IN MEMORIAM

Rev. Charles Otis "C.O." Greene died June 27, 1999 at the age of 89. A native of Cleveland County, his parents were the late Samuel Washington and Harna Ida Bridges Greene. He is survived by his wife, Eliza L. Brooks Greene of Lenoir; three sons and two daughters-in-law, Allen and Peggy Greene, Stanley and Ruth Greene, and Albert Greene; four granddaughters, one step-granddaughter, one step-grandson, two great grandchildren, and six step-great grandchildren.

Rev. Greene graduated summa cum laude from Wake Forest University in 1918. He served as pastor of the following churches in Cleveland County - New Bethel, Lenoirville, Norman's Grove and Double Shoals. Rev. Greene became the Director of Missions in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association in 1959 and served in that position until 1973. During this period two new churches were started and membership in the churches grew from 23,968 to 27,033. Baptisms averaged 659 a year. The Association grew in many effective ways through his leadership.

Rev. Greene was a woodworker making more than 150 grandfather clocks, 50 grandchilder clocks, and over 250 other clocks. Two of these clocks are in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association building. In 1993, the C.O. and Eliza Greene Lectureship was established in their honor at Gardner-Webb University.

Rev. Greene's influence will continue for years to come in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

HISTORY OF ZOAR BAPTIST CHURCH



A century and a half ago, in a barren county with sparse population, 25 Christian men and women had a vision for the glory of God. On that Sunday in 1817 a small stand was erected as a pulpit, Elder James M. Thomas presided over the worship service, and Zoar Baptist Church was born. Within a few months a former structure was erected near that small temporary pulpit, and Cleveland County's newest church started to receive those coming forth for membership and baptism.

For decades, Zoar, which means "a place of rest, or refuge" (Genesis 19:22), enjoyed tremendous response from residents in the community. By 1854 a larger building had to be constructed to accommodate the membership which had quadrupled since the church's birth. Zoar Baptist Church called Rev. Rush Padgett during the depression years of the 1930's. Rev. Padgett became the first pastor to preach at Zoar for two Sundays a month and his business-like attitude led to the remodeling of the church. In the 1940's Zoar added new Sunday School rooms, a nursery, and for the first time in church history, indoor rest rooms!

Over the last 40 years many improvements and additions have been made to the physical facilities of Zoar Baptist Church. But, more importantly, Zoar has renewed its original mission to commit to prayer, Bible study, stewardship, and Christ-centered service. The church sends missionaries annually to places the Holy Spirit commands. And, as we have done for over 150 years, Zoar worships God and ministers in this "place of refuge".

Our present pastor is Rev. Marvin Gribble. The current membership is 503.

The church sends missionaries annually to places the Holy Spirit commands. And, as we have done for over 150 years, Zoar worships God and ministers in this "place of refuge".

Our present pastor is Rev. Marvin Gobbie. The current membership is 393.



HISTORY OF BETHEL BAPTIST CHURCH

Bethel Baptist Church was organized on September 21, 1940, with 183 charter members. Rev. C.C. Matheny was the first pastor and served until November, 1942. Rev. J.A. Brock was called in 1942 and served as pastor until June, 1949. On July 1, 1949, Rev. D.W. Digh became pastor. During the ministry of both of these pastors, new Sunday Schoolrooms were constructed and our auditorium enlarged.

Dr. Ernest Arnold was called as pastor on March 17, 1948. During his ministry Bethel maintained a bus ministry and children's services. Land, where our present auditorium stands, was purchased during his ministry. Under Dr. Arnold's ministry, Bethel gave in excess of 24% of tithes and offerings to missions.

Rev. Bruce Clappitt was called as pastor in April, 1973. During his ministry, our present gymnasium was constructed. Rev. Clappitt remained as pastor for two years.

Dr. J.M. Ewell was called in June, 1975. During his ministry, the construction of 26 new Sunday School rooms were added to the gymnasium. On June 4, 1978, the ground was broken for construction of our present auditorium. The present facility was completed in December, 1979. Dr. Ewell remained pastor until January, 1985.

Rev. Mike Coffman was called as pastor in June, 1985. During his ministry the members of Bethel committed themselves to continuous prayer for the needs and request of others. Rev. Coffman moved into full-time evangelism in August, 1988.

In November, 1989, Rev. Ray Lamb was called as pastor of Bethel. His ministry began the first Sunday in December, 1989. During his ministry Rev. Lamb led the church to pay off its debt. Rev. Lamb remained as pastor until March of 1994.

In December of 1994 Dr. Pat Cornell from Houston, Texas became Bethel's ninth pastor. The current membership is 1175.

"Bethel", by its name meaning "House of God", is a place where people can worship our Lord and where friendships can be established for His honor. May we always cherish our great heritage at Bethel.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION
of
KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, INC.

A NONPROFIT CORPORATION

We, the undersigned natural persons of the age of eighteen or more, acting in incorporation for the purpose of creating a nonprofit corporation under the laws of the State of North Carolina, as contained in Chapter 55A of the General Statutes of North Carolina, entitled "Nonprofit Corporation Act," and the several amendments thereto, do hereby set forth:

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of the corporation is **KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, INC.** and shall be located in Cleveland County, Shelby, North Carolina.

ARTICLE II - DURATION

The period of duration of the corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE III - PURPOSE

A. The purpose of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association shall under the leadership of the Holy Spirit be to counsel together for the enlargement, confirmation, and strengthening of the work of the Lord Jesus Christ in Cleveland County. It shall be our purpose to provide training, to promote unity, growth and fellowship among the churches. We will engage in cooperative mission endeavors to meet the spiritual and physical needs of people in our area which cannot be accomplished by member churches acting independently. We will assist North Carolina Baptists and Southern Baptists in every area of mission and ministry in sending the Gospel to the ends of the earth.

B. In furtherance of its purposes, and to the extent necessary to carry out such purposes, the corporation:

1. Shall have all the powers given to and possessed by a North Carolina Corporation organized under the North Carolina Nonprofit Corporation Act.
2. May engage in any lawful activity within the purposes for which the corporation may be organized which are incidental to and in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the corporation.

C. No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its members, trustees, officers or other private persons, except to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and

distributions in furtherance of the purposes as set forth in the Articles.

D. The purposes for which the Kings Mountain Baptist Association is organized are exclusively religious, charitable, scientific, literary, and educational within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law.

E. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by any corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE IV - GOVERNMENT

The government of this incorporated association shall be by elected representatives, known as messengers, from the member churches, meeting two times annually, or at such other times as called in accordance with the By-laws of the incorporated association, and, in the interim, by the executive committee of the incorporated association. Final authority is vested in the association as to all matters of business, finance, and programs. The members of the governing body shall have authority to adopt and amend By-laws, approve budgets, and to employ staff to direct or assist in directing the purposes of this incorporated association.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS

The officers of this incorporated association shall be the officers set forth in the By-laws.

ARTICLE VI - MEMBERSHIP

The corporation shall have one class of members as provided by the By-laws, members being the total of all members of the churches affiliated voluntarily with the incorporated association. Membership of the member churches shall be accepted by majority vote of the association at a regular semi-annual session of the incorporated association.

ARTICLE VII - DIRECTORS

The Executive Committee, as established by the By-laws, shall be and constitute the directors of the corporation, having such powers as are provided by law and the By-laws.

ARTICLE VIII - INITIAL DIRECTORS

The initial directors shall be the twenty (20) members of the existing Executive Committee, and their terms shall be the same as the Executive Committee of the

Kings Mountain Baptist Association of Shelby, North Carolina, whose names and addresses are as follows:

ARTICLE IX - DISSOLUTION

Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the board of directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all the liabilities of the corporation, dispose

of all of the assets of the corporation exclusively for the purposes of the corporation in such a manner, or to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for religious purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law), as the board of directors shall determine. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disbursed by the Superior Court of the county in which the principal office of the corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE X - REGISTERED OFFICE AND AGENT

The address of the initial registered office and principal office of the corporation in North Carolina is 1175 Wyke Road, Shelby, Cleveland County, North Carolina 28150, and the initial registered agent of the corporation is Leland A. Kerr.

