Cline W. Borders was born April 14, 1926, Cleveland County, North Carolina, the son of Mike L. and Dorris Clair Borders. He was educated in Shelby High School, Gardner-Webb Junior College, Wake Forest University and Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary.

He is married to Doris Browne. God has blessed them with four children: Cline, Jr., Tim, Cheryl and Danny.

Prior to entering the ministry, he served with the United States military and farmed. He was licensed and ordained by Elizabeth Baptist Church, Shelby, North Carolina. He served as pastor of four churches: Ephesus Baptist, Spring Hope; Commonwealth Baptist, Charlotte; New Bethel Baptist, Lenoirville, all in North Carolina; and Draytonville Baptist, Gaffney, South Carolina. During his term as director of missions for the Kings Mountain Baptist Association significant growth occurred. Number of churches grew from 70 to 74; a new office complex was built; an extensive church and community ministries was begun; Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary Extension classes began at the Baptist Center; and associational missions gifts increased from \$24,000 to more than \$258,000.

Cline will continue to live in Cleveland County where his wife, Doris, serves as register of deeds. He has a host of friends in the county with whom he enjoys playing golf and interchanging. We hope one of his rewards will be many years of enjoying retirement.

Robert G. Davis, Sr. was born May 4, 1934, Hainesville, Mississippi. He was educated in Lela-Rich High School, Mississippi College, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and North Carolina Baptist Hospital.

He is married to Harriet Black. God has blessed them with three children: Gray, Ashley and Beep.

He was ordained August 13, 1961 by Lela Baptist Church, Lela, Mississippi. He has served as pastor of four churches: First Baptist, Dupont, Indiana; First Baptist, Ceredo, West Virginia; Covington Baptist, Covington, Virginia; First Baptist, Lowell, North Carolina. He has also served as minister, worker and director of education. HISTORY OF POLKVILLE BAPTIST CHURCH

On July 28, 1940, Polkville Church was officially constituted near the site of the present church building. Rev. D.P. Putnam was the moving spirit in the organization of this church. The deadline for charter members was set for August 11, 1940. Seventy-one charter members were formed into a new church called Polkville Baptist Church.

The first church building was erected on a tract of land purchased on October 4, 1940. The first service in the new sanctuary was held on the third Sunday of August, 1942. An educational building was dedicated on May 28, 1961. A parsonage was completed on June 1, 1963.

The sanctuary structure served the congregation until February 1, 1978 when the building was replaced by the sanctuary still in use today. In 1982 the family life center was added to give more space and better facilities to the congregation as they anticipated increased growth.

Various land purchases were made during the growth of the church. This land will be used in a five-phase growth plan adopted by the church in 1980. The first phase will include approximately 22 new classrooms. Ground breaking is anticipated in the spring of 1985.

God has blessed Polkville Baptist Church in the past years with the guidance of many faithful ministers and devoted church leaders.

Rev. Alton Martin serves as pastor, Mr. Bob Hendrick as minister of music and Mr. Rick Hamrick as minister of youth/education. The current membership is 549.



HISTORY OF ZION BAPTIST CHURCH

Zion members are presently worshipping in a modern renovated brick structure. Zion is the oldest church in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

Zion was established in 1816 and is spoken of as the "Mother Church." Members from Zion withdrew to become charter members of Zion, Shelby First, Double Springs, New Prospect, New Bethel, Pleasant Grove, Shady Grove, Ross Grove, Union and Double Shoals.

A brush arbor was mentioned as a meeting place before the first church was built of logs in 1816. The second, third and fourth buildings were built in 1858, 1883, and 1927. The first service was held in the present church in 1953.

Zion adopted Miss Faye Tustrate as a missionary to serve in the Philippines in 1966.

Zion's twentieth pastor, Rev. Russell Pitts, came April 1978. During his tenure of 13 years the Lord has blessed Zion. The church made an agreement with the pastor in 1978 to own his home and Mr. and Mrs. D.W. Nier gave an eight acre tract to build the home.

In April 1991, Zion transferred its endeavors for missions. Thirteen men traveled to Honduras to help complete construction of a missionary couple's home.

*Zion celebrated 175 years on August 18, 1991. Dr. Wynn Washburn, association historian, was the morning speaker and Dr. Gene Parkett, editor of *The Biblical Recorder*, was guest speaker for the afternoon.*

Rev. Russell Pitts serves as pastor and Miss Fattie Cooper serves as minister of music/direction/youth. The current membership is 348.

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this body shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

Under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, this association of churches seeks to further the Kingdom through the following:

- (1) the fostering of fellowship and cooperation among the member churches;
- (2) the ministering of spiritual and physical needs of people;
- (3) the giving and receiving of information, assistance and training for member churches;
- (4) the cooperation with North Carolina Baptist State and Southern Baptist Conventions.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership to the Association shall apply to the Membership Committee. Application should include:

- (1) Formal action by the group seeking admission reflecting that seventy-five percent (75%) of those voting expresses their intent to cooperate.
- (2) A written statement reflecting their beliefs and practices.
- (3) A written statement that expresses their intent to cooperate.
- (4) A willingness to meet with Membership Committee to discuss other items of mutual interest to both parties.

The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist belief and practice and what it means to cooperate with the churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. If recommended by this committee and accepted by the Association, a mission or a church shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a minimum of one (1) year. Membership within the Association shall be determined by vote of the Association at its annual meeting. Churches under the watchcare shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its constitution and by-laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and if requested, the Associational Executive Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like association.

ARTICLE IV MEETINGS

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Monday and Tuesday after the fourth Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meeting may be called by the Moderator or Executive Board, provided two (2) weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 2: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two (2) messengers to the meetings of the Association for each fifty (50) members of the church, provided each church shall not have less than three (3) nor more than ten (10) messengers. **ALONG WITH ALL ASSOCIATIONAL OFFICERS**, these shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of the messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those in attendance and registering at the Associational Meeting.

ARTICLE V AUTHORITY

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this Constitution in Article III, Sections 2 and 3.

ARTICLE VI OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTIONS

Section 1: The officers of the association shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Music Director, Brotherhood Director, Women's Missionary Union Director, Director of Media Services, Parliamentarian, and Audiovisual Coordinator.

