By recommendation of the Resolutions Committee at the Tuesday afternoon session of the annual meeting, the 1988 Minutes of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association are dedicated to the memory of Rev. J. Edgar Bishop.



## IN MEMORIAM

J. Edgar Bishop was born in Calverton, North Carolina on August 26, 1916, to Marie Morgan Bishop and George Self Bishop.

He attended public school at Calverton, and due to the Christian influence of his Mother and Grandfather, Philip Morgan, he was saved and baptized in the fellowship of Love Dale Baptist Church at Wilhite, North Carolina.

On September 26, 1936, Edgar married Gerrie B. Delfs, who was very supportive and helpful in his church work. To this union was born two sons, Harold of Mooresboro, and Hayes of Charlotte. They also have two great-grandchildren.

Edgar was ordained to the gospel ministry in 1939 by the Speedwell Baptist Church in Jackson County and pastored Trout Creek, East-La-Pont, Clark Hill, and East Sylva Baptist Churches in a bi-vocational capacity while working in the maintenance department of Mead Paper Corporation in Sylva, N.C.

In 1946, he moved to Cleveland County to further his education at Gardner-Webb College. While a student at Gardner-Webb, Trinity and Mt. Pleasant Baptist Churches in the Sandy Run Association called him as pastor in 1947. He served these churches until 1956 when New Prospect in the Kings Mountain Association called him as pastor, where he served until 1962. Poplar Springs, also in the Kings Mountain Association, called him as pastor in 1962. He served there until 1979 and was pleased to be a member of that great fellowship until his death on June 9, 1988.

After his retirement from Mt. Pleasant (second time as their pastor) in 1979, he served several churches in this area as supply and interim making a total of about forty-nine (49) years in the ministry.

It has been my privilege to be associated with Brother Bishop as a fellow pastor and more recently as a fellow church member. I can truthfully say that I have never known a person who manifested a more Christianlike attitude and spirit than Edgar Bishop. He was greatly loved by the people wherever he served. I know from experience that he did a monumental work as pastor of the Poplar Springs Baptist Church. And the beautiful building there is a monument to his leadership. Truly it can be said of Edgar, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant".

## A Brief History Of Patterson Springs Baptist Church

The Patterson Station Baptist Church, which is now the Patterson Springs Baptist Church, was organized on October 28, 1899 at the old Ellis School House in what is now the Eastern section of the Patterson Springs Community. The infant organization was begun as a mission under the direction of the Elizabeth Baptist Church and met, when the season permitted, in a brush arbor not far from the school house. The thirty-five charter members which constituted the church brought their membership from the neighboring churches: New Hope, Pleasant Hill, and Elizabeth. Services were held once a month, led by the first pastor, F.R. Ham.

The first church building was constructed about 1897 and dedicated in 1894. The second sanctuary was erected in 1923 and dedicated in 1926.

The church went from quarter-time to half-time preaching in 1930. In May, 1951, the church voted to begin a full-time program and called W.T. Robinson as its first full-time pastor. A parsonage was built that same year.

An educational building was constructed in 1956-57. In March 1962, the church voted to construct the present sanctuary. However, construction began March 1967 due to rising plans to cope with the rapidly rising cost of construction and the need to provide for the increasing population of the community. The first service, a Service of Dedication, was held March 1968.

The Christian Fellowship Growth Center was completed in 1986. This multi-purpose building includes a kitchen, Sunday School space, a parlor, a basketball court, and a ball basement to be developed into ministry space at a later time.

In January, 1989, the church began to implement the Deacon Family Ministry Plan. Through this ministry the church is seeking to demonstrate its care and concern for its members.

Dr. Hugh Richardson serves as pastor and Mrs. Dana Barker Jenkins as Music Director and Youth/Childrens Director. The current church membership is 208.



## A Brief History Of Pleasant Hill Baptist Church

In 1850 the Zion Baptist Church of Shelby, North Carolina, extended an arm to the Pleasant Hill Community, and on February 3, 1851, Pleasant Hill Baptist Church was constituted with twenty-nine charter members. Elder George W. Rollins was the first pastor of the church serving from 1851-1855. Pleasant Hill was one of the fourteen original churches to request disaffiliation from the South River Baptist Association to form the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

The present facilities consist of a 9,720 sq. ft. Educational Building built in 1955; the Sanatory and adjoining areas consist of another 4,350 sq. ft. and was built during 1974 and 1975. The building, cemetery, and parking lots are located on a 3.25 acre tract on the Pleasant Hill Church Road, Route 1, Groves, North Carolina.