ARTICLE XI - INCORPORATORS



BY-LAWS OF THE KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, INC.

(Also referred to as the Association, K MBA, or
Kings Mountain Baptist Association)

BY-LAW I MEMBERSHIP

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist Churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Membership Committee. Application should include:

- (1) Formal action by the group seeking admission reflecting that seventy-five percent (75%) of those voting expresses their intent to cooperate.
- (2) A written statement reflecting their beliefs and practices.
- (3) A written statement that expresses their intent to cooperate.
- (4) A willingness to meet with the Membership Committee to discuss other items of mutual interest to both parties.

The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist belief and practice and what it means to cooperate with the churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. If recommended by this committee and accepted by the Association, a nucleus or a church shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a minimum of six (6) months. Membership within the Association shall be determined by vote of the Association at any biannual meeting. Churches under the watchcare shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its By-Laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and if requested, the Association Executive Committee may grant letters of recommendation to other like associations.

BY-LAW II MEETINGS

Section 1: The Association shall meet biannually. It shall convene on the Monday following the fourth Sunday in April and Monday and Tuesday following the fourth Sunday in October.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or Executive Committee, provided two (2) weeks notice is given to all affiliated churches.

Section 3: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two (2) messengers to the meetings of the Association for each fifty (50) members of the church, provided each church shall not have less than three (3) nor more than ten (10) messengers. **ALONG WITH ALL ASSOCIATIONAL OFFICERS**, these shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of the messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those in attendance and registering at the Associational Meetings.

BY-LAW III PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

BY-LAW IV ASSOCIATION YEAR

The Association Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

BY-LAW V AUTHORITY

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches.

BY-LAW VI OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTIONS

- Section 1: The officers of the association shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Assistant Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Supporter, Music Director, Men's Ministries Coordinator, Women's Missionary Union Director, and Parliamentarian.
- Section 2: The Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee. The floor will then be open for additional nominations. This election will occur on the last day of the October biannual meeting. All other officers shall be contacted and nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected during the April biannual session.
- Section 3: The newly elected Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer and Assistant Clerk-Treasurer shall assume at the close of the annual union all duties incumbent upon them relating to work of the ensuing associational year. All other officers shall assume all duties incumbent upon them relating to the work of the ensuing year on October 1.
- Section 4: Any person having served two (2) terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election for two years.

BY-LAW VII DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body, appoint Committees on Committees and Committee on Enrollment, and shall be the Chairperson of the Associational Executive Committee and be ex-officio (without voting privileges) member of all other committees. Upon completion of his term of office, the Moderator shall become a member-at-large [for two (2) years] of the Missions Committee and Executive Committee.
- Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be the Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee, Chairman of the Missions Committee, and Chairman of the Calendar Committee.
- Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's October Biannual Meeting, distribute at that meeting copies of the digest of these reports, and make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of Minutes to the member churches,

keep on file copies of Minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the Executive Committee. This officer shall inform all members elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action and shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its Executive Committee, or as designated in the budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee or the Association in biannual sessions); render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the biannual meetings, and give a report at each quarterly Executive Committee meeting and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

Section 4: The Assistant Clerk-Treasurer will serve in the absence of the Clerk-Treasurer or by request of the Clerk-Treasurer. The Assistant Clerk-Treasurer will also be authorized to sign checks for the Association.

Section 5: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Associational Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in the October biannual session.

Section 6: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and make a written report to each October biannual meeting of the Association.

Section 7: The Sunday School Director shall cooperate with the Executive Director and the Church Development Director in promoting the work of the Sunday School. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this committee that would promote this work.

The Associational Sunday School should assist church leaders to be more effective in their responsibility. This should include:

1. Provide opportunities for fellowship and inspiration.
2. Interpret the Sunday School Program.
3. Train Sunday School leaders.
4. Consult with Sunday School leaders concerning their program.
5. Provide organization and leadership for cooperative work among the churches.

Section 8: The Discipleship Training Supervisor shall cooperate with the Executive Director and the Church Development Director in promoting the work of Discipleship Training. This officer shall attend Executive Committee meetings, maintain the on-going work of Discipleship Training at all times, and give a report at the biannual sessions of the Association.

Section 9: The Music Director shall provide leadership for the Association in biannual sessions and when requested at other times during the year. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this Committee that would promote the work. He shall encourage music growth in the churches throughout the year and shall make a written report to the October biannual meeting.

Section 10: The Men's Ministries Coordinator shall cooperate with the Executive Director and the Church Development Director in promoting the work of men and

boys in the churches. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to promote the development of men and boys and an awareness of world mission needs.

Section 11: The Woman's Missionary Union Director serves on the Executive Committee of the Association and works with the Executive Director and the Church Development Director; leads the WMU Council; confers with our associational WMU officers and assists them in their work; leads in providing opportunities for leaders and members of their church WMUs to have fellowship and receive inspiration concerning their mutual mission task; leads in interpreting the WMU programs to church leaders; leads in training church WMU workers and members; consults with church leaders concerning initiation of WMU work and the improvement of existing work; provides at and plans for associational meetings; leads in associational WMU annual planning; leads in discovering mission action needs and in coordinating the work being done; and reports progress of WMU work to the Association and serves as contact between the Association and state WMU.

Section 12: The Youth Ministry Coordinator shall, under the supervision of the Executive Director and the Church Development Director, serve as chairman of the Youth Ministry Committee of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

Section 13: The Parliamentarian shall, at the Biannual Meetings of the Association, rule on all questions of parliamentary procedure which shall arise during the sessions. The Parliamentarian shall serve as a resource person to the churches and shall, upon request, advise and assist the churches on matters of parliamentary procedure.

Section 14: Vacancies occurring between biannual sessions shall be filled by the Executive Committee, except the office of Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

BY-LAW VIII COMMITTEES

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the October biannual meeting through the following October biannual meeting.

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the October biannual meeting.

- B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the October biannual meeting.
- Committee on Committees**

BY-LAW IX DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

- Section 1: BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE** shall be composed of three (3) members and shall be responsible for the maintenance of the associational office and surrounding grounds. This committee is responsible to the Executive Committee.
- Section 2: BY-LAWS COMMITTEE**, composed of three (3) members shall be available to study changes or revisions in the By-laws, and make recommendations as needed.
- Section 3: CALENDAR COMMITTEE** shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Supporter, WMU Director, Men's Ministries Coordinator, Music Director and Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an associational calendar for the coming year and present same to the October biannual meeting.
- Section 4: CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMITTEE** composed of a chairperson and one person from each group of churches will give continual attention to the moral climate of the community and shall initiate necessary action to maintain and improve the climate for positive good. The committee shall counsel those persons and institutions that uphold Christian virtue and shall support the churches teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness. This committee will encourage all churches in the association to take the necessary steps to create and maintain the Christian Life Committee in their congregations. The associational Christian Life Committee will have a close working relationship with the various church committees.
- Section 5: CHURCH & COMMUNITY MINISTRIES COMMITTEE**
- A. Purpose -- The purpose of the Church & Community Ministries Committee shall be to work with the CCM Director to lead the Association to address the priority ministry needs in Cleveland County, and

to plan and coordinate programs of ministry to share Christ's love in meeting the spiritual, educational, emotional, and physical needs.

B. **Organization** -- The Church & Community Ministries Committee shall be composed of resource personnel from area ministries with which the Church and Community Ministries is actively involved plus the WMU Director and/or the Mission Action Director of the WMU, Men's Ministries Coordinator and/or the Men's Ministry Director. The CCM Director will serve as chairman of the committee. Emergency Ministry needs not addressed in the By-Laws will be met at the discretion of the CCM Director after consultation with the Executive Director.

