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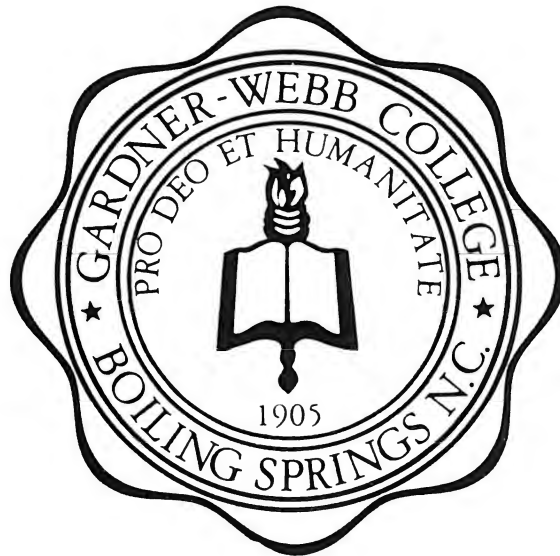

Dr. M. Christopher White speaks on Gardner-Webb College

The fourth increased student enrollment at Gardner-Webb College in as many years speaks to the enthusiasm and forward movement being witnessed on our campus. Records show an increase in each of the College's three main programs – the on-campus program, graduate studies and GOAL (Greater Opportunities for Adult Learners). The residence halls are filled.

New developments

As we open yet another exciting year at Gardner-Webb, two major developments have occurred in our campus offerings. The construction of the Craven E. Williams Observatory is progressing well, thanks to the efforts of the North Carolina Baptist Men and several Gardner-Webb faculty and staff members. The observatory, to be the only one within a 40-mile radius in western North Carolina, has opened a new field of study for our Department of Natural Sciences – the study of astronomy. A professor of astronomy has been added to this department.

Great strides have also been made in the College's Department of Communications. The purchase of video and editing equipment will allow for the setup of a first-rate television/teaching classroom and laboratory.

In the academic area, faculty and staff members are underway with the design of a new core curriculum.

The health of Gardner-Webb College, as with any other school, is in many ways dependent upon three areas – admissions, student retention and giving of all kinds.

Admissions

In terms of the admissions process, we have an outstanding group of admissions counselors at Gardner-Webb. Our admissions people are well-trained, well-equipped, highly motivated and successful at what they do.

Two things will be happening in

our admissions area this fall. The purchase of a new computer system and software for the admissions process will speed up the ability to communicate with prospects and to personalize interaction.

Also, this fall we will look at the total image of the College from a recruiting standpoint. We have employed a leading marketing firm to help design a new admissions package ... to help us define who we are.

Retention

In the area of retention, we are taking what we think are creative and positive steps toward reducing the problem of attrition. We have added air conditioning to the last two residence halls that were not already air conditioned, have made a significant purchase of furniture for Royster Hall, have refurbished three men's residence hall lobbies and have built physical fitness room in Bost Gym.

On a programatic level, we have added a residence hall director and a director of freshman programs in an effort to retain students.

Stemming from this office are a host of activities and attempts to relate to the freshman student. We want to find out why a student comes to Gardner-Webb and what will make that student want to stay.

Also in the area of Student Development, we have strengthened the Career Planning and Placement area. Ruth Kiser, who has a strong counseling background, is working with the students as they decide on areas of study and make career choices. Another new feature in this area is the addition of SIGI Plus, a computer program that allows students to weigh all aspects of making a career choice.

Development

Last year was the best year in the history of Gardner-Webb College in terms of fund-raising.

In addition to our normal operations, we upscaled the efforts of the



Christian Service Organization. This group is working toward a proposed \$1,000,000 endowment, to be reached over a three-year term.

Forrest Feezor: Spirit-Led Man of God, the autobiography of the Rev. Forrest Feezor, as told to Dr. Garland Hendricks was released in July by Gardner-Webb and the Christian Service Organization. Proceeds from the sale of the book go to the Christian Service Organization to further the scholarship endowment.

Also, we are proud of our greatly enhanced Bulldog Club, which raises dollars to provide athletic scholarships at Gardner-Webb. The Bulldog Club this summer launched an \$80,000 campaign, to be completed in May 1990.

At present we are also focused on a special appeal for the renovation of the Charles I. Dover Campus Center. Architectural plans have been drawn to allow for a new heating and air conditioning system as well as the structural renovations.

