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# DEDICATION

By recommendation of the Resolution Committee at the Wednesday evening session of the annual meeting, the 1986 Minutes of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association are dedicated to the memory of Rev. Fred Wells.

## IN MEMORIAM

A family, a church, an association and a host of friends suffered a great loss when the Rev. Fred Wells died on April 28, 1986 at the age of 89.

For eleven years Rev. Wells was an effective pastor and leader of the Midview Baptist Church. Under his guidance and influence, the church experienced much growth in membership, and considerable improvements to the building and grounds.

These changes included the installation of a baptistry, additional space in front of the building, ramp for the handicapped, porch, steps, wall-to-wall carpeting in the sanctuary, repainting of the outside and inside of facilities, dedication of a fellowship building, and the purchase of 23.47 acres of land adjacent to the property for recreational purposes. These improvements were made possible because of much love and loyalty by concerned and committed members of the church under the inspiration of their beloved pastor, Rev. Wells.

In 1985, the last full year of Pastor Wells' leadership before he suffered poor health because of heart and circulation problems, Midview received 23 new members, and 29 of these were for baptism.

Long before Rev. Wells became a pastor, he was an able and effective layman of the Oak View Baptist Church where he served many years as a deacon, Brotherhood director, Sunday School teacher and Church Training leader. During this same period he served as associational Brotherhood director and fund raiser for a chapel for the Western Carolina Center, an institution for the mentally retarded located in Morganton.

When Mr. Wells responded to God's call to the Christian ministry at the age of 36, he interpreted the call to preach as a call to prepare to preach. So he went resented at one Fruitland Bible Institute near Hendersonville, and later graduated after considerable sacrifice because of the lack of funds. He was able to secure the necessary funds, however, by borrowing money and because of the generosity of the Oak View Baptist Church, and the salary of the Western Baptist Church where he served as interim pastor for a six months period.

The writer of this tribute had the privilege of serving with Rev. Wells when we were members of the Kings Mountain Ministerial Association. He was the able president of this interdenominational, inter-racial group for a year, and over the years was instrumental in raising thousands of dollars for the poor and disadvantaged of the community.

For all the years that this good man served the Lord as a layman and a minister, he was a staunch supporter of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. He thoroughly enjoyed attending the various meetings and supporting the work of the association, convinced that the churches can do much more together than they can separately.

This eulogy would be incomplete without some words of praise to Rev. Wells' widow, Ethel, who ably assisted her husband of 49 years in everything he did for the Master's cause. If Rev. Wells could speak, he no doubt would and would say that home, church and associational life with his wife meant more to him since they started their lives together than he could ever express.

# A Brief History Of



## First Baptist Church, Kings Mountain

Mrs. Frances Lee Smith Carswell moved to Kings Mountain and requested that her church membership letter from Old Long Creek Church, near Dallas, be moved to Bethlehem Baptist Church. It remained there until September 11, 1960 when she called for her letter in order to organize the First Baptist Church in Kings Mountain. Mrs. John Thomas Kendrick assisted Mrs. Carswell in her efforts.

These persons organized meetings to be held in homes and places such as the Methodist building and the Lutheran building so that people could gather for prayer and plan for a Baptist church in Kings Mountain.

It is not known whether Rev. McManaway or Rev. M.E. Matheny was the first pastor; however, Rev. J.H. McManaway was the first missionary to receive financial assistance for the organization of First Baptist Church in Kings Mountain.

The First Baptist Church of Kings Mountain was admitted to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association on March 21, 1896. According to associational minutes, it is believed that the Sunday School was organized late in the year 1891. Mr. A.E. Clayton was the first Sunday School Superintendent. A lot which was located on the corner of Mountain Street and Pemberton Street was donated for a church home.

Rev. J.J. Beach was called July 8, 1907. Outstanding activities during his pastorate were: a lot was purchased to build a parsonage, a building committee was appointed and a building fund begun for the purpose of erecting a new church building. On April 12, 1914 the first service was held in the basement of the new building.

Construction of an educational building was begun on March 22, 1938. In 1937 the church accepted a gift of land to relocate the First Baptist Church to the corner of West King and First Street. On July 3, 1960 the congregation held a "ribbon-cutting service" and the first worship services in the new building.

On June 18, 1961 the church called R. Allen Jolley as full-time Minister of Music and Education.

In 1967 the church voted to proceed with plans for building an addition including the fellowship hall and to renovate the temporary fellowship hall.

The Rev. T. Clifton, Jr. property adjoining the church site was approved for purchase on May 29, 1968 with the home to be used as a residence for far-reaching foreign ministries.

The congregation on November 27, 1963 approved the "Together We Build" program and on September 23, 1965 held the final service in the old building and proceeded to its new sanctuary for dedication services.

On August 29, 1964 Mike Langston was called as Minister of Youth.

The present pastor is Dr. Joel P. Jenkins, Jr., and the present church membership is 728.

## A Brief History Of Macedonia Baptist Church, Kings Mountain

Macedonia Baptist Church was organized October 31, 1920. Rev. J.D. Polbright, pastor of First Baptist Church, Kings Mountain, North Carolina, was elected Moderator of the Preliminary and D.F. Hord, Secretary.

The door of the church was opened and seven men and six women were received as charter members. W.H. Moss, R.A. Bookout, S.C. Lolley and Theodora Moss were elected to serve as the first deacons of the church. These men were ordained before the meeting was adjourned.

Rev. J.E. Hicks was called to serve as the first pastor of the church and served until September, 1924. Other pastors and the order in which they served are: Clarendon Wylie, Wesley Davis, W.T. Dasher, A.O. Melton, L.V. Frederick, C.B. Roberts, R.L. Harbin, T.A. Linsberger, Wayne Ashe, L.D. Scruggs, and Tom Peterson.

There have been three buildings in the site of Macedonia Baptist Church. The first building, a small frame structure, was erected shortly after the church was organized. It was replaced by a larger frame structure built in 1928. The present brick building was completed and dedicated on Easter Sunday, 1955, during the pastorate of T.A. Linsberger.

The present membership of the church is 475. Clarendon, Jean A. Bailey serves as pastor and Delores White serves as Minister of Music and Education.

## CONSTITUTION

### PREAMBLE

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

### ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this body shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

### ARTICLE II PURPOSE

Under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, this association of churches seeks to further the Kingdom through the following:

- (1) the fostering of fellowship and cooperation among the member churches,
- (2) the ministering the spiritual and physical needs of people,
- (3) the giving and receiving of information, assistance and training for member churches,
- (4) the cooperation with North Carolina Baptist State and Southern Baptist Conventions.

### ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Membership Committee. Application should include:

1. Formal action by the group seeking admission reflecting that 75% of those voting expresses their intent to cooperate.
2. A written statement reflecting their beliefs and practices.
3. A written statement that expresses their intent to cooperate.
4. A willingness to meet with Membership Committee to discuss other items of mutual interest to both parties.

The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist belief and practice and what it means to cooperate with the churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. If recommended by the committee and accepted by the Association, a mission or a church shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a minimum of one year. Membership within the Association shall be determined by vote of the Association at its annual meeting. Churches under the watchcare shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its constitution and by-laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and if requested, the Associational Executive Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like associations.

### ARTICLE IV MEETINGS

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Tuesday and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or Executive Board, provided two weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 3: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each fifty members of the church, provided each church shall not have less than three nor more than ten messengers. Along with all associational officers, these shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those in attendance and registering at the Associational Meeting.

