IN MEMORIAM

Aaron C. Phipps was born in Ashe County, North Carolina, October 20, 1910. He was married to Esther Merchant Phipps. He has two sons, four grandchildren and a great-grandson.

In 1943 he was ordained to the gospel ministry at Draper Baptist Church, Draper, North Carolina (now Eden).

He was graduated from Campbell College and received his B.A. degree from Wake Forest College, Wake Forest, North Carolina. Aaron also attended Southwestern Seminary at Fort Worth, Texas and Southeastern Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina. During his college days he served churches in Hargett and Garfield counties. Before attending Southwestern he served a field of four churches in Alamance and Rockingham counties. His first pastorate after attending Southwestern was the Woodlawn Baptist Church in Danville, Virginia. He was pastor of Mount Moriah Baptist Church, Raleigh association from 1952-1959. During his tenure at Mount Moriah he served his denomination on an associational and state level.

In August of 1959 he moved to Shelby, North Carolina to serve the Buffalo Baptist Church for ten and a half years.

He then became pastor of the Temple Baptist Church, Henrietta, North Carolina. At the conclusion of his tenure at Temple he retired from the pastorate and moved to Danville, Virginia. He served as interim pastor for many churches in Virginia and North Carolina until his health failed in 1989. On February 3, 1993 God called him to his eternal home.

HISTORY OF WESTVIEW BAPTIST CHURCH

On Sunday afternoon, August 13, 1961, Westview Baptist Church was organized at a meeting in the new Graham School building. The members met the following Sunday with 74 present for Sunday School and 14 new members added during the worship service. For six months Rev. C.O. Greene and Dr. A.B. Wood served as supply pastors without pay. On October 8, Westview moved to the old Graham School building on Oak Street. By November 1, total membership was 105.

Rev. Forrest Teague became the church's first full-time pastor on February 18, 1962. For a couple of years the church moved back to the new Graham School and purchased five and one-half acres on Melody Lane in 1963. On February 7, 1965, the first service was held in the new building. During Rev. Teague's six years of ministry the membership grew to 364.

In June, 1968, the church called Rev. W.J. Yeaman, Jr. During his tenure Westview had it's largest Sunday School attendance ever - 354. Rev. T.W. Estes was called in July 1971. Under his leadership, a multi-purpose building was constructed. Rev. Jerry King began his ministry in 1976. During his tenure the church burned the note on the mortgage from the building project.

Interim pastor, Roland Leath, who was called in January 1982 led the church in a "I Love Westview Day" drive to replenish the general fund resulting in the biggest single day gifts in our history, \$11,811.70. In 1983 Westview voted to build a new sanctuary and five classrooms. Rev. Randy Godwin began in June 1983. The new building was dedicated on June 24, 1984.

Westview's present pastor, Rev. Jim Brackett, began his ministry in May, 1988. In October, 1988, Rev. Larry King was called as associate pastor. In March of 1989 the new building mortgage was retired. The present membership is 551.



HISTORY OF PUTNAM MEMORIAL BAPTIST CHURCH

Putnam Memorial Baptist Church was organized in October 1949, under the guidance of Rev. Lewis E. Ludlum. The first meeting place for the new congregation was a tent located on present day Earl Road. Nineteen members originally met to organize the church, but allowed ten others, over a six month period, to also be considered charter members.

Although the tent sheltered the congregation adequately for a few months, it soon became evident that a more durable structure was needed. A lot on County Home Road was purchased for that new structure. Soon a small building was erected and lovingly referred to as "the temporary building."

Rev. Lawrence Roberts served Putnam Memorial as it's first pastor, overseeing the gradual growth of the new congregation from tent to permanent building.

Under the Lord's guidance the church changed and grew in a wonderful way and larger structures were needed to accommodate that growth. In June 1952, "the temporary building" gave way to the north end of the present educational plant. The south end was added in January 1958. A parsonage was built and open house was held September 13, 1963. On March 1973, a sanctuary was built in the front center of the educational plant and dedicated to the Glory of God.

In July of 1983, God visited the congregation in a special way making it possible for the church to purchase three and one half acres of badly needed land behind the building.

The sanctuary was renovated in 1988 and a gymnasium was built on the newly acquired land and dedication services were held for the two facilities in November of 1988.

Rev. Larry A. Morris serves as pastor, Rev. Terry D. Gold serves as director of music and media, and Rev. T. Bryan Clifton serves as director of education and youth. The current membership is 668.

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this body shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

The purpose of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association shall under the leadership of the Holy Spirit be to counsel together for the enlargement, enrichment, and strengthening of the work of the Lord Jesus Christ in Cleveland County. It shall be our purpose to provide training, to promote unity, growth and fellowship among the churches. We will engage in cooperative mission endeavors to meet the spiritual and physical needs of people in our area which cannot be accomplished by member churches acting independently. We will assist North Carolina Baptists and Southern Baptists in every area of mission and ministry in spreading the Gospel to the ends of the earth.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Membership Committee. Application should include:

- (1) Formal action by the group seeking admission reflecting that seventy-five percent (75%) of those voting expresses their intent to cooperate.
- (2) A written statement reflecting their beliefs and practices.
- (3) A written statement that expresses their intent to cooperate.
- (4) A willingness to meet with the Membership Committee to discuss other areas of mutual interest to both parties.

The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist belief and practice and what it means to cooperate with the churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. If recommended by this committee and accepted by the Association, a mission or a church shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a minimum of one (1) year. Membership within the Association shall be determined by vote of the Association at its annual meeting. Churches under the watchcare shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its Constitution and By-Laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and if requested, the Associational Executive Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like associations.

ARTICLE IV MEETINGS

- Section 1.** The Association shall meet annually on Monday and Tuesday after the fourth Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.
- Section 2.** Special meeting may be called by the Moderator or Executive Board, provided two (2) weeks notice is given to the member churches.
- Section 3.** Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two (2) messengers to the meetings of the Association for each fifty (50) members of the church, provided each church shall not have less than three (3) nor more than ten (10) messengers. **ALONG WITH ALL ASSOCIATIONAL OFFICERS,** these shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of the messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those in attendance and registering at the Associational Meeting.

ARTICLE V AUTHORITY

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this Constitution in Article III, Sections 2 and 3.

ARTICLES VI OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTIONS

- Section 1:** The officers of the association shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Music Director, Brotherhood Director, Women's Missionary Union Director, Director of Media Services, Parliamentarian, and Audiovisual Coordinator.
- Section 2:** The Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee. The floor will then be open for additional nominations. This election will occur on the last day of the annual meeting. All other officers shall be contacted and nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Associational Executive Board at their April meeting.
- Section 3:** The newly elected Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer shall assume at the close of the annual session all duties incumbent upon them relating to work of the ensuing associational year. All other officers shall assume all duties incumbent upon them relating to the work of the ensuing year on October 1.
- Section 4:** Any person having served two (2) terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election for two years.