Section 2: The Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk/Treasurer shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee. The floor will then be open for additional nominations. This election will occur on the last day of the annual meeting. All other officers shall be contacted and nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Associational Executive Board at their April meeting.

Section 3: The newly elected Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk/Treasurer shall assume at the close of the annual session all duties incumbent upon them relating to work of the ensuing associational year. All other officers shall assume all duties incumbent upon them relating to the work of the ensuing year on October 1.

Section 4: Any person having served two (2) terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for two years.

ARTICLE VII TRUSTEES AND THEIR ELECTION

There shall be three (3) Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three (3) years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one (1) new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one (1) year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

ARTICLE VIII THE ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Associational Executive Board shall be composed of all Associational officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Associational Director of Missions, the Church & Community Ministries Director (an office without voting privileges), each active pastor, two (2) members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The Associational Executive Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the Constitution. Associational Executive Board members are the connecting link between the

Association and the churches. Executive Board members should represent the churches to the Association. Executive Board members should act as representatives for the Association to the churches. It is the responsibility of the Executive Board members to promote the programs, represent the needs and report to the churches concerning the work and ministry of the Association. Executive Board members should seek acceptable means of representing the Association to their respective fellowships. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association in its Annual Meeting.

The quarterly meetings will be in January, April and July, on Monday after the third Sunday.

ARTICLE IX COMMITTEES

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through the following annual meeting.

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the annual Meeting:

1. Order of Business and Program Committee (By-Law IV, Section 1)
2. Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
3. Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
4. Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)
5. Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 5)
6. Nominating Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
7. Constitution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
8. Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
9. Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
10. Resolution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
11. Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
12. Secretary Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
13. Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
14. Church & Community Ministries Committee (By-Law IV, Section 17)
15. The Family Ministry Committee (By-Law IV, Section 18)
16. Mission Committee (By-Law IV, Section 19)
17. Recreation and Drama Committee (By-Law IV, Section 20)
18. Strategy Planning Committee (By-Law IV, Section 21)
19. Memorials Committee (By-Law IV, Section 23)
20. Youth for Christ (By-Law IV, Section 22)
21. Pastoral Ministries Committee (By-Law IV, Section 24)
22. Church Survey and Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 25)
23. Any other committee authorized by the association.

B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting: Committee on Committees (By-Law IV, Section 14).

Section 2: The following committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty (30) days prior to the Annual Meeting to serve during the Annual Meeting: Enrollment Committee (By-Law IV, Section 16).

ARTICLE X AMENDMENTS

Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any Annual Session of the Association upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association on the first day and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association on the last day. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

BY-LAWS

By-Law I PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

By-Law II ASSOCIATION YEAR

The Association Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

By-Law III DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- Section 1:** The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committee on Committees and Committee on Enrollment. He shall be the Chairman of the Associational Executive Board and be ex-officio (without voting privileged) member of all other committees. Upon completion of his term of office, the Moderator shall become a member-at-large (for two (2) years) of the Mission Committee, Executive Committee and Executive Board.
- Section 2:** The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be the Vice-Chairman of the Executive Board.
- Section 3:** The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's Annual Meeting, distribute at the Annual Meeting copies of the digest of these reports, and make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of Minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of Minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the Executive Board. He shall inform all members elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action. He shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its Executive Board, or as designated in the budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Board or the Association in annual sessions); render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the Annual Meeting and give a report at each quarterly Executive Board meeting and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.
- Section 4:** The Auditor shall, at the close of the Associational Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.
- Section 5:** The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and make a written report to each An-

- Annual Meeting of the Association.
- Section 6:** The Sunday School Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Sunday School. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this committee that would promote this work. The Associational Sunday School should assist church leaders to be more effective in their responsibility. This should include:
1. Provide opportunities for fellowship and inspiration.
 2. Interpret the Sunday School Program.
 3. Train Sunday School leaders.
 4. Counsel with Sunday School leaders concerning their program.
 5. Provide organization and leadership for cooperative work among the churches.
- Section 7:** The Discipleship Training Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of Discipleship Training. This officer shall attend Executive Committee meetings, maintain the on-going work of Discipleship Training at all times, and give an annual report to the Association.
- Section 8:** The Music Director shall provide leadership for the Association in worship and when requested at other times during the year. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this Committee that would promote the work. He shall encourage music growth in the churches throughout the year and shall make a written report to the Annual meeting.
- Section 9:** The Brotherhood Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of men and boys in the churches. The officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to promote the development of men and boys and an awareness of world mission needs.
- Section 10:** The Woman's Missionary Union Director serves on the Executive Committee of the Association and works with the Director of Missions; leads the WMU Council; confers with our associational WMU officers and assists them in their work; leads in providing opportunities for leaders and members of their church WMUs to have fellowship and receive inspiration concerning their mutual mission task; leads in interpreting the WMU programs to church leaders; leads in training church WMU workers and members; consults with church leaders concerning initiation of WMU work and the improvement of existing work; provides at and plans for associational meeting; leads in associational WMU annual planning; leads in discovering mission action needs and in coordinating the work being done; and reports progress of WMU work to the Association and serves as contact between the Association and state WMU.
- Section 11:** The Director of Media Services shall promote the beginning and maintenance of church libraries in the churches; provide training opportunities for church librarians; maintain and develop the association library; attend Executive Committee meetings; cooperate with the Director of Missions and make an annual report to the Association at its annual session.
- Section 12:** The Baptist Youth for Christ Director shall, under the supervision of

the Director of Missions, serve as chairman of Youth for Christ Committee of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

Section 13: The Parliamentarian shall, at the Annual Meeting of the Association, rule on all questions of parliamentary procedure which shall arise during the sessions. The Parliamentarian shall serve as a resource person to the churches and shall, upon request, advise and assist the churches on matters of parliamentary procedure.

Section 14: The Audiovisual Coordinator shall assist all associational leadership in selection, production and use of audiovisual material. Upon request, he shall provide similar assistance to individual church leaders. He shall provide opportunities for training in the production and use of audiovisuals in education, motivation and worship. The Audiovisual Coordinator shall work with the Director in storing, cataloging and promoting the use of audiovisual materials equipment. Maintenance of audiovisual equipment is the responsibility of the Audiovisual Coordinator.