In the 138 year history of Pleasant Hill, the church has experienced thirty-eight pastors, baptized 1,250 people, ordained Wray Barrett into the Gospel Ministry on April 24, 1933, and licensed Frank "Buck" Morehead into the Gospel Ministry on November 1, 1987. The current membership of the church is 335.

Reverend Eldon G. Grigg is currently serving as pastor. He is a graduate of Gardner-Webb College and Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, and in 1986 was given the distinguished honor of having his biography appear in The Official Register of Outstanding Americans, Special Editors of Southern Baptist Leaders.

## CONSTITUTION

### PREAMBLE

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

### ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this body shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

### ARTICLE II PURPOSE

Under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, this association of churches seeks to further its Kingdom through the following:

- (1) the fostering of fellowship and cooperation among the member churches;
- (2) the ministering of spiritual and physical needs of people;
- (3) the giving and receiving of information, assistance and training for member churches;
- (4) the cooperation with North Carolina Baptist State and Southern Baptist Conventions.

### ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches in its area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Membership Commission. Application should include:

1. Formal action by the group seeking admission reflecting that 75% of those voting to present their intent to cooperate.
2. A written statement reflecting their beliefs and practices.
3. A written statement that expresses their intent to cooperate.
4. A willingness to meet with Membership Commission to discuss other items of mutual interest to both parties.

The Membership Commission should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist belief and practice and what it means to cooperate with the churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. If recommended by this committee and accepted by the Association, a mission or a church shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a minimum of one year. Membership within the Association shall be determined by vote of the Association at its annual meeting. Churches under the watchcare shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its constitution and by-laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and if requested, the Associational Executive Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like associations.

### ARTICLE IV MEETINGS

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or Executive Board, provided two weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 3: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each fifty members of the church, provided each church shall not have less than three nor more than ten messengers. ALONG WITH ALL ASSOCIATIONAL OFFICERS, these shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of the messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those in attendance and registering at the Associational Meeting.

## ARTICLE V AUTHORITY

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this Constitution in Article III, Sections 2 and 3.

## ARTICLE VI OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTIONS

Section 1: The officers of the association shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Chairman of the Library Council, Parliamentarian, and Association Coordinator.

Proposed Change—Section 2: The Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee. The floor will then be open for additional nominations. This election will occur on the last day of the annual meeting. All other officers shall be contacted and nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Associational Executive Board at their April meeting.

Section 3: The newly elected Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer shall assume at the close of the annual session all duties incumbent upon them relating to work of the ensuing associational year. All other officers shall assume all duties incumbent upon them relating to the work of the ensuing year on October 1.

Section 4: Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for reelection for two years.

## ARTICLE VII TRUSTEES AND THEIR ELECTION

There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

## ARTICLE VIII THE ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Associational Executive Board shall be composed of all Associational officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Associational Director of Missions, the Church & Community Development Director (no-office without voting privileges), each active pastor, two members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The Associational Executive Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the Constitution. Associational Executive Board members are the connecting link between the Association and the churches. Executive Board members should represent the churches to the Association. Executive Board members should act as representatives for the Association to the churches. It is the responsibility of the Executive Board members to promote the programs, represent the needs and report to the churches concerning the work and ministry of the Association. Executive Board members should seek acceptable means of representing the Association to their respective fellowships. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association in its Annual Meeting.

The quarterly meetings will be in January, April and July, on Monday after the third Sunday.

## ARTICLE IX COMMITTEES

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through the following annual meeting.

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the Annual Meeting:

1. Order of Business and Program Committee (By-Law IV, Section 1)
2. Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
3. Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)

4. Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)
5. Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
6. Nominating Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
7. Constitution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
8. Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
9. Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
10. Resolutions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
11. Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
12. Seminary Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
13. Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
14. Church & Community Development Committee (By-Law IV, Section 17)
15. The Family Ministry Committee (By-Law IV, Section 18)
16. Mission Committee (By-Law IV, Section 19)
17. Recreation and Drama Committee (By-Law IV, Section 20)
18. Strategy Planning Committee (By-Law IV, Section 21)

8. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting: Committee on Committees (By-Law IV, Section 14).

Section 2: The following committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at least sixty days prior to the Annual Meeting to serve during the Annual Meeting: Enrollment Committee (By-Law IV, Section 15).