## ARTICLE V AUTHORITY

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this Constitution in Article III, Section 2 and 3.

## ARTICLE VI OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTIONS

Section 1: The officers of the association shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Chairman of the Library Council, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Parliamentarian, and Association Coordinator.

Section 2: The Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer shall be elected on the morning of the last day of the annual meeting. All other officers shall be contacted and nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Associational Executive Board as their April meeting.

Section 3: The newly elected Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer shall assume at the close of the annual session all duties incumbent upon them relating to work of the ensuing associational year. All other officers shall assume all duties incumbent upon them relating to the work of the ensuing year on October 1.

Section 4: Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for reelection for two years.

## ARTICLE VII TRUSTEES AND THEIR ELECTION

There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself more than the lapse of one year. The expiration date of each officer's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

## ARTICLE VIII THE ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Associational Executive Board shall be composed of all Associational officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Associational Director of Missions, the Christian Social Ministries Director two officers without voting privileges, each active pastor, two members chosen by each member church from its membership and verified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The Associational Executive Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the Constitution. Associational Executive Board members are the connecting link between the Association and the churches. Executive Board members should represent the churches to the Association. Executive Board members should act as representatives for the Association to the churches. It is the responsibility of the Executive Board members to promote the programs, represent the needs and report to the churches concerning the work and ministry of the Association. Executive Board members should seek acceptable means of representing the Association to their respective fellowships. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association to its Annual Meeting.

The quarterly meeting will be in January, April and July, on Monday after the third Sunday.

## ARTICLE IX COMMITTEES

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through the following annual meeting.

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the Annual Meeting:

1. Order of Business and Program Committee (By-Law IV, Section 1)
2. Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
3. Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
4. Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)

5. Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 5)
  6. Nominating Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
  7. Construction Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
  8. Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
  9. Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
  10. Revelations Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
  11. Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
  12. Seminary Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
  13. Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
  14. Christian Ministry Development Committee (By-Law IV, Section 17)
  15. Church Reconciliation Committee (By-Law IV, Section 16)
  16. Mission Committee (By-Law IV, Section 19)
  17. Recreation and Drama Committee (By-Law IV, Section 20)
  18. Strategy Planning Committee

  20. Youth For Christ

- B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting: Committee on Committees. (By-Law IV, Section 14)

Section 2: The following committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting to serve during the Annual Meeting: Enrollment Committee (By-Law IV, Section 16).

## ARTICLE X. AMENDMENTS

Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any Annual Session of the Association upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association on the first day and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association on the last day. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

## BY-LAWS

### By-Law I. PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

### By-Law II. ASSOCIATION YEAR

The Association Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

### By-Law III. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committee on Committees and Committee on Enrollment. He shall be the Chairman of the Associational Executive Board and be an ex-officio (without voting privileges) member of all other committees. Upon completion of his term of office, the Moderator shall become a member-at-large for two years of the Mission Committee, Executive and the Executive Board.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be the Vice-Chairman of the Executive Board.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's Annual Meeting, distribute at the Annual Meeting copies of the digest of these reports, make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of Minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of Minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the Executive Board. He shall inform all members elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action. He shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association, disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its Executive Board, or as designated in the budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance

Committee to the Executive Board or the Association (in annual session), render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the Annual Meeting and give a report at each quarterly Executive Board meeting and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Associational Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.

Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and make a written report to each Annual Meeting of the Association.

Section 6: The Sunday School Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Sunday School Department. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this committee that would promote this work.

The Associational Sunday School should assist church leaders to be more effective in their responsibility. This should include:

1. Provide opportunities for fellowship and inspiration.
2. Interpret the Sunday School Program.
3. Train Sunday School leaders.
4. Consult with Sunday School leaders concerning their program.
5. Provide organization and leadership for cooperative work among the churches.

Section 7: The Church Training Department shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Church Training Department. This officer shall attend Executive Committee meetings, maintain the on-going work of this department at all times, and give an annual report to the Association.

Section 8: The Music Director shall provide leadership for the Association in session and when requested at other times during the year. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this Committee that would promote the work. He shall encourage music growth in the churches throughout the year and shall make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

Section 9: The Brotherhood Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of men and boys in the churches. The officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to promote the development of men and boys and an awareness of world mission needs.

Section 10: The Woman's Missionary Union Director serves on the Executive Committee of the Association and works with the Director of Missions; leads the WMU Council; confers with our associational WMU officers and assists them in their work; leads in providing opportunities for leaders and members of their church WMUs to have fellowship and receive inspiration concerning their mutual mission task; leads in interpreting the WMU program to church leaders; leads in training church WMU workers and members; consults with church leaders concerning initiation of WMU work and the improvement of existing work; presides at and plans for associational meeting; leads in associational WMU annual planning; leads in discussing mission action needs and in coordinating the work being done; and reports progress of WMU work to the Association and serves as contact between the Association and state WMU.

Section 11: The Chairman of the Library Council shall promote the beginning and maintenance of church libraries in the churches; provide training opportunities for church librarians; maintain and develop the associational library; attend the Executive Committee meetings; cooperate with the Director of Missions and make an annual report to the Association at its annual session.

Section 12: The Baptist Youth for Christ Director shall, under the supervision of the Director of Missions, serve as chairman of Youth for Christ Committee of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

Section 13: The Parliamentarian shall, at the Annual Meeting of the Association, rule on all questions of parliamentary procedure which shall arise during the sessions. The Parliamentarian shall serve as a resource person to the churches and shall, upon request, advise and assist the churches on matters of parliamentary procedure.

Section 14: The Audiovisual Coordinator shall assist all associational leadership in the

selection, production and use of audiovisual material. Upon request, he shall provide similar assistance to individual church leaders. He shall provide opportunities for training in the production and use of audiovisuals in education, motivation and worship. The Audiovisual Coordinator shall work with the librarians in storing, cataloging and producing the use of audiovisual materials equipment. Maintenance of audiovisual equipment is the responsibility of the Audiovisual Coordinator.

Section 15: Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Executive Board, except the office of Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

#### **By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES**

Section 1: **THE ORDER OF BUSINESS AND PROGRAM COMMITTEE** shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Associational Music Director, and three other members. It shall rotate the place of meeting among the groups of churches with the host church being determined by the group. It shall recommend the preacher and the alternate for the annual session. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting for the Association, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the Annual Meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the Annual Meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary. This committee will be responsible for producing the Annual Meeting through the various new media.

##### **Section 2: The Executive Committee**

1. Shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk/Treasurer, Music Director, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMJ Director, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Chairperson of the Christian Ministry Development Committee, President of the Pastors' Conference, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, President of the Committee on Committees, Chairman of Christian Life Committee, Chairman of Membership Committee, Chairman of Finance Committee, Chairman of Evangelists, Chairman of Long Range Planning Committee, and Audiovisual Coordinator.

2. When without a Director of Missions, this committee shall work out and recommend to the Association, or its Executive Board, for election of a new Director of Missions according to By-Law VI, Section 11.

3. It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or Executive Board and act on routine or emergency matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven is necessary to transact business.

Section 3: **The Evangelism Committee**, composed of six members, shall promote the work of evangelism in the churches and the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its Executive Board.