C. **MEETING** -- The Church and Community Ministry Committee will meet as needed to develop the programs of ministry.

Section 6: **COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES**, composed of seven (7) members, one from each group of churches as defined by the association, plus the chairman, shall nominate committee members, and shall assist the Executive Committee in filling vacancies on all standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the Chairmen of each committee.

Section 7: **EVANGELISM COMMITTEE**, composed of six (6) members, shall promote work of evangelism in the churches and the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its Executive Committee.

Section 8: **EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE** shall have the authority to act for the association between biannual sessions. Ten (10) members of the Executive Committee constitute a quorum to transact business.

1. Shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Music Director, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Supporter, Men's Ministries Coordinator, WMU Director, President of the Pastor's Conference, and chairpersons of the following committees: Church and Community Ministries Committee, Nominating Committee, Committee on Committees, Christian Life Committee, Membership Committee, Finance Committee, Evangelism Committee, Youth Ministry Committee, Student Ministry Committee, Personnel Committee, and the Pastoral Ministries Committee.

2a. When without an Executive Director, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Executive Director and recommend such a person to the Executive Committee for election.

2b. When without a Church & Community Ministries Director, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Church & Community Ministries Director.

2c. When without a Church Development Director, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Church Development Director.

3. It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association and act

on routine or emergency matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of ten (10) is necessary to transact business.

4. It shall have the authority to act for the association between biannual sessions.

Section 9: FAMILY LIFE COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) members and shall have the following responsibilities:

1. Train, develop and encourage church and associational family life work.
2. Provide opportunities for working together in family life work.
3. Provide resources and services to churches and family life leaders.
4. Establish and maintain appropriate communication and relationships within the community and the denomination.
5. Plan programs, activities and events that address the needs of family ministry, marriage enrichment, the home, etc.

Section 10: FINANCE COMMITTEE, composed of six (6) members, two (2) rotating annually, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs of an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following calendar year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget and make a written report to the October biannual meeting.

The FINANCE COMMITTEE may make adjustments during the year in line items or through the assignment of miscellaneous funds in Section VIII of the budget providing the adjustments:

1. --will not increase the total budget.
2. --will not alter the basic purpose or intent of the budget.
3. --will have full consent of those affected (individuals, department leaders, etc.)
4. --will not exceed a total of \$3,000 during a fiscal year.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the Association, upon request, with the stewardship programs offered by the Convention.

The Committee shall express gratitude to the churches for their stewardship development that enables them to participate in local, home, and foreign missions.

A contingency fund is to be established and maintained in the approximate amount of one (1) calendar quarter of the Association's operating budget. This contingency fund is to be deposited in an interest-bearing account.

These funds are to be disbursed only should a shortfall of general receipts occur, resulting in a lack of funds for regular operating expense. Any disbursements of funds from the contingency fund must be upon the recommendation of the Clerk Treasurer, approved by the chairman of the Finance Committee and the Chairman of the Executive Committee and is limited to budgeted items for operations where current funds for such budgeted items have been depleted.

Section 11: HISTORICAL COMMITTEE, composed of a Historian who serves as chairperson, an Assistant Historian who serves as vice chairperson, and

six (6) committee members (one person from each of the six groups of churches making up the Association.) It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the October biannual meeting.

Section 12: MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE, composed of five (5) members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the By-Laws. The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist faith and practice and what it means to cooperate with other churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. The Membership Committee shall annually review all churches and missions under the watchcare of the Association and may present them for membership within the Association or that they continue under the watchcare.

Section 13: MEMORIALS COMMITTEE, composed of three (3) members will be responsible for:

1. Recognizing deceased ministers, staff, deacons and members in an appropriate way.
2. Submitting report for inclusion in Associational Minutes.
3. Ministering to the families of associational officers, ministers and staff members when death occurs.

Section 14: MISSIONARY-IN-RESIDENCE COMMITTEE shall be made up of the following members: Pastors of churches with missionary residences, associational WMU director, Men's Ministries Coordinator, three at-large members; ex-officio members from the Kings Mountain Baptist Association: executive director, church development director, moderator, vice-moderator; along with the coordinator of the MIR program at Gardner-Webb University. The Committee will work with the Gardner-Webb University MIR coordinator in welcoming the missionaries by providing a fruit basket and a packet of information about Cleveland County and North Carolina, maps of the area, and a list of committee members. The KMBA Book of Reports will be included. When possible, committee members will be available to provide a tour of the KMBA building and to answer questions. The committee will also give as much information as possible to pastors, WMU directors, and men's ministry directors so they can invite the missionaries to speak for various groups. The committee will have exit interviews with the missionaries for evaluating their time with us.

Section 15: MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be made up of the following members: Chairman (Vice-Moderator), the Executive Director, the Church Development Director, Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Finance Committee Chairman, Chairperson of Church & Community Ministries Committee, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Supporter, Men's Ministries Coordinator, WMU Director, Music Director, and President of the Pastors' Conference. This Committee is to be available as a sounding board, to support the Executive Director as a person (as well as an officer in the Association), provide feedback concerning Associational programs and activities, conveying suggestions from the Association and offering

support in projecting programs to the Executive Committee. The Missions Committee shall seek to determine areas of needs within and without the Association and formulate recommendations to the Associational Executive Committee.

The Committee shall enthusiastically explore all mission possibilities throughout the Association, emphasizing the need for new teaching units, preaching points, missions, and churches; and it shall actively seek out potential sponsoring churches for the beginning of specific mission endeavors. Providing energetic outreach leadership for the Association shall be the Committee's highest priority.

Section 16: MISSIONS FOUNDATION COMMITTEE, composed of three (3) members will review needs and requests made to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association Missions Foundation. It shall recommend the dispersal of funds to the Missions Committee. The Missions Committee will recommend the dispersal of funds to the Executive Committee. The Executive Director, Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer will serve as *ex-officio* members of the Missions Foundation Committee.

Section 17: NOMINATING COMMITTEE, composed of six (6) members, contact and nominate the officers of the Association. This committee shall also, in cooperation with the Nominating Committee of various departments (except the WMU and Men's Ministry organizations), recommend workers for these various departments. The officers and workers of these respective organizations shall be nominated by the organization themselves and submitted to the Nominating Committee. They shall also nominate Associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention. The committee shall also assist the Executive Committee in filling vacancies which occur between biannual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

Section 18: ORDER OF BUSINESS AND PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Associational Music Director, and three (3) other members. It shall rotate the place of meeting among the groups of churches with the host church to be determined by the group. It shall recommend the preacher and the alternate for the annual service of the October biannual session. It shall prepare a printed program for the October biannual meeting for the Association, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty (30) days before the October biannual meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the October biannual meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary. This committee will be responsible for promoting the October biannual meeting through the various news media.

Section 19: ORDINATION COMMITTEE, composed of five (5) members, with the pastor of the home church (the church of which the candidate is a member), the Executive Director, and deacons of the home and requesting churches, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

The Committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of the Minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conference at which the home church voted to request examination of the candidate.

The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.

The chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place, and procedure.

The Committee suggests that the candidate be questioned at least two (2) weeks prior to his ordination.

The Committee shall question the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, and his personal life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.

The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the ministry.

In every instance, the Committee shall be guided by the Scripture, especially 1 Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-9.

The Committee shall give written notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the ordination.

The Chairman shall report the Committee's activities to the Executive Committee quarterly and provide a written report for the October biannual meeting.

Section 20: PASTORAL MINISTRIES COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) ministers and or staff persons in the Association with two (2) rotating off each year.

It shall be the duty of this committee to work with the Executive Director in planning and providing continuing educational opportunities for ministers and staff persons in the Association.

Section 21: PERSONNEL COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) members and shall have the following responsibilities:

1. Develop proper and appropriate personnel policies and procedures for the associational staff.
2. Be responsible for securing associational support staff when openings occur.
3. Seek solutions for problems concerning associational staff.
4. Conduct staff evaluations and recommend salary and benefit proposals to Finance Committee.