## **ARTICLE X AMENDMENTS**

Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any Annual Session of the Association upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association on the first day and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association on the last day. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

## **BY-LAWS**

### **By-Law I PARLIAMENTARY RULES**

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

### **By-Law II ASSOCIATION YEAR**

The Association Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

### **By-Law III DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committee on Constitution and Committee on Enrollment. He shall be the Chairman of the Associational Executive Board and be an ex-officio (without voting privileges) member of all other committees. Upon completion of his term of office, the Moderator shall become a member-at-large (for two years) of the Mission Committee, Executive Committee and Executive Board.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be the Vice-Chairman of the Executive Board.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's Annual Meeting, distribute at the Annual Meeting copies of the digest of these reports, and make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of Minutes to the member churches.

then, keep on file copies of Minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the Executive Board. He shall inform all members elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action. He shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; distribute the same upon instructions from the Association, its Executive Board, or as designated in the budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Board or the Association in annual session); render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the Annual Meeting and give a report at each quarterly Executive Board meeting and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Associational Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.

Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and make a written report to each Annual Meeting of the Association.

Section 6: The Sunday School Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Sunday School Department. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this committee that would promote this work.

The Associational Sunday School should assist church leaders to be more effective in their responsibility. This should include:

1. Provide opportunities for fellowship and inspiration.
2. Interpret the Sunday School Program.
3. Train Sunday School leaders.
4. Consult with Sunday School leaders concerning their program.
5. Provide organization and leadership for cooperative work among the churches.

Section 7: The Church Training Department shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Church Training Department. This officer shall attend Executive Committee meetings, maintain the on-going work of this department at all times, and give an annual report to the Association.

Section 8: The Music Director shall provide leadership for the Association in session and when requested at other times during the year. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this Committee that would promote the work. He shall encourage music growth in the churches throughout the year and shall make a written report to the Annual meeting.

Section 9: The Brotherhood Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of men and boys in the churches. The officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to promote the development of men and boys and an awareness of world mission needs.

Section 10: The Woman's Missionary Union Director serves on the Executive Committee of the Association and works with the Director of Missions; leads the WMLU Council, consults with our associational WMLU officers and assists them in their work; leads in providing opportunities for leaders and members of their church WMLUs to have fellowship and receive inspiration concerning their mutual mission task; leads in interpreting the WMLU program to church leaders; leads in training church WMLU workers and members; consults with church leaders concerning initiation of WMLU work and the improvement of existing work; presides at and plans for associational meeting; leads in associational WMLU annual planning; leads in discerning mission action needs and in coordinating the work being done; and reports progress of WMLU work to the Association and serves as contact between the Association and state WMLU.

Section 11: The Chairman of the Library Council shall promote the beginning and maintenance of church libraries in the churches; provide training opportunities for church librarians; maintain and develop the associational library; attend the Executive Committee meetings; cooperate with the Director of Missions and make an annual report to the Association at its annual session.

Section 12: The Baptist Youth for Christ Director shall, under the supervision of the Director of Missions, serve as chairman of Youth for Christ Committees of the Big Mountain Baptist Association.

Section 13: The Parliamentarian shall, at the Annual Meeting of the Association, rule on all questions of parliamentary procedure which shall arise during the sessions. The Parliamentarian shall serve as a resource person to the churches and shall, upon request, advise and assist the churches on matters of parliamentary procedure.

Section 14: The Audiovisual Coordinator shall assist all associational leadership in selection, production and use of audiovisual material. Upon request, he shall provide similar assistance to individual church leaders. He shall provide opportunities for training in the production and use of audiovisuals in education, motivation and worship. The Audiovisual Coordinator shall work with the librarian in storing, cataloging and promoting the use of audiovisual materials equipment. Maintenance of audiovisual equipment is the responsibility of the Audiovisual Coordinator.

Section 15: Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Executive Board, except the office of Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

#### **By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES**

Section 1: THE ORDER OF BUSINESS AND PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Associational Music Director, and three other members. It shall select the place of meeting among the group of churches with the host church being determined by the group. It shall recommend the preacher and the alternate for the annual session. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting for the Association, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the Annual Meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the Annual Meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and move through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary. This committee will be responsible for promoting the Annual Meeting through the various news media.

##### **Section 2: THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE**

1. Shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Music Director, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMC Director, President of the Pastor's Conference, Audiovisual Coordinator, and chairpersons of the following committees: Church and Community Development Committee, Nominating Committee, Commission on Ministries, Christian Life Committee, Membership Committee, Finance Committee, Evangelism Committee, Strategic Planning Committee, and Baptist Youth for Christ Committee.

2. When without a Director of Missions, this committee shall seek out and recommend to the Association, or its Executive Board, for election of a new Director of Missions according to By-Law VI, Section 11.

3. It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or Executive Board and act on routine or emergency matters concerning business management, approval/employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven is necessary to transact business.

