management but desired to apply her skills to human resources. "I have always had a passion for working with associates," she reflected. "I knew all the policies and how things should run within the business, so the transition to human resources was smooth."

Since earning her Master of Business Administration (MBA) in Human Resources, she's worked in various corporate and manufacturing positions. Bullard was promoted to assistant human resources manager at Sara Lee Intimate Apparel in Statesville, N.C., and worked there until 2006. Then, she took a job in human resources at Newell Rubbermaid in Huntersville, N.C., where she worked nine years and received various promotions. She worked for Amazon in Spartanburg, S.C., for nearly two years.

Recently, she was named associate director of Human Resources at Davidson (N.C.) College. Her primary responsibilities include managerial training, employee relations and performance management. "Being strategic in the workplace is key to being successful," Bullard stated. "The Gardner-Webb classes promoted my forward thinking, which has been essential in my growth in human resources."