Section 15: Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Executive Board, except the office of Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1: **THE ORDER OF BUSINESS AND PROGRAM COMMITTEE** shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Associational Music Director, and three (3) other members. It shall rotate the place of meeting among the groups of churches with the host church determined by the group. It shall recommend the preacher and the alternate for the annual sermon. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting for the Association, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty (30) days before the Annual Meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the Annual Meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary. This committee will be responsible for promoting the Annual Meeting through the various news media.

Section 2: **THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE**

1. Shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Music Director, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMU Director, President of the Pastor's Conference, Audiovisual Coordinator, and chairpersons of the following committees: Church and Community Ministries Committee, Nominating Committee, Committee on Committees, Christian Life Committee, Membership Committee, Finance Committee, Evangelists Committee, Strategy Planning Committee, and Baptist Youth for Christ Committee.
2. When without a Director of Missions, the Associational Ex-

Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Director of Missions and recommend such a person to the Executive Committee for election according to By-Law VI.

3. It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or Executive Board and act on routine or emergency matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven (7) is necessary to transact business.

Section 3. THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE, composed of six (6) members, shall promote work of evangelism in the churches and the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its Executive Board.

Section 4. THE FINANCE COMMITTEE, composed of six (6) members, two (2) rotating annually, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs of an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

THE FINANCE COMMITTEE may make adjustments during the year in line items or through the assignment of miscellaneous funds in Section VII of the budget providing the adjustments:

1. -will not increase the total budget.
2. -will not alter the basic purpose or intent of the budget.
3. -will have full consent of those affected (individuals, department leaders, etc.)
4. -will not exceed a total of \$5,000 during a fiscal year.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the Association, upon request, with the stewardship programs offered by the Convention.

The Committee shall express gratitude to the churches for their stewardship development that enables them to participate in local, home, and foreign missions.

A contingency fund is to be established and maintained in the approximate amount of one (1) calendar quarter of the Association's operating budget. This contingency fund is to be deposited in an interest bearing account.

These funds are to be disbursed only should a shortfall of general receipts occur, resulting in a lack of funds for regular operating expense.

Any disbursements of funds from the contingency fund must be upon the recommendation of the Clerk/Treasurer, approved by the chairman of the Finance Committee and the Chairman of the Executive Committee and is limited to budgeted items for operations where current funds for such budgeted items have been depleted.

Section 5. THE ORATION COMMITTEE, composed of five (5) members, with the pastor of the home church (the church of which the candidate is a member), the Director of Missions, and deacons of the

home and requesting churches, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

The Committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of the Minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conference at which the home church voted to request examination of the candidate.

The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.

The chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place, and procedure.

The Committee suggests that the candidate be questioned at least two (2) weeks prior to his ordination.

The committee shall question the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, and his personal life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.

The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the ministry.

In every instance, the Committee shall be guided by the Scripture, especially I Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-9.

The Committee shall give written notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the ordination.

The Chairman shall report the Committee's activities to the Executive Board quarterly and provide a written report for the Annual Meeting.

Section 6: THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE, composed of six (6) members, contact and nominate the officers of the Association according to Article VI of the Constitution. This committee shall also, in cooperation with the Nominating Committee of various departments (except the WMC and Brotherhood organizations), recommend workers for these various departments. The officers and workers of these respective organizations shall be nominated by the organization themselves and submitted to the Nominating Committee (Article VI, Section 1). They shall also nominate Associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. The committee shall also assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

Section 7: THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE, composed of three (3) members, shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and make recommendations as needed.

Section 8: THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE, composed of five (5) members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws. The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist faith and practice and what it means to cooperate with other churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. The Membership Committee shall annually review all churches and missions under the watchcare of the Association and may present them

for membership within the Association or that they continue under the watchman.

- Section 9: THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following Association officers: Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, WML Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director and Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an associational calendar for the coming year and present same to the ANNUAL MEETING OF MESSENGERS.
- Section 10: THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE composed of three (3) members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation, plan and promote the work of the Committee in an annual planning meeting; and present resolutions of appreciation to individuals, organizations, and churches when there are events worthy of commendation. DEBATE THE ANNUAL MINUTES TO A DESERVING PERSON.
- Section 11: THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and six (6) other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Association Meeting.
- Section 12: THE SEMINARY EXTENSION COMMITTEE, composed of three (3) members, shall publicize study courses and programs that are available; and shall plan, provide and promote Seminary Extension studies as they may be desired.
- Section 13: THE CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMITTEE, composed of six (6) members, will give continual attention to the moral climate of the community and shall initiate necessary action to maintain and improve the climate. The committee shall commend these persons and institutions that uphold Christian virtue, and shall support the churches in the teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness.
- Section 14: THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES, composed of five (5) members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX, Section 1), and shall assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies on all standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the Chairman of each committee.
- Section 15: THE TELEPHONE CONTACT COMMITTEE shall be composed of one (1) person from each group of churches in the Association (6). These committee members shall relay messages to pastors and lay leaders during the year. All messages to be sent should be cleared with the Director of Missions.
- Section 16: THE ENROLLMENT COMMITTEE shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of the messengers. A total enrollment shall be made for each day.
- Section 17: THE CHURCH & COMMUNITY MINISTRIES COMMITTEE
A. Purpose - The purpose of the Church & Community Ministries Committee shall be to work with the CCM Director to lead the Association to address the priority ministry needs in Cleveland County, and to plan and coordinate pro-

grams of ministry to share Christ's love in meeting the spiritual, educational, emotional, and physical needs.

- B. **Organization** - The Church & Community Ministries Committee shall be composed of resource personnel from areas ministries with which the Church and Community Ministries is actively involved plus the WMU Director and/or the Mission Action Director of the WMU, Brotherhood Director and/or the Baptist Men's Director. The CCM Directors will serve as chairman of the committee. Emergency Ministry needs not addressed in the constitution will be met at the discretion of the CCM Director after consultation with the Director of Missions.
- C. **MEETING** - The Church and Community Ministry Committee will meet as needed to develop the programs of ministry.

Section 18. **THE FAMILY MINISTRY COMMITTEE**, composed of the chairperson and one (1) person from each group of churches, shall work in creating an awareness of the need for our churches to establish ministries to Families, Senior Adults, and Single Adults. It will be their task to identify and prioritize needs, resources, and opportunities for family ministry. It will also be their task to provide family ministry resources and services to churches and provide training for family ministry workers.