Section 3: THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE, composed of six members, shall promote the work of evangelism in the churches and the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its Executive Board.

Section 4: THE FINANCE COMMITTEE, composed of six members, two rotating annually, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs of an adopted program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for meeting the disbursement of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

**THE FINANCE COMMITTEE**, may make adjustments during the year in line items or through the assignment of miscellaneous funds in Section VII of the budget providing the adjustments:

1. —will not increase the total budget.
2. —will not alter the basic purpose or intent of the budget.
3. —will have full consent of those affected (individuals, department leaders, etc.)
4. —will not exceed a total of \$2,000 during a fiscal year.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the Association, upon request, with the stewardship programs offered by the Convention.

The Committee shall express gratitude to the churches for their stewardship development that enables them to participate in local, home, and foreign missions.

A contingency fund is to be established and maintained in the approximate amount of one calendar quarter of the Association's operating budget. This contingency fund is to be deposited in an interest bearing account.

The funds to be disbursed should a shortfall of general funds receipts occur, resulting in a lack of funds for regular operating expenses.

Any disbursement of funds from the contingency fund must be upon a recommendation of the Finance Committee and approval of the Executive Committee.

**Section 5: THE ORIENTATION COMMITTEE**, composed of five members, with the pastor of the home church (the church of which the candidate is a member), the Director of Missions, and deacons of the home and requesting churches, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

The Committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of the Minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conference at which the home church voted to request examination of the candidate.

The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.

The Chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place, and procedure.

The Committee suggests that the candidate be questioned at least two weeks prior to his ordination.

The Committee shall question the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his devotion, and his personal life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.

The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the ministry.

In every instance, the Committee shall be guided by the Scriptures, especially 1 Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-9.

The Committee shall give written notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the ordination.

The Chairman shall report the Committee's activities to the Executive Board quarterly and provide a written report for the Annual Meeting.

**Section 6: THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE**, composed of six members, shall contact and nominate the officers of the Association according to Article VI of the Constitution. This Committee shall also, in cooperation with the Nominating Committee of various departments (except the WMU and Brotherhood organizations), recommend workers for these various departments. The officers and workers of these respective organizations shall be nominated by the organization themselves and submitted to the Nominating Committee (Article VI, Section 1). They shall also nominate Associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. The Committee shall also assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

**Section 7: THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE**, composed of three members, shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed.

**Section 8: THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE**, composed of five members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws. The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a witness of Baptist faith and practice and what it means to cooperate with other churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. The Membership Committee shall annually review all churches and missions under the watchcare of the Association and may present them for membership within the Association or that they continue under the watchcare.

**Section 9: THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE** shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMU Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director and Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an associational calendar for the coming year and present same to the ANNUAL MEETING OF MESSENGERS.

**Section 10: THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE** composed of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation, plan and promote the work of the Committee in an annual planning meeting, and present resolutions of appreciation to individuals, organizations, and churches when there are events worthy of commendation. DEDICATE THE ANNUAL MINUTES TO A DESERVING PERSON.

**Section 11: THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE** shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and six other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Association Meeting.

**Section 12: THE SEMINARY EXTENSION COMMITTEE**, composed of three members, shall publicize study courses and programs that are available, and shall plan, provide and promote Seminary Extension studies as they may be desired.

**Section 13: THE CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMITTEE**, composed of six members, will give continual attention to the moral climate of the community and shall initiate necessary action to maintain and improve the climate. The committee shall counsel those persons and institutions that uphold Christian virtues, and shall support the churches in the teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness.

**Section 14: THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES**, composed of five members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX, Section 7), and shall assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies on all standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the Chairman of each committee.

**Section 15: THE TELEPHONE CONTACT COMMITTEE** shall be composed of one person from each group of churches in the Association (8). These committee members shall relay messages to pastors and lay leaders during the year. All messages to be sent should be cleared with the Director of Missions.

**Section 16: THE ENROLLMENT COMMITTEE** shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of the members. A total enrollment shall be made for each day.

### **Section 17: THE CHURCH & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE**

**A. Purpose**—The purpose of the Church & Community Development Committee shall be to work with the CCM Director to lead the Association to address the priority ministry needs in Cleveland County, and to plan and coordinate programs of ministry to show Christ's love in meeting the spiritual, educational, emotional, and physical needs.

**B. Organization**—The Church & Community Development Committee shall be composed of the chairpersons of the component sub-committees. Resource personnel will be the WMU Director and/or the Mission Action Director of the W.M.U., Brotherhood Director and/or the Baptist Men's Director. The CCM Director will serve as chairman of the committee. Emergency Ministry needs not addressed in the constitution will be met at the discretion of the CCM Director after consultation with the Director of Missions.