ARTICLE VII TRUSTEES AND THEIR ELECTION

There shall be three (3) Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three (3) years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one (1) new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one (1) year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

ARTICLE VII THE ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Associational Executive Board shall be composed of all Associational officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Associational Directors of Missions, the Church & Community Ministries Director (ex-officio without voting privileges), each active pastor, and (2) members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The Associational Executive Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by its Constitution. Associational Executive Board members are the connecting link between the Association and the churches. Executive Board members should represent the churches to the Association. Executive Board members should act as representatives for the Association to the churches. It is the responsibility of the Executive Board members to promote the programs, represent the needs and report to the churches concerning the work and ministry of the Association. Executive Board members should seek acceptable means of representing the Association to their respective fellowships. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association at its Annual Meeting.

The quarterly meetings will be in January, April, and July on Monday after the third Sunday.

ARTICLE IX COMMITTEES

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through the following annual meeting.

Section 2: The following committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty (3) days prior to the Annual Meeting to serve during the Annual Meeting: **Enrollment Committee** (By-Law IV, Section 16).

ARTICLE X AMENDMENTS

Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any Annual Session of the Association upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association on the first day and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association on the last day. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

BY-LAWS

By-Law I PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

By-Law II ASSOCIATION YEAR

The Association Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

By-Law III DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committees on Committees and Committee on Enrollment, and shall be the Chairperson of the Associational Executive Board and be ex-officio (without voting privileges) member of all other committees. Upon completion of his term of office, the Moderator shall become a member-at-large (for two (2) years) of the Missions Committee, Executive Committee and Executive Board.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be the Vice-Chairman of the Executive Board, Chairman of the Missions Committee, and Chairman of the Calendar Committee.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's Annual Meeting, distribute at the Annual Meeting copies of the digest of these reports.

and make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of Minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of Minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the Executive Board. This officer shall inform all members elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action and shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its Executive Board, or as designated in the budget (monies to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Board or the Association in annual sessions); render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the Annual Meeting and give a report at each quarterly Executive Board meeting and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

- Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Associational Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.
- Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and make a written report to each Annual Meeting of the Association.
- Section 6: The Sunday School Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Sunday School. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this committee that would promote this work. The Associational Sunday School should assist church leaders to be more effective in their responsibility. This should include:
1. Provide opportunities for fellowship and inspiration.
 2. Interpret the Sunday School Program.
 3. Train Sunday School leaders.
 4. Consult with Sunday School leaders concerning their program.
 5. Provide organization and leadership for cooperative work among the churches.
- Section 7: The Discipleship Training Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of Discipleship Training. This officer shall attend Executive Committee meetings, maintain the on-going work of Discipleship Training at all times, and give an annual report to the Association.
- Section 8: The Music Director shall provide leadership for the Association in session and when requested at other times during the year. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this Committee that would promote the work. He shall encourage music growth in the churches throughout the year and shall make a written report to the Annual meeting.
- Section 9: The Brotherhood Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of men and boys in the churches. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer

creative plans to promote the development of men and boys and an awareness of world mission needs.

Section 10: The Woman's Missionary Union Director serves on the Executive Committee of the Association and works with the Director of Missions; leads the WMU Council; confers with our associational WMU officers and assists them in their work; leads in providing opportunities for leaders and members of their church WMUs to have fellowship and receive inspiration concerning their mutual mission task; leads in interpreting the WMU program to church leaders; leads in training church WMU workers and members; consults with church leaders concerning initiation of WMU work and the improvement of existing work; provides at and plans for associational meeting; leads in associational WMU annual planning; leads in discovering mission action needs and in coordinating the work being done; and reports progress of WMU work to the Association and serves as contact between the Association and state WMU.

Section 11: The Director of Media Services shall promote the beginning and maintenance of church libraries in the churches; provide training opportunities for church librarians; maintain and develop the association library; attend Executive Committee meetings; cooperate with the Director of Missions and make an annual report to the Association at its annual session.

Section 12: The Youth Ministry Coordinator shall, under the supervision of the Director of Missions, serve as chairman of the Youth Ministry Committee of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

Section 13: The Parliamentarian shall, at the Annual Meeting of the Association, rule on all questions of parliamentary procedure which shall arise during the sessions. The Parliamentarian shall serve as a resource person to the churches and shall, upon request, advise and assist the churches on matters of parliamentary procedure.

Section 14: The Audiovisual Coordinator shall assist all associational leadership in selection, production and use of audiovisual materials and upon request, he shall provide similar assistance to individual church leaders and shall provide opportunities for training in the production and use of audiovisuals in education, motivation and worship. The Audiovisual Coordinator shall work with the librarian in storing, cataloging and promoting the use of audiovisual materials equipment. Maintenance of audiovisual equipment is the responsibility of the Audiovisual Coordinator.

Section 15: Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Executive Board, except the office of Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1: THE ORDER OF BUSINESS AND PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Associational Music Director, and three (3) other members. It shall

rotate the place of meeting among the groups of churches with the host church to be determined by the group. It shall recommend the preacher and the alternate for the annual session. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting for the Association, which shall be sent to all pastors on the program and to all pastors at least thirty (30) days before the Annual Meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the Annual Meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary. This committee will be responsible for promoting the Annual Meeting through the various news media.

Section 2: THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

1. Shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Music Director, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMJ Director, President of the Pastor's Conference, Audiovisual Coordinator, and chairpersons of the following committees: Church and Community Ministries Committee, Nominating Committee, Committee on Committees, Christian Life Committee, Membership Committee, Finance Committee, Evangelism Committee, Strategy Planning Committee, Youth Ministry Committee, Student Ministry Committee, and Personnel Committee.

2. When without a Director of Missions, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Director of Missions and recommend such a person to the Executive Committee for election according to By-Law VI.

3. It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or Executive Board and act on routine or emergency matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven (7) is necessary to transact business.

Section 3: THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE, composed of six (6) members, shall promote work of evangelism in the churches and the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its Executive Board.

Section 4: THE FINANCE COMMITTEE, composed of six (7) members, two (2) rotating annually, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs of an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following calendar year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget and make a written report to the Annual Meeting.

THE FINANCE COMMITTEE, may make adjustments during the year in line items or through the assignment of miscellaneous funds in Section VII of the budget providing the adjustments.

1. --will not increase the total budget.
2. --will not alter the basic purpose or intent of the budget.
3. --will have full consent of those affected (individuals, department leaders, etc.)
4. --will not exceed a total of \$5,000 during a fiscal year.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the Association, upon request, with the stewardship programs offered by the Convention.

The Committee shall express gratitude to the churches for their stewardship development that enables them to participate in local, home, and foreign missions.

A contingency fund is to be established and maintained in the approximate amount of one (1) calendar quarter of the Association's operating budget. This contingency fund is to be deposited in an interest bearing account.

These funds are to be disbursed only should a shortfall of general receipts occur, resulting in a lack of funds for regular operating expense.

Any disbursements of funds from the contingency fund must be upon the recommendation of the Clerk/Treasurer, approved by the chairman of the Finance Committee and the Chairman of the Executive Committee and is limited to budgeted items for operations where current funds for such budgeted items have been depleted.

