigned to some in these groups.

10. **Feed The Hungry Ministry** I have been struggling for some time in trying to find effective ways to minister to the street people, homeless, and others who have hunger needs. One way we have begun to minister to these is through a sandwich and vegetable meal at First Baptist Church of Shelby each Friday at noon. We applied for and received \$2,500 from the North Carolina Hunger Fund of the Baptist State Convention, and began the ministry on September 6th. During the month of September we averaged feeding sixteen persons per week and had involvement of twenty-six volunteers.

11. **Children's Clothing Ministry** On September 5 Marie Wall began direction of a ministry to take some of our excess adult clothing and recycle it into usable children's clothing. This group meets twice each Thursday and works on this project.

Three regular meetings of the Executive Board were held during the past year. Our meetings were held on Monday evenings after the third Sunday during the months of January, April and July, 1985. Our church hosts for the meetings were: January — First Baptist, Grover; April — Patterson Grove; July — Fremont Memorial.

Excellent attendance occurred at each of our meetings. The first portion of each meeting provided a time of presentation of current Association programs. SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

Preliminary figures based on church letters turned in by this morning and information gained by the telephone poll that last Sunday in September indicate that Sunday School enrollment will be about 16,800 as opposed to the 16,154 reported last year. Average attendance will be about 9,125, up 214 over last year's 8,911.

Because of the 8.5 by '85 campaign closing with a high attendance effort the last Sunday in September, we had two high attendance days observed in the 1984-85 church year. On the traditional High Attendance Day, the last Sunday in October of 1984, we had 16,524 attending Sunday School in EMBA churches. On High Attendance Day as observed by most of our churches on the last Sunday in September, there were 16,319 present.

Rev. Robin Moore led the Vacation Bible School Circle at Ellaneth Church on April 23, 1985. This was a well attended and loaded event.

Rev. Ken Cytke, Sunday School Outreach Director, was involved in the summer training in prospect discovery for the Good News America Campaign.

Denise Smith organized the Sunday School Workers Training Conference held this year at Bolling Springs Baptist. There were 176 participants registered from 27 churches.

The associational Sunday School organization is now called the ASSIST Team. This stands for Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team. Your ASSIST Team led individual and group conferences in more than ten churches in our association. Your ASSIST Team always stands ready to give assistance to churches in their Bible teaching and outreach programs.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE IV MEETINGS

Present Reading Section 1: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each fifty members of the church, provided each church shall not have less than three nor more than ten messengers. These shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those in attendance and registering at the Associational Meeting.

Proposed Change Section 1: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each fifty members of the church, provid-

of each church shall not have less than three nor more than ten members. **Along with all associational officers**, these shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The minutes of meetings printed in the minutes shall include only those in attendance and registering at the Associational Meeting.

BY-LAWS

BY-LAWS IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Present Reading Section 4: The Finance Committee, composed of six members, two rotating annually, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs of an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the Association, upon request, with the stewardship programs offered by the Convention.

The Committee shall express gratitude to the churches for their stewardship development that enables them to participate in local, home, and foreign missions.

Proposed Change Section 4: The Finance Committee, composed of six members, two rotating annually, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs of an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperating of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

The Finance Committee may make adjustments during the year (not to exceed \$1,000) in line items of the budget providing the adjustments:

1. will not increase the total for a section.
2. will not alter the basic purpose or intent of the budget.
3. will have full consent of those affected (individuals department leaders, etc.)

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the Association, upon request, with the stewardship programs offered by the Convention.

The Committee shall express gratitude to the churches for their stewardship development that enables them to participate in local, home, and foreign missions.

5. Literary Ministries The Literary Ministries shall be composed of (a) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the slow readers, non-readers and non-English speaking persons in developing and improving reading skills.

6. Emergency and Relief Ministries The Emergency and Relief Ministries shall be composed of (a) six members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the economically disadvantaged persons of Cleveland County.

7. Developmental Disability Ministries The Developmental Disability Ministries shall be composed of (a) members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the Developmental Disabled persons of Cleveland County and to their families.

8. Visually Handicapped Ministries The Visually Handicapped Ministries shall be composed of (a) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the Visually Handicapped persons of Cleveland County and to their families.

9. Christmas Toy Store The Christmas Toy Store Ministry shall be composed of (a) six members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministry to persons of needy children during the Christmas season.

10. Substance Abuse Ministry The Substance Abuse Ministry shall be composed of (a) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to address the needs of those afflicted with substance abuse problems and their families.

The personnel of the sub-committees shall provide assistance to churches through their

ministry education organizations in the development of ministries to those included in the job description written above, and to encourage participation by the churches in ministries conducted on the associational level.