We are building Block by Block, making lots and lots of little steps in a lot of areas. Our efforts at Gardner-Webb College are a statement of pride in the present and hope for the future.

THE CRAVEN E. WILLIAMS OBSERVATORY

Construction efforts underway thanks to N.C. Baptist Men

Construction has begun on the \$107,000 Craven E. Williams Observatory. The foundation was established early in June with the expertise and assistance of two students from Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute.

The Rev. David A. Thomas Sr. and the Rev. Charles L. Maney put aside their vocations to enter study for the ministry. Rev. Thomas, 51, had been employed in heavy commercial construction for 25 years and worked in North Carolina as a licensed general contractor. Rev. Maney, 34, had worked as manager of a concrete plant in Pendleton, S.C.

The two met at Fruitland and formed a partnership in light construction work, D.T. and C.M. Finishers. As a team, they have worked on about four or five projects.

Their most recent project has been the Gardner-Webb observatory. The two experts worked to create a Sonotube, a 27-foot-high tube that measures two feet in diameter. The Sonotube will be used to base the main telescope.

The solid concrete Sonotube, enforced with steel, was poured in three sections. It sits on its own foundation, separate from that of the observatory building. Nothing will touch the Sonotube except the telescope. This is necessary to avoid any vibrations that might affect the accuracy of the telescope.

The concrete footings for the structure were poured by Tri-City Concrete of Forest City.

Church Group Helps Bring Stars to Observatory

The sun was hot, so volunteers working Saturday morning on the Craven E. Williams Observatory got an early start. Nine members of a single's group from First Baptist Church in Cary were completing the sheeting on the \$107,000 project along with Gardner-Webb College administrators and other volunteers.

"We came because we were looking for a mission project we could take part in and feel like we're accomplishing something," said Iris Caldwell of the Cary group. "I just came because they needed help," another volunteer from Cary said as he pounded nails.

"We did the framing last week," said Dr. Robert Parsons, head of the college's B.E. Morris Academy. "We did the sheeting this week."

Between now and its fall completion date, numbers of volunteers from Baptist churches throughout the state are expected to visit Gardner-Webb and offer assistance on the project. Most of the volunteers will be members of the N.C. Baptist Men's organization, who regularly donate their time to help build churches and projects at Baptist institutions and colleges.

Wayne Honeycutt, a building contractor is the volunteer construction coordinator of the state Baptist convention and the overseer of the local project. Besides working on the projects himself, he also speaks at churches enlisting volunteers for the mission work. "I've been all over the state," he said, Saturday morning as he wiped his brow and waited his turn at the water cooler. "Everybody is interested in what they can do." Most recently, he has coordinated the volunteer efforts of a chapel and fellowship hall at Mars Hill College and a church in Conover. Honeycutt said 2,000 Baptist men across the state representing a variety of professions participate as volunteers in the building of church and college projects. Because of the volunteer efforts, he said the projects cost about half of what they normally would. Materials also are donated or purchased at a reduced price which helps keep costs down.

Churches from Cleveland, Gaston and Lincoln counties will be involved in the observatory construction. Other church groups also will provide lunch for the workers.



College administrators working on the project Saturday, including President Christopher White, said they expect the observatory building to become one of the most used buildings on campus. Located on Stadium Drive, the building includes reception rooms as well as restroom facilities.

Forrest Feezor: Spirit Led Man of God released at June reception

A book review and reception was held June 23 at Gardner-Webb College to release the book, *Forrest Feezor: Spirit-Led Man of God*.

The book is the autobiography of the late Dr. Forrest Chalmers Feezor (1892-1986), as told to Dr. Garland Hendricks.

"When I think about my life from babyhood until now, I realize that it has been a miracle of God working through my Lord Jesus Christ and His Holy Spirit," Dr. Feezor said in the pages of his book.

"He saved me from sin, inspired me with a compelling sense of purpose, disciplined me through my conscience, empowered me with devotion and a strong voice, possessed me with a love for all people and taught me grace through the every day patience and devotion of Jessica (my wife)," he said.

Dr. Feezor served as executive secretary for the Texas Baptist Convention, taught at Liberty Baptist College and served Tabernacle, Broadway and Waco Churches in Texas. Following his retirement, he served several interim pastorates in North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia. Dr. Feezor has also been noted for his influence on the convention level.