Section 19. **THE MISSIONS COMMITTEE** shall be made up of the following members: Chairman (Vice-Moderator), the Director of Missions, Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Finance Committee Chairman, Chairperson of Church & Community Ministries Committee, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMU Director, Music Director, President of the Pastors' Conference, and Audiovisual Coordinator.

This Committee is to be available as a sounding board, to support the Director of Missions as a person (as well as an officer in the Association), provide feedback concerning Associational programs and activities, conveying suggestions from the Association and offering support in projection programs to the Executive Committee and/or Executive Board. The Missions Committee shall seek to determine areas of needs within and without the Association and formulate recommendations to the Associational Executive Committee.

The Committee shall enthusiastically explore all mission possibilities throughout the Association, emphasizing the need for new teaching units, preaching points, missions, and churches and it shall actively seek out potential sponsoring churches for the beginning of specific mission endeavors. Providing energetic outreach leadership for the Association shall be the Committee's highest priority.

Section 20. **THE RECREATION AND DRAMA COMMITTEE** shall promote a program of Christian recreation and drama in the churches. The Committee shall regard recreation and drama as a means, not an end. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall use their programs as a way to teach, a means of witnessing and an avenue of expressing the abundant Christian life. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall be responsible to give assistance to any church

that should request help in the area of recreation and drama. The Committee's responsibilities shall include fellowships, Senior Adults, retreats, crafts, drama workshops and other assignments of the Association, if asked. The Chairman of the Recreation and Drama Committee shall plan with the Director of Missions and give a report of the committee's activities at the Executive Board quarterly meetings.

Section 21: THE STRATEGY PLANNING COMMITTEE, composed of five (5) members, shall seek to understand the 'Priority Statements' of the Association; provide support and suggestions to the appropriate committees for implementation; and recognize personally and publicly the committees that address themselves to, and make significant accomplishment in achieving the 'Priority Statements'. At a time it judges appropriate, the Committee will also suggest to the Association the need for further strategy planning.

Section 22: YOUTH FOR CHRIST COMMITTEE, composed of a chairperson and six (6) members, shall be responsible for promoting and coordinating the following activities:

1. Youth Council Sessions.
2. Quarterly sessions of Youth for Christ in local churches.
3. A Kairos Crusade for Christ every 3 to 5 years.
4. Mission Vacation Bible School and/or Backyard VBS.
5. Serve as a support group to the Associational Summer Youth Worker.
6. Any other activity which the Director of Missions and/or Executive Committee deem necessary to foster a positive Christian witness for Christ.

Section 23: MEMORIALS COMMITTEE, composed of three (3) members will be responsible for:

1. Recognizing deceased ministers, staff, deacons and members in an appropriate way.
2. Submitting report for inclusion in Associational Minutes.
3. Ministering to the families of associational officers, ministers and staff members when death occurs.

Section 24: PASTORAL MINISTRIES COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) ministers and/or staff persons in the Association with two (2) rotating off each year.

It shall be the duty of this committee to work with the Director of Missions in planning and promoting continuing educational opportunities for ministers and staff persons in the Association.

Section 25: CHURCH SURVEY AND EXTENSION COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) members and shall encourage the Association to respond to the need for new churches and the development of young congregations. It shall be the responsibility of this committee to keep abreast of the growth and development of the township within the Association and encourage the appropriate response.

Section 26: Members of all these committees, except the CHURCH & COMMUNITY MINISTRIES COMMITTEE and those appointed by the moderator, shall be elected to serve not more than three (3) years on a rotating basis.

By-Law V TRUSTEES

The duty of the Trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other securities of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its Executive Board.

By-Law VI DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

When without a Director of Missions, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Director of Missions and recommend such person to the Executive Committee. His selection shall be upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association at its Annual Meeting, or between sessions of the Association, by its Executive Board. His time of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity. His duties will be in accordance with the job description at the time of his call.

By-Law VII CHURCH & COMMUNITY MINISTRIES DIRECTOR

- Section 1: Employment - The Director of CCM shall be jointly employed by the Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Home Mission Board. The employee should be elected to work until the sponsoring groups mutually agree to cease the tenure of service or the employee resigns. The CCM Director shall work under the supervision of the Director of Missions and in compliance with the Job Description provided by the State and Association.
- Section 2: Basic Function - The basic functions are to work with the CCM Committee to organize, supervise and promote a program of activities to meet the spiritual, educational, emotional and physical needs of the people within the geographical boundaries of the Association.
- Section 3: The CCM Director shall be an ex-officio member of the Associational Executive Board, Associational Executive Committee and Missions Committee without voting privileges.
- Section 4: When without a Church & Community Ministries Director, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Church & Community Ministries Director according to By-Law VII, Sections 1 & 2.

By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the Annual Meeting by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

By-Law IX DEFINE PROCEDURE

- Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.
- Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.
- Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six (6) Associational Groups as follows: Polkville, Lattimore, Shelby, Kings Mountain, Grove, and Waco.

Hunter Hay, V. pastor of Ross Grove; Rev. Ralph Sparrow, pastor of Oak View, and wife, Darla; Rev. Norris Willis, pastor of Allen Memorial; Rev. Paul Williams, pastor of Lenoirville; Rev. Doug Pedigo, minister of music/youth/children of Zion; Rev. Robert Haynes, pastor of Temple; Rev. Joe Edwards, pastor of Christian Freedom; Miss Fannie Cooper, minister of music/children of Zion; Rev. Allen Barlow, pastor of Pleasant Grove; Rev. Harold Beath, pastor of Bethlehem; Rev. Clay Edwards, pastor of New Bethel; Rev. Bill Jordan, pastor of Palestine; Rev. David Norison, minister of youth, senior adults and recreation of Elizabeth; Jean Costner, minister of music of Pleasant Grove; Rev. L.H. Lovelace, pastor of Westover; Miss Debbie Low, minister of music/youth of Christopher Road; Mr. Jose Espinosa, missions pastor of fear of Bethlehem Mission and Mr. Joe Cline representing Piedmont Baptist Church of Lenoirville.