11. **Meeting** The personnel of the sub-committees will meet as needed to develop the programs of ministry. The Christian Ministry Development committee shall meet annually for their planning and training.

Present Reading Section 23: Memorials Committee, composed of three members, will be responsible for:

1. Recognize deceased ministers, staff, deacons and members in an appropriate way.
2. Submit report for inclusion in Associational Minutes.
3. Represent Association to those who are bereaved.

Proposed Change Section 23: Memorials Committee, composed of three members, will be responsible for:

1. Recognizing deceased ministers, staff, deacons, and members in an appropriate way.
2. Submitting report for inclusion in Associational Minutes.
3. Ministering to the families of associational officers, ministers and staff members when death occurs.

EVANGELISM REPORT

The Executive Committee of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association voted in June of 1984 to participate in Good News America God Loves You Struggleman Revival for 1985. As of today we have 661 churches which are involved. The revival will be held from April 4 through 13, 1985. I am excited about the response which we are having. Churches are now conducting a PEOPLE SEARCH in an effort to secure prospective families. Each church will need to find these prospects and cultivate them until the revival that next spring. An associational rally is planned for January 27, 1986 at First Baptist Church, Shelby with Dr. Azzale Walker of First Baptist Church, Spartanburg as the speaker. Music will be provided by the Don Baughman Family. A training session will be held prior to the associational rally.

I trust every church is ready to go and reach our goal of 800 baptisms for the church year of 1985-86.

HISTORIANS REPORT

Where did I come from?

Little Johnny asked his mother this question, and she took the time 30 minutes telling him about the birds and the bees, and even about the little basket under her heart.

"That's not what I mean, Ma," he said. "Little came from Charlotte; Bob came from Winston-Salem and Joe came from Lenoire. Where did I come from before I came here?"

Have you ever wondered where the Kings Mountain Baptist Association came from . . . with all its 75 wonderful New Testament churches?

We came from ancient times and distant places. Early followers of Jesus were Baptists. We came from ancient times and distant places. Early followers of Jesus were Baptists. Though for centuries they were simply called Christians . . . first at Antioch. John who baptized Jesus in the Jordan River, was widely known as "the Baptist", or "the Baptizer".

Then as the years rolled by Christians such as Paul and Silas, Luke and Mark, Peter and

many others took the Gospel to Antioch in Syria, then to Rome; later new Christians spread over the whole of the European continent, including England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales; then to the United States with the Jamestown colony in 1607, to Massachusetts in 1621 as the Puritans sought religious liberty; then as they desired that same liberty to some, Roger Williams, a Baptist, founded Providence and Rhode Island.

Eventually Baptists came to North Carolina, the first church being Shiloh in Currituck County in 1727. Kethokee in Halifax County was organized in 1732.

The Philadelphia Baptist Association was organized in 1707 and the Charleston (S.C.) Association in 1751, and both these great associations were wellsprings of missionary zeal and activity for many years. Sandy Creek, near Burlington and Jersey in the Liberty Association near Lexington were organized in 1755. Dr. Garland Hendricks of Gardner-Wells College wrote a history of the Jersey Settlement and church some time ago, and he and I were privileged to attend the 250th anniversary celebration there last month. Just think, those churches are nearly 100 years older than our own Kings Mountain Association!

The Broad River Association was formed in 1836, with pioneer preachers from both Charleston and Sandy Creek and Jersey leading the way. This was the same year the North Carolina Baptist State Convention was organized. Later there was a Western Convention, since travel and communication with the East was difficult, but when roads and railroads were built, Baptists went back to just one convention.

Some of the earliest Baptist leaders who influenced the very beginnings of Baptists life in this region were William Brewster who founded the First Baptist Church of Charleston in 1683; William Sojourner at Kethokee in 1740; Shaloh Stearns at Sandy Creek and John Gane at Jersey in 1755.

Nearly all the Associations in North Carolina, and many of the churches are named for rivers, creeks, bridges, hills, springs, mountains, valleys, trees, Bible places, Indians or natural geographical landmarks. For instance our forefathers got on high ground in this area and could see the Blue Ridge, South Mountains, Bee's Knob, Carpenter's Knob, Kings Mountain, Watakin's Mountain, and Thickety Mountain and Cherry Mountain. The Classical profile of Old Kings Mountain, with its Revolutionary War connection and fame, was chosen. And I am glad.