Dr. Garland Hendricks, who completed the writing of the book for Dr. Feezor, is former director of the B.E. Morris Academy at Gardner-Webb College.

Dr. Hendricks has authored several books, including *Biography of a Country Church*, *Call to the Country*, published

by the Baptist Home Missions Board, *Appalachian Shepherd*, and *To Higher Ground*.

The cost of the book is \$5, plus \$1 for shipping and handling. Proceeds from the sale of the book will go to the Christian Service Organization at Gardner-Webb College, an organization which provides scholarships to students entering Christian service.

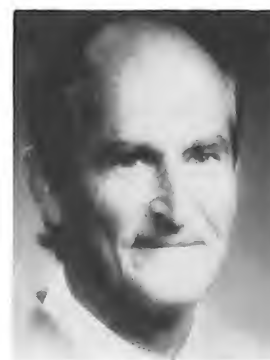
Lonnie Proctor, Bill Naylor are winners in Senior Games

The fund provides financial assistance to worthy and needy full-time students at Gardner-Webb, with preference given to students from Rutherford County and surrounding counties in North Carolina.

Contributions for the open-ended fund were initiated by Mrs. Lindsay. The scholarship will be permanently endowed, with the annual interest available for scholarship awards. Additional contributions may be made at any time by Mrs. Lindsay, her family and friends of Gardner-Webb.

"By endowing a scholarship, the Lindsay name and gift will forever be a part of Gardner-Webb," says Mrs. Lutz. "This is, in my estimation, the wisest use of one's money."

A Look at Railroads in Appalachia: Appalachian Consortium develops new exhibit

Since the late 1800s, railroads have played a major role in the cultural and natural resources of Appalachia.

Geography played a large part in isolating the southern mountains from the mainstream American experience. Settlers often put down roots in one place, farmed and became economically independent. It was in this century of isolation that the unique culture of the Appalachians emerged.

With an increased demand for raw materials to fuel the expanding industrialism of urban America, developers set their sights on the Southern Highlands and their rich storehouse of natural resources. Inroads, via rail, were made to the mountains' resources.

The arrival of the railroad in Appalachia brought change. While it afforded the mountain people increased material advantages and opportunities, it altered their lifestyles. Industrialization caused exploitation

of the land – timbering and mining left much of the land in ruins.

The tourist industry was a natural extension of railroad expansion into the mountains and is today an important component in the revitalization of many communities.

Until recently, however, no attempt has been made to depict the full impact of the railroads on this region. Today the Appalachian Consortium, of which Gardner-Webb College is a member institution, is developing an exhibit entitled, "Agent of Transformation: The Impact of Railroads in the Southern Highlands."

The Consortium is a regional organization dedicated to preserving the cultural and natural resources of the Southern Highlands and the study of the region. Funds for the development of the exhibit are provided by the National Endowment for the Humanities and the member institutions and agencies.

Video shows off Gardner-Webb's attributes

Gardner-Webb has gone the way of the video. At least for admission purposes, anyway.

The College is offering a 13-minute video cassette tape to prospective students interested in learning more about the campus and its offerings.

Gardner-Webb offers new commitment to Athletic Program

Starting with the 1989 Bulldog Club campaign, Gardner-Webb College has made an unprecedented move in support of athletic scholarships. The first \$50,000 raised, excluding lifetime memberships, in this year's campaign will go to the yearly scholarship budget to help pay for the school's 48 athletic scholarships.

However, once the Bulldog Club surpasses that total in giving, one half of every dollar given will go into an endowed athletic scholarship called the Bulldog Club Endowed Athletic Scholarship Fund.

With a goal of \$80,000 for the Bulldog Club this year, we could put as much as \$15,000 into endowment and still have \$65,000 for this year's scholarship budget. There has never been a better time to join the Gardner-Webb College Bulldog Club. Join today!

Last year the school contributed over \$300,000 to athletic scholarships alone. (The Bulldog Club raised \$60,000 to bring the grand total for athletic scholarships to around \$360,000). In addition, the College has committed four new scholarships for the 1989-90 year. The South Atlantic Conference allows 65 total scholarships. Gardner-Webb will now give 48. We are still 17 scholarships away from being competitive year-in and year-out in every sport. Our goal, as a college, is to obtain these additional 17 scholarships over the next three years. This year the Bulldog Club has already raised in excess of \$58,000 (As of August 9, 1989). For our scholarships to reach the maximum number suggested by the South Atlantic Conference we must average \$120,000 in annual contributions.