Section 3: THE ORDNATION COMMITTEE, composed of five (5) members, with the pastor of the home church (the church of which the candidate is a member), the Director of Missions, and deacons of the home and requesting churches, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

The Committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of the Minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conference at which the home church voted to request examination of the candidate.

The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.

The chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place, and procedure.

The Committee suggests that the candidate be questioned at least two (2) weeks prior to his ordination.

The Committee shall question the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, and his personal life. The Convention may also counsel the candidate.

The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the ministry.

In every instance, the Committee shall be guided by the Scriptures, especially 1 Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-9.

The Committee shall give written notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the

organization.

The Chairman shall report the Committee's activities to the Executive Board quarterly and provide a written report for the Annual Meeting.

- Section 6: THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE, composed of six (6) members, contact and nominate the officers of the Association according to Article VI of the Constitution. This committee shall also, in cooperation with the Nominating Committee of various departments (except the WMU and Brotherhood organizations), recommend workers for these various departments. The officers and workers of these respective organizations shall be nominated by the organization themselves and submitted to the Nominating Committee (Article VI, Section 1). They shall also nominate Associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. The committee shall also assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

- Section 7: THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE, composed of three (3) members shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and make recommendations as needed.

- Section 8: THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE, composed of five (5) members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws. The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist faith and practice and what it means to cooperate with other churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. The Membership Committee shall annually review all churches and missions under the watchcare of the Association and may present them for membership within the Association or that they continue under the watchcare.

- Section 9: THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, WMU Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director and Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an associational calendar for the coming year and present same to the ANNUAL MEETING OF MISSIONERS.

- Section 10: THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE composed of three (3) members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation, plan and promote the work of the Committee in an annual planning meeting; and present resolutions of appreciation to individuals, organizations, and churches when there are events worthy of commendation. DEDICATE THE ANNUAL MINUTES TO A DESERVING PERSON.

- Section 11: THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and six (6) other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its

report at the Annual Association Meeting.

Section 12: THE SEMINARY EXTENSION COMMITTEE, composed of three (3) members, shall publicize study courses and programs that are available; and shall plan, provide and promote Seminary Extension studies as they may be desired.

Section 13: THE CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMITTEE composed of a chairperson and one person from each group of churches will give continual attention to the moral climate of the community and shall initiate necessary action to maintain and improve the climate for positive good. The committee shall commend those persons and institutions that uphold Christian virtue and shall support the churches teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness. This committee will encourage all churches in the association to take the necessary steps to create and maintain the Christian Life Committee in their congregations. The associational Christian Life Committee will have a close working relationship with the various church committees.

Section 14: THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES, composed of seven (7) members, one from each group of churches as defined by the association, plus the chairman, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX, Section 1), and shall assist the Executive Board in filling vacancies on all standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the Chairman of each committee.

Section 15: THE TELEPHONE CONTACT COMMITTEE shall be composed of one (1) person from each group of churches in the Association (6). These committee members shall relay messages to pastors and lay leaders during the year. All messages to be sent should be cleared with the Director of Missions.

Section 16: THE ENROLLMENT COMMITTEE shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of the messengers. A total enrollment shall be made for each day.

Section 17: THE CHURCH & COMMUNITY MINISTRIES COMMITTEE

A. Purpose -- The purpose of the Church & Community Ministries Committee shall be to work with the CCM Director to lead the Association to address the priority ministry needs in Cleveland County, and to plan and coordinate programs of ministry to share Christ's love in meeting the spiritual, educational, emotional, and physical needs.

B. Organization -- The Church & Community Ministries Committee shall be composed of resource personnel from area ministries with which the Church and Community Ministries is actively involved plus the WMU Director and/or the Mission Action Director of the WMU, Brotherhood Director and/or the Baptist Men's Director. The CCM Director will serve as chairman of the committee. Emergency Ministry needs not addressed in the constitution will be met at the discretion of the CCM Director after consultation with the Director of Missions.

C. MEETING - The Church and Community Ministry Committee will meet as needed to develop the programs of ministry.

Section 18: FAMILY LIFE COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) members and shall have the following responsibilities:

1. Train, develop and encourage church and associational family life work.
2. Provide opportunities for working together in family life work.
3. Provide resources and services to churches and family life leaders.
4. Establish and maintain appropriate communication and relationships within the community and the denomination.
5. Plan programs, activities and events that address the needs of family ministry, marriage enrichment, the home, etc.

Section 19: THE MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be made up of the following members: Chairman (Vice-Moderator), the Director of Missions, Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Finance Committee Chairman, Chairperson of Church & Community Ministries Committee, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Brotherhood Director, WMU Director, Music Director, President of the Pastors' Conference, and Audiovisual Coordinator.

This Committee is to be available as a sounding board, to support the Director of Missions as a person (as well as an officer in the Association), provide feedback concerning Associational programs and activities, conveying suggestions from the Association and offering support in projecting programs to the Executive Committee and/or Executive Board. The Missions Committee shall seek to determine areas of needs within and without the Association and formulate recommendations to the Associational Executive Committee.

The Committee shall enthusiastically explore all mission possibilities throughout the Association, emphasizing the need for new teaching units, preaching points, missions, and churches, and it shall actively seek out potential sponsoring churches for the beginning of specific mission endeavors. Providing energetic outreach leadership for the Association shall be the Committee's highest priority.

Section 20: THE RECREATION AND DRAMA COMMITTEE, composed of six (6) members, shall promote a program of Christian recreation and drama in the churches. The Committee shall regard recreation and drama as a means, not an end. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall use their programs as a way to teach, a means of witnessing and an event of expressing the abundant Christian life. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall be responsible to give assistance to any church that should request help in the area of recreation and drama. The Committee's responsibilities shall include fellowships, Senior Adults, retreats, crafts, drama workshops and other assignments of the Association, if asked. The Chairperson of the Recreation and Drama Committee shall plan with the Director of Missions and give a report.

of the committee's activities at the Executive Board quarterly meetings.

Section 21: THE STRATEGY PLANNING COMMITTEE, composed of six (6) members, shall seek to understand the 'Priority Statements' of the Association, provide support and suggestions to the appropriate committees for implementation; and recognize personally and publicly the committees that address themselves to, and make significant accomplishment in achieving the 'Priority Statements.' At a time it judges appropriate, the Committee will also suggest to the Association the need for further strategy planning.

Section 22: YOUTH MINISTRY COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) members and the Associational Youth Ministry Coordinator who serves as chairman. This committee shall have the following responsibilities:

1. Plan associational youth ministry programs and events.
2. Enlist the support of church youth and youth leaders for associational programs and events related to youth ministry.
3. Provide on-going support for church youth and youth leaders in churches.
4. Plan and promote associational training and information conferences for church youth and youth leaders.
5. Promote state, regional and national conferences in youth ministry.
6. Any other activity which the Director of Missions and/or Executive Committee deem necessary to foster a positive Christian Witness for Christ.

Section 23: MEMORIALS COMMITTEE, composed of three (3) members will be responsible for:

1. Recognizing deceased ministers, staff, deacons and members in an appropriate way.
2. Submitting report for inclusion in Associational Minutes.
3. Ministering to the families of associational officers, ministers and staff members when death occurs.