#### **C. SUB-COMMITTEES**

**1. PRISON MINISTRIES**—The Prison Ministries shall be composed of at least (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministry in our local prison camp.

2. **JAIL MINISTRIES**—The Jail Ministries shall be composed of at least (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries in our local jail.

3. **MIGRANT MINISTRIES**—The Migrant Ministries shall be composed of at least (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries among the migrant farm workers.

4. **JUVENILE COURT MINISTRIES**—The Juvenile Court Ministries shall be composed of at least (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministries to the Juvenile Court personnel and clientele.

5. **LITERACY MINISTRIES**—The Literacy Ministries shall be composed of at least (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the slow readers, non-readers and non-English speaking persons in developing and improving reading skills.

6. **EMERGENCY RELIEF MINISTRIES**—The Emergency Relief Ministries shall be composed of at least (6) six members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the economically disadvantaged persons of Cleveland County.

7. **DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITY MINISTRIES**—The Developmental Disability Ministries shall be composed of at least (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the Developmental Disabled persons of Cleveland County and to their families.

8. **VISUALLY HANDICAPPED MINISTRIES**—The Visually Handicapped Ministries shall be composed of at least (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to the Visually Handicapped persons of Cleveland County and to their families.

9. **CHRISTMAS TOY STORE**—The Christmas Toy Store Ministry shall be composed of at least (6) six members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate the ministry to parents of needy children during the Christmas season.

10. **SUBSTANCE ABUSE MINISTRY**—The Substance Abuse Ministry shall be composed of at least (3) three members whose duties shall be to plan, promote, perform and evaluate ministries to address the needs of those afflicted with substance abuse problems and their families.

The personnel of the sub-committees shall provide assistance to churches through their missionary education organizations in the development of missions to those included in the job description written above, and to encourage participation by the churches in ministries conducted on the associational level.

D. **MEETING**—The personnel of the sub-committees will meet as needed to develop the programs of ministry. The Christian Ministry Development Committee shall meet annually for their planning and training.

**Section 18. THE FAMILY MINISTRY COMMITTEE**, composed of the chairperson and one person from each group of churches, shall work in creating an awareness of the need for our churches to establish ministries to Families, Senior Adults, and Single Adults. It will be their task to identify and prioritize needs, resources, and opportunities for family ministry. It will also be their task to provide family ministry resources and services to churches and provide training for family ministry workers.

**Section 19. THE MISSIONS COMMITTEE** shall be made up of the following members: Chairman (Vice-Moderator), the Director of Missions, Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Finance Committee Chairman, Chairpersons of Church & Community Development Committee, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMU Director, Music Director, President of the Pastors' Conference, and Associational Coordinator.

This Committee is to be available as a sounding board, to support the Director of Missions as a person (as well as an officer in the Association), provide feedback concerning Associational programs and activities, conveying suggestions from the Association and of-



bring support in preparing programs to the Executive Committee and/or Executive Board. The Missions Committee shall seek to determine areas of needs within and without the Association and formulate recommendations to the Associational Executive Committee.

The Committee shall enthusiastically explore all mission possibilities throughout the Association, emphasizing the need for new teaching units, preaching points, missions, and churches; and it shall actively seek out potential sponsoring churches for the beginning of specific mission endeavors. Providing energetic outreach leadership for the Association shall be the Committee's highest priority.

**Section 20: THE RECREATION AND DRAMA COMMITTEE** shall promote a program of Christian recreation and drama in the churches. The Committee shall regard recreation and drama as a means, not an end. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall use their programs as a way to teach, a means of witnessing and an avenue of expressing the abundant Christian life. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall be responsible to give assistance to any church that should request help in the area of recreation and drama. The Committee's responsibilities shall include fellowships, Senior Adults, veterans, clubs, drama workshops and other assignments of the Association, if asked. The Chairman of the Recreation and Drama Committee shall plan with the Director of Missions and give a report of the committee's activities at the Executive Board quarterly meetings.

**Section 21: THE STRATEGY PLANNING COMMITTEE**, composed of five members, shall seek to understand the 'Priority Statements' of the Association; provide support and suggestions to the appropriate committees for implementation; and recognize personally and publicly the committees that address themselves to, and make significant accomplishments in achieving the 'Priority Statements.' At a time it judges appropriate, the Committee will also suggest to the Association the need for further strategic planning.