This committee is responsible to the Executive Committee and the Chairman of the Personnel Committee shall be a member of the Executive Committee. The Executive Director is an ex-officio member of the Personnel Committee except when the committee is in executive session.

Section 22: RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE composed of three (3) members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation, plan and promote the work of the Committee in an annual planning meeting; and present resolutions of appreciation to individuals, organizations, and churches when there are events worthy of commendation. Dedicate the annual minutes to a deserving person.

Section 23: SENIOR ADULT MINISTRY COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) members and shall have the following responsibilities:

1. Assist in the organization and development of senior adult clubs in the local church.
2. Initiate, promote, and conduct senior adult ministries and activities in the association.
3. Provide opportunities for the development and enrichment of senior adults in the association.

Section 24: SENIOR SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE was established in memory of Libby and Rachel Senter, mother and daughter, who were murdered in 1984 in Liberia, West Africa while serving as missionaries of the Southern Baptist Convention. Libby Senter grew up in Zion Baptist Church in our Association. The scholarship is to extend the memory and ministry of this outstanding missionary who died in service. This committee, composed of three (3) members shall function under the following guidelines:

1. Award income and coupon to a worthy seminary student(s) who best meet the criteria by which the scholarship is established.
2. The committee may determine the amount to be awarded for each scholarship and the number of scholarships awarded.
3. The committee may furnish application forms to be completed by the applicants and may require applicants to appear before them.
4. The potential to succeed in seminary, financial need of applicant, and the applicant's concern for others shall be considered at the discretion of the committee.
5. The scholarship is to be used for seminary training in a Southern Baptist Seminary and may be paid to the seminary or to the recipient as the committee directs.

The following criteria shall be used by the committee in determining the recipient:

- A. Preference is to be given to applicants who are residents of Cleveland County and the committee find are committed to foreign missionary service.
- B. Applicant must be a member of a co-operating Southern Baptist Church.

Section 25: SINGLE ADULT MINISTRY COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) members and shall have the following responsibilities:

1. Train, develop and encourage leaders of single adults within local churches.
2. Serve as a catalyst to encourage churches together in a cooperative effort to further Single Adult Ministry.
3. Provide resources, programs, and services to local churches and leaders in the area of Single Adult Ministry.
4. Serve as a liaison to establish and maintain communication within the community and denomination.
5. Help involve students in the associational missions work.

Section 26: STUDENT MINISTRY COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) members and shall have the following responsibilities:

1. Help local Baptist Student Unions and churches reach and minister to college and university students.
2. Work with the state director of student ministries and local directors

of student ministries to start new Baptist Student Unions in the association and to strengthen existing programs.

3. Assist in recruiting volunteer directors.
4. Provide training for workers with students.

Section 17: TELEPHONE CONTACT COMMITTEE shall be composed of one (1) person from each group of churches in the Association (8). These committee members shall relay messages to pastors and key leaders during the year. All messages to be sent should be cleared with the Executive Director.

Section 18: YOUTH MINISTRY COMMITTEE shall be composed of six (6) members and the Associational Youth Ministry Coordinator who serves as chairman. This committee shall have the following responsibilities:

1. Plan associational youth ministry programs and events.
2. Enlist the support of church youth and youth leaders for associational programs and events related to youth ministry.
3. Provide on-going support for church youth and youth leaders in churches.
4. Plan and promote associational training and information conferences for church youth and youth leaders.
5. Promote state, regional and national conferences in youth ministry.
6. Any other activity which the Executive Director, the Church Development Director and/or Executive Committee deems necessary to foster a positive Christian Witness for Christ.

Section 19: Members of all these committees except the Church and Community Ministries Committee and those appointed by the moderator, shall be elected to serve not more than three (3) years on a rotating basis.

BY-LAW X

THE KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION MISSIONS FOUNDATION

The purpose of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association Missions Foundation is to enable individuals, regardless of their age, or resource level, the opportunity to continue supporting Christian causes during and after their lifetime. It will provide a fund for churches to contribute to for specific missions and ministry projects beyond their regular associational giving.

The Foundation will provide financial support for Baptist causes that include but not limited to: National and International Mission Partnership and Projects, New Work New Starts, Missionary-in-Residence Housing, Church and Community Ministries Projects, Short-term emergency assistance for existing churches.

BY-LAW XI TRUSTEES

There shall be three (3) Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three (3) years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one (1) new trustee shall be elected at the April biannual meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one (1) year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

The duty of the Trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other securities of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its Executive Committee.

BY-LAW XII EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

When without an Executive Director, the Associational Executive Committee shall be responsible for the appointment of a Search Committee to seek a person to serve as Executive Director and recommend such person to the Executive Committee. His selection shall be upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association at a biannual meeting, or by a called meeting of the Association. His time of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity. His duties will be in accordance with the job description at the time of his call.

BY-LAW XIII CHURCH & COMMUNITY MINISTRIES DIRECTOR

- Section 1: **Employment** – The Director of CCM shall be jointly employed by the Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the North American Mission Board. The employee should be elected to work until the sponsoring groups mutually agree to cease the tenure of service or the employee resigns. The CCM Director shall work under the supervision of the Executive Director and in compliance with the Job Description provided by the State and Association.
- Section 2: **Basic Function** – The basic functions are to work with the CCM Committee or organization, supervise and promote a program of activities to meet the spiritual, educational, emotional and physical needs of the people within the geographical boundaries of the Association.
- Section 3: The CCM Director shall be an ex-officio member of the Associational Executive Committee and Missions Committee without voting privileges.

BY-LAW XIV CHURCH DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR

- Section 1: **Employment** – The Church Development Director shall be employed by the Association. The employee should be elected to work until the Association agrees to cease the tenure of service or if the employee resigns. The Church Development Director shall work under the supervision of the Executive Director and in compliance with the job description provided by the Association.
- Section 2: **Basic Function** – The basic function is to assist the churches of the Association in their spiritual, numerical, stewardship, evangelistic and leadership development. He/she will serve as resource person in association and church organizational life regarding Sunday School, Discipleship Training, WMU, Men's Ministry, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Student Ministries, Single Ministries, Youth Ministries.
- Section 3: The Church Development Director shall be an ex-officio member of the Associational Executive Committee, and Missions Committee without voting privileges.

BY-LAW XV AMENDMENTS

Proposed amendments to the By-Laws must be published in the Association's monthly publication at least 30 days before being considered at a session of the biannual meetings, where it may be adopted by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

BY-LAW XVI DEFINE PROCEDURE

- Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.
- Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.
- Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.
- Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, biannual meetings shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six (6) Associational Groups as follows: Polkville, Lattimore, Shelby, Kings Mountain, Groves, and Waco.