Section 24: PASTORAL MINISTRIES COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) ministers and/or staff persons in the Association with two (2) rotating off each year. It shall be the duty of this committee to work with the Director of Missions in planning and promoting continuing educational opportunities for ministers and staff persons in the Association.

Section 25: BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three (3) members and shall be responsible for the maintenance of the associational office and surrounding grounds. This committee is responsible to the Executive Committee.

Section 26: PERSONNEL COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) members and shall have the following responsibilities:

1. Develop proper and appropriate personnel policies and procedures for the associational staff.

2. Be responsible for securing associational support staff when openings occur.
3. Seek solutions for problems concerning associational staff.
4. Conduct staff evaluations and recommend salary and benefit proposals to Finance Committee.

This committee is responsible to the Executive Committee and the Chairman of the Personnel Committee shall be a member of the Executive Committee. The director of missions is an ex-officio member of the Personnel Committee except when the committee is in executive session.

Section 27 SINGLE ADULT MINISTRY COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) members and shall have the following responsibilities:

1. Train, develop and encourage leaders of single adults within local churches.
2. Serve as a catalyst to encourage churches together in a cooperative effort to further Single Adult Ministry.
3. Provide resources, programs, and services to local churches and leaders in the area of Single Adult Ministry.
4. Serve as a liaison to establish and maintain communication within the community and denominations.

Section 28 SENIOR ADULT MINISTRY COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) members and shall have the following responsibilities:

1. Assist in the organization and development of senior adult clubs in the local church.
2. Initiate, promote, and conduct senior adult ministries and activities in the association.
3. Provide opportunities for the development and enrichment of senior adults in the association.

Section 29 STUDENT MINISTRY COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) members and shall have the following responsibilities:

1. Help local Baptist Student Unions and churches reach and minister to college and university students.
2. Work with the state director of student ministries and local directors of student ministries to start new Baptist Student Unions in the association and to strengthen existing programs.
3. Assist in recruiting volunteer directors.
4. Provide training for workers with students.
5. Help involve students in the associational missions work.

Section 30 Members of all these committees except the Church and Community Ministries Committee and Student Ministry Committee and those appointed by the moderator, shall be elected to serve not more than three (3) years on a rotating basis.

By-Law V TRUSTEES

The duty of the Trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other securities of said Association; and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its Executive Board.

By-Law VI DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

When without a Director of Missions, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Director of Missions and recommend such person to the Executive Committee. His selection shall be upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association at its Annual Meeting, or between sessions of the Association, by its Executive Board. His time of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity. His duties will be in accordance with the job description at the time of his call.

By-Law VII CHURCH & COMMUNITY MINISTRIES DIRECTOR

- Section 1: Employment - The Director of CCM shall be jointly employed by the Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Home Mission Board. The employee should be elected to work until the sponsoring groups mutually agree to cease the tenure of service of the employee resigns. The CCM Director shall work under the supervision of the Director of Missions and in compliance with the Job Description provided by the State and Association.
- Section 2: Basic Function - The basic functions are to work with the CCM Committee or organize, supervise and promote a program of activities to meet the spiritual, educational, emotional and physical needs of the people within the geographical boundaries of the Association.
- Section 3: The CCM Director shall be an ex-officio member of the Associational Executive Board, Associational Executive Committee and Missions Committee without voting privileges.
- Section 4: When without a Church & Community Ministries Director, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Church & Community Ministries Director according to By-Law VII, Sections 1 & 2.

By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the Annual Meeting by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

By-Law IX DEFINE PROCEDURE

- Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- Section 2: Every report, resolution, or attendance offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.
- Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.
- Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.
- Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six

(6) Associational Groups as follows: PoKeville, Lattimore, Shelby, Kings Mountain, Cherokee, and Waco.

Monday Evening
October 25, 1993

He longs for Southern Baptists to know what is being done on the mission field. He shared scripture from Matthew 9:35-39 and offered a challenge for those who would "step forward" into areas of eastern Europe to be "their" shepherd and live out the truth of the gospel among the people. He told of instances of what is currently happening in many of these areas such as Bulgaria, Albania, Yemen, etc. and what an urgency there is to get into these areas now. We have 200 Russian missionaries and had 50,000 baptisms last year in Russia. He shared about many things being done through the aid of Southern Baptists through their mission gifts.
20. Dr. James asked for an invitation hymn. Rev. Lawton Neely led the congregation in "Wherever He Leads" as persons responded to the leading of the Holy Spirit.
21. Rev. Gene Daggehart, pastor of Ross Grove Church, pronounced the benediction.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON OCTOBER 26, 1993

22. As messengers and visitors gathered at Putnam Memorial Church for the second session of our annual meeting, special music was provided by a string quartet: Leland Kree, our director of missions, on the bass, Lawton Neely of Bethel Church, on the harjo, Mike McGee of Elizabeth Church, and Rod Murrey of Bethlehem Church on the guitars.
23. Moderator Russell Pitts called our session to order. Rev. Larry Morris, pastor of Putnam Memorial, welcomed us to the host church and recognized Pauline Webber, a member at Putnam who attended the annual meeting in 1949 when Putnam was received into the association. Putnam was the last church to be received into the association without being under watchcare. Mrs. Webber has attended every annual meeting since 1949 with the exception of one. Rev. Larry King, associate pastor of Westview Church, accompanied by Rev. Doug Padgett, minister of music/choir, Zion Church, led the congregation in singing, "I Love Your Kingdom, Lord." Scripture was read from Colossians 1: 9-15 and prayer was led by Rev. Glenn Walker, pastor of Double Springs Church.

24. Rev. Charlie Cabaniss, minister of music at Christopher Road and chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the following nominations for 1993-94:

Moderator.....Rev. Jim Brackett
Vice-Moderator.....Mrs. Mary Lou Casady
Clerk-Treasurer.....Ms. Rebecca Singham

There were no nominations from the floor. Rev. John Bridges, pastor of Grover First, motioned that we accept the nominations. Rev. Allan Barlow, pastor of Pleasant Grove, seconded the motion. The motion carried and the officers were elected.

25. Rev. Jim Brackett, pastor of Westview Church and vice-moderator, gave the Missions Committee report. He asked all to read the report and also asked that we make these concerns a part of our daily prayer life remembering what God would have us do as an association and as individuals. Rev. Brackett also presented the 1994 calendar. One change was made: the WMU Spring Meeting was moved from April 25 to May 10. Rev. Brackett motioned that we accept the calendar. The motion was seconded, voted on and approved.
26. Dr. Robert Abrams presented the Constitution Committee recommendation for a change from 5 members of the Committee on Constitution to seven members. He moved that this change be approved. Rev. Harold Pitts seconded. It was voted on and approved.
27. The Committee on Committee report was given by Rev. John Bridges, pastor of Grover First. He thanked the members of the committee for their work. The committee tried to include all, or as many as possible, of our churches and also tried to balance males and females and lay persons and clergy. Rev. Bridges moved to adoption of this report. Charlie Cabaniss seconded the motion. It was voted on and approved.
28. The Memorials committee report was presented by Rev. Dan Jolly. We lost 252 laypersons, 11 deacons, and 5 ministers, Marlow Stroup, Herman Thomas, Elanist Myers, Bruce Wilson and Aaron Phipps. Rev. Jolly led a time of prayer in memory of them.