QUESTIONS PROSPECTIVE MEMBERS MAY ASK

1. What is the Bulldog Club?

The Bulldog Club is a College affiliated support organization consisting of donors to the intercollegiate athletic program. There are several levels of membership based upon the amount contributed on an annual basis. **All the funds raised are used to provide scholarships for student-athletes.**

2. Why should a person/firm join the Bulldog Club?

No two people will have identical reasons for joining the Bulldog Club. However, some of the reasons might include:

- A personal concern for the college and it's image on both a local and national level.
- A strong conviction about the Bulldogs and the Bulldog Club and the opportunity which is being provided to over 250 student-athletes.
- Civic pride, knowing that an effective support organization and thus a successful athletic program is a tremendous community activity.
- Fun. The social benefits of belonging to the Bulldog Club include special travel, meeting new friends, keeping in touch with old friends and making possible business contacts.
- Tickets to football and basketball games.

3. What level of Bulldog Club membership should a donor choose?

Prospective donors often ask what their level of membership in the Bulldog Club should be. The question can only be answered by the individual or business based on income, obligations, and personal concern for the college and its athletic programs. Keep in mind the cost of a total scholarship (\$9,000.00). The cost of running an athletic program is on the rise. Give a gift which is comfortable for you and at the same time support the Bulldogs.

4. What type of benefits will I receive for my donation?

The benefits of the Bulldog Club are many. Depending upon the donor's level of membership, benefits such as parking, game tickets, special meals, tailgate parties, trips, etc. In addition, there are newsletters, decals, press guides, and special recognition gifts.

5. How do the tax laws affect donations?

The gift is tax deductible except for the cost of the tickets. If you do not receive tickets, the entire gift is tax deductible.

6. Why is money needed?

Inflation is not limited to consumers and corporations. Colleges across the nation are second only to hospitals

in increased operating expense. GardnerWebb College is committed to a first-class athletics program, but the price is high.

Scholarship costs continue to escalate, while funding must also be secured for facility improvements and additions.

We are presently 17 scholarships under the South Atlantic Conference Limit. In other words 17 scholarships away from being competitive year-in and year-out in every sport.

7. What is the cost of an athletic scholarship?

The cost for one student-athlete to attend Gardner-Webb College is as follows:

8. How is the money used?

100% of the money raised is used for athletic scholarships. (even the amount designated for tickets) The first \$50,000 raised during the 1989-90 campaign will go to this year's scholarship budget. After that 1/2 of the remaining amount raised will go into the Bulldog Club Endowed Athletic Scholarship Fund. If we reach our budget of \$80,000 this year then we will supply \$65,000 for current scholarships and \$15,000 for endowed scholarships.

Gardner-Webb Biology students tour Florida Everglades and Keys for class credit

On Saturday afternoon, May 6, a group of 16 Gardner-Webb College students and three science professors, Dr. Les Brown, Dr. Tom Jones and Dr. Andy Ashe, boarded two vans for an excursion to the Florida Keys.

Dr. Barbara Burkett and I would join the group in a few days.

The trip, made attractive by the allure of one of America's most noted vacation spots, also held class credits for the students.

The Special Topics Class on the Ecology and Geology of Southern Florida was offered this year, for the first time, through the Gardner-Webb Department of Natural Sciences. The course outline included presentations on terrestrial vegetation, geology, coral ecology and a look at the environment and marine life in the Keys.

The first night's stop was in southern Georgia at Crooked River State Park. An early morning start on Sunday took the group along the Limestone Belt, giving them an opportunity to talk about cave systems and hydrology. They wound their way south to the Ocala National Forest in Florida, where they camped at Mayakka River State Park.

Monday's adventures took the class to the Gulf of Mexico, where they visited Ding Darling National Wildlife



Refuge and Sanibel Island, just off the coast at Fort Myers. Here, they caught the very last of the Horseshoe Crab and looked for glimpses of the Roseate Spoonbill and other exotic birds. And, a part of the morning was set aside for snorkeling.

Monday also included a stop at Corkscrew Swamp Audubon Preserve, an inland Cypress swamp, before settling in for the night at Collier Seminole State Park. Here, they met the mosquito.

Tuesday was an introduction to the Everglades, and was a day of fame for the Gardner-Webb group. Driving across the northern Everglades to the east coast, the group made its way through a portion of Big Cypress Swamp, heading to the Shark River Observation Tower. Here, they planned to view the grasslands or "wet prairie."