PROCEEDINGS **Monday Evening** **October 15, 1999**

1. Messengers and visitors gathered at Zoar Baptist Church at 6:45 p.m. for the 149th Biannual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.
2. Special music was presented by a nine-member ladies group, Heaven's Gold, from Zoar Church. Mrs. Madlene Gold, minister of music at Zoar, directed the group. Their selections included: "We've Come to Bless Your Name," "I Worship You O' Mighty God," and "Come Into His Presence."
3. Mrs. Gold welcomed everyone to Zoar and led in our opening hymn, "Break Out, O Church of God." Lyn Carroll, from Zoar served as organist for the evening.
4. Moderator Keith Dixon, pastor of Flat Hill Church, welcomed everyone to the meeting and called the session to order. He called attention to our theme and expressed appreciation to Zoar for hosting our meeting.
5. Rev. Neal Eford, pastor of Northside Church, read scripture from Isaiah 43:14-19. The opening prayer was led by Rev. Tim Lowry, pastor of Allen Memorial Church.
6. Dr. Marvin Gobble, host pastor, welcomed everyone to Zoar Church.
7. Moderator Dixon recognized special guests in the congregation: Rev. Clive Borders, former director of missions of Kings Mountain Baptist Association; Dr. Don Berry, director of Global Missions Resource Center at Gardner-Webb University; and Rev. Luther Gurnett, representative from the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina.
8. Rev. Leland Kerr, executive director of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association, shared prayer requests and led in prayer for several of our pastors and/or family members experiencing difficulty at the present time. He extended a warm welcome to our new ministers and staff who have been called to our Association since our last Fall Biannual Meeting. These included: Rev. Bryan Glines, pastor, Putnam Memorial Church; Rev. Neal Eford, pastor, Northside Church; Rev. Tim Lowry, pastor, Allen Memorial Church; Mrs. Karen Davis, director of education, Bethlehem Church; Mrs. Cindy Hord, music director, Lawndale Church; and Mr. Bob Grigsby, youth director, Waco Church. He also introduced Ms. Robyn Roper, his bride-to-be, to the congregation.
9. In the absence of Dr. Don McSwain, chairman of the Order of Business Committee, Rev. Glenn Walker, vice-moderator, moved that the printed program with necessary changes be the Order of Business of this 149th Biannual Session. The motion was approved.
 He announced host churches for our 200 meetings in the Grover Group: Spring Biannual Meeting - Christian Freedom; Fall Biannual Meeting - New Hope and Patterson Springs. He moved that these meeting plans be approved and the motion carried. He called for messengers to fill out attendance cards at this time.
10. Our theme interpretation was presented by the Zoar Church Puppet Ministry. As the puppets sang "The Colors of His Love," Wendy Smith signed for the group.
11. Dr. Jim Tootle, pastor of Christ Covenant and chairman of the Membership Committee, moved that Trinity Church, who was approved for watch since April 1999, be accepted into full membership of the Association. The motion was approved by the messengers.
 Leland Kerr welcomed Trinity into the Association and asked Rev. Buddy Marchand

to come forward. Rev. Morehead asked Trinity church members present to stand. He stated they are happy to now be members and expressed appreciation to the Association for accepting them.

Leland Kerr called for others to collect the attendance cards.

12. Ms. Reena Bingham, clerk-treasurer and member of Elizabeth Church, presented the Executive Committee report and the 1998-99 treasurer's report.
13. Rev. Robert Abrams, member of Boiling Springs Church and member of the By-Laws Committee, called attention to the proposed By-Law changes. He stated these changes will be voted on at the Tuesday afternoon session by messengers from our churches.
14. Dr. Marvin Gobbia, member of the Nominating Committee, presented nominees for associational officers for 1999-2000: Moderator - Rev. Glenn Walker, Vice-Moderator - Rev. Otis Byrnes, and Clerk-Treasurer - Reena Bingham and Mr. Bill Stroud - representative for Baptist Retirement Homes. He moved the nominees be elected. The messengers approved the motion.
15. Moderator Dixon recognized and expressed appreciation to all committee people and associational volunteers.
16. Ms. Susan Wilson, minister of music/education at Eastside Church, Shelby, led the congregation in singing, "Let Others See Jesus in You."
17. Moderator Dixon recognized Rev. Leland Kerr to present his challenge to the Association. Rev. Dixon expressed appreciation to Rev. Kerr for his being a pastor to the pastors in our Association.
18. Rev. Kerr asked if we had "caught the vision." He read Joel 2:28. He stated some of the ways we had caught the vision included: (1) New work: Providence Church. (2) Christopher Road Hispanic Mission, after meeting at Christopher Road Church for many years, is moving into a facility of their own on Cadeb Road. He encouraged churches to support the mission as they are securing a \$68,000 loan. Pastor Jose Espinales has a "vision" to begin multiple Hispanic work in our county. (3) He challenged the Association to begin other new starts in our county. (4) A Counseling Ministry recommendation will be presented at our April 2000 Spring Biennial Meeting for messengers to consider for our Association. (5) Reaching the unchurched through prayerwalking and use of a Mapping Center for Evangelism program available through the Association. (6) Missions Partnerships which include multiple ways for churches or individuals to get involved. (7) The hiring of another Church Development Director hopefully in the very near future. (8) Churches using associational staff to assist churches in being on mission in their area. (9) Our 2000 budget reflects some new ministries. He stated we must become birthing centers for new churches, become training centers to send out our people, begin house church planting, and partner with sister churches in our own association who need help. He closed with reading Joel 2:32.
19. Dr. John Sloan, pastor of First Church, Kings Mountain and chairman of the Evangelism Committee, presented his report and stated we are short by 69 of reaching our goal of 800 baptisms for 1998-1999. He reminded us that our goal for 1999-2000 is 900 baptisms. He gave four ways we can reach our goal: (1) Churches reach out and become really evangelistic. (2) Individuals need to get evangelistic as well. Learn to be bold for Christ. (3) Churches pray. (4) Individuals pray. This can be done through having prayer walks and building each other up rather than tearing one another down. As part of his report he invited Rev. Reg Alexander, layman from Kings Mountain

- First who sang "This Time I'm Walking For You" which was written by Rev. Alexander.
20. Our special music for the evening was presented by Heaven's Gold. The group sang "The Battle Hymn of the Republic."
 21. Rev. Leland Kerr introduced our speaker for the evening - Rev. Nelson Searcy, team leader, Evangelism and Church Growth Team, Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.
 22. Rev. Nelson Searcy presented the annual sermon using the theme, "New Ways for a New Century" and reading scripture from Acts 1:1-8 calling attention to vs. 8b. He stated this scripture tells us what we must do to evangelize our world for Christ. He presented four ways to help us: (1) Intentional evangelism - there is a difference in being intentional and being interested. Problems in our churches is not so much sin of commission or sin of omission but the sin of no mission. (2) Individual evangelism - "you" must be on mission. The preferred method is still one-on-one evangelism. (3) International evangelism - we represent Christ. We must take on the mind of Christ with acts of kindness as we share Christ. We must adopt methods of Christ. Rather than "go tell" we have adopted "come here" method. (4) Invitational evangelism - extend an invitation to people to accept Jesus as Lord. We must extend the net to "all" people and then draw the net in.
 23. Rev. Bob Della, minister of music of First Baptist Shelby, led the congregation in singing, "Wherever He Leads I'll Go."
 24. Rev. Cline Burdick pronounced the benediction. As messengers departed the meeting, Trinity church members present were extended the right hand of fellowship into our Association.

Tuesday Afternoon October 26, 1999

25. At 2:45 p.m. messengers and visitors gathered at Bethel Baptist Church for the second session of our meeting. Moderator Ruth Dixon introduced Rev. Charles Calhoun who presented a program of special music solos. The meeting was called to order. Rev. Larry Franks, minister of music and senior adults at Bethel, our host church, welcomed us and led us in singing "Great is Thy Faithfulness" accompanied by Rev. Charles Reed on the piano. Lamentations 3:21-24 was read by Rev. Tim Hardin, pastor of Buffalo. Mrs. Karen Davis, education director at Bethlehem, led the opening prayer.
26. Our theme interpretation was presented by Rev. Jerry Welch, pastor at Carpenters Grove. He did this in a clowning skit with the assistance of Rev. Paul Williams, Mrs. Crady Ford, and Mrs. Vickie Welch.
27. Dr. Chris White, president of Gardner-Webb University, gave a report from the university. He thanked the association as a whole and individuals for the support given financially and in other ways. Service to churches, especially the ones in our area, is one of the main goals of GWU. The university had a record enrollment this fall of 1,050 which includes the largest freshman class in the history of the university. Physical growth as well as academic growth is seen all through the university. Ethics, morality and character are also taught along with each course. GWU is a "powerhouse" of Christian education and will become Division I in more than athletics. Dr.