29. Ms. Rebecca Bingham, clerk-treasurer, gave the Executive Board report. She extended an invitation to everyone to attend the quarterly meetings of the board, so that you may know what is going on in our association. Ms. Bingham also presented the 92-93 Treasurers report. No questions were asked about this report. It was voted on and approved.
30. The Sunday School report was given by Joe Coffins, our Sunday School director. He noted that our ASSISTeam has received standard recognition from the State Convention for the past two years. With many training opportunities this past year, Calvary, Elizabeth and Poplar Springs have lead with the largest number of participants in these events.
31. Rev. Larry Burns, pastor of Faith, gave the Discipleship Training report. We are all called to be disciples and to make disciples. He moved the report be accepted. This was recorded, voted on and approved.
32. Enrollment cards were taken up by the visitors at this time.
33. Mrs. Dorcas Wacaster, minister of music and youth at First Hill, led us in singing "The Church is One Foundation".
34. Rev. Jose Espinuelas, pastor of our Spanish mission, The Star of Bethlehem, gave his report. He thanked the individuals, churches, and the association for help in working with the mission this past year. A special "thanks" went to Pottsville Church who donated a van to the mission. They now have 25 members with an average attendance of 13 each Sunday worship.
35. Dr. John Sloan, pastor at First Baptist in Kings Mountain, reported on the Lactian mission work. They have had no baptisms and no decisions YHT but the work is continuing. Dr. Sloan asked us to pray daily for a spiritual awakening in the Lactian community of our county.
36. Moderator Russell Pitts asked that any new pastors or staff who were not here last night to please come forward and introduce themselves. These were: Paul West, minister of youth and singles at Shelby First, Mark King, pastor at Zion, and David Jones, pastor at Crestview.
37. Joe Cabezas, chairman of the Finance Committee, gave his report. He stated that the quarterly missions account receipts for 92-93 were \$224,947.19. He presented the new January - December 1994 budget. The Personnel Committee had input on staff salary and benefits which had a 5% increase. Total budget increased 6 1/2 % over last year. The floor was opened for questions. There were none. Mr. Cabezas moved the adoption of the budget. Rev. Dave Gordon seconded. It was voted on and approved.
38. Dr. Paul Sorrells, pastor of Beaver Dam, gave the Membership Committee report. The committee has been working with Crestview Church since their beginning on June 13, 1993. The church has already baptized 15. Dr. Sorrells recommended, on behalf of the Membership Committee, that Crestview be brought under the watchcare of the association. Mr. Harold Caudy seconded the motion. It was voted on and approved.
39. The Historian report was given by Dr. Wynn Washburn. He highlighted several individuals from the Shelby group of churches who have been great leaders in Baptist life.

40. Director of Missions Leland Kerr welcomed Crestview Church into our association under watchcare status. He commended Rev. Jose Espinolas, pastor of the Star of Bethlehem Spanish Mission, for his work in our community. Rev. Kerr also encouraged us to support the Habitat House that is being built for the Espinolas family in any way that we can. Rev. Kerr also asked that churches "adopt" the missionary in residence by helping with rent of their house which is \$500 per month.
41. Special music was presented by Rev. Terry Gold, his wife, Beth and Teresa Crawford, all of Putnam Memorial Church.
42. Rev. Leland Kerr gave his report. He has been our director of missions for 22 months now. Rev. Kerr asked everyone who had been on a mission trip of any kind this past year to raise their hand. Many hands were raised. Missions the most important part of our work as Christians. Rev. Jon Toole, church planter in the Boiling Springs area new work, was introduced. Rev. Toole thanked the churches that are helping with this effort: Beaver Dam, Boiling Springs, Christopher Road, Flat Hill and Poplar Springs. He encouraged anyone who wants to help, to please contact him. Rev. Kerr stated that now with Crestview under our watchcare that we have a total of 81 churches and missions in our association. This summer our association, in partnership with the Greater Rochester Baptist Association in New York, participated in a mission trip to New York where work was done with three area churches. Sixty-one people from our association went on this trip. Linda Ellis, Dorcas Wainster, Bryan Gordon and Jeanne Watson shared some of their experiences with us. Three decisions for Christ were made by persons in New York. Another trip is planned for July 8-16, 1994. Rev. Kerr expressed a burden for our churches who are struggling. The figures from our Uniform Church Letters for 1992-93 (with six churches not reporting) show decreases in many areas of our work. Sunday School enrollment and baptisms are down from last year but there is still hope if we give it to the Lord and pray and work. We gung work together and make disciples. Isaiah 54: 2-4 gives us an effective plan for breakthrough. William Cary once said, "Attempt great things for God. Expect great things from God." Rev. Kerr encouraged us to step out on faith instead of being silent Christians. We have hope...in Jesus Christ!
43. Rev. Larry Morris, pastor of our host church, Putnam Memorial, gave directives and thanks for our evening meal.

TUESDAY EVENING October 26, 1993

44. At 8:30 p.m. as messengers and visitors gathered for the evening session, a video was presented on how three churches reached out to bring "Hope to Hating Humanity." After the video, Charles Reed, director of church and community ministries of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association, encouraged churches to do simultaneous crusades in the spring of 1994 with "Hope for Hating Humanity" as their theme.

45. A most inspiring pre-session musical program was rendered by the Celebration Singers of Putnam Church. The singers were accompanied by taped music and the musical presentation was interspersed with displays of banners. A dramatic sketch on "I Don't Want to Fight You Any More" was presented by Norma Smith.
46. Vice-Moderator Jim Brackett, pastor of Westview Church, provided for the remainder of the session.
47. Rev. Bob Dilla, minister of music, First Church Shelby, led the congregation in singing, "Beware the Perishing."
48. Rev. Mark King, pastor of Zion Church, shared scriptures from Psalm 48:10 and led in the opening prayer for this session.
49. Rev. Charles Reed, church and community ministries director, gave the CCM report. He shared with the group how the work of CCM began in our association with the calling, in March 1978, of Rev. Bob Davis as the first director. Rev. Reed asked Mr. A.B. Davidson to come forward to accept an appreciation plaque on behalf of Mr. Carlos Young who served our association over twenty years in the jail ministry. Mr. Young was unable to be present to accept the plaque. Due to health reasons he must resign from the jail ministry.
50. Rev. Ed Sessions, retired pastor and chairman of the Resolutions Committee, presented his report. The report included the dedication of the association's minutes to the memory of Rev. Aaron C. Phipps, Rev. Marlow Arthur Sloop, and Rev. Robert Bruce Wilson.
51. Rev. Ed Sessions chairman of Amalgam Task Force spoke briefly concerning amity for pastors and offered a challenge to the churches of the importance of taking care of their pastors for retirement.
52. Ms. Rebecca Bingham gave the attendance report. She reported a total of 345 for the day: 206 messengers and 28 non-messengers in attendance for the afternoon session and 85 messengers and 26 non-messengers for the evening session. This represented 85 of our churches.
53. Mrs. Laddell Shukla, minister of music/education/youth, Beaver Dam Church, led the congregation in singing, "Come, We That Love the Lord."
54. Vice-Moderator Jim Brackett presented the 1993-94 Committee on Committees on behalf of Moderator Russell Pitts. Those who will serve are: Rev. Jeff Barendse, Elizabeth Church, chairman; Mrs. Frances Cavity, Bethany Church; Mr. Hankel Swinto, Putnam Grove Church; Mrs. Vickie Wyatt, Poplar Springs Church; Rev. Alton Martin, Putnam Church; Mrs. Beth Haffner, Dover Church; and Mr. Hal Carpenter, Waco Church.
55. Special music for the evening was rendered by a choir's quartet from Putnam Church.
56. Vice-Moderator Jim Brackett introduced Rev. Russell Pitts for presentation of the moderator's message.
57. Moderator Russell Pitts presented his message for the evening. He talked about "What do we Baptists Believe and Teach." He spent time reflecting back over his ministry and the things he believed. He shared scripture from Hosea 4:6, "My people are destroyed from lack of knowledge." He talked about various aspects of church: complaining, trusting, finances, family, the importance of a church following God's plan, forgiveness among Christians, how God can handle different ways of worship and doesn't forget anything about us but our sins.