Entering an area that was under heavy attack by brush fire, the vans were being rerouted when the group was approached by a television news reporter and film crew. The reporter was covering the effects of the brush fire in Shark Valley, and talked with Gardner-Webb biologists Dr. Jones and Dr. Ashe. The interview, which gave the two professors a chance to

explain the necessity of the burning from an environmental standpoint, aired that night on Miami's Channel 10.

Campsites were set up Tuesday night at Everglades National Park – home for the next three nights.

Anhinga Trail caught in early morning

Wednesday's activities began before sunrise. Students and professors crawled out of tents at 4 a.m. and headed for Anhinga Trail.

The Anhinga trail is a wonderful cross-section of the Everglades – from the sawgrass prairie to the Mangrove trees and other hardwoods. There is a quiet peacefulness about the place, disturbed only by the calls of the birds found nesting there.

The waters that move ever-so-gently throughout the Everglades form a pond at this spot. A rustling in the Lily pads that float there will, upon closer examination, often reveal one of the many alligators that live in this setting.

Wednesday stretched on to include hiking along nature trails in the afternoon, along with visits to Mahogany Hammock and Pinelands.

Having arrived in the Keys Wednesday evening, Dr. Burkett and I joined the group Thursday morning. Driving

through the Everglades National Park to the campsite, we could see the dark clouds of a storm coming across the horizon toward us. The sun blanketed the prairie between us and the darkness and the full arch of a rainbow formed, stretching to touch the earth just ahead ... perhaps a good omen for the day.

Thursday morning we visited the sawgrass communities and Mangrove communities that make up a large portion of the Everglades. The Mangrove trees, with exposed roots that are snarled and tangled, are found growing in the fresh waters of the Everglades as well as in salt water.

Arriving at Nine Mile Pond, we were greeted by a large alligator lying near the shore. A short hike along a trail that circled the pond allowed us to watch the Anhingas drying themselves. The Anhingas are large birds that have no oil glands, so they must "hang themselves out to dry."

The next stop was Paurot's Pond, where the students had a lesson on the Mangrove Islands, or Hammocks of hardwoods, that form amid the sawgrasses. These Hammocks serve, in part, to provide hurricane protection.

The morning's last stop was at Coot Bay, a known nesting site for the American Bald Eagle. A frustrated group of birdwatchers returned to the campsite, only to spot a Bald Eagle in a tree several yards away.

Thursday afternoon was spent on a backwater cruise in the Everglades. The highlight of the cruise was seeing a crocodile sunning himself on a fallen tree at the water's edge. We learned that he was one of a small number of crocodiles, approximately 300, left in the area. A Miami biologist who has worked 15 years researching various parts of this area for a large land developer says he has never seen a crocodile – adding to the excitement of our find.

Students discover life in the Keys

Friday morning the students were out of the Everglades, away from the mosquitoes. Their activities had taken them into the upper part of the Florida Keys.

An early morning snorkle in Card Sound, on the Atlantic side of Key Largo, started the day. The light of the warm morning sun created sparkles as it caught the slight ripples of the water.

The water was a little rougher that day than most, and the satin-like surface usually seen on the water was disturbed.

The students spent most of the morning at this peaceful setting, where they learned of sponges and various organisms that make up a world just below the water's surface.

Friday afternoon was the group's first boat charter. We spent an entire afternoon snorkling and diving at John Pennkamp Coral Reef. Here, we discovered what it is like to meet up with both barracuda and sharks in the water. Fortunately, the creatures were only as curious as we were.

Just off the reef at our second dive site, we discovered a large statue of Christ that had been planted firmly on



the ocean's floor. Christ's outstretched arms seemed to reach out to us as we swam above the statue. And, the divers were able to read the inscription on the base of the piece, which was donated to the United States by France. There was no touching the statue, however, for parts of it were covered with Fire Coral, which is aptly named.

Saturday, the group had planned to visit the Turtle Grass communities on

Boot Key. However, we learned of a drug war that had recently occurred there resulting in the deaths of two innocent people. Needless to say, plans were altered a bit and a part of the day was spent relaxing ... and studying for the exam that they had that night.

Sunday also began with a snorkle, just out from where the students were camping at Bahia Honda State Park. Here, we met up with yet another barracuda – one that was estimated at about six feet long.