**Section 22: YOUTH FOR CHRIST COMMITTEE**, composed of a chairperson and six members, shall be responsible for promoting and coordinating the following activities:

1. Youth Council Sessions.
2. Quarterly sessions of Youth For Christ in local churches.
3. A Korea Crusade for Christ every 1 to 2 years.
4. Mission Vacation Bible School and/or Backyard VBS.
5. Serve as a support group to the Associational Summer Youth Worker.
6. Any other activity which the Director of Missions and/or Executive Committee deem necessary to foster a positive Christian witness for Christ.

**Section 23: MEMORIALS COMMITTEE**, composed of three members, will be responsible for:

1. Recognizing deceased ministers, staff, deacons, and members in an appropriate way.
2. Submitting report for inclusion in Associational Minutes.
3. Ministering to the families of associational officers, ministers and staff members when death occurs.

**Section 24: PASTORAL MINISTRIES COMMITTEE**

The Pastoral Ministries Committee shall be composed of six ministers and/or staff persons in the Association with two rotating off each year.

It shall be the duty of this committee to work with the Director of Missions in planning and providing continuing educational opportunities for ministers and staff persons in the Association.

**Section 25: CHURCH SURVEY AND EXTENSION COMMITTEE**

The Church Survey and Extension Committee shall be composed of six members and shall encourage the Association to respond to the need for new churches and the development of young congregations. It shall be the responsibility of this committee to keep abreast of the growth and development of the townships within the Association and encourage the appropriate responses.

**Section 26: Members of all these committees, except the CHURCH & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE and those appointed by the moderator, shall be elected to serve not more than three years on a rotating basis.**

### **By-Law V TRUSTEES**

The duty of the Trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other securities of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its Executive Board.

### **By-Law VI DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS**

His selection shall be upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association at its Annual Meeting, or between sessions of the Association, by an Executive Board. His term of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity.

### **By-Law VII CHURCH & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR**

**Section 1: Employment** - The Director of CCM shall be jointly employed by the Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Home Mission Board. The employees should be started to work until the sponsoring groups mutually agree to meet the terms of service or the employee resigns. The CCM Director shall work under the supervision of the Director of Missions and in compliance with the Job-Description provided by the State and Association.

**Section 2: Basic Function** - The basic functions are to work with the CCM Committee to organize, supervise and promote a program of activities to meet the spiritual, educational, emotional and physical needs of the people within the geographical boundaries of the Association.

**Section 3: The CCM Director shall be an ex-officio member of the Associational Executive Board, Associational Executive Committee and Missions Committee without voting privileges.**

**Section 4: When without a Church & Community Development Director, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Church & Community Development Director according to By-Law VII Sections 1 and 2.**

### **By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS**

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the Annual Meeting by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

### **By-Law IX DEFINE PROCEDURE**

**Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.**

**Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.**

**Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.**

**Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.**

**Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six Associational Groups as follows: Polkville, Lattimore, Shelby, Kings Mountain, Graver, and Wata.**

### **By-Law X THE CONFESSION OF FAITH**

The Baptist Faith and Message is revised and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention on May 9, 1963.

## 1987-88 ANNUAL REPORT DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

Turning back through the calendar of this past year is a quick review of the good year we have had.

Our association voted to explore partnership evangelism with an association in Brazil. In response, you asked Moderator Billy Cropper and me to "go out the land". We left Chicago for Sao Paulo, Brazil on November 23 and returned November 24, 1987.

The fruitfulness of our trip resulted in the approval of a Brazilian Task Force chaired by Rev. Kevin Rutledge. The following served with him: Mrs. Frances Close, Mr. Fred Maaney, Mrs. Joan Truog, Mrs. Mary Lou Cauley, Rev. Roger Bowers, Rev. Phil Waugh, Dr. Gene Watterman, Mrs. Jane Lee, Mr. Bob Chadwick, and Dr. F.A. Close. The committee developed new three sub-committees: enlistment, orientation, and fund raising. All three have been active during this past year.

Their work resulted in enlisting and training our first team. A commissioning service was held on Sunday afternoon, August 23, at Elizabeth Baptist at which time eight persons were appointed for the mission task. These persons were: Rick Hamrick and Tom Davis from Pilgrim Church; Vickie Spangler, Phil Reist, and David Swann from Elizabeth Church; Jerry and Theresa Tomlin from Piedmont Grove Church; and Wanda Davis from First Baptist, Kings Mountain. Seven of these started their journey to work in the sul de Capital Association on August 31. They came back on September 13 with glowing reports of the Lord working through them.

Our Task Force is now preparing for next year. They invite you to consider this mission opportunity.