58. Leland Kerr presented a plaque to Moderator Fitts for his two-year tenure as associational moderator. He expressed appreciation for the way Rev. Fitts has been available to help him since he came as director of missions as well as always having a "good word" for the people of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.
59. At this time the new associational officers were installed and a prayer of commitment given by Director of Missions Leland Kerr. The new officers are:
- * Moderator: Rev. Jim Brackett, pastor of Westview Church
 - * Vice-Moderator: Mrs. Mary Lou Cusby, Shelby First Church
 - * Clerk/Treasurer: Ms. Ranaa Bingham, Elizabethtown Church
- Rev. Kerr passed the gavel to our new moderator and asked the congregation to pledge their support of the new team of leaders by standing.
60. Moderator Jim Brackett asked for the prayers of Kings Mountain Baptist Association. He feels God wants to break through to his people in a mighty way but this will not happen without a lot of prayer. He asked that we pray for God to reveal His glory to His people.
61. Rev. Russell Fitts dismissed with prayer the 143rd annual session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

What a joy it is to serve as your director of missions. I enjoy this association so much and appreciate the opportunity you have given me to minister with you. I am glad God called me to this place of service. I appreciate our associational staff who are really my "family." We are blessed indeed to have such a caring, loving, and qualified team in Charles, Margaret, Judy, and Diane. We serve as a team to assist you and your church.

As I travel from church to church in our association I see firsthand how gifted and unique our churches and church members are in their setting. I have had the opportunity during 1992-93 to do many things in our churches - preach, train pastor search committees, work with deacons, work with finance committees, preach revivals, entertain, interpret Southern Baptist work, lead Sunday School conferences, speak to missions organizations, work with youth and much, much more. I try to be in our churches as often as possible.

A new service to our churches is the "Great Commission Breakthrough" (OCB). This is a process of evaluation, internal study, applying demographic information, interviewing church members and key leaders, and setting priorities, goals and actions to enable a church to position itself to fulfill the Great Commission. A part of this process is a four-session Bible study centered around the Great Commission passage in Matthew 28. I have had the privilege to lead this process as a consultant in three of our churches - Lawndale, Pleasant Grove, and Westview. I have recently started the process with Poplar Springs Baptist Church, and three other churches are considering entering the process. You can contact our associational office for more details.

I think the OCB is an excellent tool to help a church grow. I envision at least ten churches per year involved in OCB. Some of our ASSISTment members are trained OCB consultants. My work in this area affirms our need for a church development director to broaden our opportunities to assist churches "on mission in their setting." We hope to add this staff member in the next few months. The search committee is working diligently to fill the position.

We had the opportunity in July of this year to participate in our first project in partnership with the Greater Rochester Baptist Association in Rochester, New York. Sixty-eight youth and adults from twelve of our churches worked with three churches in the Rochester area July 9-17. We conducted Backyard Bible Clubs, led worship services, distributed church flyers, conducted door-to-door surveys and did some re-modeling of a church building. We plan to take another group July 8-16, 1994 to mark your calendar. We may also send an adult construction team in 1994. More details later.

During our annual meeting you will hear the report of the great work of our church and community ministries under the direction of Charles Reed. This part of our work is leading the way in our state and in our convention through timely and very creative approaches to meeting the needs of the 90's. Two workshops in particular reminded us of the needs around us that we as churches must address - "Ministry to the Chemically Dependent" and "When HIV/AIDS comes to Church." Charles continues to bring to our attention various needs that we must respond to and resources to meet those needs. Charles is part of a Regional HIV/AIDS Consortium and also chairs the

HIV/AIDS Task Force of our Baptist State Convention.

I want to urge each of our churches to support the Bill Glass Crusade October 31 - November 7 at Gardner-Webb University. We need this crusade to remind ourselves and our community that we must be about the business of reaching the lost and making disciples. There is no more important task than this.

As we look toward a new year of opportunities for ministry in our association, let us do so with openness, obedience, and faith. Please call me if I can assist you and/or your church in any way.

Prison Ministry:

A. Yokefellow Ministry - Rev. Rosabelle Ingle, Rev. Scott Carpenter and

Jeffery Allen assist with a time of worship and fellowship every other Tuesday at the local prison unit.

B. Bible Study - Rev. Rochelle Ingle assisted by Thomas Garver lead a Bible study on Thursday afternoons at the local prison unit.

5. Ministry to the Visually Impaired:

Two individuals were assisted with eyeglasses. One Gardner Webb student was helped with a special watch. A pizza party for visually handicapped students from Gardner-Webb University was held in May.

6. Ministry to the Developmentally Disabled:

One Vacation Bible School and five day camps were held for developmentally disabled young people. The average attendance for these events was five students. Approximately sixty-five volunteers assisted with these activities. Jason Kerr, the CCM summer worker, coordinated these events.

7. Migrant Ministry:

Worship and fellowship services for migrant workers were held during the summer months at Belwood Community Center. Five Baptist churches assisted in serving meals. Rev. Jose Espinales conducted the services. There were eleven professions of faith.

8. Friday Lunch Program:

The number of meals served to the hungry and homeless this year was 1,511. Assisting in serving were 211 volunteers.

9. Jail Ministry:

Services were conducted on Sunday afternoons at the Cleveland County Jail by approximately twenty-six different churches serving on a rotating schedule.

10. Literacy Ministry:

Literacy training workshops were held at Temple Baptist Church on February 27 and May 15. Eleven individuals received certificates for having completed Lambach Literacy Training.

11. Childrens Bible Ministry:

Children whose parents have applied for assistance at the CCM office are mailed Bible books on their birthdays. John Cabness oversees this ministry.