The dive was also at a protected site for queen conch. Gently turning over what appeared to be brown rocks just under the sand, we revealed the beautifully colored shells. The live conch quickly dashed inside, and the shells were carefully placed where they had been.

Sunday afternoon's highlight was a visit to Lignum Vitae State Botanical Park on Lignum Vitae Key. While in the boat crossing to the island, we spotted a water spout in the distance. Eying the dark funnel that dipped from the clouds, we were told it was a tornado over the water. (This was an experience that Dr. Burkett and I would have again, later in the week.) Fortunately, in both instances, the spout took another turn and dissipated before it got to us.

Library Benefits from Washburn Endowment

The Wyan and Emily Washburn Endowment of \$20,000 was established earlier this year by the Boiling Springs couple.

The endowment has been directed at the Gardner-Webb Library and is restricted to the purchase of books and curriculum-materials for the Religious Studies program at the College.

"This is the first endowed fund in this college that is for-the purchase of instructional materials," says Dr. Chris White.

Dr. Washburn's interest in Gardner-Webb goes back many decades, notes Dr. White. He has served as a member of the Board of Advisors and as a Trustee and held the position of campus physician in past years.

The Gardner Society

Members contribute \$1500 each year to help meet pressing needs of the College.

The Gardner Society is named for Governor O. Max Gardner, who gave needed leadership to the College during the depression years. Members receive a large armatele plate inscribed with the College crest and cameo.

The Webb Alliance, named for the Webb family, is made up of individuals who contribute \$500 to \$1499 annually. The Webbs, in particular Mrs. Faye Webb Gardner, were early benefactors of the College. Members receive a small armatele plate inscribed with the College crest and cameo.



The Christian Service Organization

The Christian Service Organization provides scholarship aid for committed, capable and deserving students preparing for Christian service through a full-time church vocation.

Gifts are primarily direct, bequests or memorial contributions. All gifts go into an endowment fund for scholarships, with interest used each semester to help students prepare for their church-related vocations.



The Bulldog Club

The Bulldog Club helps support athletics at Gardner-Webb by raising money for athletic scholarships. Last year the school contributed over \$300,000 to athletic scholarships alone, with the Bulldog Club raising \$60,000 to bring the total to approximately \$360,000. This year, the Bulldog Club has set a goal of \$80,000.

The Heritage Club

Membership in the Heritage Club is made up of individuals who are helping to assure the future of Gardner-Webb College by participating in building more adequate endowment resources.

Persons qualify by making a gift \$1000 or more to Gardner-Webb College or a gift of land, stock, insurance, copyright, oil rights, letter stock or restricted stock, etc. to the Endowment Fund of the College. Other gifts may be in the form of a new or revised will, directing that a percentage, a fixed amount or a contingency bequest be received by the Endowment Fund; the creation of a Charitable Remainder Unitrust or an Annuity Trust, a Pooled Life Income Agreement, a Charitable Gift Annuity, a Life Estate or a bank deposit that directs all or a portion of the principal to the Endowment Fund; or by the creation of a Charitable Lead Trust that directs all or a portion of the income to the Endowment Fund of Gardner-Webb College.

Once on the island, we were in for a delightful surprise. The island, one of the highest elevations in the Keys, at 16 feet above sea level, is also one of the few that had a supply of fresh water.

A house, built of coral, has been standing at this site since the 1800s, having withstood many storms and hurricanes. It was the approximately two-mile trail, however, that captured the group. Except that the varieties of trees and plants were quite different, we might have been walking along a trail in North Carolina woods – not at all what we expected to find on an island!

Key West was a highlight of the trip

The last leg of the trip for the class began early Monday morning with a trip to the Big Pine Deer Refuge on Big Pine Key.

We learned that the Key Deer is a subspecies of the Virginia white-tailed deer. The shoulder height of these graceful creatures is only 24 to 28 inches. As we walked a nature trail through the refuge, one of the deer made its way to the path. A hush fell over the large group as we watched him quietly nibble on a nearby leaf. He seemed to pose for photographs and appeared to be quite tame, although no one tried to coax him to trust us – the next group might not be as friendly to a trusting animal.

After the hike, there was time for lunch at the famous Seven Mile Grill, located just at the beginning of the Seven-Mile Bridge. The new concrete spanse replaces the old 35,716-foot bridge, which is very narrow. The old bridge still stands, with part of it used as a fishing pier.