- White proudly stated that GWU will become the first university to offer a dual degree in Master of Divinity and an MBA degree. Also next month the School of Divinity will be accredited by the Association of Theological Schools. Dr. White asked for our continuing support and prayers.
28. South Mountain Baptist Camp Director Al Tinsin shared with us about the great work being done there. This past summer the camp hosted 1,703 campers, which is double the figure for 1996. One hundred seventy professions of faith were made and two hundred thirty-three rededications. There were also seven individuals who surrendered their lives to God's call. Many lives are being touched by the ministry at South Mountain Camp. Rev. Tinsin asked that we continue to pray, give, provide workers, and use the camp. He mentioned that during this dry summer the two wells that serviced the dining hall at the camp went dry. The cost of digging a new well was \$8,000 but three-fourths of this cost was paid by individuals within two weeks.
 29. Vice-moderator Glenn Walker presented the 2000 associational calendar and moved that it be adopted as printed. Being no discussion, it was voted on and approved.
 30. Mrs. Joyce Bowman, member of David Church, presented the Committee on Committees report. One addition was made: Mrs. Gail Fufbrigle of First Baptist Greer added to the Christian Life Committee. This was voted on and approved.
 31. The Memorials Committee report was given by Rev. Ed Sessions. Rev. C.O. Greene, former pastor and director of missions, and Rev. Glenn Short, former pastor, died this year. We have lost a total of 274 lay persons, pastors and deacons since our last meeting. Rev. Sessions led in memorial prayer for all these.
 32. Mrs. Doreen Wuesten, minister of music at First Hill then led us in singing "Take the Name of Jesus with You."
 33. Attendance cards were taken up at this time by the ushers.
 34. Since the proposed changes in our by-laws were presented at our Monday night meeting, Rev. Robert Abrams moved that we approve these changes: 1. that all changes be first presented to the By-laws committee, 2. that we add an assistant clerk-treasurer and 3. that any by-law changes be published 30 days before being considered at any session of the biannual meetings. These were voted on and approved without any discussion.
 35. Mrs. Pat Jones, Finance Committee chairman and member at Pleasant Ridge Church, presented the 2000 budget. She thanked the Finance Committee members for their hard work this year. The yearly audit revealed everything is in order. She asked that the budget be accepted as printed. This was voted on and approved.
 36. The Historians Report was given by Leland Jolly. He mentioned that we are a privileged people to be living at the end of a century. The KMBA will be 150 years old in 2001. The last history of our association was written in 1951 so the History Committee is working on an up-dated history and will have it ready by 2000. Each church is asked to furnish a one page history so that it may be included.
 37. Executive Director Leland Kerr gave the Resolutions Committee report. Rev. Kerr expressed thanks to our host churches, Zion and Bethel and all who had a part in making our meetings a success. On behalf of the Resolutions Committee, Rev. Kerr moved that the 1999 associational minutes be dedicated to Rev. C.O. Greene and Rev. Glenn Short. This was voted on and approved.
 38. Moderator Keith Davis made the appointment of the Committee on Committees: Don Ellis from Allen Memorial, Rethy Alexander from KM First, Jim Richardson from Poplar Springs, Cindy Hood from Lawndale, Richard Morgan from Dover,

Shirley Hord from New Prospect and Chairman Mike Shumate from Union.

39. Vice moderator Glenn Walker gave the Missions Committee report. He recommended that, in addition to the Cleveland, Ohio, Rochester, New York and Hurricane Floyd relief effort, we join the partnerships with Alaska and the Appalachian Mountain areas beginning in the year 2000. The first planning meeting will be in January 2000. Rev. Jim Brackett, who just returned from a South Africa mission trip, spoke to the request for prayer from Bonnie Doughtie. We voted on the partnership and it was approved. Rev. Walker also recommended that we participate in "On Mission Celebration" (formerly known as World Mission Conference) in 2002. This was also approved. He mentioned that our newest work, Providence Baptist Church in the Kings Mountain area, is well on the way. Rev. Billy Rutch, church planter, was recognized and gave thanks to the association for all the support. Worship, Bible studies and many other activities are now taking place there. Mrs. Ruby Alexander, who serves on the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, presented to Providence Church a check for \$5000, which is designated to be used for landscaping.
40. Glenn Walker introduced Mrs. Lora Lee Smith, CCM director from Cleveland, Ohio. She brought greetings and thanks from the people in Cleveland who were touched by the efforts of our partnership there. She presented certificates of appreciation to the associations and our 10 churches that were involved. These being: Bethlehem, Carpenters Grove, Dover, Elizabeth, Flint Hill, Kings Mountain Second, Lawdsdale, New Bethel, Northside in Shelby, and Peoples. She updated us on the many facets of the work in the Cleveland area and asked for our continuing prayer support.
41. In the absence of Evelyn Pascoe from South Africa, Glenn Walker read an e-mail from Bonnie Doughtie who is in South Africa. She updated us on her ministry there. She has set up a resource center that is very much appreciated and used. Sunday School training is being done in many churches. She stated that the partnership is a much needed one and is a blessing to all who are involved. She also thanked all who support her through prayer and finance.
42. Dr. Don Berry, Global Mission Resource Center (formerly World A Resource Center) director at Gardner-Whitcomb brought a report. Dr. Berry likes to think of this as an "Andrew" ministry in that it introduces people to Jesus. One of their ministries is to provide orientation materials to those going abroad and to support all mission efforts. The center exists to connect people and resources so that they may come to know Jesus as Lord.
43. Moderator Keith Dixon then asked us to gather in groups to pray to the Lord that we may feel His movement to go on mission to do His work in Cleveland County and elsewhere in our country and in our world.
44. Mrs. Cindy Hord, minister of music at Lawdsdale, presented us with a solo of "Not Too Far From Here."
45. Rev. Charles Reed, associational Church and Community ministries director, gave his report. He asked that the messengers take the written report back to their churches so that the people can see what opportunities are available for ministry. To date \$28,263.64 has been donated for Hurricane Floyd Relief through our CCM department. Toy Store volunteers are still needed as well as new toys. The Duke Power Foundation Share the Warmth and Community Challenge programs in the near future may be able to help with power bills all year round. Mrs. Charlotte Craig, parish nurse based at the Kings Mountain Hospital, shared with us about this nursing ministry that works with the churches to promote health and healing through body, mind

and spirit. The parish nurses provide health education, teach and coordinate volunteers, serve as liaisons between church and community, provide a listening ear, and provide other services based on faith. Elizabeth Edwards, Christian Women Job Corp director, explained the ministry, founded in 1984, which is to work with women on welfare to find jobs, housing, child care, etc. There are 150 sites across the United States. They are working on getting a site started in Cleveland County. This can be a mission opportunity for those who would like to volunteer as a mentor.

46. Rev. Jerry Welch presented another theme interpretation using "Carry Your Cross" music assisted by Leland Kerr, Keith Dixon, Charles Reed and Glenn Walker. He had a Bible that had the "power" to light a candle.
47. Rev. Larry Franks gave directions and asked the Lord's blessing for our evening meal. The meeting was adjourned until after the meal.

Tuesday Evening October 26, 1989

48. Messengers and visitors gathered for the evening session at Bethel Baptist Church.
49. Vice-Moderator Glenn Walker welcomed everyone and moderated during the evening session.
He asked messengers to fill out attendance cards. He reported 281 attended the Monday evening session at Zion Church. Also, 187 were in attendance at the Tuesday afternoon session.
He reported we collected \$455.00 during our meal to be sent to the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina for Hurricane Floyd Flood Relief.
He called attention to the organizational reports in the Book of Reports and asked everyone to please read the reports. Organizational people give verbal reports at the Spring Biannual Meeting.
He stated we want to dispose of all business matters so we can focus our attention to worshipping God and be in His presence during the remainder of the session.
50. Rev. Jeff Rens, minister of music and pianist at Kings Mountain Baptist Church, presented a mini-concert on the piano for our special music for the evening. His selections included: "Joyful, Joyful We Adore Thee," "Great is Thy Faithfulness," and "It Is Well With My Soul." He finished the concert by playing and leading the congregation in a medley of choruses.
51. Mrs. Beth Heather, minister of music education youth at Dover Church, led the congregation in singing, "Praise to the Lord, the Almighty." Rev. Jeff Rens accompanied on the piano.
52. Rev. Jeff Johnson, minister of students at Kings Mountain First, read scripture from Luke 5:36-39. The opening prayer was led by Rev. Larry Franks, minister of music at adults at Bethel Church.
53. Mr. Don Ramsey, minister of music at Christopher Road Church, led the congregation in singing, "How Firm a Foundation." Rev. Charles Reed accompanied on the piano.
54. Mrs. Mary Ruth Dixon, member of First Hill Church, presented our Theme Interpretation. She gave a beautiful and moving presentation of "Mercy Seat" through sign language and interpretive movement. The message of the song was coming out of our burdens and leaving them with God.