12. Volunteer Receptionists and Clothing Room Workers:

We have nineteen volunteers who assist as regularly as receptionists for the CCM office. Ten ladies volunteer time on a weekly basis to assist in our clothing room.

13. HIV/AIDS Conference:

A conference entitled "When HIV/AIDS Comes to the Church" was held at Gardner-Webb University on April 13. There were approximately 100 participants from local churches, the professional community and Gardner-Webb University. The conference was sponsored by S.E. Morris Academy and Kings Mountain Baptist Association. Information was presented about the clinical and psychological aspects of HIV/AIDS. Program presenters included members of the medical and church professions as well as family members and individuals who have been affected by HIV/AIDS.

14. Chemical Dependency Workshop:

"The Church Ministering to the Chemically Dependent and Their Families" was a workshop held at Gardner-Webb University May 17-20. The workshop was co-sponsored by Kings Mountain Baptist Association, the S.E. Morris Academy and the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. There were approximately forty participants.

15. Mississippi Disaster Relief:

Kings Mountain Baptist Association has been receiving donations to aid those individuals in the flooded areas of the Mississippi River. These donations are forwarded to the Baptist State Convention where the Baptist Men's Department uses the funds for water purification systems, food and shelter for the flood victims. JULY 19 - At Macedonia, where Leland Kerr shared about the Youth Mission Trip to New York, reporting that 65 youth and adults from 12 churches in the association and three youth from other associations enjoyed the opportunity afforded by the trip and the ministries involved. In the absence of Charles Reed, Diane Davis reported for the church and community ministries, stating how much volunteers were appreciated and still needed in so many areas of the work of the association.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

"As the Sunday School goes, so goes the church." I have been hearing this phrase for years, and become more and more convinced of it every year. The truth of this is the driving force behind the Kings Mountain Baptist Association's commitment to ASSIST work. ASSIST stands for Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team and is composed of volunteers from all over our association who give their time and many talents to help churches develop their Sunday Schools.

For the third year in a row, your ASSISTTeam has received the recognition of Standard ASSIST from the Baptist Sunday School Board for its leadership in a variety of workshops, participation in training at the state level, and availability to the churches who need information and other help. Members of this year's ASSISTTeam include Joe Collins, director; Jerry Welch, adult and small church director; Bridget Allen, Vacation Bible School director and youth director; Scott Norton, youth director; Mark Davis, children director; Linda Ellis, preschool director; and Robert Heynes, outreach/evangelism director. A host of others helped lead our Vacation Bible School clinics.

Workshops led by the ASSISTTeam offered help in many areas of Sunday School work. On February 25, Bridget Allen led pastors and Vacation Bible School directors in a VBS Early Bird clinic to help them "get a jump" on the massive task of Vacation Bible School.

On April 3-4, Temple Baptist Church hosted the annual Spring outreach clinic. Forty-five participants represented eleven churches as they studied the new Reaching People series.

On May 4 and 6, two Vacation Bible School clinics were held, one in the eastern part of the association, the other in the western.

On August 30-31, the ASSISTTeam led our association in basic training and offered a variety of conferences from which experienced and inexperienced workers could benefit. Twenty-six churches were represented by sixty-six participants in the two night affair held at Calvary Baptist Church.

A few churches have stood out this year in their commitment to training on the associational level. Calvary led the way by involving nineteen different people in training. Poplar Springs involved fourteen, and Bethlehem involved twelve. May we learn from these churches the value of training to lead our churches to be all they should. HISTORIANS REPORT

My report this year will deal mostly with the 14 churches in the SHELBY GROUP. These host churches are in the geographical center of the association, and have the most members of any of our six groups.

Following is a list of these churches with their dates of founding and their contribution to missions last year. Data for this year will be in the new minutes of this meeting.

Names of these churches came from places, faces, roads, the Bible, herbs, a sweetheart, an orchard and geography. Pure democracy and religion at its best, don't you think?

If Zoar is the second oldest church in the association, may it also be called the mother of these churches. Shelby First may then be called a daughter and the other churches, born in the 20th century, may be called granddaughters and great granddaughters. As the town and community of Shelby grew the need for new churches arose.

The late John R. Dwyer used to say he wanted a Baptist church in every area where he built a cattle mill.

Gifts to missions from this group of churches has been outstanding. Members averaged \$73 per person last year which exceeds the associational average of \$69 and the state average of \$54 per member per year. This does not include contributions to local expenses.

Zoar and Shelby First were among the 19 churches which in 1851 withdrew from the Broad River Association to help form the new Kings Mountain Baptist Association which now has 77 churches. This county seat area has provided much leadership to the State and to the South in government, in civic affairs and building churches.

At a meeting at Zoar in 1905 this association voted to start a school to train preachers and church workers to teach the Bible and basic education. This school, now Gardner-Webb University, has over 2,000 students and teaches a broad range of subjects and awards, doctoral as well as academic degrees.

Christopher Road with Rev. Mackey Heyward as pastor, is now at five years of age, well on its way to becoming fully self-supporting. A thrilling part of its baby-days has been thousands of hours worked by volunteers from other churches, and cash donations from many sectors.

A brief look at the calendar tells us that our 150th anniversary the Sesqui-centennial year of 2001, is fast approaching. It is not too early to begin to plan how best to celebrate and observe this most historical event.

Our History Committee wishes to thank all the church clerks and historians for gathering data this year which will be reflected in the annual minutes of this body.

THE FOLLOWING IS THE ACTUAL HISTORIANS REPORT GIVEN AT THE ANNUAL MEETING _____

This year the fourteen churches in the Shelby area are hosts to the association. These churches and the Shelby community in the past 142 years have produced a number of Baptist GIANTS, so to speak in the association, for the State of North Carolina and the nation. These giants have appeared both in the old days and in recent years. I name a few.

John E. Logan and wife, Susan, were members at Zora. He was a historian of high caliber and wrote a complete history of the Broad River and the Kings Mountain Baptist Associations from the year 1800 to around 1880. He was born in 1811 and died in 1884.

Thomas Dixon Sr. was the father of several famous men and women including A.C. Dixon, internationally known minister; Thomas Jr. author and playwright whose books on post-Civil War events were the subjects of movies, stage dramas and pageants; Frank, governor of Alabama; Delia Dixon Carroll, first woman physician of the State of North Carolina and resident physician at Meredith College. Elder Dixon was pastor of several churches in this area and was for 34 years pastor at New Prospect, the longest tenure of record in the association. He lived on South Washington Street in Shelby.

The Durham family had several giants. Two ministers were Charles and Colcabon, the latter at one time was executive secretary of the NC Baptist State Convention. Charles C. was clerk of superior court; Capenford and L.N. were at separate times mayor of the City of Shelby; Dr.L.N. was a dentist; W.C. was an editor; Robert Lee was president of a seminary for women and Captain Plato Durham was wounded several times as captain of a company in the Civil War. A marker near the court square in Shelby tells his story.

L.C. Each, L.M. Berry, D.L. Scrugg and G.P. Hamrick were all pastors of the Shelby First Church. Scrugg was a native of Germany, but became a loyal American.

