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Classes Challenge Roberta F. Callaway ('16) to be a Conduit for Change

a self-assessment. The exercise in introspection proved to be the most beneficial in

I knew we could use our different perspectives to grow professionally, so I began the practice of looking for strengths in others and using those strengths as opportunities for growth."

She was further challenged by Dr. Jenny Sabin, GWU adjunct professor, to be a conduit for change. "She helped me understand the gradual and ongoing nature of personal and organizational change," Callaway affirmed. "She inspired me to use constructive criticism as a means to improve, and provided immeasurable support throughout the dissertation process."

With the information she learned in her doctoral classes, Callaway was able to make improvements in how she conducted her job. "My clinical experience assignments helped me gain a thorough understanding of the interconnection of school, community, and curriculum with student achievement," she assessed. "I became more involved in the inner workings of my school, community, and district."