In 1851, 13 churches withdrew from the Broad River Association, to union at Sandy Run, to form Kings Mountain Association which met later in the year at Double Springs. Eight of those churches are still with us: Flom, New Bethel, Boiling Springs, Mt. Sinai, Beaver Dam, Pleasant Hill, Zion, and Double Springs. The five which joined other bodies: Buffalo, Sandy Run, the two oldest in the area; Bethel at Elmhurst, Mt. Pleasant, and First Broad.

Again, where did we come from? From ancient times and distant places. From Europe, New England, Pennsylvania and Virginia and North Carolina; but also from poverty, persecution, privation, persecution, piety and occasionally piety. We have come from ignorance and education, from trial and error, from other denominations, from primitives and pagans, and from some who had no religion at all.

Where do we go from here? If anyone asks where you came from, tell them "the work" or "the doctor's little black bag", or tell them the truth. If they ask where the association came from, tell them what I just told you!

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

A church media/library can help every church officer perform his job better. A church media/library can help every church program reach its goal faster and more successfully. A church media/library can help make the programs of every church organization more interesting. A church media/library can provide materials to enrich the lives of every church member. But these great things can happen only if the members use their library; and if the librarian tries to supply the supplementary materials needed by the officers, teachers, leaders, organizations and members; and if the church sets aside enough funds for purchasing these materials.

Thirty-nine churches of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association reported storing libraries this year. Some of the librarians have a place to house books, audio-visual materials and equipment. Others have no space. Faithful Baptist Church moved into its new library this year. It is right in the middle of the church, where its very location encourages people to use it. More librarians than ever before report that they have joined the Broadman Readers Plan. That means that they receive at least three new books each quarter — one doctrinal and two inspirational — published by Broadman. A church member reading all twelve books would better understand four Baptist doctrines and would have eight uplifting experiences in reading.

The church librarians have met each quarter to discuss problems in their own libraries and make plans for library improvement. Their next meeting is November 12 to plan their libraries for the new year.

The Associational Library has begun purchasing sound filmstrips and other audio-visuals. These as well as the books and materials already in the library are for lending to the churches and church personnel of the association. We hope the new items will be especially attractive for use with the youth — maybe for church look-ins or summer youth programs. Resources in your Associational Library are for the use of the churches to enrich the church programs.

STRATEGY PLANNING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Strategy Planning Committee is your "dream teammate." You have assigned us the responsibility of looking at our present ministries and "dreaming" of how we can, under our Lord's leading, take that which is already great, and make it greater. We have held several meetings throughout the 1984-85 year to do just that. We have done some evaluation of present activities, but primarily we have looked at currently unmet needs and sought God's mind as to how we could meet these in the future.

Needs we believe that our association should be addressing are: 1) A universal ministry at the Cleveland Mall. 2) A ministry to the students at Cleveland Tech. 3) Utilization of the talents and witness of the members of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes in our churches. 4) A van to be used in the various outreach ministries of our association. 5) An additional

member of the associational staff to serve as a Church Development Specialist. 6) Encourage churches to provide better retirement coverage for pastors and staff members. 7) Encourage our various organizational leaders to better utilize the time given them at the quarterly Executive Board meetings. 8) Encourage the Evangelism Committee, after the Good News, America Campaign, to start planning another association-wide evangelistic effort.

What do we propose to do about our dreams? First, we want you to begin to dream along with us. We want you to join us in prayer until we are dreaming as one-not just "me" with each other but one with God. Secondly, we desire your input. We need to hear from you about your dreams as well as how to facilitate those ideas we already have. In the third place we are assigning these ideas to various committees, organizations and individuals for further study and implementation. Finally, we plan to conclude where we started and have tried to remain. We agreed to bring everything to God in prayer that we might know His will and be empowered by His Holy Spirit to do it.

While all these ideas are important and need, in the judgment of this committee, to be acted upon, there are two that we feel need further explanation. They are items 3 and 4 above. Item 3 is long-range, but item 4 is of immediate concern.

What do we mean when we speak of church development specialists? We are thinking of someone who could work with the organizational leaders and their organizations on the associational level helping them sharpen their skills, but more importantly be available to local churches to assist them in developing their local church educational, discipling or administrative program and ministries. This would be especially helpful to churches that are unable to call an additional staff member, yet it desires to improve in one or more of the above areas.

To aid churches in planning adequate retirement and insurance coverage for their staff members, we are scheduling a seminar for pastors, staff, and key laymen from each church. This is to be done through the associational NRC Assembly Board representative. The date and place for this will be announced at a later date.

Again, come pray and dream with us. The writer of Proverbs states "Where there is no vision, the people perish." Let us seek and find our Lord's vision for us.