Joseph Sattle was pastor at Double Springs when the association was organized there in 1854. He was grandfather to our better known Brother John Sattle, who was moderator of the association for 40 years.

In more recent times some of our "giants" have included Dr. Zora Wall, pastor of Shelby First for 25 years, president of the State Convention four times, a record.

president of Gardner-Webb College, now a university, and author of a number of books of sermons. His music minister, Horace Eason, a layman, was almost as well known in the state.

G. Max Gardner, Tipton governor and U.S. Ambassador to the Court of St. James in Britain, taught a large Sunday School at First Church. His wife, Faye Webb Gardner, was widely acclaimed as a hostess both in Raleigh and Washington. She was a trustee at Gardner-Webb, founder of the Shelby Women's Club, mother and grandmother to Baptists who continue to bear the name well.

Ray E. Brown, son of a South Shelby minister, noted hospital and health care administrator in Shelby, Winston-Salem, and Chicago, was another giant.

C.O. Greene, rural minister, was the first director of missions for the Kings Mountain Association, and the best known clock maker and wood craftsman in this part of the state. The one thing he does better than woodworking is preaching.

Clare W. Southern followed C.O. Greene as director of missions and led the association in many areas of enlargement and service. Joe E. Cabaniss and Lawrence Roberts both served long terms as clerk-treasurer for our association. Carlos Young has been very active with the brotherhood and in the Baptist Hospitals and Homes for the Aged.

John Roberts of the Elizabeth Church is editor of the Baptist Courier of South Carolina and is a past president of the South Carolina Baptist Convention.

Last, but certainly not least, is Dr. Gene Watterson, pastor of First Baptist in Shelby. He is the shepherd of the largest flock in our midst, and was president of the Baptist State Convention twice.

It may sound odd to include women as giants, but by any measure, Mrs. Mae Cline Sroupe qualifies. In her lifetime, she gave away close to a million dollars to many charities...Baptist schools, Baptist hospitals. Her name is on two large buildings at Gardner-Webb and Mars Hill Universities.

I salute the GIANTS and the giant tasks they made look so easy.

STAR OF BETHLEHEM HISPANIC MISSION REPORT

This year has been a blessing in our work for God. His word says: "If any man come to me, and hate not his father, and mother, and wife, and children, and brethren, and sisters, yea, and his own life also, he cannot be my disciple" (Luke 14:26).

All my free time I spend on families who do not know about Jesus. Many families have been helped with housing, lights, food, and clothes through our mission with the help of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

During the first three months of 1993, many families lost their jobs. This caused them to move to Lincoln, Forest City, Charlotte, Durham, Raleigh, Miami, and Mexico. We still keep in touch with these families and some of them come to church every fifteen days.

In January 1993 we started Bible studies every Wednesday with a forty percent attendance. We also have services on Monday and Saturday for the people who have been sick and could not come to church on Sunday. We continue to teach Spanish on Saturday at my house from 6-8 p.m. (These classes are free).

This year was a successful one with the migrant workers. We had twenty-seven accept Jesus as personal Savior, two were baptized, three were reconciled and two children were dedicated to God.

We received a van from Polkville Baptist Church. We are very thankful for their generosity. We also want to thank Leland Kerr, Charles Reed and the associational staff for their help.

LAOTIAN MISSION REPORT

In June, 1992, the Kings Mountain Baptist Association and the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina joined with the York Baptist Association and the Baptist State Convention of South Carolina in a mission effort to reach the Laotian people with the gospel of Jesus Christ. This mission effort focused on the Laotian communities in and around Clover, South Carolina and Kings Mountain, North Carolina.

Steve Sergap has directed the work with the advice and assistance of retired missionary to Thailand, Rev. Judson Lennon. Steve has attempted to minister to two communities of Laotians - one meeting in Clover and the other in Kings Mountain. Steve would meet on weekdays for a month in one community and then meet on Sundays the next month in the other community. The work was progressing slowly, if at all. With advice from Rev. Lennon and in consultation with leaders in Clover and Kings Mountain, some changes are felt to be necessary.

Beginning in January, 1994, Steve will focus his work exclusively on the Laotian community in the Kings Mountain area. Sunday School will be taught by Steve, followed by a worship service in space provided by First Baptist Church, Kings Mountain. This change will enable Steve to spend all his visitation time in the one community. Of course, the change will result in a loss of financial support from the Baptist State Convention of South Carolina and the York Baptist Association.

Please pray for Steve Sergap to find permanent employment. Pray for the spiritual growth and development of the few Laotian believers. Pray for the penetration of the gospel in and through the Laotian community.

1. Salaries and housing/Utilities allowances, plus the resultant changes in retirement have been increased by 5% upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.
2. The Home Mission Board pays life insurance, disability insurance and all but \$180 a month of medical insurance for our Church & Community Director. Our association pays the remaining portion as part of his salary.
3. In 1994, we will receive \$6,500 toward the salary, expenses, etc. of our Church & Community Director. This amount is deducted from our total budget of \$326,804 and adjusts our budget needs for 1994 to \$320,304, or 6.5% increase over the 1992-93 budget.

HISTORICAL AND STATISTICAL TABLES

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

On November 7, 1851 the following churches from the Broad River Baptist Association met at Double Springs Baptist Church for the purpose of organizing a new association: Beaver Dam, Bethel, Boiling Springs, Broad River, Buffalo, Double Springs, Mt. Pleasant, Mt. Sinai, New Bethel, Pleasant Hill, Sandy Run, Zion, and Zion.

The need for a new association resulted from geographical conditions. The boundary of the Broad River Association was so extensive that delegates were unable to attend the annual sessions due to swollen rivers and streams.

The name "Kings Mountain Association" was chosen because its boundary included the Kings Mountain battleground, a monument to be remembered by every patriot and lover of religious liberty.

In 1903, the association appointed a committee to establish and endow a denominational high school. In 1905, Boiling Springs was chosen as the most suitable site by a 15-member Board of Trustees. The Sandy Run Association was invited to join the Kings Mountain Association in establishing the school. In 1906, efforts and plans were begun to raise money for the school and in 1907, the first building was erected. The school opened on October 1, 1907 with 125 students. The first principal was Professor J.D. Higgins. The school later became known as Gardner-Webb College.

During the tenures of Rev. Lufkin and Rev. Bray, the association occupied its office in the First Baptist Church, Shelby. In 1949, the association voted to build a missionary home on Buffalo Street for the associational missionary. In 1959, the association voted that the missionary home be turned into an office building to provide space for the associational missionary, secretary, clerk/treasurer and to provide conference space for meetings. The home was sold in 1965 and the association rented office space in Shelby.

In April 1978, the association called Rev. Bob Davis as Church and Community Ministries Director. Rev. Davis served until August 1989 when he went on medical leave. Rev. Sam Snyder served as interim CCM Director from October 23, 1989 to September 30, 1990. In October 1990, the association called Rev. Charles Reed as the current CCM Director.

Additional staff and growing ministries led the association to build an associational complex on Wyke Road in Shelby. In 1981 a dedication service and open house was held.

Currently the association is made up of 77 member churches, one watch care church, two missions with a total church membership of 29,595.