Section 4: **The Finance Committee**, composed of six members, two rotating annually, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs of an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

The Finance Committee, may make adjustments during the year in line items or through the assignment of miscellaneous funds in Section VII of the budget provided the adjustments:

1. --will not increase the total budget.
2. --will not alter the basic purpose or intent of the budget.
3. --will have full consent of those affected (individuals, department leaders, etc.)
4. --will not exceed a total of \$1,000 during a fiscal year.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the Association, upon request, with the stewardship programs offered by the Convention.

The Committee shall express gratitude to the churches for their stewardship development that enables them to participate in local, home, and foreign missions.

A contingency fund is to be established and maintained in 1% approximate amount of one calendar quarter of the Association's operating budget. This contingency fund is to be deposited in an interest bearing account.

The funds to be disbursed should a shortfall of general funds receipts occur, resulting in a lack of funds for regular operating expense.

Any disbursement of funds from the contingency fund must be upon a recommendation of the Finance Committee and approval of the Executive Committee.

**Section 5: The Ordination Committee**, composed of five members, with the pastor of the home church (the church of which the candidate is a member), the Director of Missions, and deacons of the home and requesting churches, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

The Committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of the Minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conference at which the home voted to request examination of the candidate.

The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.

The Chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place, and procedure.

The Committee suggest that the candidate be questioned at least two weeks prior to his ordination.

The Committee shall question the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, and his personal life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.

The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the ministry.

In every session, the Chairman shall be guided by the Scriptures, especially 1 Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:6.

The Committee shall give written notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the ordination.

The Chairman shall report the Committee's activities to the Executive Board quarterly and provide a written report for the Annual Meeting.

**Section 6: The Nominating Committee**, composed of six members, shall contact and nominate the officers of the Association according to Article VI of the Constitution. The Committee shall also, in cooperation with the Nominating Committee of various departments (except the WMU and Brotherhood organizations), recommend workers for these various departments. The officers and workers of these respective organizations shall be nominated by the organization themselves and submitted to the Nominating Committee (Article VI, Section 1). They shall also nominate Associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. The Committee shall also advise the Executive Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

**Section 7: The Constitution Committee**, composed of three members, shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed.

**Section 8: The Membership Committee**, composed of five members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws. The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a full extent of Baptist faith and practice and what it means to cooperate with other churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. The Membership Committee shall annually review all churches and missions under the banners of the Association and may present them for membership within the Association or that they continue under the banners.

**Section 9: The Calendar Committee** shall be composed of the following Association of Officers: Secular School Director, Church Training Director, WMU Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director and Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an associational calendar for the coming year and present same to the annual meeting of messengers.

**Section 10: The Resolutions Committee** composed of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation, plan and promote the work of the Committee in an annual planning meeting; and present resolutions of appreciation to individuals, organizations, and churches when there are events worthy of commendation. Dedicate the annual minutes to a deserving person.

**Section 11: The Historical Committee** shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and six other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Association Meeting.

**Section 12: The Seminary Extension Committee**, composed of three members, shall publicize study courses and programs that are available; and shall plan, provide and promote Seminary Extension studies as they may be desired.

**Section 13: The Christian Life Committee**, composed of six members, will give continual attention to the moral climate of the community and shall initiate necessary action to maintain and improve the climate. The committee shall commend those persons and institutions that uphold Christian virtue, and shall support the churches in the teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness.

**Section 14: The Committee on Committees**, composed of five members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX, Section 1), and shall assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies on all standing committees covering between sessions. The committee shall also advise the Chairman of each committee.

**Section 15: The Telephone Contact Committee** shall be composed of one person from each group of churches in the Association (64). These committee members shall relay messages to pastors and key leaders during the year. All messages to be sent should be cleared with the Director of Missions.

**Section 16: The Fundraising Committee** shall prepare for and direct the evolution of the messengers. A total expenditure shall be made for each day.

**Section 17: The Christian Ministry Development Committee.**

**A. Purpose.**—The purpose of the Christian Ministry Development Committee shall be to work with the CSM Director to lead the association to address the priority ministry needs in Cleveland County, and to plan and coordinate programs of ministry to share Christ's love in meeting the spiritual, educational, emotional and physical needs.

**B. Organization.**—The Christian Ministry Development Committee shall be composed of the chairpersons of the component sub-committees. Resource personnel will be the WMU Director and/or the Mission Action Director of the W.M.U., Brotherhood Director and/or the Baptist Men's Director. The CSM Director will serve as chairman of the committee. Emergency Ministry needs not addressed in the constitution will be met at the discretion of the CSM Director after consultation with the Director of Missions.

**C. Sub-Committees**

**1. Prison Ministries.**—The Prison Ministries shall be composed of at least (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries in our local prison camp.

**2. Jail Ministries.**—The Jail Ministries shall be composed of at least (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries in our local jail.

**3. Migrant Ministries.**—The Migrant Ministries shall be composed of at least (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries among the migrant farm workers.

**4. Juvenile Court Ministries.**—The Juvenile Court Ministries shall be composed of at least (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries to the Juvenile Court personnel and church.

**5. Literacy Ministries.**—The Literacy Ministries shall be composed of at least (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the slow readers, non-readers and non-English speaking persons in developing and improving reading skills.

**6. Emergency and Relief Ministries.**—The Emergency and Relief Ministries shall be



see's activities at the Executive Board quarterly meetings.

**Section 21: The Strategy Planning Committee**, composed of five members, shall act to understand the "Priority Statements" of the Association; provide support and suggestions to the appropriate committees for implementation; and recognize personally and publicly the contributors that address themselves to, and make significant accomplishment in achieving the "Priority Statements." As a time it judges appropriate, the Committee will also report to the Association the need for further strategy planning.

**Section 22: Youth for Christ Committee**, composed of a director and six members, shall be responsible for promoting and coordinating the following activities:

1. Youth Council Sessions.
2. Quarterly sessions of Youth for Christ in local churches.
3. A Rabies Crusade for Christ every 3 to 5 years.
4. Mission Vacation Bible School and/or Backyard VBS.
5. Serve as a support group to the Associational Summer Youth Worker.
6. Any other activity which the Director of Missions and/or Executive Committee deem necessary to foster a positive Christian witness for Christ.

**Section 23: Memorials Committee**, composed of three members, will be responsible for:

1. Recognizing deceased ministers, staff, deacons, and members in an appropriate way.
2. Submitting report for inclusion in Associational Minutes.
3. Ministering to the families of associational officers, ministers and staff members when death occurs.

**Section 24: Pastoral Ministries Committee**

The Pastoral Ministries Committee shall be composed of six ministers and/or staff persons in the Association with two rotating off each year.

It shall be the duty of this committee to work with the Director of Missions in planning and promoting continuing educational opportunities for ministers and staff persons in the Association.

**Section 25: Church Survey and Extension Committee**

The Church Survey and Extension Committee shall be composed of six members and shall encourage the Association to respond to the need for new churches and the development of young congregations. It shall be the responsibility of this committee to keep abreast of the growth and development of the churchships within the Association and encourage the appropriate responses.

**Section 26: Members of all these committees, except the Christian Social Ministry Development Committee and those appointed by the moderator, shall be elected to serve not more than three years on a rotating basis.**

#### **By-Law V TRUSTEES**

The duty of the Trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other securities of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its Executive Board.