10. Rev. Sam Snyder, interim director of missions gave his report. As part of his report he recognized Mr. and Mrs. Jose Espinales and their son from the Fair of Bethlehem Mission as well as Mr. Joe Cline from Piedmont Church of Lawndale.
11. Rev. Russell Pitts recognized Chas Borders, former director of missions. Rev. Borders came forward and expressed his appreciation to the association for his opportunity to serve in our association and for the way the association helped him close out his ministry. He stated the future of the association can be bright, beautiful and promising if we reach out and take advantage of the opportunities here in Cleveland County.
12. Rev. Robert Abrams, chairman of the Constitution Committee, presented copies of the proposed Constitution changes. The vote on these changes will be taken during the Tuesday afternoon session.
13. Miss Fathie Cooper, minister of music/educational youth of Zion Church, led the congregation in singing, "Have Faith in God."
14. (A) Rev. Eugene Lard, pastor of Second Baptist, Kings Mountain and chairman of the Eastern Advisory Committee, presented information on the work his committee has done in conjunction with Peoples Baptist Church, a new work in the Kings Mountain area. He introduced Rev. John House, pastor of the new church. Rev. House reported the work has been very rewarding, they began with only eight people and now have forty-eight. He asked the association to pray for them as their work continues.
(B) Dr. Jordan "Daddy" Corbin, former pastor of Sealing Springs Baptist Church and former chairman of the Western Advisory Committee, presented information on the work his committee has done in conjunction with New Jerusalem Baptist Church, who has been under watchtower of the association since the 1980 annual meeting. He reported of the great need for this church which is located in a hard pressed area where we would refuse to serve. He encouraged churches to become involved in encouraging and supporting these new churches. He introduced Rev. Xavier Trevil, pastor of New Jerusalem Church. Rev. Trevil expressed thanks for the association's helping hand and asked for the prayers of the association as they continue in their work for the Lord.
15. "Let the Redeemed of the Lord Say So," special music for the evening was presented by the Kings Mountain Baptist Association Ministers of Music Choir under the direction of Rev. Charlton Bousel.
16. Ms. Norma Bingham, clerk/treasurer, gave the attendance report. She reported 268 messengers, 69 non-messengers for a total of 336 in attendance representing 67 churches.
17. Dr. Ann Richardson, pastor of Poplar Springs Baptist Church and chairman of the Director of Missions Search Committee, was recognized. He called attention to the printed copy of a new job description for the director of missions position. A sub-committee selected from the Director of Missions Search Committee revised the eighteen year old job description. He asked the group to study the material and be prepared to vote at the designated time at the Tuesday afternoon session. He expressed gratitude for prayers and support thus far for their committee. He led in prayer for God's leadership for the man he would have for this great association.
18. Moderator Joe Cabaniss was recognized to present the moderator's message. Mr. Cabaniss shared scripture from Proverbs 3:4-5. He stated he has been an active part of the association for the past twenty-five years serving in the areas

of clerk/treasurer, vice-moderator and moderator. During his tenure he has been asked and has responded to numerous questions concerning the association. He chose "What Does a Director of Missions Do?" as the topic for his message. He discussed the role of the director and shared the names of those who have served in this area for our association.

18. Rev. Ralph Sparrow, pastor of Oak View Baptist Church, pronounced the benediction.

Tuesday Afternoon October 29, 1991

20. As messengers and visitors gathered at 2:45 p.m. at Polkville Church for the second session of our annual meeting, Rev. Bill McSwain, minister of music at Union church, presented a mini-concert on the piano accompanied by Doug Pedigo, minister of music and youth at Zion Church, on the organ.
21. Moderator Joe Cabaniss welcomed everyone and thanked Polkville Church and the Polkville group of churches for being our host. Mrs. Doreen Wacziarg, minister of music and youth at First Hill Church, led the congregation in singing "We're Marching To Zion" accompanied by Rev. Bill McSwain on the piano and Doug Pedigo on the organ. Mr. Cabaniss then announced that Dr. Paul Borrelli, pastor at Beaver Dam Church, is in the hospital having heart catheterization today. He requested our prayers. Rev. Robert Haynes, pastor of Temple Church, read scripture from Romans 8:37. The opening prayer was led by Rev. Paul Williams, pastor at Lakeside Church.
22. Mr. David Swann, our Brazil Partnership coordinator, gave an update on this project. Next year, 1992, will be our last year in the five year partnership. Eighteen volunteers are needed for the evangelistic needs of the First De-Capital Association of Brazil in 1992, a breakdown of the monies donated for the partnership has been approved by the Executive Committee of our association. The dates for next years trip are September 17-30, 1992.
23. The Confirmation Committee report was given by Rev. John Bridges, pastor at First Baptist, Green. The committee examined and recommended Tim Trecker, Chris Masters, and John W. Ware this past year.
24. Rev. T.A. Linberger, director of South Mountain Baptist Camp, gave an update on the activities at the camp this past summer. Prayer was the most important reason for all these reunion professions of faith - 161, re-dedications - 141, and 66 decisions made during the time the Methodists used the camp.
25. Rev. Dave Gordon, pastor at New Hope and chairman of the Committee on Committees, gave his report. He thanked the committee members for all their work this year. The committee was Dave Gordon, Chairman, Leroy Morris, J.B. Williams, Marshal Cook, and Ralph Mithem. He mentioned that the report be accepted, it was seconded by Rev. Martin Adams and approved.
26. The Memorial Committee report was presented by Rev. E.M. Smith. We lost 218 laypersons, 15 deacons, and 1 pastor, Rev. T. Max Linvers.
27. Enrollment cards were taken up by the ushers at this time. Ms. Rerica Brigham, clerk/treasurer and a member at Elizabeth Church, gave the Executive Board report and the 1990-91 Treasurers report. She urged board members to attend the meetings so that they might keep up with the activities