During the fall we held our most successful bi-vocational workshop. Rev. Tom Lofley spoke to a group of pastors, wives, and church leaders.

All of us were saddened by the sudden and brutal deaths of Libby and Rachel Senter, missionaries in residence in Zekwen, Liberia, West Africa. Many of us felt that this supreme sacrifice must be remembered. A Senter Scholarship Fund was established and a committee composed of Judge George Hamrick, Gladys Lubberts, and Mary Lou Cauley were asked to help us raise \$25,000 to launch this memorial. A date was set for an association-wide offering. To date the fund totals \$12,400.00. We hope to continue to receive contributions to this fund in memory of loved ones. Acknowledgments will be sent by the association to contributors. Libby's church, Zion Baptist, created a lovely memorial garden and held a special dedication service. We thank God for the privilege of preserving the memories of Libby and Rachel Senter.

Classes at Shelby from Southeastern Seminary have reached a new high with a current enrollment of 31. For eight years now our association has provided a plant for Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary to hold classes in our area. Students come from a radius of about 100 miles to take these classes. During these years, we have had students traveling from as far away as Charleston, South Carolina and Savannah, Georgia. These classes are credit courses applicable to Master of Divinity and Doctor of Ministry degrees. As an association, we are so pleased to have a part in such a magnificent ministry.

Children's Bible Drill continues to grow under the leadership of Rev. Dawn Gordon. We are pleased to see this renewed interest in such an important activity. Children who participate in this activity will carry their skills with them for a life time.

Former Moderator Billy Cropper left our area at mid-year to become Minister of Education at Woodmont Baptist Church, Nashville, Tennessee. This automatically moved Vernon Moderator Jeff Brundie to the moderator position. At the Executive Board meeting in July, Joe Calamia, clerk-retiree for twenty years, was elected as vice-moderator.

One of the crowning activities of the year was the constituting of Christopher Road Baptist Church. In November 1986, in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Rick Crofts, a small but determined nucleus gathered every Sunday afternoon. They began reaching the people in the community which had had a 73.2% population growth in the past 18 years.

## 3. PRISON MINISTRY:

- YOUNG FELLOW MINISTRY**—Volunteers met regularly every other Tuesday evening for a period of worship and fellowship. There were 13 volunteers who participated throughout the year. 18 church groups provided refreshments for the fellowship times.
- BIBLE STUDY**—Rochelle Ingle has assumed the responsibility of Bible Study leader for the Thursday afternoon time.
- FIELD DAY ACTIVITIES**—We provided gift slips to be used at the prison canteen for each of the Field Day Activities that were held during the year.
- FAMILY VISITATION**—Double Springs and Study First provided refreshments and seven volunteers for Family Visitation time in two of the summer months. Several of our churches participated in special refreshments during Christmas.
- CHRISTMAS TIME MINISTRIES**—We continued our program of preparing and presenting each inmate with a gift packet at Christmas time. 21 church groups provided the items and 18 youth came and processed the items into gift bags.



### 3. MINISTRY TO VISUALLY HANDICAPPED:

First Baptist Church hosted a Halloween Party, 17 visually handicapped attended, and 8 volunteers assisted. Shelby First hosted a valentine party, 15 visually handicapped attended, and 8 volunteers assisted. In May the association sponsored a picnic party, with Hosier Springs Baptist serving as host. 7 visually handicapped Gardner-Wyler students attended. Each student was given a "goodie" basket to aid them during exam week.

### 6. MIGRANT MINISTRY:

There were 7 of our churches who participated in our Migrant Ministry this summer. We alternated with Methodist churches in the upper Cleveland area, and worked in cooperation with them. Folks from the Harvest Time Baptist Church, a Spanish church in Lincoln County, came and assisted in the programming. Phillip studied the pastor, and two or three of the members came on a weekly basis. 193 volunteers participated from the 7 churches that were represented. Our migrant attendance averaged 14 per meeting.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

Let me first call your attention to your excellent Sunday School Council, known as the ASSISTeam which has served the association so well during this past year. They are: Linda Ellis and John Hunter with 9 years service, Denise Smith with 8 years service, W.N. Tashiro with 6 years service, Joe Collins with 3 years service, and Cindy Waugh with 1 year service.

They have served the association by planning projects, teaching clinics, and in individual consultation with Sunday School workers in local churches.

New members coming on the ASSISTeam are Janet Brown of Elizabeth Church who will be Pre-School Director and Mark Jones of Sealing Springs Baptist who will serve as Youth Director.