#### **By-Law VI DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS**

**Section 1:** His election shall be upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association at its Annual Meeting, or between sessions of the Association, by its Executive Board. His time of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity.

#### **By-Law VII DIRECTOR OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRY**

**Section 1: Employment**—The Director of CSM shall be jointly employed by the Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Home Missions Board. The employee should be elected to work until the sponsoring groups mutually agree to cease the

amount of service or the employee resigns. The CSM Director shall work under the supervision of the Director of Missions and in compliance with the Job Description provided by the State and Association.

**Section 3: Basic Functions**—The basic functions are to work with the CSM Committee to organize, supervise and promote a program of activities to meet the spiritual, educational, emotional and physical needs of the people within the geographical boundaries of the Association.

**Section 3:** The CSM Director shall be an ex officio member of the Associational Executive Board, Associational Executive Committee and Missions Committee without voting privileges.

**Section 4:** When without a Christian Social Ministries Director, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Christian Social Ministries Director according to By-Law VII Section 1 and 2.

#### **By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS**

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the Annual Meeting by a majority of the members present and voting.

#### **By-Law IX MEETING PROCEDURE**

**Section 1:** The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

**Section 2:** Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing, if requested by the Moderator.

**Section 3:** No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.

**Section 4:** Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.

**Section 5:** Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six Associational Groups as follows: Polkville, Lawrence, Shafter, Kings Mountain, Gravel, and Waco.

# PROCEEDINGS

October 21, 1966

Tuesday Afternoon

1. The Youth Handbell Choir of Bethel Baptist Church, under the direction of Rev. Lawton Neely, played at the messengers and visitors gathered in the First Baptist Church of Kings Mountain for the 1966 Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.
2. Moderator Wade Dellinger, pastor of Maids Memorial Baptist Church, called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. Rev. Bob Dills, Associational Music Director and Minister of Music at Shelby First Baptist Church, led in our hymn of praise, "To God Be the Glory." Mr. Mike Landrum, Minister of Youth at First Baptist, Kings Mountain, read scriptures from Philippians 2: 1-11. Rev. Eldred Grigg, pastor of Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, led the opening prayer.
3. Moderator Wade Dellinger then thanked the Kings Mountain group of churches for being our host. A special thanks went to First Baptist, Kings Mountain, for allowing us to meet in their new facilities.
4. Dr. Paul Scovello, pastor of Beaver Dam Baptist Church, then gave the Order of Business report. He reported necessary changes to the program and moved that this be our order of program. Rev. Russell Hinton, pastor of Double Shoals Baptist Church, seconded the motion and it was approved.
5. The enrollment cards were taken up at this time by the ushers.
6. The appointment of the Committee on Catechists was then read by Moderator Wade Dellinger. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
7. Rev. Jerry Randolph, pastor of Dover Baptist Church, read the proposed constitutional changes. These changes are found elsewhere in this volume. The vote on these changes will be at the Wednesday session.
8. The report from the Feasibility Study Committee for a Church Developer was given by Rev. Richard Pyler, pastor of Patterson Grove Baptist Church. This report is found elsewhere in this volume. He introduced the members of the committee: Rev. Richard Pyler — chairman, Rev. John Bridges, Dr. Joel Smith, Rev. Phil Waugh, Rev. Royce Bailey, and Dr. Bob Larch. The committee is to continue their work until all questions on this matter are answered.
9. Mr. A. L. Hardin, Jr., chairman of the Nominating Committee for the Brotherhood and a member of Patterson Springs Baptist Church, submitted the names for consideration. These are found elsewhere in this volume. Ed Seaton seconded the motion for these nominees and it was approved by a vote.
10. Rev. Bob Cline, pastor of Pleasant Ridge Baptist Church, gave the report from the Ordination Committee. This report is found elsewhere in this volume. Rev. Cline stated that the catechists do not have the right to ordain but is here to assist our churches in the ordination procedure.
11. At this point in our meeting, Rev. Billy Cooper, vice-moderator and Minister of Education at First Baptist Church, Shelby, took over the moderator's duties.
12. Dr. Wyan Washburn gave the Historical Report. This report is found elsewhere in this volume. He stated that some of our history has already been put on microfilm at the Gardner-Whitely College library. He then makes motion that our last 21 year history be put on film before the next meeting. Mr. W. H. Lutz seconded the motion and it was approved.
13. Director of Missions, Cline Borders was recognized for his report. He introduced the association staff: Mrs. Margaret Lipscomb — Office Manager, Mrs. Judy Franks — Financial Secretary, Mrs. Jane Brumley — C.S.M. Secretary, and Rev. Bob Davis, C.S.M. Director, who was unable to be with us as he was in the hospital. Mr. Borders thanked the churches for giving 72 out of 73 church letters back to our office on time. He stated that the cornerstone of the Southern Baptist Convention is the local church. He challenged us to work together for this goal to strengthen the local church. He also reported a serious matter of Sunday School enrollment declining steadily since 1960.

Assisted by Dr. Paul Sorrells, Rev. Borders shared slides and highlights of the vision churches in the Kings Mountain group. He asked members and the pastor of these churches to stand as called.

14. Rev. Bob Dills led in singing "His Name is Wonderful."
15. Vice-moderator Billy Cooper called for reports from any conference agency representatives that might be present. There were none.
16. Mr. Joe Cabaniss, clerk-treasurer, gave the attendance report. There were 388 total present with 277 of these as stewards. He then gave the Executive Board report. This report is found elsewhere in this volume. He reported that our association is in the process of renovating the lower level of our Baptist Center building. He also gave the Treasurers' Report. This is found elsewhere in this volume. Ninety-three percent of the budget was received this year which was our best year lately. Mr. Cabaniss moved that the report be adopted. Mr. Lloyd Bost seconded and it was approved.
17. Rev. Royce Bailey, pastor of Waco Baptist Church and associational Sunday School Director, gave the Sunday School Report. He stated that the Sunday School enrollment has increased for the second year in a row. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
18. Rev. Dave Gordon, pastor of New Hope Baptist Church and associational Church Training Director, gave the Church Training report. This report is found elsewhere in this volume. He stated that Church Training provides the programs and methods for Christian growth.
19. Rev. Bonnie Douglas, Minister of Education at Bowling Springs Baptist, gave a report from the Renovation Committee. She reported that we do have the \$20,000 in hand now so the plans for renovation of our lower level can be let out for bids. Rev. David Webb, pastor of Sandy Plains Baptist Church, gave a report on the seminary mission classes that are offered at our Baptist Center from Septemberers each Monday. These classes enable some of our pastors to continue their education. Rev. Webb reported 38 enrolled in the morning class and 32 in the afternoon class.
20. Rev. Bob Dills led in singing "There is a Name I Love To Hear."
21. Rev. Jesse Bailey, pastor of Macedonia Baptist Church, gave the Strategic Planning Committee report. This report is found elsewhere in this volume. He reported that project #6 was ready for action. The report is that a Task Force is to be formed to educate the churches and encourage their participation in the SBC Annuity Program. He moved that this be adopted. Rev. Alton Martin seconded and it was approved. Garland Hendricks then came to speak on the motion for explanation. This was voted on and approved.
22. Rev. Russell Fitts, pastor of Zion Baptist Church, then gave the Membership report. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.
23. Vice-Moderator Billy Cooper called for any announcements and there were none.
24. Rev. Bob Dills led the congregation in singing "Blessed Like a Shepherd Lead Us."
25. Special music was then presented by Rev. Bob Dills and James Byrd who is a member of First Baptist Shelby and a senior at Gardner-Webb College. They sang "Amazing Grace" accompanied by Mrs. Beth Hamrick on the piano.
26. Dr. Wade Dellinger presented the moderator's message. He read scriptures from Acts chapter 1. "The Mission of the Church" was the title of his message. He pointed out that the mission of the church is to be in our proper place and proper state of mind and once we have found the lost that we need to be responsible for and to them. He stated that we must come together in power and purpose so that God will bless His people and His church and their work here on earth.
27. Rev. Joel Jenkins, our host pastor, gave directions and thanks for our evening meal. We then adjourned until 6:45 p.m. Joe Cabaniss gave an up-date on our enrollment as being 314 total.