- of the association and the community. Ms. Bingham mentioned that the report be accepted. It was seconded by Rev. Paul Williams and approved.
28. Mrs. Bonnie Doughter, minister of education at Boiling Springs, gave the Sunday School report in the absence of Joe Collins, associational Sunday School director. Enrollment for 1980-81 was 18,617. The average attendance increased this year to 8,600 to break a four year decline. Our association has achieved STANDARD SUNDAY SCHOOL status as recognized by the state convention.
 29. The Discipleship Training report was given by Rev. Dave Gordon, associational Discipleship Training director and pastor at New Hope. He reminded us that there are many new training programs available now to our churches through Discipleship Training. Our Childrens Bible Drill is growing each year. This year we had ten churches involved.
 30. Miss Bobbie Low, minister of music and youth at Christopher Road, led us in singing "Because He Lives."
 31. Rev. Bruce Raboin, Finance Committee chairman and pastor at Double Springs, gave the Finance Committee report and presented the new budget for 1981-82. The new budget reflects a difference of \$13,903.64 which is a 6.09% increase from last year. He moved the adoption of the budget. Mr. J.T. Roper seconded the motion and it was approved.
 32. The Membership Committee report was given by Rev. C.D. Greene, retired pastor and former director of missions. He recommended, on behalf of the committee, membership for New Jerusalem Full Gospel Baptist Church. This was seconded by Joe Murray and approved by a unanimous vote. This was a historical moment as New Jerusalem is the first black church to be approved for membership in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. Rev. Greene recommended The People's Baptist Church in Kings Mountain for watchman status. This was seconded by Creed Jones of Polkville Church. The motion was voted on and approved unanimously. Piedmont Church of Lawndale was also recommended for watchman. Henry Rappe of Bethel seconded the motion. The motion was voted on and approved unanimously. Membership in our association is now increased to 79 churches, 1 mission, and 3 churches under watchman.
 33. Rev. Charles Reed, church and community ministries director, gave the CCM report. He stated that he and his wife, Carolyn, have been officially appointed as leave missionaries by the Home Mission Board. Our CCM department has ministered to many people during the past year. All that has been accomplished was done because of prayer support, financial support, and time volunteered by the people who make up our association. A new ministry this year was the NC Baptist Men's Medical/Dental Bus which came to our area in May. Two hundred twelve people were ministered to and six professions of faith were made. Another new ministry was to the families and loved ones of the Desert Storm military men and women.
 34. The Historian report was given by Associational Historian, Dr. Wynn Wadsworth. The focus of his report was the history of our churches and how much they have influenced our association through the years.
 35. Rev. John E. Lawrence, who was pastor at First Baptist, Shelby for 10 1/2 years, spoke on behalf of the Baptist Retirement Homes of NC, especially Brookridge in Winston-Salem, which is our newest Baptist home. He reminded us that our February offering goes to help those residents 64% of whom may need assistance with living expense.

36. Rick Hamrick, minister of education and youth at Polkville Church, spoke for the Youth for Christ Committee. He gave highlights from Rescuer '91. There were 52 professions of faith, 191 re-dedications, and 2 youth who left the call to Christian vocations. Now Rescuer '92 is planned for April 2-3-4, 1992. James Byrd, minister of music and youth at Second Church, Sharkey, ask each church to consider prayer support and financial support.
37. J.Y. Hopes, member of Buffalo, was recognized for attending 49 consecutive annual associational meetings.
38. Rev. Alton Martin, pastor of our host church Polkville, welcomed us to Polkville and gave us directions for our evening meal.
39. Dr. Jim Richardson, chairman of the DOM Search Committee and pastor at Poplar Springs Church, gave a report on the activities of the search committee and presented a revised DOM job description for approval. Rev. C.G. Givens motioned the job description be approved. Rev. John Bridges seconded it. It passed unanimously by vote.
40. Rev. Robert Abrams, chairman of the Constitution Committee, presented the constitutional changes that were given last evening for approval by vote today. These changes are "cosmetic" only and are on file at the associational office. Rev. Keith Dixon seconded the motion that the changes be accepted as written. By a standing vote the changes were approved.
41. Interim Director of Mission Barn Snyder recognized the churches that had just been voted into our association and those who were voted into membership. Rev. John House, pastor of The People's Baptist Church, thanked the association and God for all that had been achieved through the ministry of his church. He stated that there are only two kinds of people in the world, not black and white, but saved and unsaved.
42. Rev. Harold Broom, pastor at Bethlehem Church, gave thanks for our evening meal and we adjourned until 7:00 p.m.

Tuesday Evening October 29, 1991

43. At 7:00 p.m. as messengers and visitors gathered at Polkville Baptist Church for our evening session, the NEWMARKETS presented a program of special music. The trio included Rev. and Mrs. Terry Gold and Merlela O'Neal. Rev. Gold is the minister of music/deacon of Putnam Memorial Church.
44. Moderator Cabaniss gave an update on Dr. Paul Sorrells that surgery would not be necessary at this time. He asked for registration cards to be distributed to those who had not already registered for the day.
45. Mrs. Myrtle Price, minister of music at Sandy Plains Baptist Church, led the congregation in singing, "He Keeps Me Singing."
46. Rev. Joe Edwards, pastor of Christian Freedom Baptist Church, shared scriptures from Psalm 100. Rev. Dale Angel, pastor of New Buffalo Baptist Church, led the opening prayer for the evening session.
47. Rev. Ed Sessom, retired minister and chairman of the Resolutions Committee, presented his report. The report included the dedication of the associational minutes to the memory of Dr. T. Max Lintner, former pastor of Bowling Springs Baptist Church in honor of Rev. Cline W. Borders, former director of missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association, and in honor of Rev. Robert G. Davis, former church and community ministries director of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. Rev. Sessom moved the report be

accepted, seconded by Rev. Dan Jolly. The motion carried.

48. Dr. Jim Richardson, pastor of Poplar Springs Church and chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the following report for 1991-92:

The floor was opened for other nominations. Rev. Paul Williams moved the nominations be closed. Rev. Bill McIlwain called for the vote. The motion carried and the officers were elected.