The first associational Sunday School event was the spring Outreach Clinic at Elizabeth Baptist on March 14-15, 1988. Joe Collins and I taught the Training Union module, "Training Sunday School Workers in Evangelism" to 97 persons representing 25 churches.

Denise Smith directed our Vacation Bible School Clinic which was also held at Elizabeth Baptist, May 1, 1988. Ninety-three persons from 25 churches attended.

The final Sunday School event of the 1987-88 associational year was the Training School at Euclid Baptist, Shelby this past September 12-13. Instead of having age-group studies, two books were taught: Jesus the Teacher and How to Study the Bible. Ninety-one persons from 17 churches attended.

For the past fifteen years, more or less, there has been a general decline in Sunday School enrollment and average attendance in our association. This past year, enrollment declined by 60% and average attendance by 29%. Sunday School has been the chief evangelistic arm, fund raiser, and Bible teaching program of Southern Baptist Churches.

We must be conscious of our need to mobilize our Sunday Schools in project discovery, quality Bible teaching, and visitation ministry.

**PRESENT READING**—Section 2: The Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer shall be elected on the last day of the annual meeting. All other officers shall be initiated and nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Associational Executive Board at their April meeting.

**PROPOSED CHANGE**—Section 2: The Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee. The floor will then be open for additional nominations. This election will occur on the last day of the annual meeting. All other officers shall be contacted and nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Associational Executive Board at their April meeting.

And what's more exciting is that each of these are making themselves available to come and share with your church about an exciting, fast-paced, awe-inspiring, fulfilling, fantastic, thrilling, unexpectedly miraculous, amazing, and life-changing twelve days in Sao Paulo, Brazil. And if you have one of these come and share with your fellowship, you will probably feel the same way.

Ordination Council members who served to examine these candidates for the gospel ministry were Dan H. Jolly (chairman), Mrs. Ann Jolly, Rev. Royce Bellow, Mr. Ron Nansary, Rev. Eddie Grigg, and Rev. Clive Borders.

The Association Ordination Council met four times this year for the purpose of examining candidates. One Association Council member was requested by a church to serve on its appointed Ordination Council.

Caesar Baptist Church requested an examination of Mr. Kevin Rutledge for ordination whom they had called as pastor. The Ordination Council met October 19, 1987 at the Baptist Center. The Council was unanimous in their recommendation for ordination.

On November 22, 1987 a request from Boiling Springs Baptist Church for "support and involvement of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association" in the examination of Mark Jones to the gospel ministry was fulfilled. First Baptist Church, Shelby North Carolina, assumed the Christian responsibility to assist Michael in his education at Gardner-Whitcomb Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary. During this period of preparation his wife and sons were separated from him in Africa for a period of time. Mr. Tolbert is a member of The Gold Hill Baptist Association (composed of black churches) of Forest City-Spartanburg area. The Council recommended unanimously his ordination. He has been interned of Oak Grove Baptist Church, Forest City, North Carolina since ordination.

Patriot Springs Baptist Church on December 4, 1987 requested the examination of Mr. James Christopher Schofield by the Ordination Council for the gospel ministry. ## REPORT OF ANNUITY BOARD TASK FORCE

I have good news and bad news for you concerning our Expanded Annuity Program.

The good news is that North Carolina has signed more Cooperative Agreements than any other state—including Texas. There have been 125 new members enrolled in the retirement plans during the period January 1-July 15. It is exciting to think about what has been

done to help ministers to retire with dignity. Strong efforts have been made to make all of our churches and staff aware of the opportunities and the need to act on them.

The bad news is that the Annuity Board has been at work for 75 years and only 40% of our churches are participating in its retirement plans. Even many of these churches make no direct contribution - the staff member contributes through the church. The average annuitant in North Carolina receives \$294.00 per month, which is far from adequate to meet survival needs. There are some in our association that receive less than \$10.00 per month.

Many of our churches have allowed this to happen because they do not understand the work of the Annuity Board. All of the churches that I have had the privilege of working with have become participants, which leads me to believe that if you understand it you want the advantages it offers.

Many pastors feel their financial obligations to be too heavy to participate. The truth is - the more you put in, the more you will get out. Pastors need to start as soon as possible - even small contributions for a longer time will produce greater benefits. Pastors are fearful to talk to the church about the Annuity Program for fear the church will think he is "wanting their seat" for more money. The FACT is that the Annuity Program is protection for BOTH church and staff.

We protect our buildings and properties (with insurance) - are our leaders less important to us? As we have learned about for and their insurance, we have taken advantage of it. Let's learn about the advantages of the Expanded Annuity Program and take advantage of it! It has some rich and rewarding long range benefits.