32. Moderator Wade Dellinger asked for all those who did not fill out an envelope card this afternoon to do so at this time. The others took them up.
33. Miss Dolores White was asked to give directions on how to get to Macedonia Baptist Church for the Wednesday morning session.
34. A warm welcome was extended to new ministers and staff members from our Director of Missions, Clive Borders. Those included: Rev. Eddie Grigg, pastor of Pleasant Hill; Rev. Buddy Corbin, pastor of Boiling Springs; Rev. & Mrs. Cecil Buff, pastor of Norman's Grove; Rev. & Mrs. David Webb, pastor of Sandy Plains; Mr. Steve Harrill, Minister of Music/Adult Education at Waverly; Rev. & Mrs. Ross Canfield, pastor of Oak Grove; Mrs. Beth Heffron, Music Director at Dover; Mr. Larry Zaky, associate pastor of Pleasant Ridge; and Rev. Scott Smith, pastor of New Camp Creek.
35. Rev. Clive Borders, on behalf of Rev. Bob Davis who is in the hospital, presented the Christian Social Ministries report. He introduced Mrs. Jane Broadie and Rev. Stan Webb who assisted him with the report. (1) Mrs. Broadie presented a report on the Emergency and Relief ministry and explained how the system works. She gave statistical information which can be found elsewhere in this volume in the CSM report. (2) Rev. Webb presented a report from the Substance Abuse Committee and announced a Substance Abuse Workshop to be held in November. (3) Mr. Borders highlighted several ministries from Mr. Davis' report. A copy of this report is found elsewhere in this volume.
36. Dr. Dellinger asked the congregation to stand in appreciation for Bob and led in prayer for his recovery.
37. Mrs. Donna Tidwell, Chairman of the Finance Committee, was recognized for the presentation of the 1986-87 budget. Mrs. Tidwell expressed appreciation to the members of the committee for their support in the budget preparation. She called attention to the new format and to those items which either increased or decreased from last year. Mrs. Tidwell moved that the budget be adopted and Rev. Paul Wall seconded the motion. The motion carried. This budget is found elsewhere in this volume.

63. Mr. Carlos Young was recognized on behalf of the Baptist Hospital. He reported that an expansion program is going on at the Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem. His night's commended the hospital as a caring institution.
64. Mr. J.Y. Roper was recognized for this being his 46th annual morning.
65. Dr. Garland Hendricks was recognized to introduce our guest speaker, Dr. Christopher White, president of Gardner-Webb College.
66. Rev. Bob Dills introduced Miss Dana Bachan, Minister of Music and Youth/Children Director at Parkerson Springs Baptist Church, who sang, "There is a Savior," accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Tazene Schofield.
67. Dr. Christopher White came at this time to present the morning message. The subject of his message was "Christian Higher Education" and its text was taken from Hebrews 12:1-2. He discussed the difficulties and successes of private colleges. He encouraged support of our Baptist colleges and also expressed appreciation to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association for founding and supporting the college.
68. Rev. Rochelle Ingle, pastor of Peach Street Baptist Church, pronounced benediction of the 116th session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

## 1986 ANNUAL REPORT DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

This has been a fruitful and exciting year for the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. We have experienced growth in the joint ministry of our seventy-three churches and one mission.

I have kept a record of my activities for the year. I began this process as a means of determining how my time was being spent. This record has served that purpose.

I am most grateful for the opportunities churches provide me to serve them at points of need. It is my prayer that the service we render will enhance opportunities of service.

Last year Christopher Road Mission was a struggling dream. We hoped to buy a lot. We prayed that we might secure adequate space for learning and worship. Today the mission owns 1.3 acres of land. A mobile unit was added for educational space. Construction is under way for the first unit, a 90' x 40' building. The Baptist Men of North Carolina, under the leadership of David Langford, brotherhood director for the state, promised us to volunteer labor to build the first unit.

The Christopher Road Advisory Committee felt they could raise the money for the material. I am very pleased to report both are working beautifully. We have had more volunteers than we could utilize. We currently have \$23,813.11 in the Christopher Road Building Fund and some bills have been paid. It is a miracle the way all this has come together! The mission congregation should be in the new unit before Christmas. Praise the Lord!

The Renovation Committee, under the leadership of Rev. Jeff Brendle, has completed plans for the completion of the basement. The association has approved these plans as well as the financial plan. The Special Gifts Committee is doing a superb job in soliciting funds for this project. Funds are now in hand that will enable the Renovation Committee to seek bids. If these come in under the limitations, then construction will begin after January 1, 1987. The completion of the basement will make this part of our office so much more serviceable. We look forward to its completion.

A committee was appointed to study the possibility of another staff person at the associational level. The committee, under the leadership of Rev. Richard Pyle, has been meeting and compiling information and assessing needs. A progress report will be made in our Annual Meeting.

Money talks. If this is true, you will rejoice in the growing financial strength of our joint ministry. This past church year receipts came to 91% of the projected budget for a record total of \$142,594.42. This is a 10% increase over last year.

More and more churches are reaching toward the goal of giving 4% of their budget dollar to associational missions. Some have adopted a program of increasing each year until they reach the 4% level. The growing participation in missions right here in Cleveland County is a great encouragement to your staff.


The Baptist State Convention offered our churches a team of four college students for the summer. With the assistance of our Finance Committee, and Gardner-Webb College who provided housing at a very modest rate, we were able to work it out. James Langley, Charles Cox, Delores Carr, and Susan Beck who came to be known as the "A" Team did a tremendous work. They worked anywhere and everywhere they were asked to serve. In their wake they left a spiritual impact, confidence in Christian college kids, and a love that will linger on in the lives of those they touched.

Cecilia Long has been our Associational Summer Worker for three years. Cecilia will be completing her last year at Southwestern this school year. Our churches, children and youth will remember Cecilia. She was a blessing to us. Along with her own responsibilities this past summer, she assisted the "A" Team and became a real support person to them. Cecilia has chosen not to be with us next year as she has plans for other endeavors. We wish her God's richest blessings and have real gratitude for the blessing she has been to our churches and the associational staff.

When I became Director of Missions for the Kings Mountain Baptist Association, I had dreams that were far reaching but my dreams have been exceeded. This came true because the people who constitute this association of churches had dreams also. Together with shared dreams and goals the Lord has worked mightily among us and we praise Him for who He is and what He has done.



**1985-86 ANNUAL REPORT  
CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRY DEPARTMENT  
KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION**

The Christian Development Committee has functioned for one year now and has done quite well. Many of our ministries have been expanded and activities have increased. I have been pleased with the progressive involvement of new folk in positions of leadership in our ministries.