53. Rev. Keith Dixon brought the moderator's message. He used our theme for the evening, "New Challenge for a New Century." He read scripture from Acts 2:42 and from Luke 9. He stated it is time for us to make decisions and carry them out. Our challenge is for the church to turn itself over to the power and leadership of the Holy Spirit. We think and believe if we rely entirely upon the Holy Spirit we will have chaos in our church. We need to remember that God is the God of order not chaos. Consider what if the Holy Spirit moves "outside" the process that we are carrying out. We tend to follow what "other" churches are doing rather than what God wants us to do. Are we trying to put a new century into an old way of being a church? Are we filled with something fresh that causes people to want to experience Jesus or are we frozen with no taste for those "outside" the church? We need to be the church moved by the Holy Spirit of the living God so we can become fishers of men for Christ. As freshness of God's power comes over us, we will experience people coming to the mercy seat of God. In the new millennium we can safely continue to do what we have always done but if we are to be the church we need to be we must go out into the highways and hedges and reach the world for Christ. We can meet the challenge of the new millennium if we allow the Holy Spirit to breathe on us again.
54. Moderator Dixon asked the congregation to join with him as we commit ourselves to what God has done for us on the cross. He asked that we bow for a quiet time of prayer and seek God's forgiveness of our sins, especially that of quenching the Holy Spirit.
55. Moderator Dixon gave instructions to the congregation for participation in the Lord's Supper. Pastors from our churches distributed the Lord's Supper to the congregation. Rev. Dixon reminded us that we have heard the "Good News" and that we have "Good News" to share with others.
56. Mrs. Faitha Beem, minister of music/education/youth at Zion Church, and music director for the Association, led the congregation in a hymn of commitment, "I Surrender All."
57. Rev. Leland Kerr expressed appreciation to Moderator Keith Dixon for his tenure of two years as vice-moderator followed by two years as moderator of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. He presented Rev. Dixon with a plaque as a token of our appreciation to him.
58. The new officers were installed at this time. Rev. Kerr asked that Rev. Glenn Walker, moderator; Rev. Olin Byron, vice-moderator, and Ms. Rebecca Bingham, clerk-treasurer come forward. He asked all the associational staff to join the officers and that everyone come forward to lay hands on the group and commit to pray for them this next year. Rev. Kerr led in prayer for the new officers and the associational staff.
59. Rev. Leland Kerr declared the 149th biennial session adjourned.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S CHALLENGE

After quite a few years of watching, praying and surveying, our newest mission, Providence Baptist Church, is off to a good start. Billy Ruck, our church planter, has been working tirelessly and faithfully for a year and a half and worship services and ministry opportunities are on-going. In February of this year we received a Mobile Chapel from the Baptist State Convention to place on our property on Saint Luke Church Road. Many of our churches in the Kungs Mountain area have contributed to the financial support of this work. Financial support is still needed.

Through the years we have seen the work of the Christopher Road Hispanic Baptist Mission continue to grow. The Christopher Road Baptist Church has graciously provided a place for them to meet and worship for eight years. As both churches have grown, time has come for our Hispanic church to have its own place. They are in the process of purchasing a building on Caleb Road and anticipate occupying it in the next few weeks. We rejoice with them as they continue to grow and move to their new location. We also express appreciation to Christopher Road Baptist Church for their servant-spirit through the sharing of space and resources these eight years.

As our county continues to grow, we have greater opportunities to start new churches. Our Missions Committee will continue to look at ways to start new churches and areas where they are needed. I encourage our churches to develop a mindset that is open to new starts. We will share more about new start opportunities in the future.

The Search Committee for a Church Development Director has begun the process to fill this associational staff position. Please pray for them as they seek God's direction in this process.

The Counseling Ministry Study Committee is at work and hopes to bring recommendations concerning a Counseling Ministry to the Spring Biannual Meeting. A figure of \$10,000 is proposed in our 2000 budget to provide start-up funds for contract counseling services.

Partnership Missions have become a vital part of our associational ministry. Over 40 of our churches have participated in some area of our Partnership Missions since 1993.

I would like to see all 80 of our churches involved in Partnership Missions. Our Missions Committee will recommend a new approach to Partnership Missions during our Biannual Meeting that we feel will make it easier for every church to participate in some area of Partnership Missions.

Our Evangelism Committee continues to seek ways to stress the importance of evangelism in our churches. During our Fall Biannual Meeting they will bring updates from "The Year of Evangelism" and share plans for coming events and emphases.

As a new millennium approaches I believe the church is in a position to do some of its most dynamic and meaningful ministry. As the times change, the church must also be willing to change. We must seek new ways to reach the unchurched. We must show a hurting, hopeless world how to find hope. Our churches must show the world the power of the love of Christ. In order to do this, our churches must be healthy and effective. In his book, *The Purpose Driven Church*, Pastor/Author Rick Warren says, "I believe the key issue for churches in the twenty-first century will be church health, not church growth. Focusing on growth alone misses the point. When congregations are healthy they grow the way God intends."

He further states that the church needs to focus on the nature and the tasks of the church by asking four questions:

1. Why does the church exist?
2. What are we to be as a church? (Who and what are we?)
3. What are we to do as a church? (What does God want done in the world?)
4. How are we to do it?

I encourage our churches to look at these questions and answer them in the context of what the Bible says. May we grow healthier as we enter a new millennium.

4. Prison Ministry:

- YOKEFELLOW MINISTRY** - Volunteers assist with a time of worship and fellowship every other Tuesday evening at the Cleveland Correctional Center.
- BIBLE STUDY** - A volunteer chaplain leads a Bible study for inmates at Cleveland Correctional Center on Thursday afternoons. CCM furnishes devotional guides and Bible study materials for these studies.
- CHRISTMAS GIFT PACKETS** - were distributed to 128 inmates at the Cleveland Correctional Center and a gift was given to the staff of sixty at the facility. Boxes of apples and Bibles were also distributed as a gift from the association.

5. Children's Bible Ministry:

Bible books were distributed to children whose parents applied for assistance in the CCM office. Bible books were distributed to children at the Cleveland County Fair. Thanks to the Brotherhood groups and others whose donations have provided for this ministry.

6. Jail Ministry:

Services were conducted at the Cleveland County Jail and the Jail Annex by forty churches serving on a rotating schedule of at least six volunteers at each facility on Sunday afternoon. Mrs. Judy Allen scheduled the churches and scheduled volunteers who assisted with the jail ministry this year.

7. HIV/AIDS Ministry:

The Regional HIV/AIDS Consortium in Charlotte has once again awarded CCM \$1500 to be used for the food and nutrition needs of the HIV infected. Four volunteers and the CCM director assisted Mrs. Jackie Williams of the Greater Cleveland Association of Cleveland, Ohio, in starting a ministry to people with HIV/AIDS as a result of the mission trip July 9-16, 1999. A dinner and worship service for the HIV infected was held at Elizabeth Baptist Church on May 11, 1999, as a cooperative effort with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.

8. Ministry to the Visually / Hearing Impaired:

A dinner party hosted by CCM and the GA's of Mt. Sinai Baptist Church for eleven blind students from Gardner-Webb University was held May 6, 1999, at Mt. Sinai Baptist Church before the students began study for final exams. Mrs. Vickie Blanton and Mrs. Alta Pernell presented the students with gift baskets they made and graduating seniors were presented a special gift.