Monday afternoon was spent on another dive and snorkle trip, this time boarding a boat to Looe Key. Here, the divers



watched as an octopus ate a lobster and snorkled through a sea of jelly created by a cluster of harmless jelly-fish. And, again, the group encountered a shark in the waters.

Tuesday was a full day as the group headed south to Key West. We made a quick stop at Sugarloaf Lodge to have a chance look at Sugar, the dolphin in residence there. Fortunately, Sugar's trainer was just about to feed her a breakfast of fish and we were treated to a full show – one not to be equalled at any of the tourist locations.

Key West was a day of shopping and battling the heat and humidity, which registered at about 99 percent. The group had time to enjoy the flavor

of the charming town – and, in the evening, experienced a look at a rather unique form of nightlife. Part of the group spent the Key West day on a boat trip out to Sand Key, where they opted to snorkle, because energy levels were too low to dive.

By Wednesday, thoughts had turned to going home. The trip north, out of the Keys, bypassed Miami and ended in Fort Lauderdale. For the first time in 11 nights, the students slept in beds. There were estatic screams up and down the hall when they discovered televisions in their rooms ... and it didn't take long for everyone to have long, hot showers or for the girls to apply their makeup.

Thursday was the grand finale for the trip. Early Thursday morning the group boarded a small plane for Nassau in the Bahamas for a day of sightseeing and shopping. With the exception of a rough plane ride, the day was yet another treat for the students, many of whom had never flown. The trip ended after the students and three professors completed a long drive to Boiling Springs. With a final exam on Saturday, the students packed up their memories and experiences and headed home for the summer.





Leadership Development Scholarship funds Student Leadership Retreat

When Earl and Evelyn Spangler of Shelby endowed the Leadership Development Scholarship at Gardner-Webb 10 years ago, it provided scholarship dollars to an incoming freshman each year.

Annually, the entering freshman with the most clearly demonstrated record of, and with the most predictable potential for, general practical leadership was selected. The recipient was recognized for his achievements and potential.

Today, the endowment has expanded to allow a number of students to benefit from the Spanglers' generosity.

The endowment was established "to express a commitment to Christian higher education and to manifest an interest in assisting students with the potential for leadership."

The Spanglers' intent was to have the endowment extend to develop programs that would stress the need for creative leadership in society.

This year, the Spangler Leadership Development Scholarship was used to fund the Spangler Student Leadership Retreat, held at Camp Broadstone in Valle Crucis.

Forty-two students, under the direction of Dr. Richard Franklin, vice president and dean for student development, participated in the retreat.

The three-day retreat was designed to allow student leaders the opportunity

to learn group interaction, problem solving and decision making skills, and to build self-esteem.

"They learned to do things they never thought they could do," says Dr. Franklin.

The students participated in a High Ropes Course, a Group Interaction Course and Caving. "I liked the High Ropes so much," commented one student after the retreat, "Not only because it gave me a chance to meet and conquer fear, but because it gave all of us a chance to support and encourage each other."

The weekend was punctuated with entertainment and quiet time. Dr. Franklin gave a presentation on leadership - discussing task and relationship styles. And, there were games and activities designed to get the group to work together.

"These were designed at showing you work best in harmony with others," says Dr. Franklin, "showing the importance of teamwork, not trying to do it all yourself."

The students, all leaders of campus clubs and organizations for 1989-90, were not given specifics on how to handle each leadership position. But, they came away from the retreat ready to take on the responsibilities of their respective roles.

"Because of the activities, we all became more group oriented and learned to be followers as well as leaders," said another student.

He can feel pain on the side that doesn't move well and has no sensation of pain on his good right side. He has some problems with seeing things up close, which the doctors say should improve. He has an area on one side of the top of his head that is extremely sensitive to pain. The weakness on his left side includes his neck, causing him to have difficulty holding his head straight; and he becomes ill if his head and neck bend forward too far.

When Tom comes home he will

likely be confined to a wheelchair or with crutches and leg braces. He says he will walk again and his family believes this. Meanwhile, they are asking for any ideas or suggestions to make their split-level accessible to Tom.

Tom's spirits are very high. He can feed himself pretty well and is out of bed for most of the day and in therapy. He has decided he's had enough of high school, so he is going to get his GED while in Denver and hopes to go to college when he gets home.

Tom's parents are keeping busy changing the house and writing letters to newspapers and members of Congress on gun controls.