Our number of times that volunteers have participated is overwhelming. I am so grateful for the ongoing tremendous response of the members of our seventy-three churches as they continually respond positively to ministry opportunities throughout Cleveland County.

Our good news of sharing His love is illustrated in the reports of ministry listed below.

- I. **Prison Ministry:** We have four basic programs at the State Prison Camp on Kemper Road. 1) Volunteers conduct worship services every other Tuesday evening. We have averaged four volunteers for each service and twenty-one inmates. Twenty-seven church groups have assisted by providing refreshments. 2) We have Bible study weekly on Thursdays and recently have had Bible Study on Mondays, also. Four volunteers have been involved in this ministry. Average attendance from the inmate population has been fourteen. 3) We were able to provide the one hundred sixty-five inmates at the prison camp with a gift packet at Christmas time. Twenty-three church groups/individuals participated by either giving gifts or money. Seven volunteers from three different churches processed the items into gift bags. 4) We began a new element of ministry this year. On Sundays during family visitation—one Sunday a month, we provided light refreshments for the inmate and his family during the time of visitation. In May we also took polaroid family pictures to give to the inmate. Six churches were involved in this ministry, which began in regularity toward the end of the year. Six volunteers have participated.

- II. **Jail Ministry:** This year we were only able to have one camping experience with our Juvenile Court youth. We had eleven youth to go and eight volunteers. Everyone enjoyed the weekend at South Mountain Baptist Camp. The weather was good and most were able to enjoy the hike up South Mountain.

In January 1986, nineteen juveniles and four adults participated in the Final Step Program at Western Correctional Facility. Meals and transportation were furnished for those attending.

We also helped to sponsor a camping trip in August for the youth at the Lutheran Group Home.

Thirteen church groups participated by providing Health Care Kits and health care items.

- XII. Winter Night Shelter:** Last year we participated in cooperation with other churches in Shelby in the Winter Night Shelter for the homeless and transient people of Cleveland County. The shelter was held at two of our churches, Shelby First and Bethel. I appreciate the leadership of these churches in hosting the shelter for two months. I do not have volunteer statistics on this ministry, but am aware of several of our members who participated. The shelter this winter will open on November 2nd. Volunteers are needed to help with this ministry.

- XIII. Substance Abuse Ministry:** This committee has met several times. They completed a survey of the churches and are currently working on a "fact sheet" on substance abuse in Cleveland County. This will be made available to church leadership. This committee will provide the program for the November Pastors Conference.

A brochure listing substance abuse resources people of Cleveland County has been prepared and will be made available to church leadership.

The committee has worked hard to develop a Substance Abuse Awareness

Workshop which will be held on November 17th at 7:00 p.m. at Elizabeth Baptist Church.

The Ministry Development Committee has worked exceedingly well this year. I appreciate those who have functioned so effectively to make ministry meaningful in Cleveland County.

## EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT 1986

Three regular meetings of the Executive Board were held during the past year. Our meetings were held on Monday evenings after the third Sunday during the months of January, April, and July, 1986. Our church hosts for the meetings were: January — Second Baptist, Shelby; April — Pleasant Ridge; July — Pleasant Hill.

At each meeting new pastors having moved to serve churches in our association were presented and welcomed.

Various committee reports were presented at each meeting, also reports of our Director of Missions and Director of Christian Social Ministries. Financial reports of the Association were presented.

Our Executive Board approved a recommendation of our Executive Committee and our Mission Committee that our moderator be directed to appoint a committee to study the feasibility of pursuing an associational church development director. Our Executive Board also approved the moderator appointing a committee to prepare plans and secure cost estimates for the completion of the interior of the lower level of our association building. The Executive Committee approved the recommendation of our renovations committee that plans for the renovation of the lower level of our association building be prepared by the architectural firm of Talley and Associates at a cost not to exceed \$1,500. The renovations committee was authorized to proceed with the renovations if the total cost estimates were within ten percent of a projected cost of \$20,000. The approval was also subject to our Special Gifts Committee securing an amount of \$20,000 prior to submitting plans for bids. Approval was also granted our trustees to secure a loan to complete the project, again within the guidelines of ten percent leeway of the \$20,000 projected cost.

### CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE REPORT CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS CHANGES PROPOSED BY THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE (Effective 1986-87)

#### CONSTITUTION ARTICLE IX COMMITTEES

**Proposed Changes:** Add the following existing committees to Article IX Committees. Under paragraph A, (following the number 10), add:

19. Memorial Committee
20. Youth For Christ
21. Pastoral Ministries Committee
22. Church Survey and Extension Committee
23. Any other committee authorized by the association.

#### BY-LAWS BY-LAW IV, SECTION 4

**Present Reading:** Section 4: (Paragraph 1): The Finance Committee may make adjustments during the year (not to exceed \$1,000) in line items of the budget providing the adjustments:

1. -- will not increase the total for a section.
2. -- will not alter the basic purpose or intent of the budget.
3. -- will have full consent of those affected (individuals, department leaders, etc.)

**Proposed Changes:** Section 4: (Paragraph 2): The Finance Committee may make adjustments during the year in line items or through the assignment of miscellaneous funds in Section VII of the budget providing the adjustments:

1. -- will not increase the total budget.
2. -- will not alter the basic purpose or intent of the budget.
3. -- will have full consent of those affected (individuals, department leaders, etc.)
4. -- will not exceed a total of \$5,000 during a fiscal year.

**Present Reading:** Section 9: (Second sentence): This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an associational calendar for the coming year and present same to the

Executive Board for adoption.

**Proposed Reading:** Section 9 (Second sentence): This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an associational calendar for the coming year and present same to the annual meeting of messengers.

**Present Reading:** Section 16: The Resolutions Committee composed of three members, shall draw up and present to the association resolutions of appreciation, plan and promote the work of the committee in an annual planning meeting, and present resolutions of appreciation to individuals, organizations, and churches when there are events worthy of commendation.

**Proposed Reading:** Section 19: Add the following sentence: Dedicate the annual calendar to a deserving person.

**Present Reading:** Section 17 C) ... shall be composed of (3) three members ...

**Proposed Reading:** Section 17 C) ... shall be composed of at least (3) three members ...  
(This addition to be made to each of the two committees)

**Present Reading:** Section 26: Members of all these committees, except those appointed by the Moderator, shall be elected to serve not more than three years on a rotating basis.

**Proposed Reading:** Section 26: Members of all committees, except the **Christian Social Mission Development Committee** and those appointed by the moderator, shall be elected to serve not more than three years on a rotating basis.

## HISTORIANS REPORT

For the new church year we hope to bring microfilming of our associational and church records up to date.

Some of you may recall that in 1960 we microfilmed the first 110 years of history of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association and all its churches. We were fortunate to have a photographer come from the Historical Commission of the Baptist Sunday School Board in Nashville, Tennessee to do this work for us. She brought cameras and all the work was done in the Gardner-Webb College Library. Copies were sent to Nashville, to Gardner-Webb, to Wake Forest and one remained with the Historian.

We are now making preparations to microfilm all the records which have accumulated the past 25 years, 1961 to 1985, and when completed we will probably have the most history on film of any association in the state.