Used eye glasses were collected in the CCM office to give to Dr. Craig Spangler and others who used them on mission trips. Used eye glasses and used hearing aids can be donated in the CCM office and given to the Lions Club in Cleveland for repair and distribution to people in need.

9. CCM Summer Missions:

Crystal Lawton served for ten weeks as CCM Summer Missionary. Crystal conducted Bible schools for the Developmentally Disabled, gave leadership to the Friday Lunch Program at First Sheltie, and assisted Rev. Jose and Maria Espinalas with the Migrant Ministry in Belwood. Spanish Bibles were distributed in the Migrant Ministry and a separate time of Bible study was provided for children attending the meals and worship service. Volunteers from churches in KMBA provided the meals for the Migrant Ministry.

10. Disaster Pastors:

This is a new ministry sponsored by CCM to offer training to thirty ministers who will be willing to offer counsel and support to victims and emergency responders in times of natural disasters or other critical incidents. This group works closely with Cleveland County Emergency Management.

Disaster Packers assisted CCEM at an apartment fire in Shelby and responded to the need for additional counselors at Crest High School when a student was killed tragically in an auto accident. Two Y2K Awareness meetings were conducted.

11. Friday Lunch Program:

The number of meals served to the hungry and homeless through the soup kitchen by volunteers from KMBA churches at First Shelby on Fridays was 1333. Assisting in serving were 193 volunteers.

12. Chemical Dependency Workshop:

The 8th annual workshop entitled "The Church Ministering to the Chemically Dependent and their Families" was held at Gardner-Webb University July 19-22, 1999. The faculty this year was as follows: Dr. Frieda Brown, adjunct professor in Gardner-Webb's School of Divinity; Rev. Steve Sammel of the Christian Life and Public Affairs Council of the NC Baptist State Convention; and Rev. Chris Aguin of North Carolina State University. There were twenty-four participants including the faculty.

13. Volunteer Receptionists and Clothing Room Workers:

There are sixteen volunteers who assist regularly in the CCM office as receptionists. Twelve people volunteer on a weekly basis in the clothing room.

14. Metropolitan Food Bank:

In addition to the non-perishable food items donated through the churches of KMBA, fourteen volunteers pick up meat, dairy products, and grocery items from two local Food Lion stores. A total of 20,775 pounds of salvaged items were received from Food Lion to distribute to those in need of food.

15. NCBS/South Africa Baptist Partnership

As a part of the partnership between NC Baptists and the Baptist Union of South Africa the KMBA CCM director consulted the Baptist Union's social ministries committee and churches in Cape Town, Johannesburg, and Pretoria, South Africa, from February 4-16, 1998. Existing ministry projects were evaluated and new ministry ideas were shared with the BU CARE Board of Directors in Johannesburg prior to departure back to the U.S.

16. Cleveland County Fair Ministry:

Since 1990 the Cleveland County Fair Board has asked the KMBA CCM director

to serve as a volunteer chaplain to be on call for ministry needs, assist with the opening ceremonies, and assist with the traditional prayer breakfast held the first Wednesday of the fair for the workers and those who travel with the carnival. With the addition of the new 3,000 seat grandstand, a worship service was held there on Sunday, October 3, for 200 people who could not attend their own church that morning. For those who attended church that day, a free admission was given to those who brought their church bulletin until 1:30 p.m. Gospel music was presented by various churches from 2:00 to 3:00 p.m.

Our deepest gratitude goes to those who have "responded to the call" through giving of their time, talents, spiritual gifts, and financial resources to minister to those in need through CCM of KMBIA. Our deepest gratitude goes to God through our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ for allowing us to be used to respond to the needs of our neighbors and for providing the resources needed to minister effectively. TO GOD BE THE GLORY!

The committee further recommended the following goals for baptisms in the Association for the next three years: 800 baptisms in 1998-1999, 900 baptisms in 1999-2000, and 1000 baptisms in 2000-2001. The recommendations were adopted. The Evangelism Committee has worked to keep the evangelistic theme and baptism goals before the churches.

Understanding that nothing can be accomplished apart from God, the Evangelism Committee encouraged the six groups of churches within the Association to gather for prayer. All six groups held prayer rallies in January of 1999 with a special emphasis on God's empowerment of His churches to do evangelism. Reports from the rallies indicate that the associational fellowship of churches was strengthened and the priority of evangelism was accepted.

The Evangelism Committee encourages the churches to take advantage of the resources available through our associational staff and office, such as: the Mapping Center, Prayer Walk video, Celebrate Jesus 2000 tracts, one-verse evangelism cards, etc. Plans are under way for tent crusades in the spring of 2000 and major evangelistic events in 2001.

The number of young folks involved in these activities is (or should be) an inspiration to us all.

Storms and floods: All ages in all churches are working in some manner (either hand on or through financial aid) to alleviate the devastation caused by major catastrophes like these.

Consecratory wide: LOOK - someone in your church somewhere today is doing something good for another who needs what GOD can provide.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

As we enter a new century and a new millennium, it is good to reflect on the history of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association during the past 150 years. In 2001, the Association will celebrate its sesquicentennial, and the History Committee plans to have the history of the Association published by that year. Between now and 2001, we hope to whet your appetite for reading the history by relating a few interesting facts about the Association.

In 1851, when the Broad River Association met with the Sandy Run Church, thirteen churches left the Broad River Association to form the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. The Broad River Association was made up of churches from a large geographic area including three or four counties in South Carolina and of churches scattered over several counties in North Carolina including Burke, Rutherford, Lincoln, Cleveland, Catawba, Gaston, and Polk. Can you imagine the difficulty in traveling to associational meetings?

Between 1851 and 1999, the number of churches has grown from the original thirteen to seventy-eight churches, one mission and one new work in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association today. Through the years churches have joined the Association and other churches have joined other Associations. For example, several churches left the Kings Mountain Association to join the Gaston Association.

The early church members came to church in horse-drawn buggies and wagons. The small churches were primarily heated by wood-burning stoves. Today, we come to our churches in automobiles and sit in air conditioned buildings. The form of worship has changed dramatically, but the mission of our churches has not changed.

In studying the history of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association, it is evident that at different times the emphasis may have changed. However, emphasis throughout the past 150 years has centered on worship, evangelism, discipleship, fellowship, missions, and ministry. Programs, agencies, techniques, and methods have varied, but the command of Jesus to carry the Gospel to the entire world beginning in the churches of the Association will be an eternal purpose of the churches and the Association.

Comments:

- (1) Church and Community Ministries has been reduced in order to broaden our ministries. Church and Community Ministries receives significant funding from grants, designated gifts from churches and community organizations and personal gifts from individuals. Our budget will still include salary, allowances and benefit support of our two Church and Community Ministries staff members.
- (2) The "New Start Work" line item is doubled to provide continued support of our newest work, Providence Baptist Church, and another anticipated new start in 2000.
- (3) "Hands-on-Missions" is a ministry designed to "involve people in missions worldwide." Glenn Walker, our vice-moderator/moderator-elect is the director and Barry Coker, our Men's Ministries director, is the associate director. Numerous people from our churches have accompanied Glenn and Barry on mission trips nationally and internationally.
- (4) A Counseling Ministry Study Committee was appointed a couple of years ago to research the need and feasibility of a counseling ministry through our association. \$10,000 has been included in this budget to cover the costs of a contract counselor one day per week.

*Salaries and housing utilities allowances, plus the resultant changes in retirement have been increased by 3.0% for our staff.

*The Home Mission Board pays life insurance, disability insurance and all but \$135 a month of medical insurance for our Church and Community Ministries director. Our association pays the remaining portion of his salary.

*In 2000, we will receive \$2380 toward the salary, expenses, etc. of our Church and Community Ministries director. This amount is deducted from our total budget of \$410,871 and adjusts our budget needs for 2000 to \$408,491. This is a 3.8% increase over the 1999 budget.