49. Ms. Rebecca Bingham gave the attendance report. She reported 238 messengers, 50 non-messengers and four visitors for a total of 292 in attendance for the day representing 62 churches.
50. On behalf of the association, Rev. Sam Snyder, interim director of missions, came forward to present a moderator's plaque to Mr. Joe Cabaniss in appreciation of his service to the association as moderator during 1989-91.
51. Rev. Dave Gordon, chairman of Committee on Committees, was recognized to present an addendum to his report presented earlier in the afternoon session and moved it be accepted. The motion was seconded by Rev. Jim Rice and carried.
52. In the absence of Rev. Larry King, Rev. Lawton Neely, minister of music/youth of Bethel Church, led the congregation in singing, "Shave His Love."
53. Moderator Joe Cabaniss appointed the 1991-92 Committee on Committees. Those who will serve are: Dr. John Sloan, First Baptist, Kings Mountain, chairman; Rev. Jim Brackett, Westview Church; Rev. Jan Rice, Immanuel Church; Mr. Robert Borders, Elizabeth Church; and Mrs. Joyce Wiseman, Double Springs Church.
54. Rev. Marion Adams, retired minister, was recognized with a special request for the association. He requested we pray for the Arabs and Israelis as they meet for peace talks for the Middle East. Following a period of silence, he led in prayer.
55. The NEWMATICS presented "Praying Up a Storm," special music for the evening.
56. Rev. Dan Wallace, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, presented an inspirational message using Psalm 142 as his scripture. His message was one of encouragement to all. He shared that we can stand and endure where God places us if we know the Lord.
57. Mr. Cabaniss asked Rev. Pitts to come forward. He presented the gavel to our new moderator.
58. Rev. Pitts stated he looks forward to working with the association. His word to us is to have mutual respect for each other as we work together. He dismissed with prayer the 141st annual session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

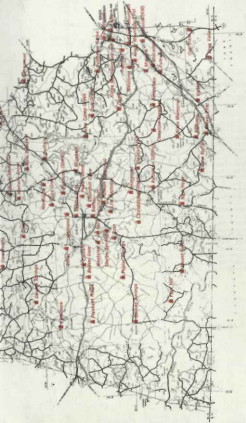

4. Prison Ministry:

A. Yokefellow Ministry - Rick Powell, David Strickell, and Scott Carpenter assist with a time of worship and fellowship every other Tuesday at the local prison unit.

B. Bible study - Rev. Rochelle Ingle leads a Bible study on Thursday afternoons at our local prison. Average attendance is 9 inmates.

5. Ministry to the Visually Impaired:

A graduation party for visually impaired students of Gardner-Webb College was held at Boiling Springs Baptist Church in May. A social for the visually impaired was held at Westview Church with 22 guests and 9 volunteers. Vickie Blanton coordinates this ministry.

6. Ministry to the Developmentally Disabled:

This summer Kaseade, Shelby and Boiling Springs hosted VUS for the developmentally disabled young people. There was an average of 11 students and 13 volunteers in attendance. Day Camps were held by Shelby Second, New Hope, Four, Mt. Sinai, Rose Grove, Christopher Rd., Zion, Beaver Dam, Patterson Grove, Kaseade (Shelby), and Boiling Springs. The average attendance for day camps was 11.

7. **Migrant Ministry:**
Services for the migrant workers were held this summer on Sunday afternoons at Beloved Community Center. The Methodist churches in the upper Cleveland County area alternate with the Baptist churches in providing a time of worship and fellowship for the migrant workers. Brother Ronaldo Cotto and his wife led the services in Spanish.
8. **Friday Lunch Program:**
The number of meals served to the hungry and homeless this year was 2,047. Assisting in serving were 242 volunteers.
9. **Jail Ministry:**
Services are conducted on Sunday afternoons for the inmates at the Cleveland County jail. Approximately fifty-one churches participated this year by conducting these services. Carlos Young and Judy Allen coordinate this ministry.
10. **Literary Ministry:**
The Literary Ministry has 27 volunteers who are tutoring 32 students. Sarah Williams and Ann Worden coordinate this ministry.
11. **Children's Bible Ministry:**
This ministry provides Bible books to the children of people who apply for assistance at the CCM office. John Calhoun coordinates this ministry and it was financially supported this year primarily by the Brotherhoods of Zion and Lefthorn.
12. **Volunteer Receptionists and Clothing Room Workers:**

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT - 1991

Three regular meetings of the Executive Board were held in 1991 - January 28 at Bowling Springs, April 22 at First Church, Kings Mountain and July 22 at Zora.

New pastors and new board members were recognized at each meeting. Reports from the director of missions (and interim director of missions), director of church and community ministries, various committees and clerk-treasurer were presented at the meetings.

Highlights of the meetings included the following:

In JANUARY, the Strategy Planning Committee reported that a new staff position, that of Church Development Director, had been approved, and this would, of course, entail the need for increased giving by the churches in order to meet the budget needs for a new staff person.

This committee also reported the ongoing work of working to establish new Southern Baptist churches in predominately black communities. Recommendations were made and approved to assist with the funding of this work.

At the close of the meeting, Rev. Clint Borders announced his resignation as director of missions.

In APRIL, Mr. Borders gave his final report as director of missions and expressed his appreciation for both his office staff and the church community for their support of him and the work which has been and is being done.

It was recommended and approved to put the new staff position of church development director "on hold" due to the resignation of the director of missions and what was felt to be the more urgent need to fill that vacancy on the staff.

At the close of the meeting, Rev. Sam Snyder was requested to come forward and was introduced as the acting director of missions, and he expressed his willingness to serve in this capacity to meet the needs of the association until the position could be filled.

At the JULY meeting, both the Eastern and Western Advisory Committees had reports of the ongoing, exciting and challenging work the sponsored churches are attempting to do and are doing.

At the close of each meeting, the host church provided a time of fellowship and refreshments.

We thank each person in the association who makes a contribution (whether of prayer, time, energy or money) to assist in the work of this body of Christ.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

I am pleased to report that the Sunday Schools of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association have made some progress during the past year. In the area of enrollment, we have held our own. In Average weekly attendance and participation of leaders in training, we have made some significant gains.

Last year marked our first significant enrollment gain in ten years. This year we cannot report a gain, but with two churches not reporting yet, our Sunday School enrollment stands at 18,817 - just 3 below last year's total enrollment. Our enrollment in Vacation Bible School increased this year by nearly two hundred.

There is probably no truer growth indicator in Southern Baptist life than average weekly Sunday School attendance, and I gladly report to you a gain among Kings Mountain Baptist churches. Our average weekly attendance climbed for the second year in a row after four years of steady decline. This year's figure of 8,800 was 150 higher than the previous year.

Sunday School training in our association is the charge of the Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team (or ASSS Team for short). This year, because they provided a variety of training events and participated themselves in training and planning, your ASSS Team was recognized by the Sunday School Board as a standard team.

On March 28, Mike Johnson of First Baptist Shelby led an outreach clinic on "Reaching Out in the Nineties." Twenty-six persons attended this event, representing twelve of our churches.

On June 11, pastors, Sunday School directors, and others responsible for ordering literature were invited to attend a Preview of 1991 Improved Curriculum Conference at the association building. Twenty-three attended, representing fourteen churches.