Recently I have had conferences with Mr. Lynn May of the History Commission in Nashville and with Mr. John Woodard, Director of the Baptist Collection at the Wake Forest University Library in Winston-Salem. They have given me counsel and advice on how the History Committee of our association can get it done.

First, let us review some of the reasons why it ought to be done:

1. Paper records in books, notebooks or files can be lost or be burned in a fire or simply deteriorate and be of no value. Microfilm is more permanent. A negative can be kept secure from which copies can be made.
2. Researchers or historians can readily use the records. They can be reading tools in the work of the church or for ministers and students.

Now how can we microfilm 25 years of records? The association might buy the equipment and hire a photographer. Even one of the larger churches might do that, but I feel it would be too expensive to do it that way.

In outline, I recommend the following plan, with some of the details to be worked out as we go along:

1. Use the Baptist Center in Shelby as a collection point, and during the next associational year send our records to Mr. John Woodard of the Baptist Collection at Winston-Salem. This will include ALL the records of NEW churches, constructed since 1960, and records of older churches which have accumulated since then.
2. The records will be put in safe containers, and will be taken by a dependable person or insured carrier and delivered to the photographer. The records will be inventoried and

- accounted for both going and coming. Receipts will be made.
3. Historians or church clerks will be the contact persons for this task. The decision to microfilm should be approved by the church or appropriate body as deacons or trustees.
4. THE COST? Nothing for microfilming, but there might be a minimal fee if records are sent by carrier.
5. How long will the records be away? John Woodard estimates two to three weeks, depending on the volume and on how many records come from other associations.
6. What records should be microfilmed?
  - A. Church minutes, with dates, chronological
  - B. Board records, deacons, trustees, church council, WMI, Brotherhood, etc.
  - C. Other church records: the covenant, articles of faith, budgets, bulletins, committees, by-laws, correspondence, membership rolls, letters received or granted, resolutions, reports to the association, biographies, building plans, censuses, deeds, maps, clippings, memorials, special events, photographs, scrapbooks, yearbooks, financial records, vacation Bible School records.
7. All written records of any church organization or society.
8. Movies or tape recordings of special events.

Brother Moderator, I moved the adoption of this report and that the Association approve the project to microfilm a 25-year span of our records as outlined.

## LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

About half of our churches report libraries. I have been talking to some of the folk at Christopher Road Mission about including a place for a library as they build, if not a room, then a cabinet.

Why have a church library? Or what is the purpose of the media-library? To elect teachers and other leaders in the church and not furnish them with adequate materials to do the job is like asking them to make brick without cream. Not many teachers or leaders can afford to buy their own commentaries or Bible dictionaries. But when the church furnishes these expensive books and places them in a central location where all teachers can have access to them, then they will sometimes use them and do a better job informing, instructing and inspiring.

This notice I'm wearing a yellow button which says "IMPACT 90". I attended Library Week at Ridgecrest August 17-23 and the theme of the conference was "IMPACT 90". They explained that the last decade of the 20th century is coming up soon and we want to get ready to make an impact for Christ during the last 10 years of this century and we have 1 year to get prepared for it.

When I got home I was telling our moderator about the fantastic sale of audio-visual equipment at Ridgecrest and that some church leaders in this association might like to take advantage of it in future years. He said yes include that in your report to the association. They had projectors, screens, over-head projectors, opaque projectors, cassettes, head phones. They had each item priced and they said it was one-half what they had paid for it and that they had gotten it at a discount. They can't 1 year, and sell at the end of the semester to the highest bidder using sealed bids.

I bid on a good looking cassette player, but not quite as much as someone else. So much for this year's sale.

For several years I heard much talk of Tunes. I said what is it and how does it work. I'm happy to say we now have the associational media organization operating here pretty well. We meet four times a year, usually the 2nd Thursday night in November, February, May and August. But when there is a conflict like the Baptist State Convention next month we move it a week. Our November meeting will be November 4th, the same day as the election. We will be meeting at 7 P.M. in the Gardner-Wohl Library. Mrs. Marie Wellman, who is one of the college librarians will have the program. If your church librarian can't come, then you come. We welcome any interested person.

One reason I like to attend Library Week at Ridgecrest is they always give us a list of new

books. Miss Jacqueline Anderson is a strict reviewer and anything she passes on is excellent. We had classes on "Meeting the Needs of Senior Adults, Meeting the Needs of Young Families, Youth, and the Unreached/Unsaved." Each teacher gave a list of 25 or 30 books. I got home with 29 pages of titles of new books. The associational office has made 40 copies. If your librarian is not here to get a copy for your church you may take one if you promise to get it to your church librarian.

I am available to come to your church and help you with your media center. I have \$200 travel expense available. I want to serve you. Call on me.

We come today in honor of our Saviour Jesus Christ and in memory of those who have departed this association in the past year. As we look at the members, we are aware that they represent individuals. Hopefully, all of these were active and faithful in our local churches. But most of all, it is our prayer that they were Christians. I am reminded of a story told about John Wesley, the great preacher. A speaker once related that John Wesley had dreamed he saw a great throng entering hell, and he asked whether any Methodists were among them. "Yes," he was told, "plenty of them." And Baptists? Yes. And Presbyterians. Yes. Then in his dream, he was suddenly at the gate of heaven, and curiously asked the porter who was inside. Methodists? Not one! Presbyterians? No! Baptists? Not Catholic? No! "Then who are inside?" he asked. "Only Christians" was the reply.

We need to learn today that only those who accept and follow Christ daily will go to heaven. We need to be busy and active in our Lord's work. The list today includes a total of 245. There are three pastors, Rev. Fred Wells, Rev. Howard Cook, and Rev. Fred Knapp, six deacons, and 229 laymen on the list. Union Baptist Church has been his hard this year with those passing on to meet Jesus. The ages show a wide range, some in their eighties and yet one who was only 12 years old. As Carla Carpenter sat in her hospital room in Durham, she told me she had four wishes. You would expect one to be that she would not die, but she had faith in God and in Duke Hospital. Even in the mist of death, I saw God working on this little life. Her four wishes were: 1 - to get to come home, 2 - to get to go back to school even for one day, 3 - to accept the Lord as Saviour, and 4 - to be baptized. I saw each of these wishes become a reality. I remember her calling me up and crying to the study and there prayed the seniors prayer. I saw God grant her enough time for her soul to grow back in order to be baptized even though the doctors said she wouldn't have that much time. To tell you about Carla is to reflect back this year as to others you have known in your church who have gone to be with the Lord. Even though Carla was the member with the shortest time as a member of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association, we will miss her and you miss those who have left your membership this past year.

I was asked one time after a memorial service if I really believed in the resurrection of the dead. One member of the family said if I believed in the resurrection that I was a bigger fool than he thought. My mind reflects back to a story I once heard. A young man while preaching the Gospel in an open air meeting heard this sarcastic remark: "Poor fellow, he's cracked." "Yes," he replied quickly, "thank God, that is where the Light shone in." I replied to the man that day, if I am a fool for believing the Gospel in regard to the resurrection, then count me a fool for Christ.

Let us work everyday for the Lord Jesus and may He find us working for the greatest cause on earth, the cause of Jesus Christ. Let us keep our faith and look forward to the day when we shall be again with those who have accepted the Lord as Saviour.

## STRATEGY PLANNING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Strategy Planning Committee did not meet as frequently this year as it did last year. In fact, the Committee met only once. In that meeting it was decided that the focus this year should be on working to implement studies of the eight projects mentioned in the report last year.