Our largest training event of the year was held at Elizabeth Church on September 16, 1991. One hundred fifty-three Sunday School leaders from across the association attended the Associational Training School to learn about improvements in Sunday School literature and new recommendations for organization. Thirty-four of our churches were represented.

During the year, a total of 170 different persons participated in training events, and thirty-eight of our seventy-five churches were represented. My prayer is that Kings Mountain Baptist Sunday School leaders will continue to train for the task of reaching people with Bible study. The difference between good Sunday Schools and poor ones has always been leadership.

Some were as well educated as the preachers. All praise is due to our ministers but today let us talk about a few lay people. Today lay members outnumber ministers about 1,000 to one.

First, John R. Logan, who wrote "The History of the Broad River Association." He helped map and lay out the town of Shelby and the county seat.

From Double Springs, J.N. Barnett, J.B. Gillespie, and Fred Greer were outstanding leaders.

From Sandy Hill, J.H. Rollins and E.O. Whitaker, who were strong supporters of Gardner-Weiss College. From Zeno, G.T. Calabrese and Walter Davis.

From the Kings Mountain area, G.O. Page, J.R. Davis, and a number of McNeeys, Sanders, and Hords stand out.

From Double Shoals, J.W. Costner, also a member of Springers.

From Sealing Springs came J.Y. Hamrick, Eljah Clifford, O.P. Hamrick and J.D. Huggins. Also Elia Curtis and Olie Wood.

From Shelby First we have Fico Darham, O. Max Gardner and his wife, Faye Webb-Gardner, Judges J.L. and E.Y. Webb, Byron Weathers, A.A. Powell, Peyton McQueen, O.M. Moll and Rush Hamrick, Sr., Homer Sweet and Dr. Zeno Wall.

From South Shelby, G.V. "governor" Hawkins stands out.

From Elizabeth Church, Thomas Wilson, who married the daughter of James

Love. Mr. Love provided the land for the City of Shelby. Also from Elmhurst, F.M. Mauney, father of our parliamentarian Joe Mauney.

Lay leaders have been prominent in our Baptist colleges. At Wake Forest, W.L. Potam and A.C. Reid. At Meredith, Fuller B. Hamrick worked as finance officer.

In state government we add to O. Max Gardner the names of J.W. Hartsell, Forest Sheffield, L.R. Hamill, J.S. Dorton and J.T. Hamrick II.

At Gardner-Webb College, following layman Huggins were such lay leaders as George Barnett, A.C. Lovelace, Phil Elliott, and now, Christopher White.

Outstanding women of the LAITY include: Mae Clite Stroup, Delta Dixon Carroll, Mrs. John Wancaster, Selma Webb, Minnie Scherck Ramseyer, and of course, Grace and Kailaya Hamrick, current columnist and historian.

Other outstanding were: Dewey Whitaker, who became president of Lehigh University and served on the Atomic Energy Commission and Ray E. Brown, a well known hospital administrator at Shelby and NC Baptist in Winston-Salem. Writers and publishers: Lee B. Weathers, R.E. Price, whose widow Denise Roberts Price, is still with us, John Roberts, Hatcher Huggins, and Thomas Dixon, Jr.

The LAITY, both men and women in this association, not only followed the leadership of the clergy, but in some cases became the leaders, seizing opportunity, fulfilling obligation, and achieving outreach. Briefly the LAITY is ALL O.K.!

NOTES REGARDING CHANGES IN BUDGET:

1. Salaries and housing/Utilities allowances, plus the resultant changes in retirement packages, have been increased by 3%. The compensation package for the Director of Missions does not reflect any change at all. The compensation package for the new Director of Missions will be recommended by the Search Committee as a part of the process of recommending the new Director of Missions.
2. The amount contributed to the C.C.M Director's compensation jointly by the Baptist State Convention and the Home Mission Board is decreased \$500 this year. The Association's portion of the salary item is thus increased by the same amount. The salary item reflects the 3% referred to in previous paragraph plus \$500.
3. Life insurance, medical insurance, and long-term disability insurance are provided for Charles Reed by the Home Mission Board.
4. Allocations shown in the budget reflect the specific requests of staff, committee chairpersons, and/or heads of organizations.
5. This proposed budget reflects a total increase over last year's budget \$15,903.64. This figure represents an increase of 6.09%.

HISTORICAL AND STATISTICAL TABLES

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

On November 7, 1881 the following churches from the Broad River Baptist Association met at Double Springs Baptist Church for the purpose of organizing a new association: Beaver Dam, Bethel, Boiling Springs, Broad River, Buffalo, Double Springs, Mt. Pleasant, Mt. Sinai, New Bethel, Pleasant Hill, Sandy Run, Zion, and Zion.

The need for a new association resulted from geographical conditions. The boundary of the Broad River Association was so extensive that delegates were unable to attend the annual sessions due to swollen rivers and streams.

The name "Kings Mountain Association" was chosen because its boundary included the Kings Mountain battleground, a monument to be remembered by every patriot and lover of religious liberty.

In 1883, the association appointed a committee to establish and endow a denominational high school. In 1885, Boiling Springs was chosen as the most suitable site by a 15-member Board of Trustees. The Sandy Run Association was invited to join the Kings Mountain Association in establishing the school. In 1886, efforts and plans were begun to raise money for the school and in 1892, the first building was erected. The school opened on October 1, 1907 with 125 students. The first principal was Professor J.B. Huggins. The school later became known as Gardner-Webb College.

During the tenures of Rev. Ludlum and Rev. Bray, the association occupied an office in the First Baptist Church, Shelby. In 1943, the association voted to build a missionary home on Buffalo Street for the associational missionary. In 1959, the association voted that the missionary home be turned into an office building to provide space for the associational missionary, secretary, clerk/treasurer and to provide conference space for meetings. The home was sold in 1965 and the association rented office space in Shelby.

In 1975, the association called Rev. Bob Davis as Church and Community Ministries Director. Rev. Davis served until August 1989 when he went on medical leave.

Additional staff and growing ministries led the association to build an associational complex on Wylie Road in Shelby. In 1981 a dedication service and open house was held.

In 1990, the association called Rev. Charles Reed as the current Church and Community Ministries Director.

Currently the association is made up of 74 member churches with a total church membership of 30,615.