These projects were as follows:

1. A seasonal ministry at the Cleveland Mall.
2. A ministry to the students at Cleveland Tech.
3. Utilization of the talents and witness of the members of the Fellowship of Christian Artists in our churches.
4. A van to be used in the various outreach ministries of our association.
5. An additional member of the associational staff to serve as a Church Development Specialist.
6. Encourage churches to provide better retirement coverage for pastors and staff members.
7. Encourage our various organizational leaders to better utilize the time given them at the quarterly Executive Board meetings.
8. Encourage the Evangelists Committee, after the Good News America Campaign, to start planning another association-wide evangelistic effort.

These projects were all presented to the Executive Committee of the Association, which in turn assigned them to various individuals and committees for feasibility studies. Progress reports were made at the last meeting of the Executive Committee on September 28, 1988.

At this point, only project number six (6) is ready for action. The others are in various stages of study. The project ready for action is the suggestion that a Task Force be formed to educate churches and their staff members and encourage their adequate participation in the Southern Baptist Convention Annuity Program.

In compliance with the recommendations of the Executive Committee, the Strategy Planning Committee recommends that a Task Force be formed as outlined below:

The Committee recommends that a Task Force of at least three people be formed in order to encourage churches to provide adequate retirement and insurance protection for their pastors and staff.

**PERSONNEL:** The Task Force should be a mixed group: either a pastor and two members of the laity; or an all-laity group composed of two laymen and a woman. The latter is preferred.

**FUNCTION:** The Task Force will:

1. Advise their availability and function to all the churches.
2. Meet with Finance Committees, Deacons, and/or other pertinent groups in the local churches at the group's request. Also speak to the congregation at the church's request.
3. Instruct Clerks and Treasurers in the proper manner of making applications and sending payments.
4. Be available to counsel Search Committees, new pastors, and those just entering the ministry about the importance of adequate retirement and insurance coverage.
5. Try to visit the appropriate leaders in each church each year.
6. Vigorously promote and explain the new annuity program that begins January 1, 1989.
7. Make a report each quarter to the Executive Board and annually to the Association.
8. Place articles periodically in the Associational newsletter.
9. Send special mailings when needed.
10. Be able to inform churches, pastors and staff accurately concerning the rules and laws of Social Security.
11. Present a budget request to the Finance Committee of the Association each year for expense money.

**MANNER OF SELECTION:** To be nominated to, and elected by, the Association as provided by the Constitution.

## THE FEASIBILITY STUDY COMMITTEE FOR CHURCH DEVELOPER ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT

In our meeting on Thursday, October 9, 1986 the Feasibility Study Committee for Church Developer finalized and unanimously approved the following report to be presented at the One Hundred Thirty Sixth annual session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

On January 26, 1985 the Executive Board appointed a Church Development Director Feasibility Committee to "... study the feasibility of pursuing an associational Church Development Director." Later in the minutes it was stated, within parentheses, that, "This person would serve as an associational R.E. director. He would be available to assist churches in their organizational, outreach, and stewardship programs."

The committee is composed of Rev. Richard Pyle, Pastor of Paterson Grove Baptist Church, Kings Mountain, Chairman; Rev. John Bridges, Pastor of the Lawndale Baptist Church; Rev. Phil Waugh, Pastor of First Baptist Church in Graver; Dr. Joel Jenkins, Pastor of the First Baptist Church in Kings Mountain; Rev. Royce Ballou, Pastor of the Waco Baptist Church; and Dr. Bob Lamb, professor of religious education at Gardner-Webb College. What follows is a progress report.

Since receiving its assignment in January, your committee has investigated this position extensively and has met seven times for discussion of all materials received. We have discovered that other associations are using such staff persons effectively as consultants to their churches and as staff assistants to the elected associational program directors who assist churches in disciplinary development, outreach, stewardship, and in enhancement of existing educational programs. Church Development Directors are serving in the New River, Gaston, Buncombe, Mocklinburg, and New South River associations. The pastors in these associations which we have contacted are delighted with this approach. Pike Mountain association is also in the process of securing a C.D.D.

Evidence is unavailable to support the idea that the association needs a person whose major tasks would be to start churches or to serve for extended periods of time as a minister of education in specific churches. As Dr. James Williams, Associate to the President of the Sunday School Board, wrote July 28, 1986, "The idea of a roving church growth specialist who would serve as an RE worker in a church for a short time has not yet caught on. There are built-in limitations to this approach."

However, in our research, we have discovered many positive things in the term Church Development Director. It is a much broader concept than we initially realized. We see a person with this particular job title as able to

- (1) relate to our pastors, staff members, and our church organizational leaders,
- (2) serve as a consultant and resource person in our associational concerns (Sunday School, Church Training, Women's Ministry Union, Brotherhood, Evangelism, Secretary Extension, Christian Life, Recreation and Drama, Strategic Planning, Youth for Christ, and Church Survey and Extension),
- (3) serve as a catalyst for the leadership in our churches as well as an encourager for our work,
- (4) suggest good tools for churches and our staff, both volunteer and professional, and help to use them, and
- (5) relate to denominational educational agencies.

The means by which such a person could serve would include

- (1) consultation with pastors and other church leaders as requested,
- (2) provision of leadership training,
- (3) recommendation of resources,
- (4) assistance to associational committee chairmen, and
- (5) maintaining flow of communication with our churches

THIS IS A PROGRESS REPORT. While such a person would undoubtedly be useful to the churches of our association, there are still questions to be answered before our committee can complete its work. We continue to solicit your wisdom in assisting us in finishing our task.

## REPORT ON CHRISTOPHER ROAD BAPTIST MISSION (as of October 21, 1986)

Acting on faith and counting on the support pledged by the Advisory Committee of the Cape Mountain Baptist Association, the Christopher Road Baptist Mission has begun a 1,000 square foot building to be used as its base in reaching the lost and underserved in that part of Cleveland County.

1. Volunteer contractors Colton Hamrick and J.R. Withler saw that footings, a foundation, rough plumbing, and a slab were completed by the middle of September.

2. During the week of September 28th, approximately 30 volunteers from Canton, N.C. mended the walls and put on the roof and roofing so that the building was "in the dry".

3. On October 11th, 10 volunteer electricians from Charlotte and Cleveland County put in all the rough wiring.

4. Also on October 11th, approximately 25 or 30 volunteers from Cleveland County began the brick work, and they plan to continue it each Saturday until it is complete.

5. During the week of October 18th, heating and air conditioning ducts were installed, insulation was put in the walls, and more plumbing was done.

6. During the week of October 20th, (this week) there will be anywhere from 25 to 30 volunteers from Spruce Pine putting up sheek rock and doing any other work that comes to hand.

7. When the time comes, we will have volunteers from Cleveland County doing trim work, volunteers from Eden, N.C. painting, and volunteers from Cleveland County laying carpet.

8. Volunteers from W.M.U. organizations from all over Cleveland County have arranged to feed volunteer workmen.

9. We must pay for all materials and some specialized labor even though most of our labor is provided by volunteers. It is now apparent that we will need at least \$80,000 in cash money to complete this job. As of last week, the building fund has received \$48,551.97 from individuals and churches all over Cleveland County.

10. The Lord is performing a miracle in our midst. He is using many churches and many, many people from all over our county and state "His wonder to perform".
